# REPORT.

TO THE RIGHT HON. THE CHIEF SECRETARY FOR IRELAND,

SIR,

I have the honour to transmit for your information the Annual Criminal and Statistical Returns of the Dublin Metropolitan Police District for the year ended 31st December, 1881.

## *Telegraphy.*

Since the close of 1881 the principal stations of the service have been connected by telegraph.

During the short time it has been established, the results have proved most satisfactory. The officers and constables have readily adapted themselves to the working of the instruments. The utility of such rapid communication is manifest, as it gives the Police an advantage over offenders in affording immediate information of crime, and description of criminals at all points of the service, thus vastly increasing the probability of detection. It is needless to state the great value of the system being placed in direct communication with the Fire Brigade, and this particularly applies to the outlying townships. On occasions of fire much time has been lost in obtaining the permission of the Lord Mayor—a delay which can now happily be much curtailed. It can also be of much benefit in summoning the assistance of the military, each station being in close proximity to the principal barracks.

## *Indictable Offences.*

The total number of indictable offences committed within the police district during the year was 3,771, against 2,696 in 1880, and 3,735 in 1879, being an increase of 1,075 as compared with 1880, and an increase of 36 as compared with 1879. The total number of persons apprehended on these charges in 1881 was 1,332, against 1,491 in 1880, and 1,517 in 1879, showing a decrease of 159 as compared with 1880, and a decrease of 185 as compared with 1879. Of the 1,332 persons arrested, 96<sup>m</sup> were males and 369 females; of these 526 males and 128 females were committed for trial at sessions or commission; 62 males and 15 females were bailed to stand their trial; 11 males and 10 females were held to bail, &c., by magistrates, and the residue, viz., 364 males and 216 females were discharged, either for want of sufficient evidence or through non-attendance of prosecutors, &c.

## *Cases summarily disposed of.*

The total number of persons proceeded against on charges and summonses before magistrates numbered 45,580 against 50,205 in 1880, and 48,334 in 1879, showing a decrease of 4,625 as compared with 1880, and a decrease of 2,754 as compared with 1879. The persons consisted of 33,330 males (against 36,755 in 1880 and 34,678 in 1879), and 12,250 females (against 13,450 in 1880 and 13,656 in 1879). The numbers convicted of these summarily disposed of were 27,488 males and 10,086 females against 30,386 males and 10,942 females in 1880, and 31,496 males and 12,326 females in 1879. The number discharged by the magistrates in 1881 amounted to 5,842 males and 2,164 females, against 6,369 males and 2,501 females in 1880, and 3,182 males and 1,330 females in 1879.

*Total number of persons apprehended.*

The total number of persons apprehended on charges by the police was 20,302 against 22,459 in 1880, and 26,209 in 1879, showing a decrease of 2,157 as compared with 1880, and a decrease of 5,907 as compared with 1879. The persons consisted of 13,182 males (against 14,207 in 1880 and 16,949 in 1879) and 7,120 females (against 8,252 in 1880 and 9,260 in 1879.)

The total number proceeded against on summons was 26,597, viz., 21,101 males and 5,496 females.

*Murder.*

There were three murders committed in the year 1881. Two persons were charged for the commission of the crime, and three for aiding and abetting in one of the murders.

*Murder attempted.*

There was one person charged for attempting to commit murder during the year.

*Riot.*

There were four persons charged with riot during the year.

*Sacrilege.*

There were eight cases of sacrilege during the year. One person was arrested for this offence.

