REPORT.

TO THE RIGHT HON. THE CHIEF SECRETARY FOR IRELAND,

SIR,

I have the honour to submit for your information the Annual Criminal and Statistical Returns of the Dublin Metropolitan Police District.

Indictable Offences.

The total number of indictable offences committed within the district during the year was 3,885, against 3,954 in 1883, and 4,146 in 1882, being a decrease of 69 as compared with 1883, and a decrease of 261 as compared with 1882. The total number arrested on these charges in 1884 was 1,423, against 1,209 in 1883, and 1,436 in 1882, showing a decrease of 214 as compared with 1883, and an increase of 13 as compared with 1882. Of the 1,423 persons, 968 were males and 455 were females; of these 300 males and 129 females were committed for trial at sessions or commission; 108 males and 21 females were bailed to appear for trial, 4 males and 3 females were held to bail, &c., by magistrates, and the residue, viz., 556 males and 302 females, were discharged, either for want of sufficient evidence or through non-attendance of prosecutors, &c.

Cases summarily disposed of.

The total number of persons proceeded against on charges and summonses before magistrates was 48,582 against 42,841 in 1883, and 39,144 in 1882, showing an increase of 5,741 as compared with 1883, and an increase of 9,438 as compared with 1882. The persons consisted of 34,440 males (against 30,430 in 1883 and 28,657 in 1882), and 14,142 females (against 12,411 in 1883 and 10,487 in 1882). The numbers convicted of those summarily disposed of were 30,039 males and 12,402 females, against 26,132 males and 10,881 females in 1883, and 23,350 males and 8,616 females in 1882. The number discharged by the magistrates in 1884 amounted to 4,401 males and 1,740 females, against 4,298 males and 1,530 females in 1883, and 5,307 males and 1,871 females in 1882.

Total number of persons apprehended.

The total number of persons apprehended on charges by the police was 22,394 against 19,452 in 1883, and 17,569 in 1882, showing an increase of 2,942 as compared with 1883, and an increase of 4,825 as compared with 1882. The persons consisted of 13,688 males and 8,706 females against 11,952 males, and 7,500 females in 1883, and 11,435 males and 6,134 females in 1882. The total number proceeded against on summons was 27,604, namely, 21,713 males and 5,891 females.

No cases of murder, or attempted murder, occurred in the Dublin Metropolitan District during the year 1884.

Manslaughter, Indecent Offences, Coining, Assaults, and other Offences.

Thirty-seven males and 7 females were arrested for manslaughter, 24 males and one female for shooting at, stabbing, &c., to do bodily harm, 24 males for rape, 26 persons for intimidation, 946 for aggravated assaults, 5 for forgery, 7 for coining or uttering base coin, 504 for assaulting the police, 729 for committing common assaults, 32 for

Deserted Children.

The number of children found deserted by the police and others in 1884 was 38 against 39 in 1883, and 53 in 1882.

Fires.

There were 51 fires during the year, which destroyed property to the value of £38,319, against 52 in 1883, with loss of property to the amount of £24,122. The amount saved was £46,860 against £32,745 in 1883. There was one life lost by fire in 1884.

Sanitary Proceedings.

The police on sanitary duty within municipal district during the year visited 21,534 houses, containing 59,869 rooms, and discovered therein 9,918 sanitary defects, and had 9,875 of that number remedied; 1,090 summonses were issued at the suit of the police for offences against the sanitary laws, and convictions were obtained in 1,089 cases.

The sanitary officers also made 560 visits to bake-houses, 1,235 visits to slaughter-houses, and 859 visits to nightly lodging-houses during the year. Although sanitary duty is no way under the control of the Commissioner, he thinks it right to insert the report of work done as he has received it, remarking that these constables are sent to, and paid for by the Corporation, and the local authority; that as regards their duties they are directed and supervised by the local authority and sanitary officers, and are responsible only to the Commissioner for their sobriety, strict observance of the rules of the force, general good conduct and efficiency while thus employed.

The sanitary staff has been reduced to an acting-inspector, 2 sergeants, and 6 constables, and civilians appointed instead.

Dogs' Home.

976 dogs were placed in the "Home" during the year. Of this number 712 were destroyed, 181 were sold, 62 restored to owners, 11 escaped, and 10 remained in the "Home" on 31st December, 1884.

Hackney Carriage Drivers, &c.

