SIR,

I have the honour to submit the Criminal and Statistical Returns for the year 1912.

Indictable Offences—(TABLES I. AND II.)

The total number of indictable offences committed within the district during the year was 3,122, against 3,429 in 1911, being a decrease of 307. They may be classified as follows:—

Sentences of Persons Convicted on Indictment.

Of the 380 persons convicted on indictment, 7 were sentenced to 5 years, 4 to 4 years, and 43 to 3 years' penal servitude, 1 to 2 years, 56 to 12 months and under 2 years, 74 to 6 months and under 12 months, 98 to 1 month and under 6 months, 4 under 1 month, 59 were held to bail, and 34 received other punishment. (See Table II).

Sentences of Persons Summarily Convicted.

Of the 25,732 persons summarily convicted on charges by the Magistrates, 119 were sentenced to imprisonment for 6 months and above 3 months, 179 for 3 months and above 2 months, 374 for 2 months and above 1 month, 820 for 1 month and above 14 days, 647 for 14 days and under, 25 were sent to Places of Detention, 79 were sent to Reformatories, 23,397 were fined, 65 were held to bail, and 27 were otherwise disposed of. (See Table IV.)

Percentage of the Convictions of Persons made Amenable.

Of the persons proceeded against by indictment, 68.2 per cent., and of the persons proceeded against summarily, 75.2 per cent. were convicted.

Probation Orders.

During the year 1912, 316 Probation Orders were made, 182 of the persons so dealt with being charged with Indictable Offences, and 134 with Non-indictable Offences.

Of the 263 males against whom Probation Orders were made, 59 were under 12 years of age, 62 were aged 12 to 14, 66 were aged 14 to 16, 45 were aged 16 to 21, and 31 were over 21 years.

Of the 53 females against whom Probation Orders were made, 6 were aged 12 to 14, 5 were aged 14 to 16, 13 were aged 16 to 21, and 29 were over 21 years.

In 28 cases the offenders were brought up for sentence after release on Probation Order: 7 were discharged, 5 were sentenced to imprisonment, 2 were committed to a Reformatory School, and 12 were dealt with for fresh offences. (See Table V.)

Juvenile Courts.

The number of Children and Young Persons charged with Offences during the year and dealt with in Juvenile Courts was 2,092, viz. :—336 charged with Indictable Offences and 1,756 with Non-indictable Offences. They were disposed of as follows :—

Orders were made against parents or guardians, under Section 99 of the Children Act, 1908, in 3 cases to pay damages or costs, and in 87 cases to enter into recognizances. (See Table IX.)

Ages of Persons Arrested and Summarily Convicted.

Of the 9,370 persons arrested, tried summarily, and convicted, 62 were under 14 years of age, 124 were 14 years and under 16, 889 were 16 years and under 21

3,099 were 21 years and under 30, 2,737 were 30 years and under 40, 1,523 were 40 years and under 50, 658 were 50 years and under 60, and 278 were 60 years and upwards. (See Table VII.)

Education of Persons Arrested and Summarily Convicted.

Of the 5,352 males arrested and summarily convicted during the year, 500 could neither read nor write, 4,742 could read only or read and write imperfectly, 99 could read and write well, and 11 were of superior education. Of 4,018 females arrested and summarily convicted, 436 could neither read nor write, 3,552 could read only or read and write imperfectly, and 25 could read and write well, and 5 were of superior education. (See Table VII.)

INTOXICATING LIQUOR LAWS.

Each Inspector and Sergeant is required to specially visit licensed premises at uncertain hours during his patrol, for the purpose of detecting breaches of the Licensing Laws.

These officers paid visits during the year—

27,223 to Public Houses.

5,732 to Spirit Grocers and Beer Dealers.

Offences by Licensed Persons.—119 publicans, 19 spirit grocers, and 13 beer dealers were prosecuted during the year. Total 151, as compared with 92 in year 1911, being an increase of 59. 41 cases were dismissed with caution, 35 without caution, and 75 were convicted and fined in sums varying from £1 to £10. (See Table X.)