*Manslaughter, Indecent Offences, Coining, Assaults, and other Offences.*

Twenty males and 3 females were arrested for manslaughter (14 cases of which were the result of reckless driving of vehicles), 21 males and 3 females for shooting at, stabbing, &c., to do bodily harm, 9 males for rape, 5 females for child desertion, 1 male and 2 females for withholding sustenance from infants, 16 persons for intimidation, 428 for aggravated assaults, 2 for arson, 6 for forgery, 29 for coining or uttering base coin, 576 for assaulting the police, 903 for committing common assaults, 38 for assaults with intent to rob, 7 for having arms without a licence, 28 for cattle stealing, 55 for frauds and embezzlement, 330 for simple larceny committed without violence, 642 for unlawful possession of goods, 12 for receiving stolen goods, 1 for receiving soldiers' necessaries, 2 for illegally pawning goods, 18 for attempts to steal, 9 for indecently exposing the person for the purpose of insulting females, 587 for offences against the Vagrant Act, 592 for obstructing public thoroughfares, 106 for committing acts contrary to public decency, 549 for wilful damage, 4 for breach of contract, 13 for breaches of the Reformatory and Industrial Schools Acts, 174 males and 3 females for cruelty to animals, 83 for desertion from the army, &c., 1 for deserting his family, 2 for disturbing congregations at public worship, 4 for fraudulent enlistment in the army and militia, 203 for negligent driving of vehicles (107 of these having caused injury to persons), 65 for refusing to pay carfare, 35 for offences against the Poor Law Acts, 26 for misdemeanors on railways, 94 for offences against Beer and Spirit Licensing Acts, 22 for offences against the Revenue Laws, 18 for gambling, 14 convicts for offences whereby their tickets of leave were revoked.

*Offences against the Traffic Act.*

There were 2,387 persons proceeded against summarily for offences against the Dublin Traffic Act during the year. Convictions were obtained in 1,664 of these cases, and fines inflicted to the amount of £337 16s.

*Drunkenness.*

The charges of drunkenness numbered 7,130, viz., 4,825 males and 2,305 females against 7,745, viz., 5,069 males and 2,676 females in 1880, and 10,558, viz., 6,967 males and 3,591 females in 1879.

*Drunk and Disorderly.*

The number arrested for being drunk and disorderly was 2,351, viz., 1,159 males and 1,192 females against 2,393, viz., 1,113 males and 1,280 females in 1880, and 2,966, viz., 1,377 males and 1,589 females in 1879.

*Habitual Drunkards.*

For habitual drunkards, charged as such during the year, see Table VI., Part II.

*Disorderly Conduct.*

The number of arrests for disorderly conduct, exclusive of prostitutes, was 2,369, viz., 1,796 males and 573 females against 2,287, viz., 1,627 males and 660 females in 1880, and 2,557, viz., 1,971 males and 586 females in 1879, being an increase of 82 as compared with 1880, and a decrease of 188 as compared with 1879.

The number of prostitutes arrested for disorderly conduct was 975, against 1,099 in 1880 and 1,002 in 1879.

Total drunk and disorderly for the year 1881, 12,825, against 13,434 in 1880, and 17,183 in 1879, showing a decrease of 609 as compared with 1880, and a decrease of 4,358 as compared with 1879.

There were 361 persons charged for being drunk or drunk and disorderly three times and upwards during the year.

*Education of the persons arrested in 1881.*

In 1881 of 13,182 males arrested 3,978 could neither read nor write, 8,380 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 622 could read and write well, and 202 were of a superior education. Of 7,120 females taken into custody, 2,782 could neither read nor write, 4,272 could read and write only or read and write imperfectly, 62 could read and write well, and 4 were of a superior education.

In 1880 of 14,207 males arrested 3,392 could neither read nor write, 10,080 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 519 could read and write well, and 216 were of superior education. Of 8,252 females taken into custody 3,530 could neither read nor write, 4,672 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 45 could read and write well, and 5 were of superior education.

In 1879 of 16,949 males arrested 3,765 could neither read nor write, 12,392 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 506 could read and write well, and 286 were of superior education. Of 9,260 females taken into custody 4,107 could neither read nor write, 5,088 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 58 could read and write well, and 7 were of superior education.

*Ages of Persons arrested in 1881.*

In 1881 of the 20,302 persons taken into custody on charges by the police 169 were under 10 years of age, 382 were 10 years and under 15, 2,383 were 15 years and under 20, 4,751 were 20 years and under 25, 4,083 were 25 years and under 30, 3,014 were 30 years and under 35, 2,128 were 35 years and under 40, 2,067 were 40 years and under 50, 940 were 50 years and under 60, 380 were 60 years and upwards.

*Results of Committals for Trial in 1881.*

Of 712 persons committed for trial 525 were convicted, 135 were acquitted, 37 bills were ignored by the Grand Jury, 8 were discharged through non-attendance of prosecutors, &c., and 13 were held over not tried.

