# REPORT.

TO THE RIGHT HON. THE CHIEF SECRETARY FOR IRELAND,

&c., &c., &c.

Metropolitan Police Office, Dublin Castle,  
31st March, 1884.

SIR,

I have the honour to transmit for your information the Annual Criminal and Statistical Returns of the Dublin Metropolitan Police District for the year ended 31st December, 1883.

## *Indictable Offences.*

The total number of indictable offences committed within the police district during the year was 3,954, against 4,146 in 1882, and 3,771 in 1881, being a decrease of 192 as compared with 1882, and an increase of 183 as compared with 1881. The total number arrested on these charges in 1883 was 1,209, against 1,436 in 1882, and 1,332 in 1881, showing a decrease of 227 as compared with 1882, and a decrease of 123 as compared with 1881. Of the 1,209 persons, 859 were males and 350 females; of these 357 males and 114 females were committed for trial at sessions or commission; 91 males and 20 females were bailed to stand their trial, 24 males and 5 females were held to bail, &c., by magistrates, and the residue, viz., 387 males and 211 females were discharged, either for want of sufficient evidence or through non-attendance of prosecutors, &c.

## *Cases summarily disposed of.*

The total number of persons proceeded against on charges and summonses before magistrates was 42,841 against 39,144 in 1882, and 45,580 in 1881, showing an increase of 3,697 as compared with 1882, and a decrease of 2,739 as compared with 1881. The persons consisted of 30,430 males (against 28,657 in 1882 and 33,330 in 1881), and 12,411 females (against 10,487 in 1882 and 12,250 in 1881). The numbers convicted of those summarily disposed of were 26,132 males and 10,881 females, against 23,350 males and 8,616 females in 1882, and 27,488 males and 10,086 females in 1881. The number discharged by the magistrates in 1883 amounted to 4,298 males and 1,530 females, against 5,307 males and 1,871 females in 1882, and 5,842 males and 2,164 females in 1881.

## *Total number of persons apprehended.*

The total number of persons apprehended on charges by the police was 19,452 against 17,569 in 1882, and 20,302 in 1881, showing an increase of 1,883 as compared with 1882, and a decrease of 850 as compared with 1881. The persons consisted of 11,952 males against 11,435 in 1882, and 13,182 in 1881, and 7,500 females against 6,134 in 1882 and 7,120 in 1881. The total number proceeded against on summons was 24,598, namely, 19,337 males and 5,261 females.

## *Murder, Attempted Murder, and Conspiracy to Murder.*

There was one murder, and one person convicted during the year 1883. Seven persons were charged for murder, 2 for attempted murder, and 22 for conspiracy to murder. All these offences were committed in the year 1882.



*Sacrilege.*

There was only one case of sacrilege reported for year.

*Manslaughter, Indecent Offences, Coining, Assaults, and other Offences.*

Fifteen males and 4 females were arrested for manslaughter, 15 males for shooting at, stabbing, &c., to do bodily harm, 9 males for rape, 16 persons for intimidation, 616 for aggravated assaults, 4 for forgery, 10 for coining or uttering base coin, 501 for assaulting the police, 789 for committing common assaults, 34 for robbery from the person and assaults to rob, 9 for having arms without a licence, 10 for cattle stealing, 43 for frauds and embezzlement, 250 for simple larceny committed without violence, 570 for unlawful possession of goods, 15 for receiving stolen goods, 1 for receiving soldiers' necessaries, 8 for illegally pawning goods, 15 for attempts to steal, 617 for offences against the Vagrant Act, 540 for obstructing public thoroughfares, 66 for committing acts contrary to public decency, 482 for wilful damage, 179 for cruelty to animals, 71 for desertion from the army, &c., 6 for disturbing congregations at public worship, 2 for fraudulent enlistment, 212 for negligent driving of vehicles (99 of these having caused injury to person), 60 for refusing to pay car-fare, 3 for offences against the Poor Law Acts, 43 for misdemeanors on railways, 63 for offences against the Beer and Spirit Licensing Acts, 25 for offences against the Revenue Laws (see Table No. II.), 67 for gambling, 9 convicts for offences whereby their tickets of leave were revoked.

