REPORT.

TO THE RIGHT HON. THE CHIEF SECRETARY FOR IRELAND,

SIR,

I have the honour to transmit for your information, the Annual Criminal and Statistical Returns of the Dublin Metropolitan Police District for the year ended 31st December, 1875.

Indictable Offences.

The total number of indictable offences committed within the police district during the year was 3,725 against 3,734 in 1874, and 3,800 in 1873, being a decrease of 9 offences as compared with 1874, and 81 as compared with 1873. The total number of persons apprehended on these charges in 1875 was 1,697 against 1,579 in 1874, and 1,661 in 1873, showing an increase of 118 persons as compared with 1874, and 36 as compared with 1873. Of the 1,697 persons arrested 1,107 were males and 590 females; of these 474 males and 173 females were committed for trial at sessions or commission; 159 males and 26 females were bailed to stand their trial; 20 males and 4 females were held to bail, &c., by magistrates, and the residue, viz., 454 males and 387 females, were discharged, either for want of sufficient evidence or through non-attendance of prosecutors, &c.

Cases summarily disposed of.

The total number of persons proceeded against on charges and summonses before magistrates numbered 42,439 against 42,032 in 1874, and 39,374 in 1873, showing an increase of 407 as compared with 1874, and 3,065 as compared with 1873. The 42,439 consisted of 29,557 males against 29,260 in 1874, and 26,770 in 1873, and 12,882 females in 1875 against 12,772 in 1874, and 12,604 in 1873. The numbers convicted of these summarily disposed of were 27,129 males and 11,828 females, against 25,853 males and 11,327 females in 1874, and 24,686 males and 11,680 females in 1873. The number discharged of these summarily adjudicated on by the magistrates in 1875, amounted to 2,358 males and 1,054 females, against 3,407 males and 1,445 females in 1874, and 2,084 males and 924 females in 1873.

Total Number of Persons Apprehended.

The total number of persons apprehended on charges by the police was 26,378 against 26,880 in 1874, and 26,633 in 1873, showing a decrease of 502 as compared with 1874, and 257 as compared with 1873. The 26,378 consisted of 16,901 males, against 17,388 in 1874, and 16,673 in 1873, and 9,477 females (in 1875), against 9,492 in 1874, and 9,962 in 1873.

Infanticide, &c.

There was one case of infanticide within the police district during the year; there was also one attempt to murder an infant by drowning. The offender (a female), was made amenable in the latter case and was sentenced to 6 months' imprisonment by the Right Hon. the Recorder at City Sessions.

Manslaughter, Indecent Offences, Bigamy, Coining, Assaults, and other Offences.

21 males and 4 females were arrested for manslaughter, 9 cases of which resulted from the careless driving of vehicles, 29 males and 9 females for shooting, stabbing, &c., calculated to do bodily harm, 14 males for indecent offences, 5 for rape, &c., 3 females for unlaw-

fully abandoning children under 2 years of age, 1 female for withholding sustenance from infants, 1 male for bigamy, 1 female for concealing the birth of an infant, 25 persons for intimidation, 279 males and 102 females for aggravated assaults, &c., 2 persons for arson, 3 persons for forgery, 31 persons for uttering, putting off, and having in possession, base and counterfeit coin, 845 persons for assaulting the police, 1,706 for committing common assaults, 61 persons for committing assaults with violence for the purpose of robbery, 11 persons for having arms, &c., in their possession in a proclaimed district, 9 for cattle stealing, 75 for frauds and embezzlement, 1,206 persons for simple larcenies committed without violence, 670 persons for having property, &c., unlawfully in their possession, 7 persons for receiving stolen goods, 7 persons for illegally pawning goods which had been intrusted to them, 3 persons for receiving soldiers' necessaries, 50 for attempts to commit larceny, 1 for dog stealing, 3 males for indecently exposing the person with intent to insult females, 308 for offences against the Vagrant Act, 147 males and 21 females for committing acts contrary to public decency, 581 persons for wilful damage, trespass, &c., 18 for breaches of contract, 4 for breaches of the Reformatory Schools Act, 71 for cruelty to animals, 41 for desertion from the army, &c., 12 for deserting families, 23 for fraudulent enlistment, 402 for negligent driving, viz., 276 without injury, and 126 with injury to person, 97 for refusing to pay car fare, 62 for refusing to pay railway fare, 60 for offences against the Workhouse Acts, 2 persons for child stealing, 9 persons for cruelty to children, 5 persons for disturbing congregations, 4 persons for obstructing railway company's servants, 1 for personating police, and 1 for illegally abstracting gas from a gas pipe.

