REPORT.

SIR,

I have the honour to transmit for your information the Annual Criminal and Statistical Returns of the Dublin Metropolitan Police District for the year ended 31st December, 1882.

Indictable Offences.

The total number of indictable offences committed within the police district during the year was 4,146, against 3,771 in 1881, and 2,696 in 1880, being an increase of 375 as compared with 1881, and an increase of 1,450 as compared with 1880. The total number of persons arrested on these charges in 1882 was 1,436, against 1,332 in 1881, and 1,491 in 1880, showing an increase of 104 as compared with 1881, and a decrease of 55 as compared with 1880. Of the 1,436 persons, 1,071 were males and 365 were females; of these 596 males and 146 females were committed for trial at sessions or commission; 87 males and 25 females were bailed to stand their trial, 13 males and 6 females were held to bail, &c., by magistrates, and the residue, viz., 375 males and 188 females were discharged, either for want of sufficient evidence or through non-attendance of prosecutors, &c.

Cases summarily disposed of.

The total number of persons proceeded against on charges and summonses before magistrates was 39,144 against 45,580 in 1882, and 50,205 in 1880, showing a decrease of 6,436 as compared with 1881, and a decrease of 11,061 as compared with 1880. The persons consisted of 28,657 males (against 33,330 in 1881 and 36,755 in 1880), and 10,487 females (against 12,250 in 1881 and 13,450 in 1880). The numbers convicted of those summarily disposed of were 23,350 males and 8,616 females, against 27,488 males and 10,086 females in 1881, and 30,386 males and 10,949 females in 1880. The number discharged by the magistrates in 1882 amounted to 5,307 males and 1,871 females, against 5,842 males and 2,164 females in 1881, and 6,369 males and 2,501 females in 1880.

Total number of persons apprehended.

The total number of persons apprehended on charges by the police was 17,569 against 20,302 in 1881, and 22,459 in 1880, showing a decrease of 2,733 as compared with 1881, and a decrease of 4,890 as compared with 1880. The persons consisted of 11,435 males against 13,182 in 1881, and 14,207 in 1880, and 6,134 females against 7,120 in 1881 and 8,252 in 1880. The total number of persons proceeded against on summons was 22,997, namely, 18,282 males and 4,715 females.

Murder.

There were four murders committed in the year 1882.

Murder attempted.

There were five cases of attempted murder during the year, nine persons were charged for this offence.

Sacrilege.

There were five cases of sacrilege during the year, two persons were arrested for this offence.

Manslaughter, Indecent Offences, Coining, Assaults, and other Offences.

Twenty-seven males and 7 females were arrested for manslaughter (9 cases of which were the result of reckless driving of vehicles), 26 males and 4 females for shooting at, stabbing, &c., to do bodily harm, 10 males for rape, 13 persons for intimidation, 539 for aggravated assaults, 5 for arson, 1 for forgery, 19 for coining or uttering base coin, 450 for assaulting the police, 772 for committing common assaults, 76 for assaults with intent to rob, 15 for having arms without a licence, 13 for cattle stealing, 38 for frauds and embezzlement, 311 for simple larceny committed without violence, 591 for unlawful possession of goods, 15 for receiving stolen goods, 5 for receiving soldiers' necessaries, 2 for illegally pawning goods, 35 for attempts to steal, 590 for offences against the Vagrant Act, 502 for obstructing public thoroughfares, 65 for committing acts contrary to public decency, 495 for wilful damage, 2 for breaches of the Reformatory and Industrial Schools Acts, 229 for cruelty to animals, 64 for desertion from the army, &c., 2 for disturbing congregations at public worship, 5 for fraudulent enlistment in the army and militia, 182 for negligent driving of vehicles (71 of these having caused injury to persons), 71 for refusing to pay car-fare, 11 for offences against the Poor Law Acts, 30 for misdemeanors on railways, 68 for offences against Beer and Spirit Licensing Acts, 31 for offences against the Revenue Laws, 27 for gambling, 15 convicts for offences whereby their tickets of leave were revoked.

Offences against the Traffic Act.

There were 2,055 persons proceeded against summarily for offences against the Dublin Traffic Act during the year. Convictions were obtained in 1,445 of these cases, and fines inflicted to the amount of £208 14s.

Drunkenness.