*Offences against the Traffic Act.*

There were 1,891 persons proceeded against summarily for offences against the Dublin Traffic Act during the year. Convictions were obtained in 1,211 of these cases, and fines inflicted to the amount of £138 14s. 6d.

*Drunkenness.*

The charges of drunkenness numbered 6,755, viz., 4,484 males and 2,271 females against 5,738, viz., 3,727 males and 2,011 females in 1882, and 7,130, viz., 4,825 males and 2,305 females in 1881.

*Drunk and Disorderly.*

The number arrested for being drunk and disorderly was 2,242, viz., 1,013 males and 1,229 females against 1,803, viz., 840 males and 963 females in 1882, and 2,351, viz., 1,159 males and 1,192 females in 1881.

*Habitual Drunkards.*

For habitual drunkards, charged as such during the year, see Table VI., Part II.

*Disorderly Conduct.*

The number of arrests for disorderly conduct, exclusive of prostitutes, was 2,281, viz., 1,557 males and 724 females against 2,102, viz., 1,580 males and 522 females in 1882, and 2,369, viz., 1,796 males and 573 females in 1881, being an increase of 179 as compared with 1882, and a decrease of 88 as compared with 1881.

The number of prostitutes arrested for disorderly conduct was 1,146, against 785 in 1882 and 975 in 1881.

Total drunk and disorderly during the year 12,424, against 10,428 in 1882, and 12,825 in 1881, showing an increase of 1,996 as compared with 1882, and a decrease of 401 as compared with 1881.

There were 189 persons charged for being drunk or drunk and disorderly three times and upwards during the year.

*Education of the persons arrested in 1883.*

In 1883 of 11,952 males arrested 3,896 could neither read nor write, 7,105 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 738 could read and write well, and 213 were of superior education. Of 7,500 females taken into custody, 2,935 could neither read nor write, 4,503 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 62 could read and write well, and none were of superior education.



In 1882 of 11,435 males arrested 3,962 could neither read nor write, 6,611 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 642 could read and write well, and 220 were of superior education. Of 6,134 females taken into custody 2,626 could neither read nor write, 3,463 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 45 could read and write well, and none were of superior education.

In 1881 of the 13,182 males arrested 3,978 could neither read nor write, 8,380 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 622 could read and write well, and 202 were of superior education. Of 7,120 females taken into custody 2,782 could neither read nor write, 4,272 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 62 could read and write well, and 4 were of superior education.

#### *Ages of Persons arrested in 1883.*

In 1883 of the 19,452 persons taken into custody on charges by the police 194 were under 10 years of age, 433 were 10 years and under 15, 2,453 were 15 years and under 20, 4,304 were 20 years and under 25, 3,628 were 25 years and under 30, 2,976 were 30 years and under 35, 2,031 were 35 years and under 40, 1,983 were 40 years and under 50, 1,044 were 50 years and under 60, 406 were 60 years and upwards.

#### *Results of Committals for Trial in 1883.*

Of 573 persons committed for trial 412 were convicted, 95 were acquitted, 33 bills were ignored by the Grand Jury, 11 were discharged through non-attendance of prosecutors, &c., and 22 were held over not tried.

#### *Sentences of Persons Convicted.*

Of the 412 persons convicted 8 were sentenced to death, 3 sentenced for life, 6 to 10 years' penal servitude, 3 to 7 years, 29 to 5 years, 6 to 2 years, 55 to 12 months and under 2 years, 122 to 6 months and under 12, 94 to 1 month and under 6, 4 for a period under 1 month, 7 sent to reformatory schools, 1 fined, 72 held to bail, 1 sent to an asylum, and 1 other punishments.

#### *Summary Convictions—Imprisonment.*

Of the 37,013 persons summarily convicted on charges and summonses by magistrates, 26 were imprisoned for over 6 months, 134 for 6 months and above 3 months, 156 for 3 months and above 2 months, 369 for 2 months and above 1 month, 500 for 1 month and above 14 days, 463 for 14 days and under, 91 to reformatories, 363 to certified industrial schools, 16,788 were fined, 243 were held to bail, 51 were delivered to military authorities, and 17,829 to other punishments.