Drunkenness.—The charges of drunkenness, not combined with any other offence, numbered 2,345, viz., 1,542 males and 803 females, against 1,913, viz., 1,165 males and 748 females, in 1911, and 2,462, viz., 1,483 males and 979 females, in 1910.

The number arrested for being drunk and disorderly was 1,087, viz., 517 males and 570 females, against 944, viz., 479 males and 465 females, in 1911, and 1,109, viz., 542 males and 567 females, in 1910.

The number arrested for drunkenness while in charge of vehicles, &c., was 87 against 58 in 1911, and 92 in 1910.

The number arrested for drunkenness, combined with offences other than disorderly conduct, was 96, against 53 in 1911, and 95 in 1910. These cases are included in Table No. III. under the more serious offence, viz., assault, or wilful damage, &c., and are not included under drunk or drunk and disorderly.

The total number of persons who were drunk when arrested by the police during the year was 3,615 against 2,968 in 1911, and 3,758 in 1910. (See Table X.)

Licences opposed by the Police.—Sixty applications for new, renewal, and transfer licences were opposed by the Police at Licensing Sessions. Forty were granted, and twenty refused. (See Table XIII.)

Previous Convictions for Drunkenness.—113 persons were convicted of drunkenness three and less than five times, 17 five and less than ten times during the year. Total 130, against 130 in 1911. (See Table XIV.)

Dogs.

14,680 dogs were licensed during the year; 2,259 stray dogs were seized by the Police, and conveyed to the "Dogs' Home." Of this number 1,901 were destroyed, 97 restored to owners, 242 sold, and 6 died.

The Police applied for summonses against 1,639 persons for keeping unlicensed dogs, and of 2,322 persons who were prosecuted for having unlicensed, stray, or unmuzzled dogs, 441 were discharged, 1,773 were fined under 5s. each, and 108 in sums varying from 5s. to £1. In addition there were 40 prosecutions against persons for not supplying collars for their dogs under the Dublin County Council Regulations under the Dogs' Act, 1906, of these 10 were dismissed and 30 were convicted and fined. (See Table XV.)

Persons under Police Supervision.

Seventy-nine persons were under Police observation in Dublin during the year. Of this number 6 left for other districts in Ireland, 6 absconded, 15 were sent to Prison, 7 left Ireland, and in 3 cases the Supervision was remitted by His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant. (See Table XVI.)

Thieves and Persons of known Bad Character.

The number of thieves and persons of known bad character at large within the Police District in the month of April, 1912, was 71 against 61 in 1911, being an increase of 10 as compared with the latter year. (See Table XVIII.)

Stolen Property recovered.

The average actual daily loss sustained by the public from theft, &c., is set down at £11 11s. 3d., against £11 18s. 3d. in 1911, and £11 3s. 3d. in 1910. The gross loss was £6,395, against £6,477 in 1911, and £6,404 in 1910.

33·8 per cent. of property stolen has been recovered by the Police in 1912, against 32·9 per cent. in 1911, and 36·4 per cent. in 1910. (See Table XIX.)

Since the year 1902 the number of Cabs has decreased from 667 to 621—6·8 per cent. The number of Outside Cars has decreased from 1,032 to 735—28·77 per cent., within the same period.

An inspection of all Hackney Vehicles was held in May, and the owners of vehicles observed to be unserviceable were required to have them properly repaired.

The proceedings taken by the Police to enforce the Dublin Carriage Regulations are shown in Tables XXI. and XXII. There is an increase of 234 in the number of summons cases, and an increase of 17 in the number of arrests, as compared with the year 1911.

The Licences of 10 outside cars and 15 cabs were temporarily suspended, and one driver was refused renewal of his Licence.

Property found in Hackney Vehicles.—There were 263 articles of property surrendered to the Police by drivers during the year, of which number 123 were claimed. The articles included 147 umbrellas and walking sticks, 2 gold watches, a diamond and opal ring, 2 gold rings, 2 gold brooches, 7 opera and field glasses, several coats, rugs, &c.

One sovereign and three half-sovereigns were received by drivers in mistake for silver coin. Sums amounting to £37 7s. 3½d. were found in vehicles and surrendered to the Police.

