REPORT.

TO THE RIGHT HON. THE CHIEF SECRETARY FOR IRELAND.

Metropolitan Police Office, Dublin Castle,
30th March, 1881.

Sir,

I have the honour to transmit for your information the Annual Criminal and Statistical Returns of the Dublin Metropolitan Police District for the year ended 31st December, 1880.

I have during the year established a more complete and systematic mode of compiling the statistics of the service than hitherto existed, by means of which any of the offences, &c., included in the different Tables may be instantly traced to its source. This system will no doubt tend to greater accuracy in the compiling of the different tables, especially offences of a serious nature, as I can at once by the above plan make reference to the original reports. Although the number of Tables has been reduced, yet the information heretofore furnished is shown in the present Returns in a more explicit manner.

Indictable Offences.

The total number of indictable offences committed within the police district during the year was 2,696, against 3,735 in 1879, and 3,512 in 1878, being a decrease of 1,039 as compared with 1879, and a decrease of 816 as compared with 1878. The total number of persons apprehended on these charges in 1880 was 1,491, against 1,517 in 1879, and 1,714 in 1878, showing a decrease of 26 as compared with 1879, and a decrease of 223 as compared with 1878. Of the 1,491 persons arrested, 1,002 were males and 489 females; of these 425 males and 136 females were committed for trial at sessions or commission; 65 males and 9 females were bailed to stand their trial; 59 males and 10 females were held to bail, &c., by magistrates, 8 males and 1 female were committed for want of sureties, and the residue, viz., 445 males and 333 females were discharged, either for want of sufficient evidence or through non-attendance of prosecutors, &c.

Cases summarily disposed of.

The total number of persons proceeded against on charges and summonses before magistrates numbered 50,205 against 48,334 in 1879, and 52,323 in 1878, showing an increase of 1,871 as compared with 1879, and a decrease of 2,118 as compared with 1878. The 50,205 persons consisted of 36,755 males (against 34,678 in 1879 and 37,552 in 1878), and 13,450 females (against 13,656 in 1879 and 14,771 in 1878). The numbers convicted of those summarily disposed of were 30,386 males and 10,949 females against 31,496 males and 12,326 females in 1879, and 34,782 males and 13,537 females in 1878. The number discharged by the magistrates in 1880 amounted to 6,369 males and 2,501 females, against 3,182 males and 1,330 females in 1879, and 2,770 males and 1,231 females in 1878.

Total number of persons apprehended.

The total number of persons apprehended on charges by the police was 22,459 against 26,209 in 1879, and 31,308 in 1878, showing a decrease of 3,750 as compared with 1879, and a decrease of 8,849 as compared with 1878. The 22,459 persons consisted of 14,207 males (against 16,949 in 1879 and 20,377 in 1878) and 8,252 females (against 9,260 in 1879 and 10,931 in 1878.)

The total number proceeded against on summons was 29,237, viz., 23,550 males and 5,687 females.

Manslaughter, Indecent Offences, Coining, Assaults, and other Offences.

22 males and 5 females were arrested for manslaughter (10 cases of which were the result of reckless driving of vehicles), 25 males and 4 females for shooting at, stabbing, &c., to do bodily harm, 3 males for indecent assaults, 16 males for rape, and 2 females for aiding and abetting in the commission of the latter crime, 4 females for child desertion, 1 female for withholding sustenance from infant, 24 persons for intimidation, 502 for aggravated assaults, 2 for arson, 8 for forgery, 54 for coining or uttering base coin, 764 for assaulting the police, 1,410 for committing common assaults, 39 for assaults with intent to rob, 2 for having arms without a licence, 18 for cattle stealing, 68 for frauds and embezzlement, 332 for simple larceny committed without violence, 805 for unlawful possession of goods, 6 for receiving stolen goods, 6 for receiving soldiers' necessaries, 1 for illegally pawning goods, 101 for attempts to steal, 4 males for indecently exposing the person for the purpose of insulting females, 671 for offences against the Vagrant Act, 500 for obstructing public thoroughfares, 224 for committing acts contrary to public decency, 498 for wilful damage, 3 for breach of contract, 11 for breaches of Reformatory and Industrial Schools Acts, 167 males and 1 female for cruelty to animals, 75 for desertion from the army, &c., 7 for deserting their families, 11 for disturbing congregations at public worship, 5 for fraudulent enlistment in the army and militia, 306 for negligent driving of vehicles (120 of these having caused injury to person), 92 for refusing to pay carfare, 33 for offences against the Poor Law Acts, 49 for misdemeanors on railways, 88 for offences against Beer and Spirit Licensing Acts, 29 for offences against the Revenue Laws, 68 for gambling, 18 convicts for offences whereby their tickets of leave were revoked.