In the year 1884 there were within the Police District 2,097 licensed vehicles, being an increase of 5 as compared with 1883. The vehicles consisted of 1,046 hackney carriages, 792 cabriolets (including 94 phaetons), 126 job carriages, and 133 stage carriages; 122 of the latter are tram cars. There were 2,593 licensed drivers, being an increase of 10 as compared with 1883. A general inspection of hackney carriages was held in May last, when the inspecting officers returned 1,749 vehicles out of 1,793 (the total number then licensed), as fit for public accommodation, several being classified as "excellent." In the majority of the number absent from "general inspection" the owners certified that they were undergoing repairs at the builders, which statements were by inquiry found to be correct. There were only 3 cases for summons arising out of this "annual inspection," viz.:—for non-production of vehicles, the owners of which were fined 2s. 6d. each. The vehicles undergoing repairs at time of "annual inspection," before being used by the public, had to undergo a strict examination regarding their safety, condition of horses attached, as well as their accoutrements, &c.

1,329 summonses were issued at the suit of the police for breaches of the Dublin Carriages Regulations, showing a decrease of 17 as compared with 1883; they consisted of 851 against owners and drivers of hackney carriages, 426 against cabriolet owners and drivers, 31 against owners of job carriages, and 21 against the owners of stage carriages. The average fine imposed in hackney carriage cases was 2s. 4d., cabriolets 2s. 7d., job carriages 7s. 7d., and stage carriages 4s. 7d.

395 licensed drivers were arrested by the police during the year for breaches of the carriage laws, &c., whilst in charge of their vehicles; for punishments inflicted in these cases, see Table XLIV. In addition to the several punishments appearing in the Table referred to, the Commissioner of Police (at the time set apart each year for renewing conductors' and drivers' licences for ensuing year), after examining each applicant's character, refuses to renew the licences of several of the worst conducted. Some are never relicensed, others are kept out of their licences for months, according to the gravity of their offences, and are not relicensed until satisfactory proof of amendment is given. The refusal to renew licences disemploys the men refused, and it proves to drivers in general that a strict account is kept of their conduct, and that they can only expect to retain their licences by good behaviour. The Commissioner's power in this respect is much feared by conductors and drivers, and has the effect of restraining many within proper bounds, who might otherwise become very reckless. This year 30 drivers were

refused renewal of their licences between 1st November and 20th December, 1884. There is only a decrease of 1 in the number refused renewal in 1884.

It is to be observed that in the majority of cases set forth in Table XLIII., the law empowers the magistrates to inflict fines not exceeding 40s., or the alternative of a month's imprisonment.

Of the hackney vehicles, 280 new licences and 65 transfers of licences were granted during the year 1884. In each case the vehicle, beast, harness, and accoutrements were inspected and pronounced fit for public accommodation; also the characters of the persons seeking the licences were ascertained beforehand to be satisfactory.

Property found forgotten in Cabriolets or on Hackney Carriages by Drivers, &c., and how disposed of.

In 696 instances there were 825 articles of property surrendered to the police by drivers during the year, of which number 390 articles were claimed by and given up to owners at the Carriage Department, Exchange-court, and 7 at police stations through the city and suburbs, making a total of 397 articles claimed, the remainder being sent to store at the general dépôt for property, Lower Castle Yard.

The articles surrendered included 371 umbrellas of various descriptions, 2 silver watches, 1 gold brooch, 3 silver bracelets, and several other articles of jewellery, such as gold rings, scarf-pins, &c.; two handbags, locked, which were claimed, and said by owners to contain both money and jewellery, several opera glasses and spectacles, a prismatic compass, an officer's sword (military), also several valuable overcoats, travelling rugs, &c., &c., &c.

Six sovereigns and 25 half-sovereigns were surrendered by drivers during the year, having been received by them for fares in mistake for silver coins. Two sovereigns and 9 half-sovereigns were afterwards claimed and given up to owners, and the remainder sent to police store, and at the expiration of twelve months, if still unclaimed, the coins will be handed to finders-on application being made to the Commissioner of Police.

In 11 instances small sums of money, amounting to £21 18s. 8½d., exclusive of above gold coins, were found in vehicles and surrendered to police by drivers, £9 16s. 10½d. of that sum was claimed, and remainder sent to store.

Property when surrendered at police stations, except those of F or Kingstown division, if not claimed immediately, is forwarded to Carriage Department, Exchange-court, where it remains for a week, and if not claimed within that time, is sent to police store.

Recipients of property during the year left rewards for drivers who surrendered same to the amount of £10 9s. 7d.

Property surrendered direct to Owners.

