# REPORT.

TO THE RIGHT HON. THE CHIEF SECRETARY FOR IRELAND,

SIR,

I have the honour to transmit for your information, the Annual Criminal and Statistical Returns of the Dublin Metropolitan Police District for the year ended 31st December, 1879.

## *Indictable Offences.*

The total number of indictable offences committed within the police district during the year was 3,735 against 3,512 in 1878, and 3,292 in 1877, being an increase of 223 offences as compared with 1878, and of 443 as compared with 1877. The total number of persons apprehended on these charges in 1879 was 1,517 against 1,714 in 1878, and 1,713 in 1877, showing a decrease of 197 as compared with 1878, and a decrease of 196 as compared with 1877. Of the 1,517 persons arrested, 1,004 were males and 513 females; of these 375 males and 134 females were committed for trial at sessions or commission: 109 males and 20 females were bailed to stand their trial; 82 males and 19 females were held to bail, &c., by magistrates, 1 male was committed for want of sureties, and the residue, viz., 437 males and 340 females, were discharged, either for want of sufficient evidence or through non-attendance of prosecutors, &c.

## *Cases summarily disposed of.*

The total number of persons proceeded against on charges and summonses before magistrates numbered 48,334 against 52,323 in 1878, and 44,807 in 1877, showing a decrease of 3,989 as compared with 1878, and an increase of 3,527 as compared with 1877. The 48,334 persons consisted of 34,678 males (against 37,552 in 1878, and 31,284 in 1877) and 13,656 females (against 14,771 in 1878, and 13,518 in 1877). The numbers convicted of those summarily disposed of were 31,496 males and 12,326 females, against 34,782 males and 13,537 females in 1878, and 28,476 males and 12,141 females in 1877. The number discharged of those summarily adjudicated on by the magistrates in 1879 amounted to 3,182 males and 1,330 females, against 2,770 males and 1,234 females in 1878, and 2,808 males and 1,377 females in 1877.

## *Total Number of Persons Apprehended.*

The total number of persons apprehended on charges by the police was 26,209 against 31,308 in 1878, and 27,240 in 1877, showing a decrease of 5,099 as compared with 1878, and of 1,031 as compared with 1877. The 26,209 persons consisted of 16,949 males (against 20,377 in 1878, and 17,279 in 1877) and 9,260 females (against 10,931 in 1878, and 9,961 in 1877).

The total number proceeded against on summons was 23,642, viz.: 18,733 males and 4,909 females.

## *Murder and Infanticide.*

There were 2 persons charged with murder, in one case the indictment was changed to manslaughter, and in the other the prisoner was acquitted on the ground of insanity.

There were 2 persons charged for attempting to murder an infant, both were discharged by the magistrate.

## *Riot, &c.*

There were 6 persons charged for a riot and assaulting constables when proceeding to quell same; 4 were sentenced to 6 months' imprisonment, and 2 were held to bail by the Magistrates.



*Manlaughter, Indecent Offences, Coining, Assaults, and other Offences.*

16 males and 2 females were arrested for manslaughter (7 cases of which were the result of reckless driving of vehicles), 17 males and 6 females for shooting at, stabbing, &c., with intent to do bodily harm, 14 males for indecent assaults, 7 for rape, 1 male and 6 females for deserting infants, 1 male and 1 female for withholding sustenance from infants, 39 persons for intimidation, 477 persons for aggravated assaults, 2 for child stealing, 3 females for concealing births of infants, 2 persons for arson, 6 for forgery, 51 for coining, uttering base coin, or having same in their possession, 862 for assaulting the police, 1,500 for committing common assaults, 16 for assaults for the purpose of robbery, 3 for having arms without a licence, 16 for cattle stealing, 69 for frauds and embezzlement, 1,162 for simple larceny committed without violence, 702 for unlawfully possessing goods, 17 for receiving stolen goods, 7 for receiving soldiers' necessaries, 7 for illegally pawning goods, 139 for attempts to commit larceny, 2 for dog stealing, 3 males for indecently exposing the person with intent to insult females, 425 persons for offences against the Vagrant Act, 312 for obstructing public footways and carriage ways, 204 for committing acts contrary to public decency, 612 for wilful damage, 4 for breach of contract, 17 for breaches of Reformatory and Industrial Schools Acts, 162 males and 1 female for cruelty to animals, 103 for desertion from army, &c., 8 for deserting their families, 6 for disturbing congregations at public worship, 12 for fraudulent enlistment in Army and Militia, 339 for negligent driving of vehicles (124 of these having caused injury to person), 148 for refusing car fare, &c., 28 for offences against Poor Law Acts, 9 for misdemeanors on railways, 148 for offences against the Beer and Spirit Licensing Acts, 16 for offences against the Revenue Laws, 26 for gambling, 2 for perjury, 1 for falsely stating that he was a deserter, 3 for discharging fire-arms on or near public thoroughfares, 1 for conveying whiskey into a Man-of-war Ship, and 1 for procuring a situation by means of a forged certificate of character. (See "Misdemeanors," &c., Table VII.) There were also 21 convicts apprehended, whose tickets of leave had been revoked.