Offences against the Traffic Act.

There were 3,534 persons proceeded against summarily for offences against the Dublin Traffic Act during the year. Convictions were obtained in 2,345 of these cases, and fines inflicted to the amount of £367.

Drunkenness.

The charges of drunkenness numbered 7,745, viz., 5,069 males and 2,676 females against 10,558, viz., 6,967 males and 3,591 females in 1879, and 13,667, viz., 9,261 males and 4,406 females in 1878. The number of persons charged as "Habitual Drunkards" are not included in the arrests for drunkenness, as was the practice in former years. For Habitual Drunkards see Table VI., Part 2.

Drunk and Disorderly.

The number arrested for being drunk and disorderly was 2,393, viz., 1,113 males and 1,280 females, against 2,966, viz., 1,377 males and 1,589 females in 1879, and 3,331, viz., 1,734 males and 1,597 females in 1878, being a decrease of 573 as compared with 1879, and a decrease of 938 as compared with 1878.

Habitual Drunkards.

The number of persons charged for being Habitual Drunkards during the year was 1,932. This number is not included in the arrests for drunkenness. See Table VI., Part II.

Disorderly Conduct.

The number of arrests for disorderly conduct, exclusive of prostitutes, was 2,287, viz., 1,627 males and 660 females, against 2,557, viz., 1,971 males and 586 females in 1879, and 3,045, viz., 2,304 males and 741 females in 1878, being a decrease of 270 as compared with 1879, and a decrease of 758 as compared with 1878.

The number of prostitutes arrested for disorderly conduct was 1,009, against 1,102 in 1879 and 1,393 in 1878.

Total drunk and disorderly for year 1880, 13,434, against 17,183 in 1879, and 21,436 in 1878, showing a decrease of 3,749 as compared with 1879, and a decrease of 8,022 as compared with 1878.

There were 250 persons charged for being drunk or drunk and disorderly three times and upwards during the year.

Education of the persons arrested in 1880.

In 1880 of 14,207 males arrested 3,392 could neither read nor write, 10,080 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 519 could read and write well, and 216 were of superior education.

In 1879 of 16,949 males arrested, 3,765 could neither read nor write, 12,392 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 506 could read and write well, and 286 were of superior education. Of 9,250 females taken into custody, 4,107 could neither read nor write, 5,088 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 58 could read and write well, and 7 were of superior education. In 1878 of 20,377 males arrested, 4,429 could neither read nor write, 14,745 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 847 could read and write well, and 356 were of superior education. Of 10,931 females taken into custody, 4,889 could neither read nor write, 5,990 could read only, or read and write imperfectly, 40 could read and write well, and 12 were of superior education.

Ages of Persons Arrested in 1880.

In 1880 of 22,459 persons taken into custody on charges by the police, 218 were under 10 years of age, 637 were 10 years and under 15, 2,985 were 15 years and under 20, 4,706 were 20 years and under 25, 4,048 were 25 years and under 30, 3,085 were 30 years and under 35, 1,809 were 35 years and under 40, 2,906 were 40 years and under 50, 1,287 were 50 years and under 60, 716 were 60 years and upwards.

Results of Committals for Trial in 1880.

Of 518 persons committed for trial, 441 were convicted, 114 acquitted, 38 bills were ignored by Grand Jury, 21 were discharged through non-attendance of prosecutors, &c., and 4 were held over not tried.

Sentences of Persons Convicted.

Of the 441 persons convicted, 1 was sentenced to 14 years' penal servitude, 7 to 7 years, 19 to 5 years, 78 to 12 month imprisonment and under 2 years, 93 to 6 months and under 12, 142 to 1 month and under 6, 13 persons for periods under 1 month, 9 were sent to reformatory schools, 1 fined, and 78 held to bail.

Summary Convictions—Imprisonment.

Of 41,335 persons summarily convicted on charges and summonses by justices, 6 were imprisoned for over 6 months, 118 for 6 months and above 3 months, 225 for 3 months and above 2 months, 501 for 2 months and above 1 month, 741 for 1 month and above 14 days, 631 for 14 days and under, 80 to reformatories, 313 to certified industrial schools, 23,248 were fined, 411 were held to bail, 58 were delivered to military authorities, 15,003 to other punishments.