The police constables employed on carriage duty in the course of their inquiries after property reported as forgotten in cabs or cars, ascertained that the drivers had surrendered direct to owners the following articles, viz:—£12 in gold and silver coins, a dressing-case containing £108 worth of jewellery, 1 gold bracelet, 7 overcoats, 3 sealskin hand-muffs, 2 fur capes, a man's hat, a carriage apron, 2 leather hand-bags (contents unknown), 2 bags of carpenters' tools, 2 opera glasses, 103 lbs. of chain, 3 spectacles, 2 prayer-books, a roll of music, a Gladstone bag containing law papers, 1 law book, a bunch of keys on steel ring, and a fancy walking-stick.

Property discovered by Carriage Constables at Railway Stations, Hotels, &c.

A purse containing money, stamps, &c., a travelling rug, a sealskin hand-muff, a portmanteau containing wearing apparel, 1 do. (contents unknown), 1 leather hand-bag (locked), a case of jewellery, a silver bracelet, a parcel containing several books, 3 umbrellas, a silver card case, a spectacles case, and a lawn tennis racket.

Police Force.

The effective strength of the Police Force on the 31st December, 1884, was 1,199 men of all ranks.

New Buildings.

During the past ten years there were 5,363 new houses built in the district, 381 of this number being opened in 1884. Amongst the number there are 15 blocks of "Artisans' Dwellings."

New Streets Opened.

There were 143 new streets opened in the District in the 10 years as above, 6 of this number being opened in 1884. The consequent increased distance to be patrolled by

the police is 12 miles 4 furlongs and $2\frac{1}{2}$ yards; 6 furlongs 2 perches and 3 yards of this distance being opened in 1884.

Health of the Force.

I append Medical Officer's Report:—

SIR,—During the year 1884, notwithstanding the exceptionally severe duty imposed upon the Town Divisions, there was a slight improvement in the health of our men. The per-centage of the daily sick was 2·252, against 2·383, in the preceding year.

Previous to the year 1865, the average was about 5 per cent. It decreased slightly during the years following, the first notable declension being in the year 1873, when the men's pay was considerably raised, and their general mode of living, in consequence, much improved.

In 1865, and preceding years, the per-centage was (about) 5. In 1877, and succeeding years, the per-centage was (about) $2\frac{1}{2}$.

The effective strength of the Force in consequence of this improved sanitary condition must be deemed most satisfactory from economic and other important considerations.

As the controversy on the subject of re-vaccination continues to be rather warm within the profession, and at a still higher temperature amongst amateurs, I believe that our experience on the subject may be worthy of notice.

During the epidemic of Small Pox in the years 1878 and 1879, forty-four of our men died of that disease. All these had been vaccinated, but not re-vaccinated.

Of 432 men who had been re-vaccinated in our surgery by Dr. Long every one of them escaped contagion; since then no recruit is admitted to the Dépôt, without evidence of the operation having been successfully performed, and there has been no instance either amongst recruits or Constables in which it has produced more than trivial illness or inconvenience.

During the year we examined 118 recruits. Of these sixty-six were accepted and fifty-two rejected.

NOTE.—In addition to the several punishments appearing in above Table, the Commissioner of Police (at the time set apart each year for renewing drivers' and conductors' licenses for ensuing year, after examining each applicant's character, refuses to renew the licenses of several of the worst conducted. Some are never re-licensed; others are kept out of their licenses for some months, according to the gravity of their offenses, and are not re-licensed until satisfactory proof of amendment is given. The refusal to renew licenses disciplines the men refused, and it proves to drivers in general that a strict account is kept of their conduct, and that they can only expect to retain a driver's license by good behavior. The Commissioner's power in this respect is much feared by conductors and drivers, and has the effect of restraining many within proper bounds who might otherwise become very reckless. This year 39 drivers were refused renewal of their licenses, between 1st November and 25th December, 1884. There is a decrease of 1 in the number refused renewal in 1884, as compared with 1883. In addition to those refused renewal, the licenses of 21 drivers were revoked during the year, immediately on conviction of some of the more grave offences named in above Table. The 31 cases appearing under the heading "Discharged" were almost entirely either settled, or dismissed through non-attendance of complainants who gave the offenders into custody. There is an increase of 88 in the number of licensed drivers, &c., ascertained in 1884, as compared with 1883.

