## 1. The Royal Irish Constabulary, 1822~1922

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The Royal Irish Constabulary (RIC) was founded by an act of the British Parliament in 1822. For organisational purposes, Galway was divided into two districts, East and West, commanded by two County Inspectors who reported to the RIC Commissioner in Dublin Castle. The religion of the ordinary ranks of the force tended to reflect that of the wider community; however, at senior level, the force was overwhelmingly non-Catholic throughout its history.

## 1. Constáblacht Ríoga na hÉireann, 1822~1922

Muintir an phobail i gcoitinne a bhí sna céimeanna ísle go hiondúil, ach ag leibhéal na sinsearachta, fíorbheagán Caitliceach a bhí ann ó thús deireadh an fhórsa.

Is dóigh go bhfuil an bheirt chomhaltaí de Chonstáblacht Ríoga na hÉireann i mbun maoirseacht a dhéanamh ar ghlanadh suas i ndiaidh aonach in Áth Eascrach, Co. na Gaillimhe. Le caoinchead Leabharlann Náisiúnta na hÉireann.

From its foundation, the force faced particular challenges in Galway due to the persistence of land hunger among the poor, who organised themselves in secret societies and resorted to cattle driving and violent disputes over land; as a result, County Galway had the highest concentration of police in the entire country.

The *Connacht Tribune* declared in an editorial in March 1915:

*The second main factor after drunkenness that leads to unrest in the County is the delay in the agrarian settlement of certain districts. Unfortunately, this leads to evils by no means directly connected with the land problem, for there is no disguising the fact that instances have occurred where reckless irresponsible men have made so-called agrarian emancipation the cloak*

Mediating in disputes over land would remain a challenge for the police for many decades. In 1914, the District Inspector for East Galway informed Dublin Castle that “land hunger is very keen around Athenry and the forces of disorder there are thoroughly organised and quite unscrupulous.”

*there is no disguising the fact that instances have occurred where reckless irresponsible men have made so-called agrarian emancipation the cloak for acts of outrage that bring disgrace and shame upon the whole community.*

## 2. Republican Policing During the Independence Struggle, 1918~21

---

The formation of the notorious Black and Tans during the Independence struggle resulted in a series of atrocities committed by this force across Galway, including the burning of Tuam on 19 July 1920 and the notorious murders of Fr Michael Griffin, the Loughnane brothers and Mrs Eileen Quinn later the same year. In March 1921, the RIC County Inspector for Galway West wrote: “The life of the police is scarcely bearable. They are shamed and boycotted and for the most part cannot get the necessities of life unless they commandeer them. The people generally are out for a republic and they propose to get it.”

The actions of the Black and Tans left the reputation of the RIC in tatters and an editorial in the *Tuam Herald* pleaded for a respite from police reprisals as “the country is bleeding to death, bleeding at every pore.” During the same month, Archbishop Gilmartin of Tuam wrote: “if the full tale of flogging, burning, terrorism and looting could be told, the whole picture would make even savages ashamed.”

While the RIC was boycotted by the community, the Irish Volunteers began performing the role of the police and republican courts were particularly effective in reconciling disputes over land. Volunteer John Feehan recalled:

*Wholesale sheep stealing was prevalent throughout Connemara at this time and the RIC were taking no action. We made a roundup of the Twelve Pins with a force of Volunteers and*