Committals for Trial and Summarily disposed of—Percentage of Convictions of the Persons taken into custody on charges.

Of the number of persons committed for trial 71.3 per cent. were convicted, and of the number of persons summarily disposed of 93.9 per cent. were convicted.

Known Thieves.

The number of known thieves, depredators, and suspected persons within the police district who were proceeded against on indictment and summarily during the year, was 567, against 496 in 1879, being an increase of 71 as compared with the latter year. The number of the above class at large within the police district in the month of April, 1880, was 502.

Burglaries.

The number of burglaries committed in 1880 was 60, against 79 in 1879, showing a decrease of 19 as compared with the latter year. The number of persons arrested for this class of offence in 1880 was 25 against 44 in 1879, and of those so arrested in 1880 20 were convicted against 34 in 1879, 12 attempts were made to break into warehouses, &c., during the year, against 17 in 1879, being a decrease of 5 as compared with that year. 2 persons were made amenable for this class of offence, 1 of whom was held to bail and the other committed for want of sureties, 1 of the prisoners convicted for burglary was concerned in the commission of 12 of such offences.

In 14 cases of the 60 burglaries reported no property was taken, and the property

taken could not be traced or identified in 29 cases, leaving but 17 cases where the property taken could be traced or identified as can be seen by Table 26, part 2.

The number of burglaries is, of course, in excess of the number of professional burglars, as it frequently occurs when a burglar is arrested there is ample proof to connect him with several burglaries. The professional burglars are, as a rule, old thieves, who in most cases have been in penal servitude. The ticket-of-leave men, notwithstanding the supervision kept over them, are certainly the prime movers in the majority of the burglaries within the Police District: if they are not actually engaged in committing the robberies themselves, they prompt younger thieves to commit the crime.

The Detective Police do not experience very much difficulty in making local thieves amenable, but they are frequently baffled for a long time by thieves who had been convicted elsewhere and enlarged in Dublin on licence or otherwise. It occurs, too, that when convicts are liberated they take their discharge for Glasgow or Liverpool, with the avowed intention of emigrating, but after a time they return to Dublin, without the Police being aware, till reported robberies make them unpleasantly cognizant of the revisit of the thieves. Dublin is also frequently visited by London and other English thieves, and as they almost invariably transmit the proceeds of their thefts to English receivers, in most cases prior to the Police being informed of the robbery, great difficulty is experienced in detecting them.

It is in contemplation that the custom in the London Metropolitan Police, of having a member of the force present at the discharge of convicts from prison be adopted by the Dublin Metropolitan Police, and it is hoped that such a measure would prove a salutary effect on the proceedings of old offenders and be found of the very greatest assistance in the recognition of offenders in custody. The object of the convicts being seen previous to their discharge is to enable the police to refresh their memory of the men, and after comparing the convict to be discharged with the description furnished a week in advance by the governor of the prison, to note anything fresh peculiarly about them. It is suggested that such arrangements will be made that all convicts who after their discharge, intend to reside within the Dublin Metropolitan Police District be discharged from Mountjoy prison, which will facilitate the carrying out the object in view.

Doors, &c., found open by the Police.

755 doors, 61 windows, and 23 area gratings were found open or insecure by the police on night duty during the year 1880, within the Dublin Metropolitan Police District, against 446 doors and 38 windows so found in 1879.

Prostitution.

The number of prostitutes within the police district in 1880 was 434, against 308 in 1879, and 513 in 1878, showing an increase of 126 as compared with 1879, and a decrease of 79 as compared with 1878.

The number of houses occupied or frequented by this class of persons was 136 against 127 in 1879, and 139 in 1878. Twenty-seven houses of ill-fame were suppressed by the exertions of the police during the year 1880.

Suicides and Lunacy.

11 suicides were committed during the year, against 6 in 1879, and 10 in 1878; the attempts to commit suicide numbered 63, against 46 in 1879, and 50 in 1878; 61 persons were charged for this offence. 233 persons were charged as dangerous lunatics in 1880, against 248 in 1879, and 267 in 1878.

Inquests.

The number of deaths where coroners' inquests were held in 1880 was 274, against 270 in 1879, and 312 in 1878, showing an increase of 4 as compared with 1879, and a decrease of 38 as compared with 1878.

Juvenile Offenders.