*Offences against the Traffic Act.*

There were 2,816 persons proceeded against summarily for offences against the Dublin Traffic Act during the year. Convictions were obtained in 2,544 of these cases, and fines inflicted to the amount of £312 18s. 2d.

*Drunkenness.*

The charges for drunkenness numbered 10,558, viz., 6,967 males and 3,591 females, against 13,667, viz., 9,261 males and 4,406 females in 1878, and 12,301, viz., 8,182 males, 4,112 females in 1877.

*Drunk and Disorderly.*

The charges for drunkenness combined with disorderly conduct, numbered 2,966, viz., 1,377 males and 1,589 females, against 3,351, viz., 1,754 males and 1,597 females in 1878, and 2,314, viz., 1,381 males and 933 females in 1877.

*Disorderly Conduct, &c.*

The number of arrests for disorderly conduct, &c., was 2,557, viz., 1,971 males and 586 females, against 3,045, viz., 2,304 males and 741 females in 1878, and 2,454, viz., 1,613 males, 841 females in 1877.

The number of prostitutes arrested for disorderly conduct, &c., in addition to the foregoing, was 1,102, against 1,393 in 1878, and 1,672 in 1877.

Total drunk and disorderly for year 1879, 17,183, against 21,456 in 1878, and 18,741 in 1877, showing a decrease of 4,273 as compared with 1878, and of 1,558 as compared with 1877.

There were 439 persons charged for being drunk or drunk and disorderly *three times and upwards* during the year.

*Education of Persons Arrested in 1879.*

In 1879 of 16,949 males arrested, 3,765 could neither read nor write, 12,392 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 506 could read and write well, and 286 were of superior education. Of 9,260 females taken into custody, 4,107 could neither read nor write, 5,088 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 58 could read and write well, and 7 were of superior education.



In 1878 of 20,377 males arrested, 4,429 could neither read nor write, 14,745 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 847 could read and write well, and 356 were of superior education. Of 10,931 females taken into custody, 4,889 could neither read nor write, 5,990 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 40 could read and write well, and 12 were of superior education. In 1877 of 17,279 males arrested, 4,064 could neither read nor write, 12,115 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 755 could read and write well, and 345 were of superior education. Of 9,961 females taken into custody, 4,763 could neither read nor write, 5,151 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 39 could read and write well, and 8 were of superior education.

#### *Ages of Persons Arrested in 1879.*

In 1879 of 26,209 persons taken into custody on charges by the police, 172 persons were under 10 years of age, 603 were 10 years and under 15, 3,092 were 15 years and under 20, 5,733 were 20 years and under 25, 5,116 were 25 years and under 30, 3,534 were 30 years and under 35, 2,328 were 35 years and under 40, 3,443 were 40 years and under 50, 1,528 were 50 years and under 60, 660 were 60 years and upwards.

#### *Results of Committals for Trial in 1879.*

Of 614 persons committed for trial, 404 were convicted, 140 acquitted, 38 bills were ignored by Grand Jury, 14 persons were discharged through non-attendance of prosecutors, &c., and 18 were not tried but held over.

#### *Sentences of Persons Convicted.*

Of the 404 persons convicted, 1 was sentenced to 20 years' penal servitude, 2 to 14 years, 2 to 10 years, 5 to 7 years, 22 to 5 years, 1 to 2 years, 69 to 12 months' imprisonment and under 2 years, 125 to 6 months and under 12, 116 to 1 month and under 6, 3 persons for periods under 1 month, 5 were sent to reformatory schools, 3 fined, and 50 held to bail.

#### *Summary Convictions—Imprisonment.*

Of 43,822 persons summarily convicted on charges and summonses by justices, 2 were imprisoned for over 6 months, 135 for 6 months and above 3 months, 204 for 3 months and above 2 months, 514 for 2 months and above 1 month, 753 for 1 month and above 14 days, 983 for 14 days and under, 85 to reformatories, 249 to certified industrial schools, 24,731 were fined, 417 were held to bail, 69 were delivered to military authorities, 15,661 to other punishments.