Riot, &c.

There were 5 cases of riot within the police district during the year, two of which were in connection with amateur bands playing through the streets; 21 persons were made amenable for these offences.

In the month of June there were two men arrested in the act of attempting to destroy the Prince Consort statue in the Leinster Lawn, for which offence they were sentenced to 18 months' imprisonment each by the Judges at Commission.

Drunkenness.

The charges for drunkenness numbered 13,316, viz., 8,627 males and 4,719 females, against 13,810 in 1874, and 12,891 in 1873, showing a decrease of 464 as compared with 1874, and an increase of 455 as compared with 1873.

Disorderly Conduct, &c.

The number of arrests for disorderly conduct, &c., was 3,500, viz., 2,507 males and 993 females, against 3,652 in 1874, and 3,777 in 1873, showing a decrease of 152 as compared with 1874, and of 277 as compared with 1873.

The number of prostitutes apprehended for disorderly conduct, &c., was 1,462, against 1,522 in 1874, and 2,057 in 1873, showing a decrease of 60 as compared with 1874, and 595 as compared with 1873.

Education of Persons Arrested in 1875, 1874, and 1873.

In 1875 of 16,901 males arrested, 3,878 could neither read nor write, 11,975 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 723 could read and write well, and 323 were of superior education. Of 9,477 females taken into custody, 4,295 could neither read nor write, 5,185 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 83 could read and write well, and 14 were of superior education. In 1874 of 17,388 males arrested, 5,327 could neither read nor write, 10,856 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 843 could read and write well, and 362 were of superior education. Of 9,492 females taken into custody, 4,404 could neither read nor write, 5,030 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 53 could read and write well, and 5 were of superior education. In 1873 of 16,673 males arrested, 5,666 could neither read nor write, 9,639 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 913 could read and write well, and 455 were of superior education. Of 9,962 females taken into custody, 4,753 could neither read nor write, 5,150 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 59 could read and write well, and none were of superior education.

Ages of Persons Arrested in 1875.

In 1875 of the 26,378 persons taken into custody on charges by the police, 148 persons were under 10 years of age, 726 were over 10 years and under 15, 2,938 were over 15 years and under 20, 5,562 were over 20 years and under 25, 4,653 were over 25 years and under 30, 3,792 were over 30 years and under 35, 2,205 were over 35 years and under 40, 3,750 were over 40 years and under 50, 1,854 were over 50 years and under 60, and 834 were 60 years of age and upwards.

Result of Committals for Trial.

Of the 891 persons committed for trial, 554 were convicted, 189 were acquitted; 42 bills were ignored by Grand Jury, 3 persons were discharged through non-attendance of prosecutors, and 13 were not tried but held over.

Sentences of Persons Convicted.

Of the 554 persons convicted, 2 were sentenced to penal servitude for 14 years, 18 for 7 years, 68 for years, 5 for 2 years, 67 for 12 months and under 2 years, 114 for 6 months and under 12, 186 for 1 month and under 6, 3 under 1 month, 72 fined, held to bail, &c., and 1 were sent to reformatories.

Summary Convictions—Imprisonment.

Of the 39,022 persons summarily convicted on charges and summonses by justices, 70 were imprisoned for 6 months and above 3 months, 127 for 3 months and above 2 months, 383 for 2 months and above 1 month, 560 for 1 month and above 14 days, 940 for 14 days and under 53 to reformatories, 246 to certified industrial schools, 21,049 were fined, 180 were held to bail, 28 were delivered to military authorities, and 15,391 to other punishments.