The charges of drunkenness numbered 5,738, viz., 3,727 males and 2,011 females against 7,130, viz., 4,825 males and 2,305 females in 1881, and 7,745, viz., 5,069 males and 2,676 females in 1880.

Drunk and Disorderly.

The number arrested for being drunk and disorderly was 1,803, viz., 840 males and 963 females against 2,351, viz., 1,159 males and 1,192 females in 1881, and 2,393, viz., 1,113 males and 1,280 females in 1880.

Habitual Drunkards.

For habitual drunkards, charged as such during the year, see Table VI., Part II.

Disorderly Conduct.

The number of arrests for disorderly conduct, exclusive of prostitutes, was 2,102, viz., 1,580 males and 522 females against 2,369, viz., 1,796 males and 573 females in 1881, and 2,287, viz., 1,627 males and 660 females in 1880, being a decrease of 267 as compared with 1881, and a decrease of 185 as compared with 1880.

The number of prostitutes arrested for disorderly conduct was 785, against 975 in 1881 and 1,009 in 1880.

Total drunk and disorderly during the year 10,428, against 12,825 in 1881, and 13,434 in 1880, showing a decrease of 2,397 as compared with 1881, and a decrease of 3,006 as compared with 1880.

There were 193 persons charged for being drunk or drunk and disorderly three times and upwards during the year.

Education of the persons arrested in 1882.

In 1882 of 11,433 males arrested 3,962 could neither read nor write, 6,611 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 642 could read and write well, and 220 were of superior education. Of 6,134 females taken into custody, 2,626 could neither read nor write, 3,463 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 45 could read and write well, and none were of superior education.

In 1881 of the 13,182 males arrested 3,978 could neither read nor write, 8,380 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 622 could read and write well, and 202 were of superior education. Of 7,120 females taken into custody 2,782 could neither read nor write, 4,272 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 62 could read and write well, and 4 were of superior education.

In 1880 of 14,207 males arrested 3,392 could neither read nor write, 10,080 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 515 could read and write well, and 216 were of superior education. Of 8,232 females taken into custody 3,530 could neither read nor write, 4,672 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 45 could read and write well, and 5 were of superior education.

Ages of Persons arrested in 1882.

In 1882 of the 17,569 persons taken into custody on charges by the police 200 were under 10 years of age, 447 were 10 years and under 15, 1,841 were 15 years and under 20, 3,652 were 20 years and under 25, 3,533 were 25 years and under 30, 2,847 were 30 years and under 35, 2,082 were 35 years and under 40, 1,816 were 40 years and under 50, 891 were 50 years and under 60, 260 were 60 years and upwards.

Results of Committals for Trial in 1882.

Of 840 persons committed for trial 635 were convicted, 144 were acquitted, 42 bills were ignored by the Grand Jury, 13 were discharged through non-attendance of prosecutors, &c., and 6 were held over not tried.

Sentences of Persons Convicted.

Of the 635 persons convicted 1 was sentenced for life, 1 sentenced to 20 years' penal servitude, 2 to 10 years, 12 to 7 years, 84 to 5 years, 3 to 2 years, 148 to 12 months and under 2 years, 166 to 6 months and under 12, 130 to 1 month and under 6, 1 for a period under 1 month, 9 were sent to reformatory schools, 2 fined, 73 held to bail, and 3 sent to an asylum.

Summary Convictions—Imprisonment.

Of the 31,966 persons summarily convicted on charges and summonses by magistrates 28 were imprisoned for over 6 months, 124 for 6 months and above 3 months, 196 for 3 months and above 2 months, 318 for 2 months and above 1 month, 408 for 1 month and above 14 days, 308 for 14 days and under, 95 to reformatories, 346 to certified industrial schools, 16,134 were fined, 239 were held to bail, 60 were delivered to military authorities, 13,720 to other punishments.

Committals for Trial and Summarily disposed of—Percentage of Convictions of the Persons taken into custody on charges.

Of the number of persons committed for trial 75.5 per cent. were convicted, and of the number of persons summarily disposed of 91.8 were convicted.

Known Thieves.

The number of known thieves, depredators, and suspected persons within the Police District who were proceeded against on indictment and summarily during the year, was 659 against 626 in 1881, being an increase of 33 as compared with the latter year. The number of the above class at large within the Police District in the month of April, 1882, was 351.

Burglaries.