#### *Committals for Trial and Summarily disposed of—Per-centage of the Convictions of the Persons taken into custody on charges.*

Of the number of persons committed for trial 71.9 per cent. were convicted, and of the persons summarily disposed of 92.8 were convicted.

#### *Known Thieves.*

The number of known thieves, depredators, and suspected persons within the Police District who were proceeded against on indictment and summarily during the year, was 678 against 659 in 1882, being an increase of 19 as compared with the latter year. The number of the above class at large within the Police District in the month of April, 1883, was 557.

#### *Burglaries.*

The number of burglaries committed in 1883 was 30 against 56 in 1882, showing a decrease of 26 as compared with the latter year. The number of persons arrested for this class of offence in 1883 was 22 against 22 in 1882, and of those so arrested in 1883 16 were convicted against 14 in 1882. Two attempts were made to break into warehouses, &c., during the year, against 5 in 1882, being a decrease of 3 as compared with that year; 3 persons were made amenable for this class of offence.

In 8 cases of the 30 burglaries reported no property was taken, and in the remaining cases, the property could not be traced or identified, as can be seen by Table XXVI., Part II.



The number of summonses issued at the suit of the police for violation of the law was 61, against 44 in 1882, and 46 in 1881. Convictions were obtained in 53 cases out of the 61.

#### *Spirit Grocers and Beer Dealers.*

The number of spirit grocers within the Police District in 1883 was 241, being an increase of 1 as compared with 1882. Of that number 46 are suspected of selling liquor contrary to the tenor of their licences. Summonses were issued in 24 cases against spirit grocers for infraction of the law, and convictions were obtained in 17 cases. There were 161 houses in which liquor was sold without a licence within the Police District, showing an increase of 92 as compared with 1882; 441 summonses were issued against the owners of these houses for selling liquor, &c., and convictions followed in 370 cases.

#### *Refreshment Houses.*

There are 87 coffee shops and other refreshment houses in the Police District, being an increase of 10 as compared with 1882; of these houses 83 were conducted regularly, and 4 irregularly. There were 28 having a wine licence only, within the district; all the latter are conducted regularly.

#### *Deserted Children.*

The number of children found deserted by the police and others in 1883 was 39 against 53 in 1882, and 62 in 1881.

#### *Fires.*

There were 52 fires during the year, which destroyed property to the value of £24,122, against 53 in 1882, with loss of property to the amount of £28,881. The amount saved was £32,745 against £26,015 in 1882. There was one life lost by fire in 1883.

#### *Sanitary Proceedings.*

The police on sanitary duty within municipal district during the year visited 42,091 houses, containing 136,937 rooms, and discovered therein 20,862 sanitary defects, and had 20,437 of that number remedied; 2,242 summonses were issued at the suit of the police for offences against the sanitary laws, and convictions were obtained in 2,241 instances.

The sanitary officers also made 1,700 visits to bake-houses, 3,547 visits to slaughter-houses, and 2,103 visits to nightly lodging-houses during the year. Although sanitary duty is no way under the control of the Commissioner, he thinks it right to insert the report of work done as he has received it, remarking that these constables are sent to, and paid for by the Corporation, and in townships by the local authority; that as regards their duties they are directed and supervised by the local authority and sanitary officers, and are responsible only to the Commissioner for their sobriety, strict observance of the rules of the force, general good conduct and efficiency while thus employed.

One acting-inspector, 2 sergeants, and 12 constables are employed as sanitary officers.

#### *Dogs' Home.*

774 dogs were placed in the "Home" during the year. Of this number 513 were destroyed, 187 were sold, 47 restored to owners, 5 died, 4 escaped, and 18 remained in the "Home" on 31st December, 1883.