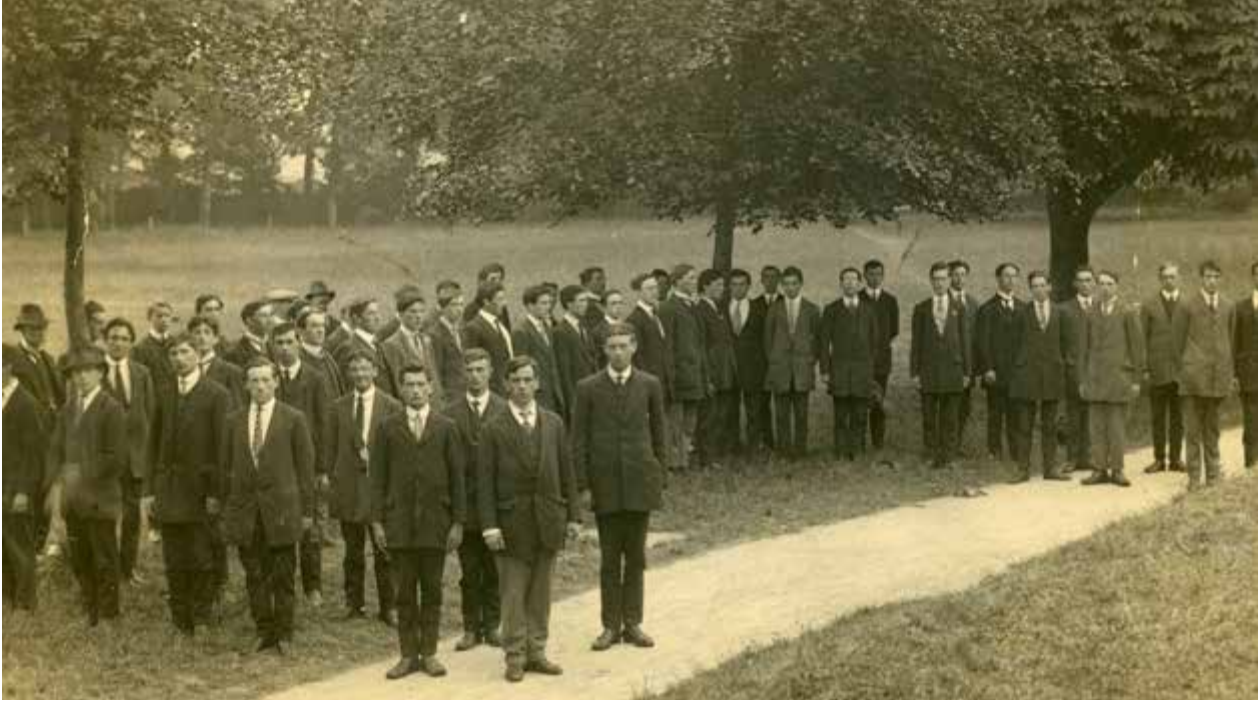

### 3. Foundation of the Civic Guard in Galway, 1922

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The establishment of the Free State led to the withdrawal of the RIC from barracks across the County in March 1922. Initially, policing was then the responsibility of the National Army. Officer Laurence Flynn recalled that, when he took command of the Loughrea RIC Barracks, the departing British officer declared: "Hurry up and get finished with this farce, we will be back again soon."

examination at Lenaboy Castle, Galway, in March 1922. An early set back occurred, however, when a section of republican forces took over the premises in the first week of April and seized all papers pertaining to police recruitment.

The first detachment of the Civic Guard in Galway was transferred from Dublin during the last week of September, 25 men being stationed in the County Club, Galway. A similar-sized force was established on the same day in Ballinasloe. On their arrival, the new commander stated to the papers:

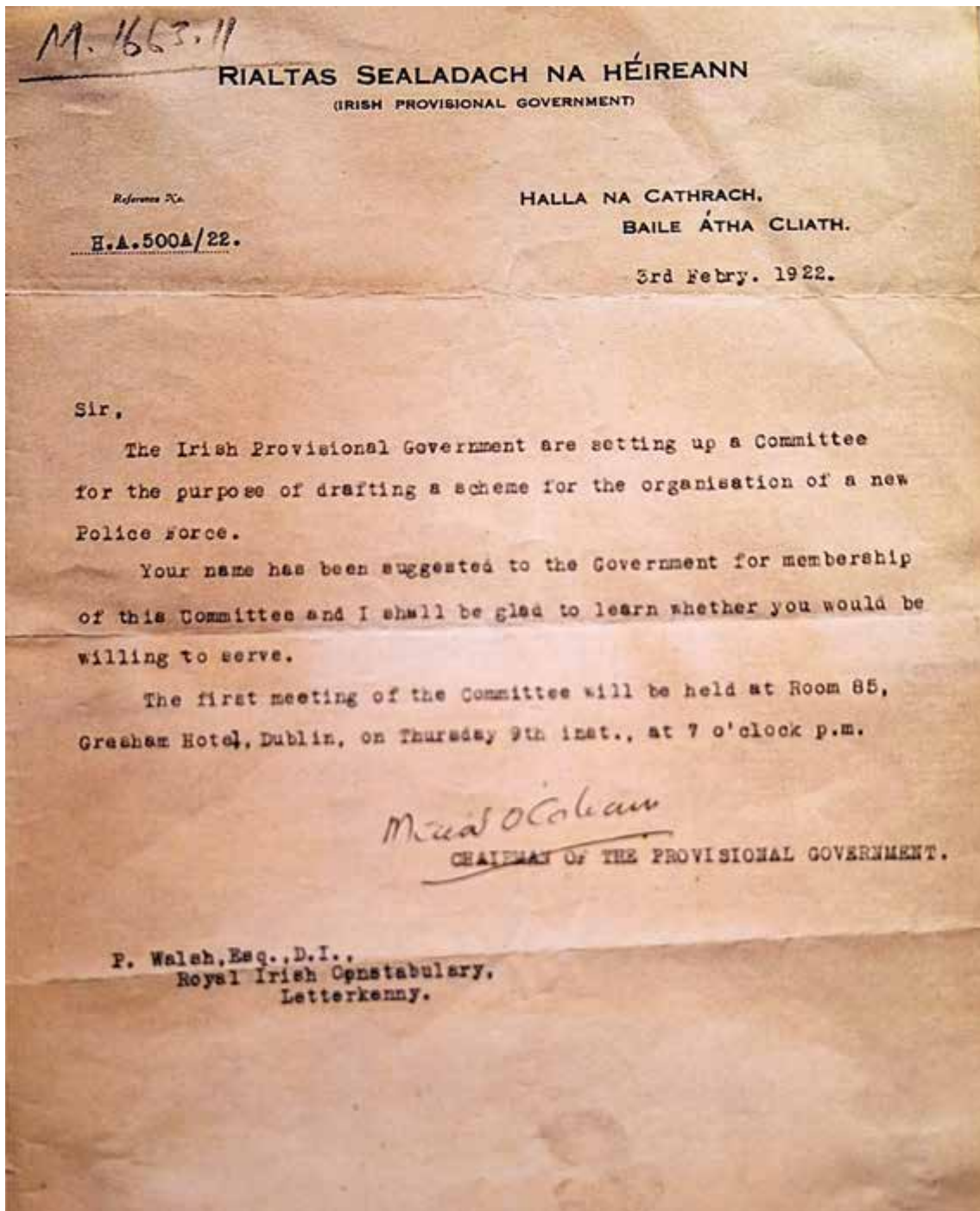

## 4. Christmas in Collinstown, 1922

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**Introduction:** This article first appeared in *Síochána* in 1972 and was written by Donal (Daniel) Colhoun who joined the Civic Guard in November 1922 with the Registration Number 2890. Donal was stationed in the Galway West Division and Connemara Gaeltacht during most of his service.

### Sergeant Donal Colhoun, 2890, Sergeant i/c, Carraroe Garda Station, Co. Galway

I visited Dublin Airport lately but, needless to say, I could not recognise the place. It has changed a lot since I first knew it in the Winter of 1922. It was then known as Collinstown Garda Depot. It consisted of a few wooden huts set in the middle of green fields. The huts have now been replaced by palatial buildings while the green fields have disappeared to give way to miles of runways for aircraft.

The Gardaí went into occupation of Collinstown on 4/11/1922. The National Army had been in occupation before then, having taken it over from the British who had been using it as an air base. The National Army remained on to guard the depot while the Gardaí were there.