*Sentences of Persons Convicted.*

Of the 525 persons convicted 2 were sentenced to death, but the sentence was afterwards commuted by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant to penal servitude for life, 1 was sentenced for life, 1 sentenced to 14 years' penal servitude, 2 to 10 years, 8 to 7 years, 1 to 6 years, 48 to 5 years, 1 to 2 years, 120 to 12 months and under 2 years, 159 to 6 months and under 12, 94 to 1 month and under 6, 12 for periods under 1 month, 5 were sent to reformatory schools, 2 fined, 68 held to bail, and 1 sent to an asylum.

*Summary Convictions—Imprisonment.*

Of the 33,330 persons summarily convicted on charges and summonses by magistrates 9 were imprisoned for over 6 months, 108 for 6 months and above 3 months, 211 for 3 months and above 2 months, 359 for 2 months and above 1 month, 542 for 1 month and above 14 days, 295 for 14 days and under, 74 to reformatories, 311 to certified industrial schools, 20,025 were fined, 223 were held to bail, 75 were delivered to military authorities, 15,332 to other punishments.

*Committals for Trial and Summarily disposed of—Per-centage of Convictions of the Persons taken into custody on charges.*

Of the number of persons committed for trial 73·1 per cent. were convicted, and of the number of persons summarily disposed of 92·7 were convicted.

*Known Thieves.*

The number of known thieves, depredators, and suspected persons within the Police District who were proceeded against on indictment and summarily during the year, was 626 against 567 in 1880, being an increase of 59 as compared with the latter year. The number of the above class at large within the Police District in the month of April, 1881, was 457.

*Burglaries.*

The number of burglaries committed in 1881 was 63 against 60 in 1880, showing an increase of 3 as compared with the latter year. The number of persons arrested for this class of offence in 1881 was 38 against 25 in 1880, and of those so arrested in 1881 31 were convicted against 20 in 1880. Fourteen attempts were made to break into warehouses, &c., during the year, against 12 in 1880, being an increase of 2 as compared with that year; 2 persons were made amenable for this class of offence.

In 5 cases of the 63 burglaries reported no property was taken, and the property taken could not be traced or identified in 21 cases, leaving but 37 cases where the property taken could be traced or identified as can be seen by Table XXVI., part II.

The number of burglaries is, of course, in excess of the number of professional burglars, as it frequently occurs when a burglar is arrested there is ample proof to connect him with several burglaries. The professional burglars are, as a rule, old thieves, who in most cases have been in penal servitude. The ticket-of-leave men, notwithstanding the supervision kept over them, are certainly the prime movers in the majority of the burglaries within the Police District; if they are not actually engaged in committing the robberies themselves, they prompt younger thieves to commit the crime.

The Detective Police do not experience very much difficulty in making local thieves amenable, but they are frequently baffled for a long time by thieves who had been convicted elsewhere and enlarged in Dublin on licence or otherwise. It occurs, too, that when convicts are liberated they take their discharge for Glasgow or Liverpool, with the avowed intention of emigrating, but after a time they return to Dublin, without the Police being aware, till reported robberies make them unpleasantly cognizant of the revisit of the thieves. Dublin is also frequently visited by London and other English thieves, and as they almost invariably transmit the proceeds of their thefts to English receivers, in most cases prior to the Police being informed of the robbery, great difficulty is experienced in detecting them.

It is in contemplation that the custom in the London Metropolitan Police, of having a member of the force present at the discharge of convicts from prison, be adopted by the Dublin Metropolitan Police, and it is hoped that such a measure would prove a salutary effect on the proceedings of old offenders and be found of the very greatest assistance in the recognition of offenders in custody. The object of the convicts being seen previous to their discharge is to enable the police to refresh their memory of the men, and after comparing the convict to be discharged with the description furnished a week in advance by the governor of the prison, to note anything fresh peculiarly about them. It is suggested that such arrangements will be made that all convicts who after their discharge, intend to reside within the Dublin Metropolitan Police District be discharged from Mountjoy prison, which will facilitate the carrying out of the object in view.

*Doors, &c., found open by the Police.*

376 doors, 10 windows, and 6 area gratings were found open or insecure by the Police on night duty during the year 1881 within the Dublin Metropolitan Police District, against 755 doors, 61 windows, and 23 area gratings so found in 1880.

*Prostitution.*

The number of prostitutes within the Police District in 1881 was 420, against 434 in 1880, and 308 in 1879, showing a decrease of 14 as compared with 1880, and an increase of 112 as compared with 1879.