#### *Hackney Carriage Drivers, &c.*

In the year 1883 there were within the Police District 2,092 licensed vehicles, being a decrease of 20 as compared with 1882. The vehicles consisted of 1,040 hackney carriages, 796 cabriolets (including 96 phaetons), 129 job carriages, and 127 stage



carriages, 121 of the latter are tram cars. There were 2,583 licensed drivers, being an increase of 11 as compared with 1882. A general inspection of hackney vehicles was held in May last, when the inspecting officers returned 1,747 vehicles, out of 1,813 (the total number licensed), as fit for public accommodation, several being classed as "excellent." In the majority of the number absent from the annual inspection the owners certified that they were undergoing repairs at the builders, which statement on inquiry was found to be correct. There were 13 cases for summons arising out of a general inspection, viz., 5 for non-production, 6 for the vehicles being in bad repair, 1 for a driver's badge being defaced, and 1 for a driver not being supplied with cards. In 10 of these cases small fines were imposed, and the remainder cautioned.

1,346 summonses were issued at the suit of the police for breaches of the Dublin Carriages Regulations, showing a decrease of 309 as compared with 1882; they consisted of 830 against owners and drivers of hackney carriages, 501 against cabriolet owners and drivers, 14 against owners of job carriages, and one against the owner of a stage carriage. The average fine imposed in hackney carriage cases was 2s. 4d., cabriolets 2s. 7d., and job carriages 5s. 1d.

307 licensed drivers were arrested by the police during the year for breaches of the carriage laws, &c., whilst in charge of their vehicles; for punishments inflicted in these cases, see Table XLIV. In addition to the several punishments appearing in above Table, the Commissioner of Police, at the time set apart each year for renewing drivers' and conductors licences for ensuing year, after examining each applicant's character, refuses to renew the licences of the several worst conducted. Some are never relicensed, others are kept out of their licences for some months, according to the gravity of their offences, and are not relicensed until satisfactory proof of amendment is given. The refusal to renew licences disemploys the men refused, and it proves to drivers in general that a strict account is kept of their conduct, and that they can only expect to retain their licences by good behaviour. The Commissioner's power in this respect is much feared by conductors and drivers, and has the effect of restraining many within proper bounds, who might otherwise become very reckless. This year 31 drivers were refused renewal of their licences between 1st November and 20th December, 1883. There is a decrease of 3 in the number refused renewal in 1883, as compared with 1882. In addition to those refused renewal, the licences of 18 drivers were revoked during the year by the Commissioner of Police, and 1 by a Divisional Magistrate, immediately on conviction of some of the more grave offences named in above Table. The 19 cases appearing under the heading "Discharged," were almost entirely either settled or dismissed, through non-attendance of complainants who gave the offenders into custody. There is a decrease of 2 in the number of licensed drivers, &c., arrested in 1883, as compared with 1882.

It is to be observed that in the majority of offences set forth in Table XLII., particularly as regards the drivers of hackney carriages, &c., the law empowers the magistrates to inflict fines not exceeding 40s., or the alternative of a month's imprisonment.

Of the hackney vehicles, 288 new licences and 48 transfers of licences were granted during the year, in each case the vehicle, beast, harness, and accoutrements being inspected and pronounced fit for public accommodation, also the character of the persons seeking the licenses ascertained beforehand to be satisfactory.

In 651 instances there were 935 articles of property surrendered to the police by drivers during the year, of which number 610 articles were claimed by and given up to owners at the carriage department, Exchange-court, and 11 at police stations through the city, &c., making a total of 621 articles claimed, the remainder being sent to store at the general police store, Lower Castle Yard.

The articles surrendered included 395 umbrellas of various descriptions, a gold watch, several articles of jewellery, such as gold bracelets, brooches, and ear-rings, &c., a melodeon, a speaking or ear trumpet, a silver sandwich case, several valuable opera and field glasses, gold and silver-mounted spectacles, fancy handbags, and a case of fire-arms, with suitable ammunition, &c. Five sovereigns and twenty-one half-sovereigns were surrendered by drivers during the year, having been received by them for fares in mistake for silver coins. Two of the sovereigns and six of the half-sovereigns were afterwards claimed and given up to owners, and the remainder sent to the general police store, and at the expiration of twelve months if still unclaimed the coins will be handed to the finders, on application being made to the Commissioner of Police.

In 12 cases small sums of money amounting to £12 12s. 3½d., exclusive of above gold coins, were found in vehicles and surrendered by drivers, £10 11s. 3½d. of that sum was claimed, and the remainder sent to store. In two instances endorsed cheques on Dublin Banks for £5 16s. and £100 10s. respectively, were surrendered by drivers and restored to owners.