Committals for Trial and Summarily disposed of—Percentage of Convictions in each case.

Of the number of persons committed for trial 70½ per cent. were convicted, and of the number of persons summarily disposed of 90½ per cent. were convicted.

Known Thieves.

The number of known thieves, depredators, and suspected persons within the police district who were proceeded against on indictment and summarily during the year, was 812, against 64 in 1874, being an increase of 198 as compared with the latter year. The number of the above class at large within the police district in the month of April, 1875, was 40.

There are receivers of stolen property, &c., within the police district, who live solely by buying and selling stolen goods.

Burglaries.

The number of burglaries committed in 1875 was 23, against 28 in 1874, showing a decrease of 5 as compared with the latter year. The number of persons arrested for this class of offence in 1875 was 30, against 28 in 1874, and of those so arrested there were convicted in 1875, 12, against 19 in 1874. 14 attempts were made to break into warehouses, &c., during the year, against 22 in 1874, being a decrease of 8 as compared with the latter year, 3 persons were made amenable by the police for this class of crime, 2 of whom were convicted.

Prostitution.

The number of prostitutes within the police district in 1875 was 537, against 531 in 1874, and 506 in 1873, showing an increase of 6 as compared with 1874, and 31 as compared with 1873.

The number of houses occupied or frequented by this class of persons was 124, against 143 in 1874 and 138 in 1873.

Suicides.

13 suicides were committed during the year, against 9 in the year 1874, and 11 in the year 1873; the attempts to commit suicide numbered 41, against 29 in 1874, and 40 in 1873.

Inquests.

The number of coroners' inquests held in 1875 was 292, against 279 in 1874, and 275 in 1873, showing an increase of 13 as compared with 1874, and 17 as compared with 1873.

Juvenile Offenders.

The total number of juvenile offenders committed to reformatories was 72, against 104 in 1874, and 107 in 1873; 246 children were transmitted to certified industrial schools during the year, against 184 in 1874, and 244 in 1873. For offences committed by those children—see Table No. 2, pages 12 and 13, also Table 50, page 56.

Money found on Drunken Persons.

6,508 persons were arrested for drunkenness during the year 1875, having money and other valuable property in their possession amounting to £20,951 11s. 3½d., which money and property were handed over to them by the police when sober.

Stolen Property Recovered.

The average daily loss sustained by the public from theft or malicious injury is set down at £24 13s. 8½d., against £23 19s. 9½d. in 1874, and £26 10s. 1½d. in 1873, the gross loss was £16,177, against £14,531 in 1874, and £17,433 in 1873, and of this sum the police recovered £7,167, against £5,775 in 1874, and £7,752 in 1873. It is necessary to bear in mind that the loss in each case reported to the police is estimated and determined not by them, but by the public who never underrate their loss; and the area of the Dublin Police District is upwards of 45 square miles, and has spread over its surface an incalculable amount of property, exposed and portable. In many instances property reported to the police as stolen or lost turns out to be only mislaid. The recovery in such cases is rarely reported to the police, therefore the loss is not so much as may appear in Table 29. 44½ per cent. of property stolen has been recovered by the police in 1875, against 39½ per cent. in 1874, and 44 per cent. in 1873. For full details, see Table 29, page 49.

Public Houses.

The total number of public-houses in the police district open for the sale of spirituous liquors in 1874 and 1875 was 1,012, being a decrease of 9 as compared with 1873.

The number of summonses issued against publicans at the suit of the police for violation of the law was 111, against 137 in 1874, and convictions were obtained in 101 cases out of the 111.

Spirit Grocers and Beer Dealers.