The number of houses occupied or frequented by this class of persons was 138 against 136 in 1880, and 127 in 1879. Eight houses of ill-fame were suppressed by the exertions of the police during the year 1881.

*Suicides and Lunacy.*

Thirteen suicides were committed during the year, against 11 in 1880, and 6 in 1879; 45 persons were charged for this offence. 236 persons were charged as dangerous lunatics in 1881, against 61 in 1880, and 248 in 1879.

*Inquests.*

The number of deaths where coroners' inquests were held in 1881 was 259, against 274 in 1880, and 270 in 1879, showing a decrease of 15 as compared with 1880, and a decrease of 11 as compared with 1879.

*Juvenile Offenders.*

The total number of juvenile offenders committed to reformatories was 79 (viz., 74 by magistrates and 5 by judges), against 89 in 1880, and 90 in 1879; 311 children were transmitted to certified industrial schools during the year, against 313 in 1880, and 249 in 1879. For offences committed by these children see Tables No. II. and XIV.

*Money found on Drunken Persons.*

6,203 persons were arrested during the year 1881 for drunkenness, having money and other valuable property in their possession amounting to about £10,949 16s., which money and property were handed over by the police to these persons when sober.

*Stolen Property Recovered.*

The average daily loss sustained by the public from theft, &c., is set down at £32 3s. 6d., against £24 10s. in 1880, and £23 0s. 10d. in 1879. The gross loss was £17,069, against £13,595 in 1880, and £12,355 in 1879. It is necessary to bear in mind that the loss in each case reported to the police is estimated and determined not by them, but by the public who never underrate their loss; and that the area of the Dublin Police District is 36 square miles, and has spread over its surface an incalculable amount of property, exposed and portable. In many instances property reported to the police as stolen or lost turns out to be only mislaid. The recovery in such cases is rarely reported to the police, therefore the loss is not so much as may appear in Table XXII.

31.2 per cent. of property stolen has been recovered by the police in 1881, against 33.7 in 1880 and 32.3 in 1879.

General dealers or brokers, who are subject to no police supervision and at present require no licence, afford great facilities to thieves in disposing of stolen property. It appears that in Edinburgh, Glasgow, and some other places, general dealers or brokers are licensed.

Marina store dealers also afford facilities to thieves to dispose of certain classes of property. It would be very desirable to bring this class of dealers under police supervision, as pawbrokers are. Could this be done, doubtless a much larger proportion of stolen property would be recovered. For full particulars see Table XXI., page 27.

*Public Houses.*

The total number of public-houses in the Police District open for the sale of spirituous liquors in 1881 was 976, being a decrease of 11 as compared with 1880, and a decrease of 14 as compared with 1879.

The number of summonses issued against publicans at the suit of the police for violation of the law was 45, against 26 in 1880, and 117 in 1879. Convictions were obtained in 30 cases out of the 45.

*Spirit Grocers and Beer Dealers.*

The number of spirit grocers within the Police District in 1881 was 232, being a decrease of 3 as compared with 1880. Of that number 70 are suspected of selling liquor contrary to the tenor of their licences. Summonses were issued in 86 cases against spirit grocers for infraction of the law, and convictions were obtained in 47 cases. There were 73 houses in which liquor was sold without licence within the Police District, showing a decrease of 1 as compared with 1880; 253 summonses were issued against the owners of these houses for selling liquor, &c., and convictions followed in 232 cases.

*Refreshment Houses.*

There are 93 coffee shops and other refreshment houses in the Police District, being an increase of 27 as compared with 1880; of these houses 87 were conducted regularly, and 6 irregularly. There were 31 houses having a wine licence only, within the district; all the latter are conducted regularly.

*Deserted Children.*

The number of children found deserted by the police and others in 1881 was 62, against 42 in 1880, and 35 in 1879.

*Fires.*

There were 62 fires during the year, which destroyed property to the value of £28,711 10s., against 93 fires, with loss of property £99,542 in 1880. The amount saved was £33,450 15s. against £59,366 in 1880.