The total number of juvenile offenders committed to reformatories was 89 (viz., 80 by magistrates, and 9 by judges), against 90 in 1879, and 70 in 1878; 313 children were transmitted to certified industrial schools during the year, against 249 in 1879, and 185 in 1878. For offences committed by these children—see Tables No. 2, and 14.

Money found on Drunken Persons.

6,961 persons were arrested for drunkenness during the year 1880, having money and other valuable property in their possession amounting to about £12,286, which money and property were handed over by the police to these persons when sober.

Stolen Property Recovered.

The average daily loss sustained by the public from theft, &c., is set down at £24 10s., against £23 0s. 10d. in 1879, and £17 17s. 11d. in 1878. The gross loss was £13,595, against £12,355 in 1879, and £10,451 in 1878. It is necessary to bear in mind that the loss in each case reported to the police is estimated and determined not by them, but by the public who never underrate their loss; and that the area of the Dublin Police District is 36 square miles, and has spread over its surface an incalculable amount of property, exposed and portable. In many instances property reported to the police as stolen or lost turns out to be only mislaid. The recovery in such cases is rarely reported to the police, therefore the loss is not so much as may appear in Table XXII. 53·7 per cent. of property stolen has been recovered by the police in 1880, against 32·3 in 1879, and 37·1 in 1878.

General dealers, or brokers who are subject to no Police supervision and at present require no licence, afford great facilities to thieves in disposing of stolen property. It appears that in Edinburgh, Glasgow, and some other places, general dealers or brokers are licensed.

Marine-store dealers also afford facilities to thieves to dispose of certain classes of property. It would be very desirable to bring this class of dealers under Police supervision, as pawnbrokers are. Could this be done, doubtless a much larger proportion of stolen property would be recovered. For full details, see Table 21 page 27.

Public Houses.

The total number of public-houses in the police district open for the sale of spirituous liquors in 1880 was 987, being a decrease of 3 as compared with 1879, and a decrease of 12 as compared with 1878.

The number of summonses issued against publicans at the suit of the police for violation of the law was 96, against 117 in 1879, and 115 in 1878. Convictions were obtained in 70 cases out of the 96.

Spirit Grocers and Beer Dealers.

The number of spirit grocers within the police district in 1880 was 235, being an increase of 1 as compared with 1879. Of that number 86 are suspected of selling liquor contrary to the tenor of their licences. Summonses were issued in 82 cases against spirit grocers for infraction of the law, and convictions were obtained in 53 cases. The number of beer-shops was 62, being a decrease of 2 as compared with 1879. Of these 31 are suspected of selling contrary to the tenor of their licences; 38 summonses were taken out at the instance of the police against beer dealers for violation of the law, and convictions were obtained in 29 cases. There were 74 houses in which liquor was sold without licence within the police district, showing a decrease of 76 as compared with 1879. 313 summonses were issued against the owners of these houses for selling liquor, &c., and convictions followed in 252 cases.

Refreshment Houses.

There are 66 coffee shops and other refreshment houses in the police district, being a decrease of 32 as compared with 1879; of these houses 63 were conducted regularly, and 3 irregularly. There were 29 houses having a wine licence only, within the district; all the latter are conducted regularly.

Deserted Children.

The number of children found deserted by the police and others in 1880 was 42, against 35 in 1879, and 48 in 1878. The number of children found dead was 49, against 25 in 1879, and 36 in 1878.

Fires.

There were 93 fires during the year, which destroyed property to the value of £99,542, against 63 fires, with loss of property £26,673 in 1879. The amount saved was £59,366 against £151,157 in 1879. There were 3 lives lost by fires in 1880.

Sanitary Proceedings.

The police on sanitary duty within the municipal district during the year, visited 94,687 houses, containing 289,400 rooms, and discovered therein 36,055 sanitary defects, and had 35,913 of that number remedied; 3,456 summonses were issued at the suit of the police, for offences against the sanitary laws, and convictions were obtained in 3,478 instances. The sanitary officers also made 2,043 visits to bake-houses, 3,853 visits to slaughter-houses, and 3,938 visits to nightly lodging-houses, during the year. Although sanitary duty is in no way under the control of the Commissioner, he thinks it right to insert the report of work done as he has received it, remarking that these constables are sent to and paid for by the Corporation, and in townships by the local authority; that, as regards their duties, they are directed and supervised by the local authority and sanitary officers, and are responsible only to the Commissioner for their sobriety, strict observance of the rules of the force, general good conduct, and efficiency while thus employed. 1 acting-inspector, 3 sergeants, 3 acting-sergeants, and 15 constables are employed as sanitary officers.

