# REPORT.

TO THE RIGHT HON. THE CHIEF SECRETARY FOR IRELAND,

Sir,

I have the honour to transmit for your information, the Annual Criminal and Statistical Returns of the Dublin Metropolitan Police District for the year ended 31st December, 1878.

## *Indictable Offences.*

The total number of indictable offences committed within the police district during the year was 3,512 against 3,292 in 1877, and 3,447 in 1876, being an increase of 220 offences as compared with 1877, and of 65 as compared with 1876. The total number of persons apprehended on these charges in 1878 was 1,714 against 1,713 in 1877, and 1,797 in 1876, showing an increase of 1 as compared with 1877, and a decrease of 83 as compared with 1876. Of the 1,714 persons arrested, 1,104 were males and 610 females; of these 363 males and 154 females were committed for trial at sessions or commission; 124 males and 27 females were bailed to stand their trial; 45 males and 17 females were held to bail, &c., by magistrates, and the residue, viz., 572 males and 412 females, were discharged, either for want of sufficient evidence or through non-attendance of prosecutors, &c.

## *Cases summarily disposed of.*

The total number of persons proceeded against on charges and summonses before magistrates numbered 52,323 against 44,802 in 1877, and 43,247 in 1876, showing an increase of 7,521 as compared with 1877, and of 9,076 as compared with 1876. The 52,323 persons consisted of 37,552 males (against 31,284 in 1877, and 29,493 in 1876,) and 14,771 females (against 13,518 in 1877, and 13,754 in 1876.) The numbers convicted of those summarily disposed of were 34,782 males and 13,537 females, against 28,476 males and 12,141 females in 1877, and 26,763 males and 12,522 females in 1876. The number discharged of those summarily adjudicated on by the magistrates in 1878, amounted to 2,770 males and 1,234 females, against 2,808 males and 1,377 females in 1877, and 2,730 males and 1,232 females in 1876.

## *Total Number of Persons Apprehended.*

The total number of persons apprehended on charges by the police was 31,308 against 27,340 in 1877, and 27,126 in 1876, showing an increase of 4,068 as compared with 1877, and of 4,188 as compared with 1876. The 31,308 persons consisted of 20,377 males, (against 17,279 in 1877, and 16,902 in 1876,) and 10,931 females (against 9,961 in 1877, and 10,218 in 1876.)

The total number proceeded against on summons was 22,729, viz.: 18,279 males and 4,450 females.

## *Manslaughter, Indecent Offences, Coining, Assaults, and other Offences.*

17 males and 2 females were arrested for manslaughter (10 cases of which were the result of reckless driving of vehicles), 44 males and 10 females for shooting at, stabbing, &c., with intent to do bodily harm, 24 males for indecent assaults, 4 for rape, 1 male and 5 females for deserting infants, 2 males and 6 females for withholding sustenance from infants, 40 persons for intimidation, 495 persons for aggravated assaults, 1 for bigamy, 3



females for concealing births of infants, 3 persons for arson, 7 for forgery, 52 for uttering base coin, or having same in their possession, 858 for assaulting the police, 1,997 for committing common assaults, 41 for assaults for the purpose of robbery, 3 for having arms without a licence, 16 for cattle stealing, 70 for frauds and embezzlement, 1,290 for simple larceny committed without violence, 736 for unlawfully possessing goods, 8 for receiving stolen goods, 5 for receiving soldiers' necessaries, 2 for illegally pawning goods, 115 for attempts to commit larceny, 1 for dog stealing, 7 males for indecently exposing the person with intent to insult females, 330 persons for offences against the Vagrant Act, 385 for obstructing public footways and carriage ways, 271 for committing acts contrary to public decency, 608 for wilful damage, 3 for breach of contract, 20 for breaches of Reformatory and Industrial Schools Acts, 187 males and 1 female for cruelty to animals, 158 for desertion from army, &c., 2 for deserting their families, 4 for disturbing congregations at public worship, 53 for fraudulent enlistment in Army and Militia, 415 for negligent driving of vehicles (152 of these having caused injury to person), 131 for refusing car fare, &c., 17 for offences against Workhouse Act, 10 for misdemeanors on railways, 186 for offences against the "Beer and Spirit Licensing Acts," 16 for gambling, 1 for perjury, 4 for contempt of court, 3 for making false declarations, 1 for falsely stating that he was a deserter, 1 for representing himself as a police constable, 1 for taking forcible possession of a tenement, 3 for illegal interment, and 1 for fraudulent bankruptcy. (See "Misdemeanors," &c., Table VII.) There were also 15 convicts apprehended, whose tickets of leave had been revoked.