*Sanitary Proceedings.*

The police on sanitary duty within the municipal district during the year visited 6,123 houses, containing 188,701 rooms, and discovered therein 36,527 sanitary defects, and had 36,232 of that number remedied; 3,381 summonses were issued at the suit of the police for offences against the sanitary laws, and convictions were obtained in 3,372 instances. The sanitary officers also made 2,218 visits to bake-houses, 3,488 visits to slaughter-houses, and 2,866 visits to nightly lodging-houses during the year. Although sanitary duty is no way under the control of the Commissioner, he thinks it right to insert the report of work done as he has received it, remarking that these constables are sent to and paid for by the Corporation, and in townships by the local authority; that as regards their duties they are directed and supervised by the local authority and sanitary officers, and are responsible only to the Commissioner for their sobriety, strict observance of the rules of the force, general good conduct and efficiency while thus employed. One acting-inspector, 3 sergeants, 3 acting-sergeants, and 15 constables are employed as sanitary officers.

*Dogs' Home.*

918 dogs were placed in the "Home" during the year. Of this number 668 were destroyed, 162 were sold, 57 restored to their owners, 9 died, 3 escaped, and 19 remained in the "Home" on 31st December, 1881. The duty is carried out only as a temporary measure by the police. In London the "Home" is worked by the Humane Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals—here it is worked by the police at considerable expense and public inconvenience. It is hoped, however, that the arrangements now contemplated by the Humane Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals will relieve the police of the duty of carrying out the details of a "Dog's Home," which certainly cannot be construed into legitimate police duty.

*Hackney Carriage Drivers, &c.*

In the year 1881 there were within the Police District 2,145 licensed vehicles, being a decrease of 77 as compared with 1880; these vehicles consisted of 1,052 hackney carriages, 820 cabriolets (including 102 phaetons), 131 job carriages, and 135 stage carriages, 128 of the latter are tram cars. There were 2,591 licensed drivers, being a decrease of 102 as compared with 1880. A general inspection of all vehicles and drivers thereof was held in May, and the inspecting officers reported 1,754 vehicles, out of 1,757 presented for inspection, as fit for public accommodation, several being classified as excellent. In the three exceptional cases, the licence appertaining to one was revoked by the Chief Commissioner of Police, and the owners of the remaining two were fined 5s. each by the presiding magistrate on summons. 72 other vehicles were not produced actually on the days of inspection, they being undergoing repairs, varnishing, &c., 21 proprietors of which were fined in small amounts for non-production, 20 were cautioned, 2 complaints withdrawn, and in the remaining 29 cases the owners were not summoned, some having no horses, and others having produced their vehicles, &c., in good order, immediately after the inspection.

2,445 summonses were issued at the suit of the police for breaches of the Dublin Carriage Regulations, showing a decrease of 954 as compared with the year 1880; they consisted of 1,595 against owners and drivers of hackney carriages, 806 against cabriolet owners and drivers, 33 against owners of job carriages, and 11 against owners of stage carriages. The average fine imposed in hackney carriage cases was 3s. 2d., cabriolets 3s. 1d., job carriages 11s. 9d., and stage carriages 20s.

371 licensed drivers were arrested by the police during the year for breaches of the carriage laws, &c., whilst in charge of their vehicles; for punishments inflicted in these cases, see Table XLIV. As a consequence of such offences as appear in this table, the Commissioner of Police each year, at the time set apart for renewing drivers' licences, after a review of the drivers' characters, refuses to renew the licences of the worst conducted; some are never again relicensed, others are kept out of their licences for certain periods, according to the gravity of their offences, and are not relicensed until satisfactory proof of amendment is given. The refusal to renew the licence has the effect of depriving the driver of employment, and proves to him that a strict account is kept, and that he can only expect to hold a licence by good behaviour. The Commissioner's power in this respect is much feared by drivers, and has the effect of restraining many within proper bounds, who might otherwise become very reckless. This year 38 were refused renewal licences between 1st November and 20th December, 1881. There is a decrease of 8 in the number refused renewal in 1881, as compared with 1880. In addition to those deprived of renewal, the licences of 22 drivers were revoked during the year by the Chief Commissioner of Police immediately on the conviction of some of the more grave offences.

It is to be observed that in the majority of offences set forth in Table XLII., particularly as regards the drivers of hackney carriages, &c., the law empowers the magistrates to inflict fines not exceeding 40s., or the alternative of a month's imprisonment.