The number of burglaries committed in 1882 was 56 against 63 in 1881, showing a decrease of 7 as compared with the latter year. The number of persons arrested for this class of offence in 1882 was 22 against 38 in 1881, and of those so arrested in 1882 14 were convicted against 31 in 1881. Five attempts were made to break into warehouses, &c., during the year, against 14 in 1881, being an decrease of 9 as compared with that year; 7 persons were made amenable for this class of offence.

In 10 cases of the 56 burglaries reported no property was taken, and the property taken could not be traced or identified in 8 cases, leaving but 38 cases where the property taken could be traced or identified as can be seen by Table XXVI., Part II.

Doors, &c., found open by the Police.

247 doors, 4 windows, and 2 area gratings were found open or insecure by the Police on night duty during the year 1882 within the Dublin Metropolitan Police District, against 376 doors, 10 windows, and 6 area gratings so found in 1881.

Prostitution.

The number of prostitutes within the Police District in 1882 was 437, against 420 in 1881, and 434 in 1880, showing an increase of 17 as compared with 1881, and an increase of 3 as compared with 1880.

The number of houses occupied or frequented by this class of persons was 161 against 138 in 1881, and 136 in 1880. Nineteen houses of ill-fame were suppressed by the exertions of the police during the year 1882.

Suicides and Lunacy.

Eleven suicides were committed during the year, against 13 in 1881, and 11 in 1880; 46 persons were charged for attempting to commit suicide. 246 persons were charged as dangerous lunatics in 1882, against 236 in 1881, and 233 in 1880.

Inquests.

The number of deaths where coroners' inquests were held in 1882 was 272, against 259 in 1881, and 274 in 1880, showing an increase of 13 as compared with 1881, and a decrease of 2 as compared with 1880.

Juvenile Offenders.

The total number of juvenile offenders committed to reformatories was 104 (*viz.*, 95 by magistrates and 9 by judges), against 79 in 1881, and 89 in 1880; 346 children were transmitted to certified industrial schools during the year, against 311 in 1881, and 313 in 1880. For offences committed by these children see Tables No. II. and XIV.

Money found on Drunken Persons.

4,106 persons were arrested during the year for drunkenness, having money and other valuable property in their possession amounting to about £8,294 2s. 6d., which money and property were handed over by the police to these persons when sober.

Stolen Property Recovered.

The average daily loss sustained by the public from theft, &c., is set down at £25 11s., against £32 3s. 6d. in 1881, and £24 10s. in 1880. The gross loss was £14,379, against £17,069 in 1881, and £13,595 in 1880. It is necessary to bear in mind that the loss in each case reported to the police is estimated and determined not by them, but by the public who never underrate their loss; and that the area of the Dublin Police District is nearly 33 square miles, and has spread over its surface an incalculable amount of property, exposed and portable. In many instances property reported to the police as stolen or lost turns out to be only mislaid. The recovery in such cases is rarely reported to the police, therefore the loss is not so much as may appear in Table XXII.

33·7 per cent. of property stolen has been recovered by the police in 1882, against 31·2 per cent. in 1881 and 33·7 in 1880.

General dealers or brokers, who are subject to no police supervision and at present require no licence, afford great facilities to thieves in disposing of stolen property. It appears that in Edinburgh, Glasgow, and some other places, general dealers or brokers are licensed.

Marine store dealers also afford facilities to thieves to dispose of certain classes of property. It would be very desirable to bring this class of dealers under police supervision, as pawnbrokers are. Could this be done, doubtless a much larger amount of property stolen would be recovered. For full particulars see Table XXI., page 27.

Public Houses.

The total number of public-houses in the Police District open for the sale of spirituous liquors in 1882 was 972, being a decrease of 4 as compared with 1881, and a decrease of 15 as compared with 1880.

The number of summonses issued against publicans at the suit of the police for violation of the law was 44, against 46 in 1881, and 26 in 1880. Convictions were obtained in 30 cases out of the 44.

Spirit Grocers and Beer Dealers

The number of spirit grocers within the Police District in 1882 was 240, being an increase of 8 as compared with 1881. Of that number 40 are suspected of selling liquor contrary to the tenor of their licences. Summonses were issued in 34 cases against spirit grocers for infraction of the law, and convictions were obtained in 28 cases. There were 69 houses in which liquor was sold without a licence within the Police District, showing a decrease of 4 as compared with 1881; 357 summonses were issued against the owners of these houses for selling liquor, &c., and convictions followed in 316 cases.