#### *Offences against the Traffic Act.*

There were 2,047 persons proceeded against summarily for offences against the Dublin Traffic Act during the year. Convictions were obtained in 2,046 of these cases, and fines inflicted to the amount of £895 16s. 6d.

#### *Drunkenness.*

The charges for drunkenness numbered 13,667, viz., 9,261 males and 4,406 females, against 12,301, viz., 8,189 males, 4,112 females in 1877.

#### *Drunk and Disorderly.*

The charges for drunkenness combined with disorderly conduct, numbered 3,351, viz., 1,154 males and 1,597 females, against 2,314, viz., 1,381 males and 933 females in 1877.

#### *Disorderly Conduct, &c.*

The number of arrests for disorderly conduct, &c., was 3,045, viz., 2,304 males and 741 females, against 2,454, viz., 1,613 males, 841 females in 1877.

The number of prostitutes arrested for disorderly conduct, &c., in addition to the foregoing, was 1,393, against 1,672 in 1877.

Total drunk and disorderly for year 1878, 21,456, against 18,741 in 1877, and 18,067 in 1876, showing an increase of 2,715 as compared with 1877, and of 3,389 as compared with 1876.

There were 350 persons charged for being drunk or drunk and disorderly three times and upwards during the year.

#### *Education of Persons Arrested in 1878.*

In 1878 of 20,377 males arrested, 4,429 could neither read nor write, 14,745 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 847 could read and write well, and 356 were of superior education. Of 10,931 females taken into custody, 4,889 could neither read nor write, 5,990 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 40 could read and write well, and 12 were of superior education.

In 1877 of 17,279 males arrested, 4,064 could neither read nor write, 12,115 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 755 could read and write well, and 345 were of superior education. Of 9,961 females taken into custody, 4,763 could neither read nor write, 5,151 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 39 could read and write well, and 8 were of superior education. In 1876 of 16,902 males arrested, 3,964 could neither read nor write, 11,957 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 642 could read and write well, and 339 were of superior education. Of 10,218 females taken into custody, 4,920 could neither read nor write, 5,263 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 27 could read and write well, and 8 were of superior education.



*Ages of Persons Arrested in 1878.*

In 1878 of 31,308 persons taken into custody on charges by the police, 128 persons were under 10 years of age, 759 were 10 years and under 15, 3,641 were 15 years and under 20, 6,965 were 20 years and under 25, 5,887 were 25 years and under 30, 4,245 were 30 years and under 35, 2,664 were 35 years and under 40, 4,151 were 40 years and under 50, 1,986 were 50 years and under 60, 882 were 60 years and upwards.

*Results of Committals for Trial in 1878.*

Of 656 persons committed for trial, 482 were convicted, 114 acquitted, 26 bills were ignored by Grand Jury, 11 persons were discharged through non-attendance of prosecutors, &c., and 23 were not tried but held over.

*Sentences of Persons Convicted.*

Of the 482 persons convicted, 1 was sentenced to 20 years' penal servitude, 1 to 14 years, 1 to 10 years, 4 to 7 years, 41 to 5 years, 10 to 2 years, 62 to 12 months' imprisonment and under 2 years, 121 to 6 months and under 12, 126 to 1 month and under 6, 3 persons for periods under 1 month, 5 were sent to reformatory schools, 3 fined, and 104 held to bail.

*Summary Convictions—Imprisonment.*

Of 48,312 persons summarily convicted on charges and summonses by justices, 3 were imprisoned for over 6 months, 84 for 6 months and above 3 months, 165 for 3 months and above 2 months, 515 for 2 months and above 1 month, 757 for 1 month and above 14 days, 1,279 for 14 days and under, 65 to reformatories, 185 to certified industrial schools, 28,481 were fined, 346 were held to bail, 134 were delivered to military authorities, and 16,305 to other punishments.