Dogs' Home.

1,884 dogs were placed in the "Home" during the year 1880. Of this number 1,546 were destroyed, 178 were sold, 120 restored to their owners, 15 died, 3 escaped, and 25 remained in the "Home" on the 31st December, 1880. This duty is carried out only in a temporary measure by the police. In London the Home is worked by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals—here it is worked by the police at considerable expense and public inconvenience. It is hoped, however, that the arrangement now contemplated by the Humane Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals will relieve the police of the duty of carrying out the details of a Dogs' Home, which certainly cannot be construed into legitimate police duty.

Hackney Carriage Drivers, &c.

In the year 1880 there were within the police district 2,222 licensed vehicles, being a decrease of 42 as compared with the year 1879; these vehicles consisted of 1,096 hackney carriages, 838 cabriolets (including 110 phaetons), 134 job carriages, and 134 stage carriages (127 of the latter are tram cars). There were 2,623 licensed drivers, being a decrease of 144 as compared with the year 1879. A general inspection of all vehicles, and drivers thereof, was held in May, and the inspecting officers reported 1,933 vehicles as fit for public accommodation. There were 36 other vehicles not produced actually on the days of inspection, they being undergoing repairs, painting, &c., but were produced shortly afterwards in good condition.

3,409 summonses were issued at the suit of the police for breaches of the Dublin Carriage Regulations, showing an increase of 44 as compared with 1879; they consisted of 1,881 against owners and drivers of hackney carriages, 1,305 against cabriolet owners and drivers, 36 against owners of job carriages, and 13 against owners of stage carriages; the average fine imposed in hackney carriage cases was 3s. 5d., cabriolets 3s. 5d., job carriages 10s. 2d., and stage carriages 6s. 6d.

519 licensed drivers were arrested by the police during the year for breaches of the carriage laws, &c., whilst in charge of their vehicles; for punishments inflicted in these cases, see Table XLIII. As a consequence of such offences as appear in this Table, the Commissioner of Police each year (at the time set apart for renewing drivers' licences), after a review of the drivers' characters, refuses to renew the licences of the worst conducted; some are never again relicensed, others are kept out of their licences for certain periods, according to the gravity of their offences, and are not relicensed until satisfactory proof of amendment is given. The refusal to renew the licence has the effect of depriving the driver of employment, and proves to him that a strict account is kept, and that he can only hope to obtain his licence by good conduct. The Commissioner's power in this respect is much feared by drivers, and has the effect of restraining many within bounds who would otherwise be very reckless. This year 46 were refused renewal of their licences, many of whom will not be permitted again to renew, and such of them as may be relicensed must be entitled to consideration for honesty, meritorious conduct, &c. There is an increase of 1 in the number refused renewal in 1880 as compared with 1879. In addition to those refused renewal, the licences of 16 drivers were revoked during the year by the Commissioner of Police for misconduct.

It is to be observed that in the majority of offences set forth in Table XLII., particularly as regards the drivers of hackney carriages, &c., the law empowers the magistrate to inflict fines not exceeding 40s., or the alternative of a month's imprisonment.

290 new licences and transfers of hackney carriages and cabriolets were granted during the year, in each instance the vehicle, horse, &c., being inspected and pronounced fit for public use, and the character of the person licensed ascertained to be satisfactory.

691 applications were made for drivers' and conductors' licences during the year; 554 were granted, character being found good; 44 refused, character being unsatisfactory, 10 unable to read, 63 not having followed up their applications, 5 being physically unsuited, 4 being too young, 3 parents opposing grants of licence, 7 not being acquainted with carriage regulations, and 1 having persisted in giving a fictitious name.

Property found in Hackney Carriages.

In 690 instances there were 995 articles of property surrendered to the police by drivers, of which number 660 articles were claimed by and given up to the owners at the police office, Exchange-court, and 15 at police stations, in the city, and in the F or Kingstown division, making a total of 675 articles claimed, the remainder being sent to the police store, Lower Castle Yard.

The articles surrendered included 410 umbrellas of every description, 2 gold watches, 7 silver watches, several gold and silver brooches, bracelets, chains, finger rings, and other articles of jewellery, a mariner's log, a barometer, two silver saltcellars with spoons to match, and a cheque-book on Bank of Ireland.