The effective strength on 31st December, 1912, was 1,171 of all ranks, and the number of removals from the Force through all causes during the year was 64.

Area and Boundary of the Police District.

The area of the Dublin Metropolitan Police District is about 36 square miles. The boundaries of the District and of each Police Division are stated at page 32.

Population of the Police District.

The population according to the Census of the year 1911 is 415,866.

GENERAL.

The gross expenditure on the Dublin Metropolitan Police Establishment (*i.e.*, Police and Police Courts), in the financial year ended 31st March, 1912, was Police, £163,296, and Police Courts, £9,846, total £173,142, of which the proportion paid out of moneys voted by Parliament was £116,870.

A Police Tax is established by 1 Vict., cap. 25, and 61 and 62 Vic., cap. 37, sec. 66, at 8*d.* in the £1, which yielded in that year £30,332 from the City and £15,806 from the County (*i.e.*, the full amount less 5 per cent. paid to the Corporation and to the County Council for the collection of the Tax, and also less the certified proportion of the former Collector-General's annuity).

These sums amount to about 17·5 per cent. and 9·1 per cent. respectively of the gross expenditure on the Establishment.

Other sums appropriated in aid of the cost of the Establishment (Police and Police Courts) in the same year amounted to £10,141, as follows:—

The ~~pay~~ of the Force, including Superintendents, Inspectors, Station Sergeants, Sergeants, and Constables was £102,631.

The mean rateable value of the Dublin Metropolitan Police Area for the year 1911-1912 was £1,482,993, of which £973,463 falls in the City and £509,530 in the County.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT on the HEALTH of the DUBLIN METROPOLITAN POLICE FORCE for the Year 1912.

During the Year 1912 there was almost total absence of zymotic disease—there being but one case of typhoid fever. There were numerous cases of influenza, tonsillitis, and bronchial affections, all of which were due to the continuous wet and chilly seasons prevailing.

The average per-centage of men sick and absent from duty was 2.5 as compared with 2.8 in the previous year.

There were but two deaths, one from septicæmia and one from diabetes, being a death rate of 1.7.

DIVISIONS AND BOUNDARIES OF THE DUBLIN METROPOLITAN POLICE DISTRICT.

The Dublin Metropolitan Police was established under the provisions of the Act 6 & 7 William IV., Chapter 29, 4th July, 1836.

Boundary.—The District was defined and extended under the provisions of the Acts 1 Vic., cap. 25, and 2 & 3 Vic., cap. 78, sec. 14, 63 & 64 Vic., cap. 264, sec. 61, and Order in Council dated 23rd October, 1901. It now comprises the City of Dublin, and part of the County of Dublin, bounded as follows :—*