*Committals for Trial and Summarily disposed of—Percentage of Convictions of the persons taken into custody on charges.*

Of the number of persons committed for trial 77 per cent. were convicted, and of the number of persons summarily disposed of 90½ per cent. were convicted.

*Known Thieves.*

The number of known thieves, depredators, and suspected persons within the police district who were proceeded against on indictment and summarily during the year, was 987, against 558 in 1877, being an increase of 329 as compared with the latter year. The number of the above class at large within the police district in the month of April, 1878, was 533.

*Burglaries.*

The number of burglaries committed in 1878 was 39, against 34 in 1877, showing an increase of 5 as compared with the latter year. The number of persons arrested for this class of offences in 1878 was 33, against 25 in 1877, and of those so arrested in 1878 19 were convicted against 17 in 1877. 20 attempts were made to break into warehouses, &c., during the year, against 12 in 1877, being an increase of 8 as compared with that year. 3 persons were made amenable for this class of offence, 2 of whom were discharged, and 1 was convicted.

*Prostitution.*

The number of prostitutes within the police district in 1878 was 513, against 539 in 1877, and 498 in 1876, showing a decrease of 26 as compared with 1877, and an increase of 20 as compared with 1876.

The number of houses occupied or frequented by this class of persons was 139, against 171 in 1877, and 131 in 1876.

*Suicides and Lunacy.*

10 suicides were committed during the year, against 12 in 1877, and 13 in 1876; the attempts to commit suicide numbered 50, against 53 in 1877 and 1876; 267 persons were charged as dangerous lunatics in 1878, against 250 in 1877.



*Inquests.*

The number of deaths where coroners' inquests were held in 1878 was 312, against 275 in 1877, and 273 in 1876, showing an increase of 37 as compared with 1877, and of 39 as compared with 1876.

*Juvenile Offenders.*

The total number of juvenile offenders committed to reformatories was 70, (viz. 65 by magistrates, and 5 by Judges), against 87 in 1877, and 80 in 1876; 185 children were transmitted to certified industrial schools during the year, against 211 in 1877, and 235 in 1876. For offences committed by these children—see Table No. 2, pages 12 and 13, and Table No. 23, pages 40 and 41.

*Money found on Drunken Persons.*

5,810 persons were arrested for drunkenness during the year 1878, having money and other valuable property in their possession amounting to about £8,843, which money and property were handed over by the police to these persons when sober.

*Stolen Property Recovered.*

The average daily loss sustained by the public from theft or malicious injury is set down at £17 17s. 11d., against £18 19s. 5½d., in 1877, and £17 0s. 6d. in 1876. The gross loss was £10,451, against £12,600 in 1877, and £9,496 in 1876, and of this sum the police recovered £3,919, against £5,673, in 1877, and £3,276 in 1876. It is necessary to bear in mind that the loss in each case reported to the police is estimated and determined not by them, but by the public who never underrate their loss; and that the area of the Dublin Police District is upwards of 36 square miles, and has spread over its surface an incalculable amount of property, exposed and portable. In many instances property reported to the police as stolen or lost turns out to be only mislaid. The recovery in such cases is rarely reported to the police, therefore the loss is not so much as may appear in Table 30. 37½ per cent. of property stolen has been recovered by the police in 1878, against 45½ in 1877, and 34½ per cent. in 1876. For full details, see Table 30, page 47.

*Public Houses.*

The total number of public-houses in the police district open for the sale of spirituous liquors in 1878 was 999, being a decrease of 8 as compared with 1877 and of 9 as compared with 1876.

The number of summonses issued against publicans at the suit of the police for violation of the law was 115, against 121 in 1877, and convictions were obtained in 86 cases out of the 115.

*Spirit Grocers and Beer Dealers.*

The number of spirit grocers within the district in 1878 was 245, being a decrease of 58 as compared with 1877. Of that number 131 are suspected of selling contrary to the tenor of their licences. Summonses were issued in 200 cases against spirit grocers for infractions of the law, and convictions followed in 167 cases. The number of beer-shops was 65, being a decrease of 50 as compared with 1877. 33 of these are suspected of selling contrary to the tenor of their licences; 45 summonses were taken out at the instance of the police against beer-dealers for violation of the law, and convictions were obtained in 37 cases. There were 204 houses in which liquor was sold without licence within the police district, showing an increase of 21 as compared with 1877. 432 summonses were issued against the owners of these unlicensed houses for selling liquor, &c., and convictions obtained in 397 instances.