5 sovereigns and 20 half-sovereigns were received by drivers for fares in mistake for silver coins, and were surrendered, one of the sovereigns and 5 of the half-sovereigns were afterwards claimed and given up, and the remainder sent to the store.

In 15 instances sums of money in bank notes, gold and silver, &c., amounting to £71 13s. 11½d., exclusive of above gold coins, were found in vehicles and surrendered by drivers, £6 13s. of that sum was not claimed, and therefore was sent to store.

Property when surrendered at police stations, excepting F or Kingstown division if not claimed immediately is forwarded to the carriage branch of the detective department, No. 3, Exchange-court, where it remains for a week, and if not during that time claimed, it is sent to the police store.

The property unclaimed in F division is after same detention also sent to store.

Recipients of property left rewards for the drivers who surrendered it to the amount of £13 4s. 6d. during the year.

Property surrendered direct to owners by drivers.

The police on carriage duty in the course of their inquiry after property reported forgotten in cabs, &c., ascertained that the drivers had surrendered direct to the owners 3 half-sovereigns, a purse containing £34, seven leather bags containing valuable property, 3 coats, 2 walking-sticks, and several other miscellaneous articles. This property is not included in the above number of articles surrendered to the police during the year.

In many instances bad vehicles were noticed by the police during the year; the owners were cautioned, and had them at once removed for repairs. This system is adopted where the subject of complaint is of a trivial nature, and a better result is obtained than would be from summons.

The licences for 16 hackney vehicles were revoked in 1880. There were 14 licences revoked during the year 1879. The cleanliness and general turn-out of some cars and cabriolets, as well as the dress of the drivers, leave much to be desired. This is attributable, in some instances, to the general depression of trade, but principally to the absurdly low fare of 6d. which is insisted upon by the cab-owners.

The law relating to nosebags is strictly carried out. The Commissioner regrets, that the car and cab fares are in an unsatisfactory condition, and that a good deal of imposition takes place and charges over the legal fare demanded from strangers, and particularly from ladies at railway stations, &c.

This evil the Commissioner fears can only be remedied by a thorough revision of fares of the boundary and the legal fares of time and distance inscribed upon a white plate being fixed inside the cab as is the practice in London and most capitals of Europe. The cabmen object both to any revision and to the plate.

Police Force.

The effective strength of the Police Force on the 31st December, 1880, was 1,133 men of all ranks.

New Buildings.

In the years 1875, 1876, 1877, 1878, 1879 and 1880, there were 3,475 new houses built in the district, 1,152 of this number being erected in 1879, and 783 in 1880. Amongst the number there are 7 blocks of "Artisans' Dwellings," 1 of them being erected in the latter year. A handsome block of new houses has also been erected in South Great George's-street, designed for the New South City Market, the upper stories of which will be used as private residences.

New Streets Opened.

There were 116 new streets opened in the Dublin Metropolitan Police District in the 6 years as above, 28 of this number being opened in 1880. The consequent increased distance to be patrolled by the police is 9 miles 6 furlongs 36 perches, 1 mile 5 furlongs 16 perches of this distance being opened in 1880. The additional space to be patrolled must, as a matter of course, lessen police protection in each street, the effective strength of the force remaining the same, notwithstanding the yearly increase requiring protection.

Removals from the Force.

The removals from the force during the year 1880 through dismissals, resignations, discharged on pension, discharged on gratuity, discharged through ill health not entitled to gratuity, and deaths, numbered 101.

The area of the Metropolitan Police District is 36 square miles 261 square yards. The population numbers 337,589 persons.

In the force during the year 1880 there was 1 case of small-pox, 27 typhoid, 2 typhus, 2 scarlatina, 2 measles, 12 rheumatism, 6 men died, 25 men were incapacitated for service from ill health (including the men who died during the year).

In the year 1879 I was able to report that the conduct of the men during that year was good. I am happy to be able to state that during the year 1880 there is even an improvement in their general conduct.

Hospital Wards.

Instances have occurred in which constables sent to hospital have found themselves in the unpleasant position of occupying wards where persons were, with whom they had previously dealt in the discharge of their duty. It is most desirable that there should be separate ward accommodation in some of the principal hospitals for such members of the service as may require hospital treatment. I hope to be able to make the necessary arrangements in the course of the year.

Burial of Deceased M.