Refreshment Houses.

There are 77 coffee shops and other refreshment houses in the Police District, being a decrease of 16 as compared with 1881; of these houses 74 were conducted regularly, and 3 irregularly. There were 31 houses having a wine licence only, within the district; all the latter are conducted regularly.

Deserted Children.

The number of children found deserted by the police and others in 1882 was 53, against 62 in 1881, and 42 in 1880.

Fires.

There were 53 fires during the year, which destroyed property to the value of £28,881, against 62 in 1881, with loss of property to the amount of £28,711 10s. The amount saved was £26,015 against £33,450 15s. in 1881. There was one life lost by fire in 1882.

Sanitary Proceedings.

The police on sanitary duty within the municipal district during the year visited 47,793 houses, containing 128,019 rooms, and discovered therein 27,422 sanitary defects, and had 27,204 of that number remedied; 2,614 summonses were issued at the suit of the police for offences against the sanitary laws, and convictions were obtained in 2,604 instances.

The sanitary officers also made 1,898 visits to bake-houses, 2,845 visits to slaughter-houses, and 3,079 visits to nightly lodging-houses during the year. Although sanitary duty is no way under the control of the Commissioner, he thinks it right to insert the report of work done as he has received it, remarking that these constables are sent to and paid for by the Corporation, and in townships by the local authority; that as regards their duties they are directed and supervised by the local authority and sanitary officers, and are responsible only to the Commissioner for their sobriety, strict observance of the rules of the force, general good conduct and efficiency while thus employed.

One acting-inspector, 3 sergeants, 3 acting-sergeants, and 13 constables are employed as sanitary officers.

Dogs' Home.

888 dogs were placed in the "Home" during the year. Of this number 596 were destroyed, 220 were sold, 52 restored to owners, 5 died, 1 escaped, and 14 remained in the "Home" on 31st December, 1882.

Hackney Carriage Drivers, &c.

In the year 1882 there were within the Police District 212 licensed vehicles, being a decrease of 33 as compared with 1881. These vehicles consisted of 1,061 hackney carriages, 797 cabriolets (including 98 phaetons), 126 job carriages, and 128 stage

carriages, 122 of the latter are tram cars. There were 2,572 licensed drivers, being a decrease of 19 as compared with 1881. A general inspection of hackney vehicles was held in May last, when the inspecting officers returned 1,777 vehicles, out of 1,809 (the total number licensed), as fit for public accommodation, several being classified as "excellent." In the majority of the number absent from the annual inspection the owners certified that they were undergoing repairs at the builders, which statement on inquiry was found to be correct. There were 17 cases for summons arising out of a general inspection, viz., five for non-production, 9 for being in bad repair, and 3 the drivers of which were not supplied with cards. In 10 of these cases small fines were imposed, 6 cautioned, and one withdrawn.

1,655 summonses were issued at the suit of the police for breaches of the Dublin Carriage Regulations, showing a decrease of 790 as compared with 1881; they consisted of 1,129 against owners and drivers of hackney carriages, 515 against cabriolet owners and drivers, 10 against owners of job carriages, and one against owner of a stage carriage. The average fine imposed in hackney carriage cases was 2s. 5d., cabriolets 2s. 6d., and job carriages 10s. 10d.

309 licensed drivers were arrested by the police during the year for breaches of the carriage laws, &c., whilst in charge of their vehicles; for punishments inflicted in these cases, see Table XLIV. In addition to the several punishments, as appear in this Table, the Chief Commissioner of Police each year, at the time set apart for renewing drivers' licences, for the ensuing year, after examining each driver's character, refuses to renew the licences of several of the worst conducted. Some are never relicensed, others are kept out of their licences for some months, according to the gravity of their offences, and are not relicensed until satisfactory proof of amendment is given. The refusal to renew licences disemploys the men refused, and it proves to drivers in general that a strict account is kept of their conduct, and that they can only expect to hold a licence by good behaviour. The Commissioner's power in this respect is much feared by drivers, and has the effect of restraining many within proper bounds, who might otherwise become very reckless. This year 34 were refused renewal of licences between 1st November and 20th December. There is a decrease of 4 in the number refused renewal in 1882, as compared with 1881. In addition to those deprived of renewal, the licences of 16 drivers were revoked during the year by the Chief Commissioner of Police immediately on conviction of some of the more grave offences.