*Refreshment Houses.*

There are 94 coffee shops and other refreshment houses in the police district, being a decrease of 11 as compared with 1877; 85 of these houses were conducted regularly, and 9 irregularly. There were 44 houses having a wine licence only, within the district; all the latter are conducted regularly.

*Deserted Children.*

The number of children found deserted by the police and others in 1878 was 48 against 40 in 1877, and 29 in 1876. The number of children found dead by the police and others was 36, against 32 in 1877, and 21 in 1876.



*Fires.*

There were 78 fires during the year, which destroyed property to the value of £36,574, against 62 fires, with loss of property £42,184 in 1877. The amount saved was £40,697 in 1878, against £143,046 in 1877. There were 3 lives lost by fires in 1878.

*Sanitary Proceedings.*

The police on sanitary duty within the municipal district during the year, visited 52,252 houses, containing 147,156 rooms, and discovered therein 29,500 sanitary defects, and had 29,341 of that number remedied; 4,481 summonses were issued at the suit of the police, for offences against the sanitary laws, and convictions were obtained in 4,472 instances. The police also made 2,905 visits to nightly lodging-houses, 2,564 visits to slaughter-houses, and 1,642 visits to bake-houses during the year.

Although sanitary duty is in no way under the control of the Commissioner, he thinks it right to insert the report of work done as he has received it, remarking that these constables are sent to and paid for by the Corporation, and in townships by the local authority; that, as regards their duties, they are directed and supervised by the local authority and sanitary officers, and are responsible only to the Commissioner for their sobriety, strict observance of the rules of the force, general good conduct, and efficiency while thus employed. 1 acting-inspector, 4 sergeants, 3 acting-sergeants, and 7 constables are employed as sanitary officers by the Corporation.

*Hackney Carriages, Drivers, &c.*

In the year 1878 there were within the police district 2,703 licensed vehicles, being an increase of 532 as compared with the year 1877; these vehicles consisted of 1,112 hackney carriages, 864 cabriolets (including 64 phaetons), 131 job carriages, and 96 stage carriages (90 of the latter are tram cars). There were 2,830 licensed drivers, being an increase of 230 as compared with the year 1877. A general inspection of all vehicles, and drivers thereof, was held in May, and the inspecting officers reported 1,823 vehicles as fit for public accommodation. There were 71 vehicles not produced; the owners of 6 of these vehicles were fined, the owners of 44 were cautioned by the magistrates, and the owners of the remainder produced their vehicles after the lapse of a few days, when they were found to be in good working order, as also 3 vehicles excepted by the inspecting officers, but subsequently repaired.

3,001 summonses were issued at the suit of the police for breaches of the Dublin Carriage Regulations, showing an increase of 844 as compared with 1877; they consisted of 1,520 against owners and drivers of hackney carriages, 1,369 against cabriolet owners and drivers, 16 against owners of job carriages, and 23 against owners of stage carriages; the average fine imposed in hackney carriage cases was 2s. 9d., cabriolets 2s. 10d., job carriages 6s. 7d., and stage carriages 3s. 10d.

615 licensed drivers were arrested by the police during the year for breaches of the carriage laws, &c., whilst in charge of their vehicles; for punishments inflicted in these cases, see Table 53, page 55. As a consequence of such offences as appear in this Table, the Commissioner of Police each year (at the time set apart for renewing drivers' licences), after a review of the drivers' characters, refuses to renew the licences of the worst conducted; some are never again relicensed, others are kept out of their licences for certain periods, according to the gravity of their offences, and are not relicensed until satisfactory proof of amendment is given. The refusal to renew the licence has the effect of depriving the driver of employment, and proves to him that a strict account is kept, and that he can only hope to obtain his licence by good conduct. The Commissioner's power in this respect is much feared by drivers, and has the effect of restraining many within bounds who would otherwise be very reckless. This year 61 were refused renewal of their licences, many of whom will not be permitted again to renew, and such of them as may be relicensed must be entitled to consideration for honesty, meritorious conduct, &c. There is an increase of 25 in the number refused renewal as compared with 1877. In addition to those refused renewal, the licences of 27 drivers were revoked during the year by the Commissioner of Police for misconduct.