#### *Committals for Trial and Summarily disposed of—Per-centage of Convictions of the Persons taken into custody on charges.*

Of the number of persons committed for trial 65½ per cent. were convicted, and of the number of persons summarily disposed of 90½ per cent. were convicted.

#### *Known Thieves.*

The number of known thieves, depredators, and suspected persons within the police district who were proceeded against on indictment and summarily during the year, was 496, against 887 in 1878, being a decrease of 391 as compared with the latter year. The number of the above class at large within the police district in the month of April, 1879, was 493.

#### *Sacrilege.*

There were 6 cases of sacrilege in 1879. There was 1 person arrested for this class of offence.

#### *Burglaries.*

The number of burglaries committed in 1879 was 79, against 39 in 1878, showing an increase of 40 as compared with the latter year. The number of persons arrested for this class of offence in 1879 was 44 against 33 in 1878, and of those so arrested in 1879 34 were convicted against 19 in 1878, 17 attempts were made to break into warehouses, &c., during the year, against 20 in 1878, being a decrease of 3 as compared with that year. 8 persons were made amenable for this class of offence, 1 of whom was discharged, and 6 convicted by judges, and 1 held to bail by magistrate.



The number of burglaries is, of course, much in excess of the number of professional burglars, as it frequently occurs when a burglar is arrested there is ample proof to connect him with several burglaries. The professional burglars are, as a rule, old thieves, who in most cases have been in penal servitude. The ticket-of-leave men, notwithstanding the supervision kept over them, are certainly the prime movers in the majority of the burglaries within the Police District: if they are not actually engaged in committing the robberies themselves, they prompt younger thieves to commit the crime.

The Detective Police do not experience very much difficulty in making local thieves amenable, but they are frequently baffled for a long time by thieves who had been convicted elsewhere and enlarged in Dublin on licence or otherwise. It occurs, too, that when convicts are liberated they take their discharge for Glasgow or Liverpool, with the avowed intention of emigrating, but after a time they return to Dublin, without the Police being aware, till reported robberies make them unpleasantly cognizant of the revisit of the thieves. Dublin is also frequently visited by London and other English thieves, and as they almost invariably transmit the proceeds of their thefts to English receivers, in most cases prior to the Police being informed of the robbery, great difficulty is experienced in detecting them.

#### *Doors &c., found open by the Police.*

446 doors and 38 windows were found open or insecure by the police on night duty during the year 1879 within the Dublin metropolitan police district.

#### *Prostitution.*

The number of prostitutes within the police district in 1879 was 308, against 513 in 1878, and 539 in 1877, showing a decrease of 205 as compared with 1878, and of 231 as compared with 1877.

The number of houses occupied or frequented by this class of persons was 127 against 139 in 1878, and 171 in 1877. Seventeen houses of ill-fame were suppressed by the exertions of the police of D Division during the past year. The 17 houses alluded to were situated in Bull-lane. The effect of their suppression in that locality was their establishment in other parts of the city where their presence had been hitherto unknown—a practice the wisdom of which may be open to question.

#### *Suicides and Lunacy.*

6 suicides were committed during the year, against 10 in 1878, and 12 in 1877; the attempts to commit suicide numbered 46, against 50 in 1878, and 53 in 1877; 248 persons were charged as dangerous lunatics in 1879, against 267 in 1878, and 250 in 1877.

#### *Inquests.*

The number of deaths where coroners' inquests were held in 1879 was 270, against 312 in 1878, and 275 in 1877, showing a decrease of 42 as compared with 1878, and of 5 as compared with 1877.

#### *Juvenile Offenders.*

The total number of juvenile offenders committed to reformatories was 90 (*viz.*, 85 by magistrates, and 5 by judges), against 70 in 1878, and 87 in 1877; 249 children were transmitted to certified industrial schools during the year, against 185 in 1878, and 211 in 1877. For offences committed by these children—see Table No. 2, pages 12 and 13, and Table No. 23, pages 40 and 41.

#### *Money found on Drunken Persons.*

5,828 persons were arrested for drunkenness during the year 1879, having money and other valuable property in their possession amounting to about £9,261, which money and property were handed over by the police to these persons when sober.

#### *Stolen Property Recovered.*

The average daily loss sustained by the public from theft or malicious injury is set down at £23 0s. 10d., against £17 17s. 11d. in 1878, and £18 19s. 5½d. in 1877. The gross loss was £12,355, against £10,451 in 1878, and £12,600 in 1877, and of this sum the police recovered £3,945, against £3,919 in 1878, and £5,675 in 1877. It is necessary



to bear in mind that the loss in each case reported to the police is estimated and determined not by them, but by the public who never underrate their loss; and that the area of the Dublin Police District is upwards of 36 square miles, and has spread over its surface an incalculable amount of property, exposed and portable. In many instances property reported to the police as stolen or lost turns out to be only mislaid. The recovery in such cases is rarely reported to the police, therefore the loss is not so much as may appear in Table 30. 32½ per cent. of property stolen has been recovered by the police in 1879, against 37½ in 1878, and 45½ per cent. in 1877.