From the Lighthouse on the North Wall of the River Liffey, by a direct line to the Lighthouse at the end of the South Wall; thence by low-water mark and the sea shore to a point two furlongs beyond the Southern Wall of Mount Malpas, Killiney, and from said point by a line running two furlongs distance from said Wall to the entrance gate of said Mount; thence by a line at the like distance to the left or outside of the Glenageary and Rochestown roads, leading to Kill-of-the-Grange; thence at like distance by the cross road of Dean's-grange and Stillorgan-road, to a point on the left bank of the River Dodder two furlongs southward of Donnybrook-bridge; thence by the left bank of that river to the junction of the baronies of Newcastle and Uppercross, near Cypress-grove, and by the boundary of those baronies to the third lock on the Grand Canal, near Golden-bridge; thence by a direct line, drawn through the fields from said lock to Chapelizod-bridge on the River Liffey, to a point 50 perches from said lock where said line intersects the boundary between the parishes of St. Jude and Ballyfermott, and by said boundary to where it intersects the G. S. & W. Railway at the carriage sheds; thence by a continuation of aforesaid direct line until it again intersects the boundary between said parishes, near Stone House; thence by said parish boundary until it abuts on St. Laurence-road, near Lynch's-lane; thence by aforesaid direct line to Chapelizod-bridge on the River Liffey, and by the left bank of the Liffey to the ferry at foot of Knockmaroon-hill; thence by the road over that hill to the Knockmaroon-gate of the Phoenix Park; thence by the Park wall to Ashtown Lodge, at the rear of the Under Secretary's house, and by the most direct road thence to Longford-bridge on the Royal Canal; thence by the most direct road to Tolka river, and by that river to Convent wall, opposite Glasnevin Cemetery, and by west side of said wall to Finglas-road, North, at Harburn Lodge, and by the left of said road, Naul-road (and Claremont to rear of Glasnevin House), to Glenavon House, thence along north side of fence across the fields to the boundary line between the townlands of Hampstead and Drishogue, and by said boundary line and wire fence between Hampstead and Albert Model Farm to a point about 200 yards from gate lodge entrance to Albert Model Farm, on Drumcondra-road; thence in a direct line to ash tree marking City boundary, on right of avenue leading to Hampstead, and across said avenue to and by the left of hedge to Whitehall; thence by the left to Drumcondra-road to a point opposite entrance to Broom-hill; thence by the right of Drumcondra-road to northern end of Charlotte-place; thence across field by said hedge to the cross fence; thence in a northerly direction by said fence to opposite Puckstown-road; thence across the fields to Puckstown-road, along said road for about fifty yards to stone pillars on said road; thence across fields by hedge on right to cross fence and said fence in an easterly direction to opposite Artane Lodge; thence by fence to the left to Puckstown-road, across said road and field to stream there; thence by the right of and along said stream to Donnycarney-bridge, Malahide-road, across said road, and along fields on right bank of said stream to within about 100 yards of Killester-lane; thence by right hand side of fence to the left to the stone pillars on Killester-lane, near gate lodge of Killester Abbey; thence along Killester-lane to Howth-road, along Howth-road to the three-mile stone; thence by Castle-avenue and Merville-avenue to "Woodville," Vernon-avenue; thence across fields and by hedge to back gate at St. Anne's, along hedge to right to gate lodge; thence across fields in St. Anne's to the Nannikin River, and by said river to Sea Wall, Dollymount Strand, along said sea wall to Annesley-bridge, and thence by sea line to the lighthouse at North Wall.

Division.—The Dublin Metropolitan Police District is divided into six divisions, viz. A B C D E F, each under the charge of a Superintendent. The number of Inspectors, Sergeants, and Constables in the Force varies according to the extent of the Divisions and other circumstances. Divisions are divided into Sub-divisions each containing a station-house. Sub-divisions are divided into Sections each under the charge of a Sergeant, and Sections are divided into beats which are patrolled by the Constables.

* NOTE.—If there be any discrepancy between the foregoing statement of the boundary and the description of it given in the Acts quoted above, the description shall prevail.

The A and B Divisions occupy the portion of the City south of the Liffey from the Estuary of the Dodder at Ringsend to the Chapelizod Bridge on the Liffey, thence in a direct line to Blackhorse Bridge on Grand Canal, and thence by the Grand Canal to the Grand Canal Basin, at the Estuary of the Dodder, Ringsend.

The A and B Divisions are separated by a line from Portobello Bridge, through Richmond-street, Camden-street, Wexford-street, Redmond's-hill, Peter's-row, Whitefriar-street, Great Ship-street, Castle Steps, Castle-street, and Fishamble-street to the Liffey.

The C and D Divisions occupy the portion of the District lying north of the Liffey between the Nannikin River, Dollymount, and the Ferry-boat Station on the Liffey at foot of Knockmaroon-hill. They are separated by a line from Grattan Bridge, through Capel-street, Bolton-street, Dorset-street, and Drumcondra-road, to Whitehall, Upper Drumcondra-road.

The E Division occupies the portion of the District south of the Grand Canal and the Liffey, between the Blackhorse Bridge on the Grand Canal and the Railway Gates at Merrion Strand. It embraces the Urban Districts of Rathmines and Pembroke.

The F Division occupies the portion of the District between the Railway Gates at Merrion, by the sea coast to a point two furlongs south of the southern wall of Mount Malpas, Killiney. It embraces the Urban Districts of Blackrock, Kingstown, Dalkey, and part of Killiney and Ballybrack.

Divisional boundaries in all cases run along the middle of the streets, &c., mentioned.