In order to supply a want long felt in the service I have determined upon selecting a burial plot in each of the principal cemeteries, Glasnevin and Mount Jerome, in which all unmarried men dying in the service will be interred, unless their friends desire the interment to take place elsewhere. I have already made a selection, and the arrangements are nearly completed. Suitable memorial tablets will be erected, and the plots neatly kept.

The additional expenses will be borne by the canteen fund.

The authorized strength of the force is 7 superintendents, 26 inspectors, 51 acting-inspectors, 72 sergeants, 94 acting-sergeants, and 884 constables (including the detective service), being an increase of 46 men allowed to be recruited up in lieu of men given to public departments, 1 inspector, 3 acting-inspectors, 4 sergeants, 4 acting-sergeants, and 53 constables are employed permanently at the Courts of Justice, Magistrates' Office, Board of Works, Museum, Sanitary and Cattle-plague duties, leaving available 7 superintendents, 25 inspectors, 48 acting-inspectors, 68 sergeants, 90 acting-sergeants, and 831 constables for legitimate police duty throughout the whole of the Metropolitan Police District.

From this total a large allowance must be made for the working and interior economy of the force, and a daily average of 60 for men sick and on leave, 31 gaolers, mess-men, clerks, men employed in police stores and in attendance on the vans and horses used in the conveyance of prisoners.

When a due allowance has been made for the duties above mentioned, there is seldom found to be over 900 officers and men available for duty. This number has to meet the necessary demands made from all sides. It has to be divided by 2 for day and night duty, and the remainder sub-divided by 2 to form two reliefs. Thus for part of the twelve

REPORT of the MEDICAL OFFICER on the HEALTH of the METROPOLITAN POLICE for the Year 1880.

The year 1880 was the healthiest year recorded in our annual reports. Taking the number of the force as 1134, the average number of our daily sick was 2.346 per cent.

In 1865 and the years preceeding, it was about 5 per cent., and it has been since gradually declining. The first notable declension was in 1873, when the men's pay was so considerably raised and their general mode of living in consequence thereof so much improved.

lower to a higher scale of pay. The examination papers are suitable in character to the examination, with the exception of the rank of inspector. The examination is almost entirely confined to the outline of police duties in the street, the public-house duties, and licensing laws, the carriage and traffic Acts, to read, to spell, and to write legibly, so as to be able to make an intelligible report. The Commissioner has endeavoured to secure that as they advance in the service they increase in the knowledge of police duties, thus adding to the efficiency of their service. These examinations are conducted under the immediate direction and supervision of the Assistant-Commissioner.

An ambulance class, under the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, was formed in May, 1880, and in the following October, 31 members of the service obtained certificates, including all ranks from inspector to constable. The benefit to the public of police being qualified to render first aid to the injured is evident, as from the nature of their duties they are constantly first present when accidents occur. Police holding certificates have rendered valuable assistance to sufferers already in 7 cases.

Police Band.

The Dublin Metropolitan Police Band consists of 36 members, who, in addition to their musical performances, also do duty on the streets. The band is now about 8 years organized, and the expenses connected with it are wholly defrayed by subscriptions from the officers and men of the service.

The two following Tables, marked "A" and "B," show the authorized and effective strength of the Force on 31st December, 1880, and the number of men of all ranks who joined the Force at the commencement (that is prior to the 5th of January, 1838), the number who joined each year from 1838 to 1880 inclusive, and the number serving on 31st December.

I have once more to call attention to our experience of the salutary influence of re-vaccination, in resisting the invasion of small-pox.

In 1880 we had but one case of this Disease.

Not one of these men had been vaccinated a second time. The same may be said of every case that has occurred since the outbreak of 1871-'72.

Within the last three years 432 men have been re-vaccinated in our Office by my able and zealous colleague, Dr. Long, and no recruit is now admitted to the Depot without evidence of the operation having been successfully performed.

Of 232 Candidates medically inspected during the year, 104 passed and 128 were rejected.

Those who are from Leinster and from the county of Tipperary in Munster are as a rule more fit for the Service than the natives of the rest of Ireland.

It thus appears that whilst the proportion of the "Invalided" to the "Full Strength" in the former Force is $\frac{1}{32}$, in ours it is only at the rate of $\frac{1}{65}$.

In my report for the year 1878 the following paragraph appears:—

"To the Staff of the House of Industry Hospitals, in which the great majority of our sick are treated, we have reason to be grateful for the skill, kindness, and attention given by them to the Force. It would be well, however, that arrangements should be made which would insure admission for our men upon every occasion they are sent thither, however trifling the case may seem. There are other contingencies beside the gravity of the symptoms that render the treatment of a constable in hospital important to our economy and discipline.