General dealers, or brokers who are subject to no Police supervision and at present require no licence, afford great facilities to thieves in disposing of stolen property. It appears that in Edinburgh, Glasgow, and some other places, general dealers or brokers are licensed.

Marine-store dealers also afford facilities to thieves to dispose of certain classes of property. It would be very desirable to bring this class of dealers under Police supervision, as pawnbrokers are. Could this be done, doubtless a much larger proportion of stolen property would be recovered. For full details, see Table 30, page 47.

### *Public Houses.*

The total number of public-houses in the police district open for the sale of spirituous liquors in 1879 was 290, being a decrease of 9 as compared with 1878, and of 17 as compared with 1877.

The number of summonses issued against publicans at the suit of the police for violation of the law was 117, against 115 in 1878, and convictions were obtained in 86 cases out of the 117.

### *Spirit Grocers and Beer Dealers.*

The number of spirit grocers within the district in 1879 was 234, being a decrease of 11 as compared with 1878. Of that number 126 are suspected of selling contrary to the tenor of their licences. Summonses were issued in 113 cases against spirit grocers for infractions of the law, and convictions followed in 84 cases. The number of beer-shops was 64, being a decrease of 1 as compared with 1878. 30 of these are suspected of selling contrary to the tenor of their licences; 18 summonses were taken out at the instance of the police against beer dealers for violation of the law, and convictions were obtained in 14 cases. There were 150 houses in which liquor was sold without licence within the police district, showing a decrease of 54 as compared with 1878. 323 summonses were issued against the owners of these unlicensed houses for selling liquor, &c., and convictions obtained in 292 instances.

### *Refreshment Houses.*

There are 98 coffee shops and other refreshment houses in the police district, being an increase of 4 as compared with 1878; 90 of these houses were conducted regularly, and 8 irregularly. There were 42 houses having a wine licence only, within the district; all the latter are conducted regularly.

### *Deserted Children.*

The number of children found deserted by the police and others in 1879 was 35, against 48 in 1878, and 40 in 1877. The number of children found dead by the police and others was 25, against 36 in 1878, and 32 in 1877.

### *Fires.*

There were 63 fires during the year, which destroyed property to the value of £26,673, against 78 fires, with loss of property £36,574 in 1878. The amount saved was £151,157 in 1879, against £40,697 in 1878. There were 2 lives lost by fires in 1879.

### *Sanitary Proceedings.*

The police on sanitary duty within the municipal district during the year, visited 3,016 houses, containing 175,715 rooms, and discovered therein 32,466 sanitary defects, and had 32,319 of that number remedied; 3,510 summonses were issued at the suit of



the police, for offences against the sanitary laws, and convictions were obtained in 3,489 instances. The police also made 3,157 visits to nightly lodging-houses, 2,934 visits to slaughter-houses, and 1,792 visits to bake-houses during the year.

Although sanitary duty is in no way under the control of the Commissioner, he thinks it right to insert the report of work done as he has received it, remarking that these constables are sent to and paid for by the Corporation, and in townships by the local authority; that, as regards their duties, they are directed and supervised by the local authority and sanitary officers, and are responsible only to the Commissioner for their sobriety, strict observance of the rules of the force, general good conduct, and efficiency while thus employed. 1 acting-inspector, 3 sergeants, 2 acting-sergeants, and 15 constables are employed as sanitary officers by the Corporation.

### *Dogs' Home.*

On the 1st of August the Commissioner was able to establish a temporary Dogs' Home in premises in Store-street, the site of a new Police Barrack. Without the aid of this Home the working of the Dog Act becomes impossible. In London the Home is worked by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals—here it is worked by the police at considerable expense and public inconvenience. It is hoped, however, that the arrangement now contemplated by the Humane Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals will relieve the police of the duty of carrying out the details of a Dogs' Home, which certainly cannot be construed into legitimate police duty. Unfortunately the temporary Home existed but for 38 days, the site for building being required by the contractors. During the time of its existence 397 dogs were placed in it, 311 were destroyed, 55 were sold, 27 restored to their owners, 2 escaped, and 2 were stolen.