It is to be observed that in the majority of offences set forth in Table 52, page 55, particularly as regards the drivers of hackney carriages, &c., the law empowers the magistrate to inflict fines not exceeding 40s., or the alternative of a month's imprisonment.

361 new licences and transfers of hackney carriages and cabriolets were granted during



the year, in each instance the vehicle, horse, &c., being inspected and pronounced fit for public use, and the character of the person licensed ascertained to be satisfactory.

812 applications were made for drivers' and conductors' licences during the year; 687 were granted, character being found good; 39 refused, character being unsatisfactory, 12 unable to read, 1 parents opposing grant of licence, 7 not being requisite age, 4 not having sufficient bodily strength, and 69 failed to follow up applications.

478 hackney carriages and 454 cabriolets were noticed by the police to be in bad repair during the year; the owners were not summoned nor their licences suspended, but time was allowed them to effect the necessary repairs. This system is adopted where the subject of complaint is of a trivial nature, and a better result is obtained than would be from summons.

The licences of 21 hackney vehicles were revoked in 1878. There were 3 licences revoked during the year 1877.

#### *Property found in Hackney Carriages.*

In 778 instances there were 1,088 articles of property surrendered to the police by drivers, of which number 601 articles were claimed by and given up to the owners at the Police Office, Exchange Court, and 5 at the different station houses, making a total of 606 articles claimed; the remainder were sent to the Police Store, Lower Castle Yard. The articles surrendered included 477 umbrellas, 3 clocks, 2 gold rings, 3 bracelets, and other articles of jewellery, 2 guns, 1 revolver, 1 case of surgical instruments, 4 hand muffs, 14 shawls, and 19 opera glasses; 13 sovereigns and 16 half-sovereigns were received by drivers in mistake for silver coins and were surrendered; 5 of the sovereigns and 1 half-sovereign were claimed by and given up to owners, the remainder were sent into store. In 25 instances, bank notes, gold and silver, amounting in all to £34 17s. 9d. (exclusive of the foregoing), were found in vehicles, and surrendered by the drivers. These were all claimed except £4 3s. 8d., which was sent into store. Recipients of property left rewards for drivers surrendering same to the amount of £16 15s. 9d. during the year.

The police on carriage duty, in the course of their inquiries after property ascertained that the drivers had surrendered direct to owners 1 diamond bracelet, 1 gold locket, 1 opera glass, 9 umbrellas, 3 portmanteaus, 10 hand bags, 2 boxes, 6 coats, 1 sword, 1 shawl, 1 rug, 1 clock, 1 writing case, 2 cases of furs, 1 purse, containing 10s., and 11 other articles which had been forgotten in their vehicles, in addition to those above mentioned.

#### *POLICE FORCE.*

During the past few years a considerable number of new streets and squares have been opened and handed over to the police, which has added materially to their responsibilities.

The area of the Metropolitan Police District is 36 square miles 261 square yards. The population numbers 337,589 persons.

The year 1878 has been remarkable for its severity, accompanied by an epidemic of small-pox and fever—typhoid and typhus—and scarlatina. In the force there were 31 cases of small-pox, 58 typhoid, 4 typhus, and 1 scarlatina; 11 men died; 41 men were incapacitated for service from ill health (including the 11 men who died in the service during the year).

The general conduct of the men during the year has been good.

The authorized strength of the Force is 7 superintendents, 26 inspectors, 51 acting-inspectors, 72 sergeants, 94 acting-sergeants, and 873 constables (including the Detective Service), being an increase of 35 men, allowed to be recruited up in lieu of men given to Public Departments.

Four acting-inspectors, 5 sergeants, 3 acting-sergeants, and 42 constables are employed permanently at the Courts of Justice, Magistrates' Offices, Board of Works, Sanitary and Cattle-plague duties, leaving available 7 superintendents, 26 inspectors, 47 acting-inspectors, 67 sergeants, 91 acting-sergeants, and 831 constables for legitimate police duty throughout the whole of the Metropolitan Police District.