Property when surrendered at police stations, except those of F or Kingstown division, if not claimed immediately is forwarded to the carriage department, Exchange-court, where it remains for a week, and if not claimed within that time, is sent to the police store. The property unclaimed in the F division is after same period of detention also sent to store.

Recipients of property left rewards for the drivers who surrendered it to the amount of £9 5s. during the year.

#### *Property surrendered direct to Owners.*

The police constables employed on carriage duty in the course of their inquiries after property reported forgotten in cabs, &c., ascertained that the drivers had surrendered direct to the owners the following articles, viz:—a gold necklet in case, a small box containing jewellery, a gold locket, 2 travelling rugs, 8 umbrellas, 3 fancy walking-sticks, 4 hand-bags, containing valuable property, 3 seal skin hand-muffs, a suit of military uniform, a court hat, 3 overcoats, a sovereign received in mistake for a shilling, 2 cheques for large amounts, a case of fancy knives and forks, 5 lbs. of tobacco, 2 hats, and 1 bonnet in case, an indiarubber foot-warmer, and 3 bunches of keys. This property is not included in the above number of articles surrendered to the police during the year.

#### *Police Force.*

The effective strength of the Police Force on the 31st December, 1883, was 1,221 men of all ranks.

#### *New Buildings.*

During the past nine years there were 4,982 new houses built in the district, 365 of this number being opened in 1883. Amongst the number there are 12 blocks of "Artisans' Dwellings."

#### *New Streets Opened.*

There were 137 new streets opened in the District in the 9 years as above, 5 of this number being opened in 1883. The consequent increased distance to be patrolled by the police is 11 miles 5 furlongs 37 perches and 5 yards; 3 furlongs 32 perches and 5 yards of this distance being opened in 1883.

#### *Removals from the Force.*

The number of removals from the force through all causes during the year was 103. The area of the Dublin Metropolitan Police District is 32.15 square miles. The population numbers about 349,648.

The two Tables, marked "A" and "B," show the authorized and effective strength of the Force on 31st December, 1883, and the number of men of all ranks who joined the Force since the commencement (that is prior to the 5th January, 1838), the number who joined each year from 1838 to 1883, inclusive, and the number serving on the 31st December.

## REPORT of the MEDICAL OFFICER on the HEALTH of the DUBLIN METROPOLITAN POLICE for the Year 1883.

I have to report that the health of our men in 1883 had improved relatively with the preceding year, and there has been a remarkable gradual advance from the year 1867.

In 1867 the aggregate of the daily sick amounted to 17,042, being 4.669 per cent. per day on the authorized strength of the Force.

In 1877 it had declined to 11,703, being 2.875 per cent. per day, the strength of the Force being 1,112. In 1883 it was 10,816, being 2.383 per cent. per day, the strength of the Force having been increased to 1,221. This shows a remarkably high standard of health.

NOTE.—In addition to the several punishments appearing in above Table, the Commissioner of Police (at the time set apart each year for renewing drivers' and conductors' licences for ensuing year), after examining each applicant's character, refuses to renew the licences of several of the worst conducted. Some are never re-licensed; others are kept out of their licences for some months, according to the gravity of their offences, and are not re-licensed until satisfactory proof of amendment is given. The refusal to renew licences disempowers the men refused, and it proves to drivers in general that a strict account is kept of their conduct, and that they can only expect to retain their licences by good behaviour. The Commissioner's power in this respect is much feared by conductors and drivers, and has the effect of restraining many within proper bounds who might otherwise become very reckless. This year 31 drivers were refused renewal of their licences, between 1st November and 30th December, 1883. There is a decrease of 1 in the number refused renewal in 1883, as compared with 1882. In addition to those refused renewal, the licences of 18 drivers were revoked during the year by the Commissioner of Police, and one by a Divisional Magistrate, immediately on conviction of some of the more grave offences named in above Table. The 19 cases appearing under the heading "Discharged" were almost entirely either settled, or dismissed through non-attendance of complainants who gave the offenders into custody. There is a decrease of 2 in the number of licensed drivers, &c., arrested in 1883, as compared with 1882.