### *Hackney Carriages Drivers, &c.*

In the year 1879 there were within the police district 2,264 licensed vehicles, being a decrease of 439 as compared with the year 1878; these vehicles consisted of 1,123 hackney carriages, 871 cabriolets (including 100 phaetons), 134 job carriages, and 136 stage carriages (129 of the latter are tram cars). There were 2,837 licensed drivers, being an increase of 7 as compared with the year 1878. A general inspection of all vehicles, and drivers thereof, was held in May, and the inspecting officers reported 1,934 vehicles as fit for public accommodation. There were 54 vehicles not produced; 49 of these were undergoing repairs, and were afterwards produced in good order. Summonses were taken out against the owners of the remaining 5, and also against the owners of 7 vehicles reported out of repair; fines were inflicted in 7 of these cases, and the remainder were cautioned.

3,055 summonses were issued at the suit of the police for breaches of the Dublin Carriage Regulations, showing an increase of 54 as compared with 1878; they consisted of 1,434 against owners and drivers of hackney carriages, 1,201 against cabriolet owners and drivers, 26 against owners of job carriages, and 35 against owners of stage carriages; the average fine imposed in hackney carriage cases was 2s. 9d., cabriolets 2s. 11d., job carriages 6s. 10d., and stage carriages 7s.

587 licensed drivers were arrested by the police during the year for breaches of the carriage laws, &c, whilst in charge of their vehicles; for punishments inflicted in these cases, see Table 53, page 56. As a consequence of such offences as appear in this Table, the Commissioner of Police each year (at the time set apart for renewing drivers' licences), after a review of the drivers' characters, refuses to renew the licences of the worst conducted; some are never again relicensed, others are kept out of their licences for certain periods, according to the gravity of their offences, and are not relicensed until satisfactory proof of amendment is given. The refusal to renew the licence has the effect of depriving the driver of employment, and proves to him that a strict account is kept, and that he can only hope to obtain his licence by good conduct. The Commissioner's power in this respect is much feared by drivers, and has the effect of restraining many within bounds who would otherwise be very reckless. This year 45 were refused renewal of their licences, many of whom will not be permitted again to renew, and such of them as may be relicensed must be entitled to consideration for honesty, meritorious conduct, &c. There is a decrease of 16 in the number refused renewal as compared with 1878. In addition to those refused renewal, the licences of 21 drivers were revoked during the year by the Commissioner of Police for misconduct.

It is to be observed that in the majority of offences set forth in Table 52, page 55, particularly as regards the drivers of hackney carriages, &c., the law empowers the magistrate to inflict fines not exceeding 40s., or the alternative of a month's imprisonment.



331 new licences and transfers of hackney carriages and cabriolets were granted during the year, in each instance the vehicle, horse, &c., being inspected and pronounced fit for public use, and the character of the person licensed ascertained to be satisfactory.

952 applications were made for drivers' and conductors' licences during the year; 777 were granted, character being found good; 40 refused, character being unsatisfactory, 30 unable to read, 1 parents opposing grant of licence, 2 not being requisite age, 7 physically unsuited, and 95 failed to follow up applications.

In many instances bad vehicles were noticed by the police during the year; the owners were cautioned, and had them at once removed for repairs. This system is adopted where the subject of complaint is of a trivial nature, and a better result is obtained than would be from summons.

The licences of 14 hackney vehicles were revoked in 1879. There were 21 licences revoked during the year 1878. The cleanliness and general turn-out of some cars and cabriolets, as well as the dress of the drivers, leave much to be desired. This is attributable, in some instances, to the general depression of trade, but principally to the absurdly low fare of 6d. which is insisted upon by the cab-owners.

Hitherto the law compelling car-owners to feed on stands from a nosebag was not insisted upon, so long as the several stands were regularly swept and the refuse carted away; but towards the close of the year the car and cab men dismissed their sweepers, leaving the stands in a filthy condition, until they became a public nuisance, so that there was no alternative but to enforce the bye-law of feeding from a nosebag—a practice insisted upon in London, Paris, and every civilized city in Europe. The law has been enforced in the Southern Division of the city, but the Police find much difficulty in carrying it out in the Northern Division. It has been the endeavour of the Commissioner to introduce the open phaeton for the convenience of the public during the summer months. Encouragement and advantages have been granted to proprietors of those vehicles, but he fears the intention will be foiled by those parties who often demand more than the legal fare, thus imposing on the public employing them (principally ladies). Their fare is precisely the same as that for any car or cabriolet, whether employed by time or distance. Whenever it came to the knowledge of the Commissioner that more than the legal fare was demanded, the licence was immediately revoked.

### *Property found in Hackney Carriages.*

In 622 instances there were 751 articles of property surrendered to the police by drivers, of which number 393 articles were claimed by and given up to the owners, at the police office, Exchange-court, and 10 at police stations in the city and in the "F," to Kingstown division, making a total of 403 articles claimed, the remainder being sent to the police store, Lower Castle Yard.