It is to be observed that in the majority of offences set forth in Table XLII, particularly as regards the drivers of hackney carriages, &c., the law empowers the magistrates to inflict fines not exceeding 40s., or the alternative of a month's imprisonment.

277 new licences and 33 transfers of licences were granted during the year, in each case the vehicle, beast, harness, and accoutrements being inspected and pronounced fit for public accommodation, also the character of the person licensed ascertained beforehand to be satisfactory.

In 649 instances there were 915 articles of property surrendered to the police during the year by drivers, of which number 595 articles were claimed by and given up to the owners at the police office, Exchange-court, and nine at police stations through the city making a total of 604 articles claimed, the remainder being sent to store at the general police store, Lower Castle Yard.

The articles surrendered included 382 umbrellas, 3 silver watches, several gold and silver bracelets and lockets, finger-rings, surgical instruments, opera glasses, dressing-cases containing valuable property such as jewellery, &c., a cheque for £50, Bank notes, &c. Eight sovereigns and 13 half-sovereigns were surrendered by drivers having been received by them for fares in mistake for silver coins. Two of the sovereigns and one half-sovereign were afterwards claimed and given up to owners, and the remainder sent to the general police store, and at the expiration of twelve months if unclaimed the coins will be handed to the finders, on application being made to the Chief Commissioner of Police.

In 10 cases small sums of money amounting to £13 14s. 11½d., exclusive of above-mentioned gold coins, were found in vehicles and surrendered by drivers, £9 0s. 5½d. of that sum was claimed, and the remainder sent to store.

Property when surrendered at police stations, except those of F or Kingstown division, if not claimed immediately is forwarded to the carriage branch of the detective department, No. 3, Exchange-court, where it remains for a week, and if not claimed within that time, is sent to the police store. The property unclaimed in F division is after some detention also sent to store.

Recipients of property left rewards for the drivers who surrendered it to the amount of £11 15s. 6d., during the year.

Property surrendered direct to Owners.

The police employed on carriage duty in the course of their inquiries after property reported forgotten in cabs, &c., ascertained that the drivers had surrendered direct to the owners £4 12s., a gold watch, a gold mounted sword and belt, an officer's sash, a despatch box containing a large quantity of jewellery, 27 umbrellas, 11 books, 2 coats, 3 rugs, 4 hand bags, 2 opera glasses, three bonnet boxes, an oil painting, a pair of gold earrings, a clergyman's surplus, a bridle, a dead chicken, a pair of boots, two pairs of gloves, a silk pocket-handkerchief, a box containing wearing apparel, &c., a sealskin handmuff, and three walking-sticks. This property is not included in the above number of articles surrendered to the police during the year.

Police Force.

The effective strength of the Police Force on the 31st December, 1882, was 1,165 men of all ranks.

New Buildings.

During the past eight years there were 4,617 new houses built in the district, 317 of this number being erected in 1882. Amongst the number there are 12 blocks of "Artisans' Dwellings," four of them being erected in the latter year.

New Streets Opened.

There were 132 new streets opened in the District in the 8 years as above, 4 of this number being opened in 1882. The consequent increased distance to be patrolled by the police is 11 miles 2 furlongs and 5 perches; 3 furlongs and 20 perches of this distance being opened in 1882.

Removals from the Force.

The number of removals from the force through all causes during the year was 140. The area of the Dublin Metropolitan Police District is 32.15 square miles. The population numbers 349,648.

Police Band.

The Dublin Metropolitan Police Band consists of 36 members, who, in addition to their musical performances, also do duty on the streets. The band is now about 9 years organized, and the expenses connected with it are wholly defrayed by subscriptions from the officers and men of the service.

The two following Tables, marked "A" and "B," show the authorized and effective strength of the Force on 31st December, 1882, and the number of men of all ranks who joined the Force at the commencement (that is prior to the 5th of January, 1838), the number who joined each year from 1838 to 1882, inclusive, and the number serving on the 31st December.

Some are drivers of licensed vehicles, and others are not. In addition to those drivers of licensed vehicles who were refused licences during the year by the Chief Commissioner of Police, occasionally a number of some of the worst offenders named in above Table. There is a decrease of 21 in the number of licensed drivers granted in 1882, as compared with 1881.