261 new licences and 65 transfers of licences were granted during the year, in each case the vehicle, beast, harness, and accoutrements being inspected and pronounced fit for public accommodation, also the character of the person licensed ascertained beforehand to be satisfactory.

In 671 instances there were 945 articles of property surrendered to the police during the year by drivers, of which number 625 articles were claimed by and given up to the owners at the police office, Exchange-court, and 13 at police stations in the city and in the F or Kingstown division, making a total of 638 articles claimed, the remainder being sent to the store at the Police Office, Lower Castle Yard.

The articles surrendered included 395 umbrellas of every description, 2 gold watches, 2 silver watches, several gold and silver bracelets and lockets, surgical instruments, opera glasses, dressing-cases containing jewellery value over £200, a deposit receipt for £658 19s. 6d., a stockbroker's cheque for £4,654 6s. 3d., a prismatic compass, a set of false teeth, bottles of rum, whiskey, and champagne, and a land tortoise, &c., &c.

Seven sovereigns and 9 half-sovereigns were surrendered by drivers having been received by them for fares in mistake for silver coins; one of the sovereigns and one of the half-sovereigns were afterwards claimed and given up, and the remainder sent to general store.

In 16 instances small sums of money amounting to £9 15s. 7d., exclusive of above gold coins, were found in vehicles and surrendered by drivers, £3 6s. 11½d. of that sum was not claimed, and therefore sent to store.

Property when surrendered at police stations, excepting F or Kingstown division if not claimed immediately is forwarded to the carriage branch of the detective department, No. 3, Exchange-court, where it remains for a week, and if not claimed during that time, it is sent to the police store.

The property unclaimed in F division is after same detention also sent to store.

Recipients of property left rewards for the drivers who surrendered it to the amount of £9 10s., during the year.

#### *Property surrendered direct to Owners.*

The police employed on carriage duty in the course of their inquiry after property reported forgotten in cabs, &c., ascertained that the drivers had surrendered direct to the owners £6 15s. 10d., 18 umbrellas, a gold pair of spectacles, a dog left in a cabriolet, and 20 small miscellaneous articles, such as pipes, walking-sticks, &c. This property is not included in the above number of articles surrendered to the police during the year.

#### *Police Force.*

The effective strength of the Police Force on 31st December, 1881, was 1,134 men of all ranks.

*New Buildings.*

In the years 1875, 1876, 1877, 1878, 1879, 1880 and 1881, there were 4,300 new houses built in the district, 783 of this number being erected in 1880, and 825 in 1881. Amongst the number there are 8 blocks of "Arisans' Dwellings," one of them being erected in the latter year.

*New Streets Opened.*

There were 128 new streets opened in the Dublin Metropolitan Police District in the 7 years as above, 12 of this number being opened in 1881. The consequent increased distance to be patrolled by the police is 10 miles 6 furlongs and 25 perches, 7 furlongs and 29 perches of this distance being open in 1881. The additional space to be patrolled must, as a matter of course, lessen police protection in each street, the effective strength of the force remaining the same, notwithstanding the yearly increase requiring protection. The Commissioner has no hesitation in stating that the authorised strength, if left in its integrity for purely police duty, would be barely sufficient for police duty over so extensive a district as that known as the Dublin Metropolitan Police District. It becomes totally inadequate when, as is now the case, 66 men are deducted for staff and other duties. The nominal weakness of the force becomes still more serious when in many localities patrols have to be doubled, owing to the turbulence of the roughs, and the savage assaults upon single constables.

*Removals from the Force.*

The removals from the force during the year 1881 through dismissals, resignations, discharged on pension, discharged on gratuity, discharged through ill-health not entitled to gratuity, and deaths, numbered 84. The area of the Metropolitan Police District is 36 square miles 261 square yards. The population numbers 349,648.

During the year 1881 the conduct of the force has been very good, a marked improvement on former years.

Five hundred and seventy-six persons were charged with assaulting the Police during the year.

The system of fixed points in the posting of constables on street duty, as carried out in London, has been adopted since 14th October, 1872, and is found to tend to the efficiency of the service.

The school was reorganised in 1875.

The decrease of the weekly attendance for 1881 from that of the two previous years is attributable to the arduous duties the force had to perform during the year.