The articles surrendered included 368 umbrellas of every description, 2 gold watches, and 2 gold chains, a marble time-piece, 6 gold ear-rings, 2 gold finger-rings, a gold brooch, gold scarf-pin, 2 telescopes, 7 opera glasses, 10 hand muffs, a double-barrel gun, a jar of whiskey, a piece of silk, 28 yds., a cheque for £12 10s., and a bank deposit receipt for £100.

7 sovereigns, and 10 half-sovereigns were received by drivers from fares in mistake for silver coins, and were surrendered, 4 of the sovereigns, and 3 half-sovereigns were afterwards claimed, and given up, and the remainder sent into store.

In 14 instances sums of money in bank notes, gold, silver, &c., amounting to £35 6s. 9d., exclusive of above gold coins, were found in vehicles, and surrendered by drivers; £1 3s. 9d. of that sum was not claimed, and was therefore sent to store.

Property when surrendered at Police stations, except those of "F," or Kingstown division, if not claimed immediately, is forwarded to the carriage branch of the detective department, No. 3, Exchange-court, where it remains for a week, and if not during that time claimed, it is sent to the police store. The property unclaimed in F division stations is, after same detention, also sent to store.

Recipients of property left rewards for the drivers who surrendered it, to the amount of £9 12s. during the year.

The police on carriage duty in the course of their inquiry after property reported forgotten in cabs, &c., ascertained that the drivers had surrendered direct to the owners, 2 half-sovereigns, a purse containing 19s., a gun, a sword, 4 leather bags, 2 ear-rugs, 2 pairs of boots, a box containing wearing apparel, 2 coats, 2 hats, a shawl, an opera-glass, 8 umbrellas, 3 books, a bath-chair, and some flour. This property is not included in the above number of articles surrendered to the police during the year.



*POLICE FORCE.*

The effective strength of the police force on the 31st December, 1879, was 1,125 men of all ranks.

The force has been now for several years kept up to its authorized strength, and there are at present a large number of approved candidates ready to join as vacancies may arise. The average height of the men of the service is 5 feet 10½ inches; average weight, 12 stone 11½ lbs.

*New Buildings.*

In the years 1875, 1876, 1877, 1878, and 1879, there were 2,752 new houses built in the district, 1,152 of this number being erected in 1879. Amongst the number there are 6 blocks of "Artisans' Dwellings," 5 of them being erected in the latter year.

These houses are chiefly occupied by commercial men, clerks, artisans, and trades people.

*New Streets Opened.*

There were 88 new streets opened in the Dublin Metropolitan Police District, in the 5 years as above, 35 of this number being opened in 1879. The consequent increased distance to be patrolled by the police is 8 miles, 1 furlong, and 20 perches; 3 miles, 2 furlongs, and 18 perches of this distance being opened in 1879.

*Removals from the Force.*

There were 71 removals from the force during the year 1879, viz.:—26 dismissed, 18 resigned, 8 pensioned, 7 discharged with a gratuity, 2 discharged not entitled to gratuity, and 10 died.

The area of the Metropolitan Police District is 36 square miles 261 square yards. The population numbers 337,589 persons.

The year 1879 has been remarkable for its severity, accompanied by an epidemic of small-pox and fever—typhoid and typhus—and scarlatina. In the force there were 13 cases of small-pox, 22 typhoid, 2 typhus, and 5 scarlatina, 2 measles, 16 rheumatism; 10 men died; 20 men were incapacitated for service from ill health (including the 10 men who died in the service during the year).

The general conduct of the men during the year has been good.

The authorized strength of the Force is 7 superintendents, 26 inspectors, 51 acting-inspectors, 72 sergeants, 94 acting-sergeants, and 881 constables (including the Detective Service), being an increase of 43 men, allowed to be recruited up in lieu of men given to Public Departments.

Four acting-inspectors, 5 sergeants, 3 acting-sergeants, and 48 constables are employed permanently at the Courts of Justice, Magistrates' Offices, Board of Works, Sanitary and Cattle-plague duties, leaving available 7 superintendents, 26 inspectors, 47 acting-inspectors, 67 sergeants, 91 acting-sergeants, and 833 constables for legitimate police duty throughout the whole of the Metropolitan Police District.

From this total a large allowance must be made for the working and interior economy of the Force, and a daily average of 64 for men sick and on leave, 31 gaolers, mess-men, clerks, men employed in the police stores, and in attendance on the vans and horses used in the conveyance of prisoners.