Between 50 and 60 recruits were allotted to each hut. These huts were very cold, having bare cement floors with plenty of broken windows for ventilation. There were two small stoves in each hut and these provided little heat. There were neither shelves nor presses. The beds were of the usual hospital-type spring beds. Each mattress was in three parts known as 'biscuits'. If a person were restless in the bed, these 'biscuits' slipped down so that one awakened to find himself sitting on the bare spring of the bed.

Superintendent Clinton was Commandant in Collinstown, Inspector Jo Murray was Adjutant and Inspector James Carbery was Depot Inspector. The Commandant was transferred to Thurles as Divisional Officer a few days before Christmas. Prior to his departure he was made a presentation on behalf of all in the Depot. Two recruits from each of the five Companies were selected to make the presentation. I was one of the two from Number 5 Company. As an Irish teacher in Collinstown, I availed of the occasion to bid farewell in the Gaelic tongue. Superintendent Clinton was replaced by Superintendent Liam Stack, who was afterwards Commandant in McKee Barracks and Divisional Officer in Bray.

Mick Lyons, Number 2155, of Number 1 Company, was the senior recruit, while the junior member (whose name I cannot recall) was number 2959 of Number 5 Company. All the numbers between those two were not in Collinstown as some had been diverted to Kildare. I am glad to say that Mick Lyons is still hale and hearty in his native Ballinasloe [NB in 1972].

There was no proper place for drill purposes so that squad drill was carried out in the green fields. These were so wet and slippery in the winter months that it was impossible to drill properly or even keep in step. There were two large sheds called 'hangers' which had been used by the British as shelters for aircraft. They were used on wet days for drill purposes and Irish classes were also held in them. Police Duty classes were held daily in the huts.

Prior to Christmas all members were asked if they would agree to paying five shillings each so that turkey might be provided for Christmas Dinner. Needless to say, everyone eagerly agreed. They had cause to rue their decision. The turkeys were sent to a firm of caterers in Dublin to be cooked. It was little cooking they got as when they arrived on Christmas Day, they were barely singed. Some members picked little morsels while

Ba é Mick Lyons, Uimhir 2155, as Complacht a hAon, an t-earcach sinsearach, agus ba é uimhir 2959 (nach bhfuil cuimhne agam ar a ainm) i gComplacht a Cúig an t-earcach sóisearach. others left their shares untouched. It was a very disappointing Christmas Dinner.

After the so-called dinner, all members were free until 11p.m. In addition, they were given a general invitation to a concert being given in Marlborough Hall, Glasnevin by artistes from the Dublin Theatres to wounded members of the National Army who were convalescing.

Most members decided to view the sights of Dublin. Having done so, a few of us decided to go to the concert. On entering we got a bit of a surprise to see Inspector Carbery and Mr McGuire seated in the front row. The latter, who had been a County Inspector in the RIC was then employed in a civilian capacity as Police Duties Instructor. He was subsequently appointed a Chief Superintendent and transferred to Limerick

where he died after a few short years. The only item of that concert that I remember is of a young couple singing the duet “Molly Bawn and Brian Og.”

The Gardai had now attracted the attention of the daily newspapers as the following item from the *Irish Independent* of Thursday 28/12/1922 shows:

*Civic Guard Festivities. The Civic Guards at the Phoenix Park Depot celebrated Christmas with great enthusiasm. There are at present 750 men undergoing training at the Depot and there are 50 in the camp at Collinstown who will eventually be transferred to the Depot.*

On 27/12/1922, we were told to dismantle our beds and leave them at the Store for transport to Dublin. That night we slept without beds with our ‘biscuits’ laid out on-the floor. After breakfast on the morning of 28/12/1922, we got ready to march to Dublin. Led by Inspectors Murray and Carbery and preceded by two pipers from the Garda Band we set off at a quick pace with Number 5 Company leading the parade.