From this total a large allowance must be made for the working and interior economy of the Force and a daily average of 64 for men sick and on leave, 31 gaolets, mess-men, clerks, men employed in the police stores, and in attendance on the vans and horses used in the conveyance of prisoners.

When a due allowance has been made for the duties above mentioned, there is seldom found to be over 900 officers and men available for duty. This number has to meet the



necessary demands for police made from all sides. It has to be divided, by two for day and night duty, and the remainder sub-divided by two to form two reliefs. Thus, for part of the twelve hours of day and of night there can be only 225 of all ranks on duty throughout the whole Metropolitan District, while for  $4\frac{1}{2}$  hours of day or night the full strength of the detail day or night are on duty. Thus the average duty done by each man is 7 hours.

Eight hundred and fifty-eight persons were charged with assaulting the police, being an increase of 60 upon the preceding year. Some of these assaults were of a very serious character, inflicting severe injury upon the men, who displayed a great deal of courage, forbearance, and good temper on these very trying occasions.

The system of fixed points in the posting of constables on street duty as carried out in London has been adopted since 14th October, 1872, and is found to tend to the efficiency of the service.

Two hundred and fourteen persons were reported to the police as lost or missing during the year, of which number 118 were found by the police and restored to their friends, 55 were found by their friends or returned home, and 11 were found dead.

The school was re-organized in 1875. Since that year the attendance has greatly increased, as will be seen by the following figures:—

This result is satisfactory when it is considered that the attendance of the men is voluntary and in their own time.

The Commissioner expects that the attendance will be double in the present year, as he has obtained a much larger and more commodious school in Kevin-street Barrack, and he has secured the assistance of one of the First Class teachers from the National Board of Education.

A very considerable augmentation has been made to the library. Branch book-cases have been sent to the several divisions and barracks, and the books changed periodically. The Commissioner is happy to say that an increased desire to read has appeared, as manifested by the numbers enrolled on the library list.

Promotion in the service can only be attained through competition by examination. A sufficient number of the seniors on a junior grade are nominated to compete for the vacancy or vacancies, as the case may be, in the senior rank, and they receive promotion in their order of merit, provided they take a sufficient number of marks to qualify. These examinations hold good to all ranks, even to the promotion of constables from a lower to a higher scale of pay. The examination papers are suitable in character to the examination, with the exception of the rank of inspector. The examination is almost entirely confined to the outline of police duties in the street, the public-house duties, and licensing laws, the carriage and traffic Acts, to read, to spell, and to write legibly, so as to be able to make an intelligible report. The Commissioner has endeavoured to secure that as they advance in the service they increase in the knowledge of police duties, thus adding to the efficiency of their service. These examinations are conducted under the immediate direction and supervision of the Assistant-Commissioner.

#### *Police Band.*

The Dublin Metropolitan Police band consists of thirty-four members (police sergeants and constables), who in addition to their musical performances, also do duty on the streets. The band is now about six years organized, and the expenses connected with it are wholly defrayed by subscriptions from the officers and men of the service.

Of the 31 cases of small-pox only 6 occurred North of the Liffey.  
There were 37 cases of assault and 15 of chronic rheumatism.

During the year 8 men were discharged upon pension. They included one Superintendent; 3 Inspectors; one Sergeant; and 3 Constables.

The average service of each was within a few days of thirty years. Within the same period 10 Constables were removed in consequence of ill health, who were not entitled to pensions by length of service. Of these 5 received gratuities on the prescribed scale.

We had so many cases of febrile and inflammatory diseases throughout the year, that we were obliged to avail ourselves largely of the accommodation which was freely afforded to us in the various hospitals of the city, and in "St. Michael's," at Kingstown.

To the Staff of the House of Industry Hospitals, in which the great majority of our sick are treated, we have reason to be grateful for the skill, kindness, and attention given by them to the Force. It would be well, however, that arrangements should be made which would insure admission for our men upon every occasion they are sent thither, however trifling the case may seem. There are other contingencies beside the gravity of the symptoms that render the treatment of a constable in hospital important to our economy and discipline.

I would recommend, also, that a ward in each of the chronic hospitals of this Institution should be set apart for the exclusive use of the Metropolitan Police.