When a due allowance has been made for the duties above mentioned, there is seldom found to be over 900 officers and men available for duty. This number has to meet the necessary demands for police made from all sides. It has to be divided by two for day and night duty, and the remainder sub-divided by two to form two reliefs. Thus, for part of the twelve hours of day and of night there can be only 225 of all ranks on duty throughout the whole Metropolitan District, while for 4½ hours of day or night the full strength of the detail day or night are on duty. Thus the average duty done by each man is 7 hours.

It must be remembered that although these new streets and squares have thus rapidly sprung up, and the population has increased, the effective strength of the Force remains the same. New duties are frequently put upon them. The great number of prisoners arrested, particularly on Saturday evening, occupy the constables to a late hour at the Magistrates' Courts in prosecuting their charges, so that it becomes difficult indeed to detail men for ordinary street duty.

The average number of officers and constables available for duty daily in the year 1879, was 863.



Eight hundred and sixty-two persons were charged with assaulting the police, being an increase of 4 upon the preceding year. Some of these assaults were of a very serious character, inflicting severe injury upon the men, who displayed a great deal of courage, forbearance, and good temper on these very trying occasions.

The system of fixed points in the posting of constables on street duty as carried out in London has been adopted since 14th October, 1872, and is found to tend to the efficiency of the service.

One hundred and sixty persons were reported to the police as lost or missing during the year, of which number 89 were found by the police and restored to their friends, 62 were found by their friends or returned home, and 9 were found dead.

The school was re-organized in 1875. Since that year the attendance has greatly increased, as will be seen by the following figures :—

This result is satisfactory when it is considered that the attendance of the men is voluntary and in their own time.

The Commissioner expects that the attendance will be double in the present year, as he has obtained a much larger and more commodious school in Kevin-street Barrack, and he has secured the assistance of one of the First Class teachers from the National Board of Education.

The branch book-cases work well. The Commissioner is happy to say that an increased desire to read has appeared, as manifested by the numbers enrolled on the library list.

Promotion in the service can only be attained through competition by examination. A sufficient number of the seniors on a junior grade are nominated to compete for the vacancy or vacancies, as the case may be, in the senior rank, and they receive promotion in their order of merit, provided they take a sufficient number of marks to qualify. These examinations hold good to all ranks, even to the promotion of constables from a lower to a higher scale of pay. The examination papers are suitable in character to the examination, with the exception of the rank of inspector. The examination is almost entirely confined to the outline of police duties in the street, the public-house duties, and licensing laws, the carriage and traffic Acts, to read, to spell, and to write legibly, so as to be able to make an intelligible report. The Commissioner has endeavoured to secure that as they advance in the service they increase in the knowledge of police duties, thus adding to the efficiency of their service. These examinations are conducted under the immediate direction and supervision of the Assistant-Commissioner.

#### *Police Band.*

The Dublin Metropolitan Police band consists of thirty-four members (police sergeants and constables), who in addition to their musical performances, also do duty on the streets. The band is now about seven years organized, and the expenses connected with it are wholly defrayed by subscriptions from the officers and men of the service.

# REPORT of the MEDICAL OFFICER on the HEALTH of the METROPOLITAN POLICE for the Year 1879.

Notwithstanding the inclement weather of last year, the health of the Metropolitan Police attained the highest standard it has yet reached. In 1877 the daily per-centage of sick was 2·875; in 1878 it increased to 3·3 per cent. In 1879 it fell to 2·9 per cent.—the most satisfactory numbers I have ever seen in our own or any other Force. Taking into account the high death-rate of the city, and the severe and arduous duty of our men, we have reason to congratulate ourselves on such a sanitary condition.

The salutary influence of re-vaccination, in resisting small-pox, remarked in my Report of last year, is made more evident by our later experience. Not one of our 13 patients who suffered from that disease had undergone the operation.

During the year we re-vaccinated 269 Constables, and we admitted no recruits into the Depot who did not produce satisfactory evidence of having been similarly treated.

Of the small-pox cases, 4 occurred on the north side of the Liffey, and 9 on the south side. In 1878 there were 6 cases in the north, and 20 on the south side.

During the autumn we noticed a great decline in the number of cases of diarrhoea as compared with former years. We had during the three months only 5 cases. The average during the same period for the preceding seven years had been high 50. The fact is sufficiently remarkable to warrant me in giving a Table of our experience of this disease during the last few years.