The number of spirit grocers within the district in 1875 was 361, being a decrease of 5 as compared with 1874. Of that number 141 are suspected of selling contrary to the tenor of their licence; 238 summonses were issued against spirit grocers in infractions of the law, and convictions followed in 208 cases. The number of beer-houses was 189, being a decrease of 37 as compared with 1874, 127 of those are suspected of selling contrary to the tenor of their respective licences; 128 summonses were taken out at the instance of the police against beer dealers for violation of the law, and convictions were obtained in 99 cases. There were 100 houses in which liquor was sold without licence within the police district, showing an increase of 8 as compared with 1874. 249 summonses were issued against the owners of these unlicensed houses for selling liquor, &c., and convictions obtained in 189 instances.

Refreshment Houses.

There are 106 coffee shops and other refreshment houses in the police district, against 113 in 1874, showing a decrease of 7 as compared with the latter year; 101 of those houses are conducted regularly, and 5 irregularly. There were 36 houses having a wine licence only within the district; all are regularly conducted.

Deserted Children.

The number of children found deserted by the police and others was 31, against 41 in 1874, and 38 in 1873. The number of children found dead by the police, &c., was 32, against 35 in 1874, and 31 in 1873.

Fires.

There were 61 fires during the year, which destroyed property to the value of £219,858, against 56 fires, with a loss of property amounting to £19,342 in 1874. The amount saved was £38,975 in 1875, against £69,688 in 1874. There was one life lost by fire in 1875, and two lives lost in 1874.

A very destructive fire (included in the above) occurred on the 18th June, originating in a spirit store at Chamber-street, by which twenty-three houses in the neighbourhood, with property contained therein, were wholly or partly destroyed; loss of property computed at £179,450.

Sanitary Proceedings.

The police on sanitary duty within the municipal district during the year visited 36,296 houses, containing 128,043 rooms, and discovered therein 26,709 sanitary defects, and had 23,955 of that number remedied; 4,332 summonses were issued at the suit of the police, and convictions were obtained in 1,314 instances. The police also made 2,922 visits to nightly lodging-houses, 2,106 visits to slaughter-houses, and 1,483 visits to bake-houses.

Hackney Carriages, Drivers, &c.

In the year 1875 there were within the police district 2,157 licensed vehicles, being a decrease of 29 as compared with the year 1874; the 2,157 vehicles consisted of 1,099 hackney carriages 855 cabriolets, 134 job carriages, and 69 stage carriages (60 of which latter are train cabs). There were 2,541 licensed drivers, being an increase of 253 as compared with the year 1874. A general inspection of all vehicles, and drivers thereof, was held in May and the inspecting officers reported 1,899 vehicles as fit for public accommodation; there were 35 vehicles not produced, the owners of 15 of these vehicles were fined, 27 were cautioned by the magistrates, and the remainder, after the lapse of a few days, produced their vehicles in proper working order.

2,408 summonses were issued at the suit of the police for breaches of the Dublin Carriage Regulations, showing an increase of 339 as compared with 1874; the 2,468 consisted of 1,117 against owners and drivers of hackney carriages, 1,250 against cabriolet owners and drivers, 28 against owners of job carriages, and 3 against proprietors of stage carriages; the average fine imposed in each hackney carriage summons case was 2s. 11d., in each job carriage summons case 15s. 11d., and in the one stage carriage case in which a fine was inflicted the amount was 20s.

449 licensed drivers were arrested by the police during the year for breaches of the carriage laws, &c., whilst in charge of their vehicles; for punishments inflicted in these cases, see Table 2, page 53. As a consequence of such offences as appear in this Table, the Commissioners of Police each year (at the time set apart for renewing drivers' licences for the ensuing year), after a review of the drivers' character, refuses to renew the licences of the worst conducted; some are never afterwards relicensed, others are kept out of their licences for certain periods, according to the gravity of their offences, and are not relicensed until satisfactory proof of amendment is given. The refusal to renew the licence has the effect of throwing the driver idle, and proves to him that a strict account is kept, and that he can only hope to obtain his licence by good conduct. The Commissioner's power in this respect is much feared by drivers, and has the effect of restraining many within bounds who would otherwise be very reckless. This year 37 were refused renewal of their licences at the time set apart for renewal, many of whom will not be permitted again to renew, and such of them as may be relicensed must be entitled to consideration for previous good character, acts of honesty, &c. In addition to those refused renewal, the licences of 11 were revoked during the year by the Commissioner of Police for misconduct.