NOTE.—The licenses of 30 outside cabs and 21 cabs were revoked, out of 40 cabs and 31 cabs were suspended in 1882 for like causes, which shows an increase of 10 in the number suspended and revoked in 1882. In many instances bad vehicles were discovered by the police going for hire, and by maintaining the owner they were as soon removed for repairs, consequently the license was not suspended or revoked. When a license is revoked, the owner, in order to license a second time, must produce a good vehicle, harness, and horses for inspection, and pay over again the full year's license duty, when his first application. This prohibition is only inserted to when such proposals it is in the light of existing bad vehicles, or otherwise contravene the carriage laws in this respect. In the case of suspension, the vehicle is not let to hire until the defects complained of are remedied, and on inspection, if pronounced fit for public use, the license is restored, free of duty or fine by the Commissioner of Police; but in other cases (its license, or "Double Fine," must be surrendered to the Police, who retain it until the license shall be restored. By this system serious and much more effectively attained in cases of urgent necessity to restore a good horse by purchasing the owner, and no endorsement enables the constables on carriage duty to prevent the removal of a great number of objectionable vehicles, by advising the proprietor to have them put in proper condition. A general inspection of hackney vehicles was held in May last, when the inspecting officers returned 1,777 vehicles, out of 1,870 (the total number licensed, as fit for public accommodation, several being classified as "condemned." In the majority of the number absent from the annual inspection the owners certified that they were undergoing repairs at the building, which statement by inquiry was found to be correct. There were 17 cases for serious causes arising out of the general inspection, viz., 5 for non-production, 3 for being in bad repair, and 2 the drivers of which were not supplied with cards. In 19 of these cases small fines were imposed, 4 contained, and 1 withdrawn.

No. XLIX.—TABLE showing the Amount of Property found forgotten in Cabs and on outside Hackney Carriages by Drivers, during the year 1882, and how disposed of.

In 549 instances there were 713 articles of property surrendered to the Police during the year by drivers, of which number, 593 articles were claimed by and given up to the owners at the Police office, Exchange-court, and 9 at Police stations through the city, making a total of 602 articles claimed; the remainder being sent to store, at the general Police store, Lower Castle-yard.

The articles surrendered included 502 umbrellas, 2 silver watches, several gold and silver timepieces, lockets, finger-rings, surgical instruments, eyeglasses, dressing cases containing valuable property, such as jewellery, &c., cloaks for £250, bank notes, &c. &c.

Eight sovereigns and 12 half-sovereigns were surrendered by drivers, having been received by them for hire in mistake for silver coins; 2 of the sovereigns and 1 half-sovereign were afterwards claimed and given up to owners, and the remainder sent to the general police store, and as expiration of twelve months, if still unclaimed, the coins will be handed to the bankers on application being made to the Chief Commissioner of Police.

In 19 cases small sums of money amounting to £19 14s. 11½d., value of silver gold coins, were found in vehicles and surrendered by drivers; £9 10s. 5½d. of that sum was claimed, and the remainder sent to store.

Property when surrendered at Police stations, except those of "F" or Kingstown, Division, if not claimed immediately, is forwarded to the Carriage branch of the Detective Department, No. 3, Exchange-court, where it remains for a week, and if not claimed within that time is sent to the Police store. The property retained in F Division is, after some detention, also sent to store.

Recipients of property left rewards for the drivers who surrendered it, to the amount of £11 10s. 6d., during the year.

PROPERTY SURRENDERED DIRECT TO OWNERS BY DRIVERS.

The Police employed on carriage duty, in the course of their inquiries after property reported forgotten in cabs, &c., ascertained that the drivers had surrendered direct to the owners—24 1½s., a gold watch, a gold mounted sword and belt, an officer's sash, a dispatch box containing a large quantity of jewellery, 27 umbrellas, 11 books, 2 coats, 5 rugs, 4 handbags, 2 open glasses, 5 basket boxes, an oil painting, a pair of gold earrings, a clergyman's surplice, a linen, a dead chicken, a pair of boots, two pairs of gloves, a silk pocket-handkerchief, a box containing wearing apparel, &c., a woman's hand-mitt, and 3 walking sticks.

This property is not included in the above number of articles surrendered to the Police during the year.