Notes.—In addition to the several particulars appearing in above Table, the Chief Commissioner of Police, at the close of each year for removing drivers' licences for the ensuing year, after consulting each driver's character, refused to issue the licence of several of the worst offenders. Some were not re-licensed; others were kept out of their licences for some months, according to the gravity of their offences, and are not re-licensed until satisfactory proof of amendment is given. The refusal to issue licences throughout the year, and it proves to drivers to amend, that a good licence is kept of their conduct, and that they are not expected to hold a licence by good behaviour. The Commissioner's power in this respect is much feared by drivers, and has the effect of restraining many while they are under the power of the law. This year 40 more refused renewal of licence, between 1st November and 30th December, 1879, for the year 1880. There is a decrease of 15 in the number refused renewal in 1879, as compared with 1878. In addition to those refused renewal, the licences of 21 drivers were revoked during the year by the Commissioner of Police, immediately on conviction of some of the more grave offences named in above Table. The 41 cases appearing under the heading "Discharged" were almost entirely minor offences, as disclosed through non-appearance of the complainants who gave the offenders the money.

Notes.—The licenses of 27 cabs and 5 omnibus cars were revoked, and of 20 cabs and 27 cars were suspended in 1879 for like causes, which shows a decrease in the number suspended and revoked in 1879. In many instances bad vehicles were discovered by the police while on duty, and by examining the owners they were at once removed for repairs; consequently the licenses were not suspended at the time. When a license is revoked, the owner, in order to get it restored, must produce a good vehicle, team, &c., for inspection, and pay over again the full year's license cost, as on his first application. This punishment is only resorted to when a proprietor is in the habit of giving bad vehicles, or others for contravention of the carriage laws in this respect. In the case of suspension, the vehicle is not fit to drive until the defects complained of are remedied, and on inspection, if pronounced fit for public use, the license is restored, free of duty or fee, by the Chief Constable, or of Police; but in either case the license, or "Red Book," must be surrendered to the Police, who retain it until the license is restored. By this system repairs are much more effectively obtained in cases of urgent necessity or excessive neglect than by suspending the license, and the owner is enabled to produce the vehicle in good condition at a great saving of considerable expense. By making the proprietors to have their cars put in proper condition. A general inspection of all hackney carriages was held in May, when the inspecting officers returned 1,504 vehicles out of 1,541 entirely, as fit for public accommodation. The causes of the 37 vehicles reported as not of public use, and of 5 other vehicles about four-fifths without reasonable cause, were examined; 7 were found, and the remainder restored. Very few other vehicles were not produced for inspection, but, being undergoing repairs at the time, were produced afterwards in good condition.

No. LVIII.—TABLE showing the Amount of Property found forgotten in Cabs and on outside Hackney Cars by Drivers, during the year 1879, and how disposed of.

In 222 instances there were 751 articles of property surrendered to the Police by drivers, of which number, 303 articles were claimed by and given up to the owners at the Police office, Exchange-court, and 10 at Police Stations in the city and in the "P." or Kingstown, Division, making a total of 313 articles claimed; the remainder being sent to the Police store, Lower Church-yard.

The articles surrendered included 211 umbrellas of every description, 2 gold watches and 2 gold chains, a marble three pence, 6 gold earrings, 2 gold finger rings, a gold brooch, gold snuff box, 2 tobacco pipes, 2 spec. glasses, 10 hand muffs, a double-barrel gun, a jar of whiskey, a piece of silk (28 yards), a shawl for £12 10s., and a bank deposit receipt for £100.

Seven sovereigns and 10 half-sovereigns were received by drivers from fares in mistake for silver notes, and were surrendered; 4 of the sovereigns and 2 half-sovereigns were afterwards claimed and given up, and the remainder sent into store.

In 34 instances sums of money in bank notes, gold, silver, &c., amounting to £55 10s. 9d., exclusive of above gold notes, were found in vehicles, and surrendered by drivers. £1 5s. 6d. of that sum was not claimed, and was therefore sent into store.

Property when surrendered at the Police stations, except those of "P." or Kingstown, Division, if not claimed immediately, is forwarded to the Carriage branch of the Detective Department, No. 3, Exchange-court, where it remains for a week, and if not during that time claimed it is sent to the Police store. The property unsent to the P. Division Stations is, after some detection, also sent to store.

Residents of property left rewards for the drivers who surrendered it, in the amount of £3 15s., during the year.

## PROPERTY SURRENDERED DIRECT TO OWNERS BY DRIVERS.

The Police, on carriage duty, in the course of their inquiry after property reported forgotten in cabs, &c., ascertained that the drivers had surrendered 320 to owners—2 half-sovereigns, a purse containing 10s., a gun, a sword, 4 leather bags, 2 carriages, 2 pairs of boots, a box containing sewing apparatus, 3 coats, 2 hats, a shawl, an apron, gloves, 5 umbrellas, 5 books, a ball chain, and seven keys. This property is not included in the above number of articles surrendered to the Police during the year.