*Burial of Deceased Members.*

A burial plot has been selected in Glasnevin and in Mount Jerome Cemetery, where members of the force who die in the service are interred, unless in cases where their friends desire the interment to take place elsewhere. Suitable Memorial Tablets have been erected, the plots enclosed and neatly kept.

Promotion in the service can only be attained through competition by examination. A sufficient number of the seniors on a junior grade are nominated to compete for the vacancy or vacancies, as the case may be, in the senior rank, and they receive promotion in their order of merit, provided they take a sufficient number of marks to qualify. These examinations hold good to all ranks, even to the promotion of constables from a lower to a higher scale of pay. The examination papers are suitable in character to the examination, with the exception of the rank of inspector. The examination is almost entirely confined to the outline of police duties in the street, the public-house duties, and licensing laws, the carriage and traffic Acts, to read, to spell, and to write legibly, so as to be able to make an intelligible report. The Commissioner has endeavoured to

secure that as they advance in the service they increase in the knowledge of police duties, thus adding to the efficiency of their service. These examinations are conducted under the immediate direction and supervision of the Assistant-Commissioner.

An Ambulance class under the Order of St. John of Jerusalem was formed in May, 1880. At the close of 1881, 65 members of the service held certificates, including all ranks from inspector to constable. The benefit to the public of police being qualified to render first aid to the injured is evident, as from the nature of their duties they are constantly first present when accidents occur.

*Police Band.*

The Dublin Metropolitan Police Band consists of 36 members, who, in addition to their musical performances, also do duty on the streets. The band is now about 8 years organized, and the expenses connected with it are wholly defrayed by subscriptions from the officers and men of the service.

The two following Tables, marked "A" and "B," show the authorized and effective strength of the Force on 31st December, 1881, and the number of men of all ranks who joined the Force at the commencement (that is prior to the 5th of January, 1838), the number who joined each year from 1838 to 1881, inclusive, and the number serving on 31st December.

# REPORT of the MEDICAL OFFICER on the HEALTH of the METROPOLITAN POLICE for the Year 1881.

The health statistics of the Force during the last year show a fractional improvement over the preceding one. The aggregate "Daily Sick" during 1880 amounted to 9,592, being at the rate of 2.346 per cent. per day, whilst in 1881 it has decreased to 9,484.

The above Table shows that the year, just passed, exhibited an excess of mob violence in resisting the police whilst discharging their duty.

Our complete freedom from small-pox in 1881 may to a certain extent be attributed to the complete revaccination of the men. Admission to the Depot is refused, except in rare instances, to recruits who cannot show satisfactory evidence of that operation having been successfully performed.

Of these, Kelly and Barry have died since their discharge.

I must again call attention to the pressing necessity which exists for a change in the character of the accommodation afforded to our sick in the hospitals of the city.

As a general rule, this is below the standard, which I consider requisite for our men, both as regards food and "lodging." The former, in my opinion, should not be allowed to be supplemented, through the agency of the nurse, at the expense of the patient; and in the latter, they should be freed from the immediate propinquity of that class of our fellow-citizens—by no means a small constituent of our hospital-population—who regard the policeman as his natural enemy.

We are supposed to have a right of admission to the hospitals of the House of Industry, as they are supported exclusively by a Parliamentary grant; but our men are almost systematically refused beds in the Chronic Medical Hospital of that institution, at the time of the year when they are most urgently required.

*Notes.*--In addition to the several proceedings appearing in above Table, the Chief Commissioner of Police (at the time not agent rank) put his reasoning before the Council for the following year, after examining each district separately, before he made the list of arrests of the next calendar year. Some prisoners he designated as "detainees" and kept out of their list; for some reasons, according to the practice of 1840. Others, and on-site-to-release until satisfactory proof of amendment is given. The refusal to accept license disrupts the man released, and is proved to detain in general that a detainee is kept of their contract, and that they may only expect to hold a license if good conduct. The Commissioner's power in this respect is much feared by detainers, and has the effect of intimidating many within proper bounds who might otherwise become real enemies. This year, 38 were (found) issued of license between 1st November and 30th Dec. 1841. There is no account of it in the London return, issued in 1842, as compared with 1840. In addition to those *deprived* of license, the license of 14 detainers was revoked during the year by the Chief Commissioner of Police, immediately on conviction of some of the prisoners; license must be shown Table. The 30 cases appearing under the heading "Discharged" were almost entirely after action, or obtained through subterfuges of the magistrates who gave the offenders into custody. This is a decrease of 149 in the number of London detainers granted in 1841, as compared with 1840.