I would recommend, also, that a ward in each of the chronic hospitals of this Institution should be set apart for the exclusive use of the Metropolitan Police."

I believe that this subject is one which is worthy of instant attention upon the part of the Chief Commissioner and of the Government. Our sick men are constantly denied admission to these hospitals—a proceeding which entails much inconvenience at all times and not a little danger.—Indeed when received into any hospital of our city they are subjected to many discomforts, that can only be avoided by having recourse to the action recommended in the second paragraph of the above quotation.

Notes.—The licenses of 7 cabs and 7 coaches only were revoked, and of 29 cabs and 14 cars were suspended in 1879 for like causes, which shows an increase in the number suspended and revoked in 1880. In many instances bad vehicles were discovered by the police plying for hire, and by examining the drivers they were found to be unfit for service, consequently the license was not renewed or was revoked. When a license is revoked, the owner, in order to get his license renewed, must produce a good vehicle, horse, and harness for inspection, and pay over again the full year's license duty, as on his first application. This punishment is only awarded in cases of gross negligence in the habit of plying bad vehicles, or otherwise contravening the existing laws in this respect. In the case of suspension, the vehicle is not fit to ply and the defect complained of is remedied, and on inspection, if pronounced fit for public use, the license is renewed, free of duty as far as the Chief Commissioner of Police is concerned, but in other cases the license is not renewed in the Police, and the owner is not allowed to ply. By this system repairs are more effectively obtained in cases of urgent necessity, by examining the vehicle, and the enforcement enables the constables on duty to prevent the removal of a gross number of objectionable vehicles, by requiring the proprietors to have them put in proper condition. A general inspection of all licensed carriages was held in May, when the inspecting officers returned 1,333 vehicles, out of 1,360 examined, as fit for public accommodation. The owners of the 27 vehicles were summoned to the Police, and 4 for being absent, and 4 for being absent; but the magistrate ordered the defendants, except those cases, where a fine was imposed, and the license suspended by the vehicle was renewed by the Chief Commissioner. Thirty-two other vehicles were not produced actually on the day of inspection, and being undergoing repairs, painting, &c., but they were produced shortly afterwards in good condition.

No. XLIX.—TABLE showing the Amount of Property found forgotten in Cabs and on outside Hackney Carriages by Drivers, during the year 1880, and how disposed of.

In 690 instances there were 850 articles of property surrendered to the Police by drivers, of which number, 600 articles were claimed by and given up to the owners at the Police office, Exchange-court, and 15 at Police stations in the city and in the "F.V." or Kingstown Division, making a total of 615 articles claimed; the remainder being sent to the Police store, Lower Castle-yard.

The articles surrendered included 410 instances of every description, 2 gold watches, 1 silver do., several gold and silver brooches, buttons, chains, fag-strings, and other articles of jewellery, a mariner's log, a barometer, 2 silver salt cellars, with spoons to match, and a change book on Black of Ireland.

Five sovereigns and 20 half-sovereigns were received by drivers in mistake for silver coins, and were surrendered; 1 of the sovereigns and 5 of the half-sovereigns were afterwards claimed and given up, and the remainder sent to the store.

In 13 instances sums of money in bank notes, gold and silver, &c., amounting to £71 15s. 11d., exclusive of above gold coins, were found in vehicles and surrendered by drivers. £6 15s. of that sum was not claimed, and therefore was sent to store.

Property when surrendered at Police stations, except those of "F.V." or Kingstown Division, if not claimed immediately, is forwarded to the Commandant of the Detective Department, No. 3, Exchange-court, where it remains for a week, and if not during that time claimed it is sent to the Police store. The property remained in F. Division Stations is, after some detention, also sent to store.

Receipts of property left awaiting for the drivers who surrendered it, to the amount of £12 4s. 6d., during the year.

PROPERTY SURRENDERED IMMEDIATELY TO OWNERS BY DRIVERS.

The Police on carriage duty, in the course of their inquiry after property reported forgotten in cabs, &c., ascertained that the drivers had surrendered direct to the owners—3 half-sovereigns, a purse containing £34, 2 leather bags containing valuable property, 3 coats, 2 walking sticks, and several miscellaneous articles. This property is not included in the above number of articles surrendered to the Police during the year.