NOTE.—The licences of 31 outside cars and 26 cabs were revoked, and of 64 cars and 38 cabs were suspended in 1883 for like causes, which shows a decrease of 24 in the number suspended and revoked in 1884. In many instances vehicles were discovered by the carriage constables plying for hire, in an unserviceable state, and by cautioning the owners they were at once removed for repairs, consequently the licences were not suspended or revoked. When a licence is revoked, the owner, in order to become re-licensed, must produce a good vehicle, beast, and harness for inspection at the Carriage Department, and pay over again the full year's licence duty, as on his first application. This punishment is only resorted to when the proprietor is in the habit of plying bad vehicles, working unserviceable horses, or otherwise contravening the carriage laws. In the case of suspension, the vehicle is not let to hire until the defects complained of are remedied, and on inspection, if pronounced fit for public use, the licence is restored, free of duty or fine, by the Commissioner of Police; but in either case the brass figure, or "Dublin Plate," must be surrendered to the Police, who retain it in the Carriage Department until the licence shall be restored. By this system repairs are much more effectively attained in cases of urgent necessity or excessive neglect, than by summoning the owners, and its enforcement enables the constables on carriage duty to procure the removal of objectionable vehicles or horses, by advising the proprietors that such shall not be allowed for public accommodation. A general inspection of hackney vehicles was held in May last, when the inspecting officers returned 1,749 vehicles, out of 1,793 (the total number then licensed), as fit for public accommodation, several being classified as "excellent." In the majority of the number absent from the general inspection the owners certified that they were undergoing repairs at the builders, which statements were, by inquiry, found to be correct. There were only 3 cases for summons arising out of this annual inspection, viz., for non-production of vehicles, the owners of which were fined 2s. 6d. each. The vehicles undergoing repairs at time of annual inspection, before being allowed to be used by the public, had to undergo a strict examination regarding their safety, condition of horses attached, as well as their accoutrements, &c.

No. XLIX.—TABLE showing the Amount of Property found forgotten in Cabs or on outside Hackney Carriages by Drivers, during the year 1884, and how disposed of.

In 656 instances there were 825 articles of property surrendered to the Police by drivers during the year, of which number, 390 articles were claimed by and given up to the owners at the Carriage Department, Exchange-court, and 7 at Police stations through the city and suburbs, making a total of 397 articles claimed; the remainder being sent to store, at the General Depot for Property, Lower Castle-yard.

The articles surrendered included 371 umbrellas of various descriptions, 2 silver watches, 1 gold brooch, 3 silver bracelets, and several other articles of jewellery, such as gold rings, scarf pins, &c., two hand bags, locked, which were claimed, and said by owners to contain both money and jewellery, several opera glasses and spectacles, a prismatic compass, an officer's sword (military), also several valuable overcoats, travelling rugs, &c., &c.

Six sovereigns and 25 half-sovereigns were surrendered by drivers during the year, having been received by them for fares in mistake for silver coins; 2 sovereigns and 9 half-sovereigns were afterwards claimed and given up to owners, and the remainder sent to police store, and at the expiration of twelve months, if still unclaimed, the coins will be handed to the finders on application being made to the Commissioner of Police.

In 11 instances small sums of money amounting to £21 18s. 8½d., exclusive of above gold coins, were found in vehicles and surrendered to police by drivers; £9 16s. 10½d. of that sum was claimed, and remainder sent to store.

Property when surrendered at Police stations, except those of "F." or Kingstown, Division, if not claimed immediately, is forwarded to the Carriage Department, Exchange-court, where it remains for a week, and if not claimed within that time is sent to Police store.

Recipients of property during the year left rewards for the drivers who surrendered same to the amount of £10 2s. 7d.

PROPERTY SURRENDERED DIRECT TO OWNERS.

The Police Constables employed on carriage duty, in the course of their inquiries after property reported as forgotten in cabs or cars, ascertained that the drivers had surrendered direct to the owners the following articles, viz.:—£12 in gold and silver coins, a dressing-case containing £108 worth of jewellery, 1 gold bracelet, 7 overcoats, 3 seal skin hand-muffs, 2 fur capes, a man's hat, a carriage apron, 2 leather hand-bags (contents unknown), 2 bags of carpenter's tools, two opera glasses, 103 lbs. of chain, three spectacles, two prayer books, a roll of music, a Gladstone bag containing law papers, one law book, a bunch of keys on steel ring, and a fancy walking stick.

A purse containing money, stamps, &c., one travelling rug, one seal skin hand-muff, a portmanteau containing wearing apparel, eno do. (contents unknown), one leather hand-bag (locked), a case of jewellery, a silver bracelet, a parcel containing several books, three umbrellas, a silver card case, a spectacles in case, and a lawn-tennis racket.