NOTE.—The licenses of 9 outside-cars and 18 cabs were renewed, and of 19 cars and 25 cabs were suspended in 1881 for like causes, which shows an increase of 49 in the number suspended and renewed in 1881. In many instances bad vehicles were discovered by the police plying for hire, and by monitoring the drivers they were at once removed for repairs, consequently the licenses were not suspended or revoked. Where a license is revoked, the owner, in order to become re-licensed, must produce a good vehicle, horse, and harness for inspection, and pay over again the full year's license duty, upon his first application. This punishment is only resorted to when such proprietor is in the habit of plying bad vehicles, or otherwise contravenes the carriage laws in this respect. In the case of suspension, the vehicle is not let to hire until the defects complained of are remedied, and on inspection, if pronounced fit for public use, the license is restored, *bona fide* as then, by the Chief Commissioner of Police, but in either case the figure, or "Traffic Plate," must be surrendered to the Police, who retain it until the license shall be restored. By this system repairs are much more effectively obtained in cases of urgent necessity or emergency, and by monitoring the owners, and the enforcement enables the possibility of carriage duty to procure the removal of a great number of defective vehicles, by refusing the proprietors to have them put in proper condition. A general inspection of hackney vehicles was held in May, when the inspecting officers returned 1,748 vehicles, out of 1,517 presented for inspection as fit for public accommodation, several being classified as inefficient. In the three companies under the license apprehending no use was reached by the Chief Commissioner of Police, and the owners of remaining two were fined in each by the presiding magistrate on summons. Twenty-two other vehicles were not produced, namely on the days of inspection they being undergoing repairs, &c., twenty-two proprietors of which were fined in small amounts for non-production, twenty were cautioned, ten complained without cause, and in the remaining twenty-nine cases the owners were not summoned, some having no horses, and others having produced their vehicles, &c., in good order immediately after the inspection.

No. XLIX.—TABLE showing the Amount of Property found forgotten in Cabs and on outside Hackney Carriages by Drivers, during the year 1881, and how disposed of.

In 671 instances there were 943 articles of property surrendered to the Police during the past year by drivers, of which number, 623 articles were claimed by and given up to the owner at the Police office, Exchange-court, and 12 at Police stations in the city and in the F. or Kingstown, Division, making a total of 635 articles claimed; the remainder being sent to store, at the Police office, Lower Castle-yard.

The articles surrendered included 393 articles of every description, 2 gold watches, 2 silver do., several gold and silver bracelets and bangles, various instruments, open glasses, drawing cases containing jewellery value over £200, a couplet receipt for £630 10s. 6d., a watchmaker's shop for £1 5s. 6d., a privateer's corpse, a set of false teeth, bottles of rum, whiskey, and champagne, and a hand mirror, &c., &c., &c.

Seven sovereigns and 9 half-sovereigns were surrendered by drivers, having been received by them for hire in mistake for silver coins; 1 of the sovereigns and 1 of the half-sovereigns were afterwards claimed and given up, and the remainder sent to the general store.

In 16 instances small sums of money amounting to £9 10s. 7d., exclusive of above gold coins, were found in vehicles and surrendered by drivers; £3 6s. 11d. of that sum was not claimed, and therefore sent to store.

Property when surrendered at Police stations, except those of "F." or Kingstown, Division, if not claimed immediately, is forwarded to the Carriage Branch of the Detective Department, No. 3, Exchange-court, where it remains for a week, and if not during that time claimed is sent to the Police store. The property mentioned in F. Division is, after same detection, also sent to store.

Receipts of property left onwards for the drivers who surrendered it, to the amount of £3 10s., during the year.

#### PROPERTY SURRENDERED DIRECT TO OWNERS BY DRIVERS.

The Police employed on carriage duty, in the course of their enquiries after property reported forgotten in cabs, &c., ascertained that the drivers had surrendered direct to the owner—£6 15s. 10d. in cash, 18 watches, a gold pair of spectacles, a dog left in a cabriolet, and 29 small miscellaneous articles such as pipes, walking sticks, &c.

This property is not included in the above number of articles surrendered to the Police during the year.
