

## ABOLITION

## DONNYBROOK FAIR

In consequence of the Abolition of Donnybrook Fair, the Commissioners of Police hereby give Notice that, in pursuance of the powers vested in them by the provisions of the Act of the 5<sup>th</sup> Vic., cap. 24 they will not permit any Hackney Carriage Stand in any of the Streets of Donnybrook, or in any place adjacent thereto.

No Crowd or assemblage of Persons or Hackney Carriages will be allowed to congregate or remain on the Green, or cause any obstruction of Public Thoroughfares, In or contiguous to the Village of Donnybrook.

From the 26th of August to the 2nd of September, 1860, inclusive all Vehicles going to places beyond Donnybrook and East of the River Dodder will go by the Rock Road and Ball's Bridge: all vehicles proceeding in the direction of Dublin from the same places will proceed by the Rock and Simmon's—court Roads. No Vehicle, during the days above stated, will be permitted to pass through Donnybrook, from any direction, after Eleven o'clock, A.M., or nearer to Donnybrook Village than Belmont Avenue on the West side, or Anglesea Bridge on the East side.

Any Owner or Drivers of Hackney Carriages plying as Stages between Dublin and Donnybrook, during the period above referred to, or are found plying for hire at places other than those legally appointed, will be Summoned by the Police, and will also be refused renewal of their Licences for the ensuing year.

The Law will be strictly enforced against all Public Houses that are not Cleared-out and Closed at the Legal Hour, Eleven o'clock, p.m.