It is to be observed that in the majority of offences set forth in Table 51, page 57, particularly as regards the drivers of hackney carriages, &c., the law empowers the magistrate to inflict fines not exceeding 40s., or the alternative of a month's imprisonment.

302 new licences and transfers of hackney carriages and cabriolets were granted during the year, in each instance the vehicle, horse, &c., being inspected and pronounced fit for public use, and the character of the person licensed ascertained beforehand to be satisfactory.

644 applications were made for drivers' and conductors' licences during the year; 563 were granted, character having been found on inquiry to be good; 16 refused, character being unsatisfactory, 7 unable to read, 2 their parents being unwilling, 46 did not follow

up their applications, 2 not the requisite age, 2 having been charged as lunatics, and 4 not having sufficient bodily strength.

349 hackney carriages and 369 cabriolets were noticed by the police to be slightly out of repair during the year, the owners of which were not summoned nor licences of those vehicles suspended, but time allowed them to effect the repairs. This system is adopted where the subject of complaint is of a trivial nature, and a better result is obtained than would be from summons.

Property found in Hackney Carriages.

Property found in cabriolets and on hackney carriages by drivers during the year 1875, and how disposed of:—Surrendered to police.—In 747 instances there were 898 articles of property surrendered, of which 525 articles were claimed by and given up to the owners at the Police Office, Exchange Court, Dame-street, and 18 at the various police stations within the district, making a total of 543 articles claimed; the remainder sent to the Police Store, Dublin Castle. The articles surrendered included upwards of 450 umbrellas of every description, gold brooches, locket, and other articles of jewellery, a gun, a revolver, a sword, a telescope, a chronometer, and a sewing machine, also several valuable opera glasses, and a quantity of wearing apparel, 7 sovereigns and 11 half sovereigns were received in mistake for coins of lesser value in payment of fares, out of which 2 sovereigns and 6 half sovereigns were claimed, the remainder were sent into the police store. In 16 instances bank notes, gold and silver, amounting to £72 2s. 9½d. were surrendered, out of which £42 12s. 10d. were not claimed but sent to the police store. Exclusive of the cash found, cheques value for £10 5s., a bill of exchange for £20, and a bill of acceptance for £12 were surrendered, all of which were claimed.

The sovereigns, half sovereigns, bank notes, &c., are not included in the total number of instances named above. Property when surrendered at the police stations, except those of the Kingstown division, if not claimed immediately, is forwarded to the carriage branch of the Detective Department, where it remains for a week, and if not claimed is sent to the police store.

Recipients of property left rewards for drivers to the amount of £21 13s. during the year.

The police on carriage duty, in the course of their inquiries after property reported as forgotten in hackney vehicles, ascertained that the drivers had surrendered direct to the owners 18 umbrellas, an opera glass, a silver bracelet, 3 purses (one containing £20 in gold, another £4, and the third £3 15s., and a deposit receipt for £75), and some articles of wearing apparel.

POLICE FORCE.

The effective strength of the police force on the 31st December, 1875, was 1,093 men of all ranks.

Since the increase of pay granted from December, 1872, the force has not only been fully kept up, without any difficulty, to its authorized strength, but there are at present considerable numbers of approved candidates waiting for vacancies. The recruits who have joined since the period mentioned, are not alone men of far greater physical strength, but men of superior education, and belonging to a better class than those who have presented themselves for enlistment during several preceding years. The average height of the whole force is now 5 feet 10½ inches; average weight, 12 stone 11½ lbs.

Police Band.

There is now attached to the Dublin Metropolitan Police establishment a band, consisting of thirty-one members (police constables), who in addition to attending at band performance, also do duty on the streets. The band was established on the 2nd August, 1873, and the expense connected with its support are wholly defrayed by subscriptions from the officers and men of the service.