Just before reaching the tramway lines at Drumcondra a halt was called and we were given a ten-minute rest. On resuming we marched through Dorset Street, Berkley Road and North Circular Road and then to the swirl of the pipes playing “Brian Boru’s March” we entered our new Depot. Here we were given a Céad Míle Fáilte.

The members of the Guard Room turned out and presented arms and the entire garrison lined up on the square and rendered signal honours. The first thing the Garda authorities did was to change the name of the Depot from Marlborough Barracks to that of McKee Barracks, in memory of Dick McKee, Commandant of the Dublin Brigade who had been shot by the British in Dublin Castle in 1920.

Ceapadh ina Ard-Cheannfort ina dhiaidh sin é agus fuair sé bás cúpla bliain tar éis aistriú go Luimneach. Taobh amuigh de lánúin óg a chan “Molly Bawn and Brian Óg”, ní cuimhin liom aon chuid eile de cheolchoirm na hoíche sin.

Bhí aird na bpáipéar nuachta ag teacht ar na Gardai faoin tráth seo mar is léir ón sliocht seo a leanas a bhí ar an *Irish Independent* Déardaoin an 28 Nollaig 1922:

*Civic Guard Festivities. The Civic Guards at the Phoenix Park Depot celebrated Christmas with great enthusiasm. There are at present 750 men undergoing training at the Depot and there are 50 in the camp at Collinstown who will eventually be transferred to the Depot.*

An 27 Nollaig 1922 a dúradh linne na leapacha a bhaint ó chéile agus iad a fhágáil ag an Stór go dtabharfaí go Baile Átha Cliath iad. We found McKee Barracks a pleasant place after Collinstown. Its wooden dormitories were in happy contrast to the cement floors of Collinstown, while its tree-lined tarmacadam's square soon re-echoed to the sound of marching men. There was much importance attached to Registered Numbers in those early days. Once you knew a man's Number you could make a good guess as to when he joined the Force.

Pride of place in this respect, in McKee, went to Dan Doolin, Number 4 and next to him came Tommy Watson, Number 13. I was glad to see that low numbers had Galway connections too. Sergeant Clarke, Number 3, was a Divisional Clerk in Eglinton Street, Galway, while Tommy Savage, Number 6, was a native of Galway City.

Most [now, in 2026, all] of those who served in Collinstown have since gone to their eternal reward. May they rest in peace. They laid a tradition for future generations.

## 5. An Garda Síochána 1920s~1930s

The Garda Síochána Establishment Scheme, 1930, provided for a “reduction in the Force” and shedding some of the responsibilities An Garda Síochána had heretofore. However, this did not affect the number of Garda Divisions (22) and Galway East Riding and Galway West Riding remained two separate Divisions. Within Galway East Riding, only two Stations were to be temporarily (Kilreeckle) or potentially (Laurencetown) closed, whereas in Galway West Riding four Stations were closed (Kilkieran, Cleggan, Clonbur and Ballinahinch). Nationwide, the number of Station closures was 404 (33%). This resulted in a nationwide reduction of the strength of the Force of 2,216 (roughly 30%); in Galway East Riding the reduction amounted to 297 (63%) and in Galway West Riding 238 (56%), the most numerous reductions in the country, due to the turbulent past in those areas when the RIC presence was most numerous there. Furthermore, some Sub-District Stations were replaced by

The East Riding Division of Galway had its Divisional Headquarters, with a Chief Superintendent, in Ballinasloe and was divided into four Districts, each with its own District Headquarter and a Superintendent, in Ballinasloe, Loughrea, Athenry and Gort. The numbers of Sub-Districts, with a Garda Station each, within the four Districts were Ballinasloe 9, Loughrea 7, Athenry 8 and Gort 7.

The West Riding Division of Galway had its Divisional Headquarters, with a Chief Superintendent, in Galway and was also divided into four Districts, each with its own District Headquarter and a Superintendent, in Galway, Tuam, Clifden and Oughterard. The numbers of

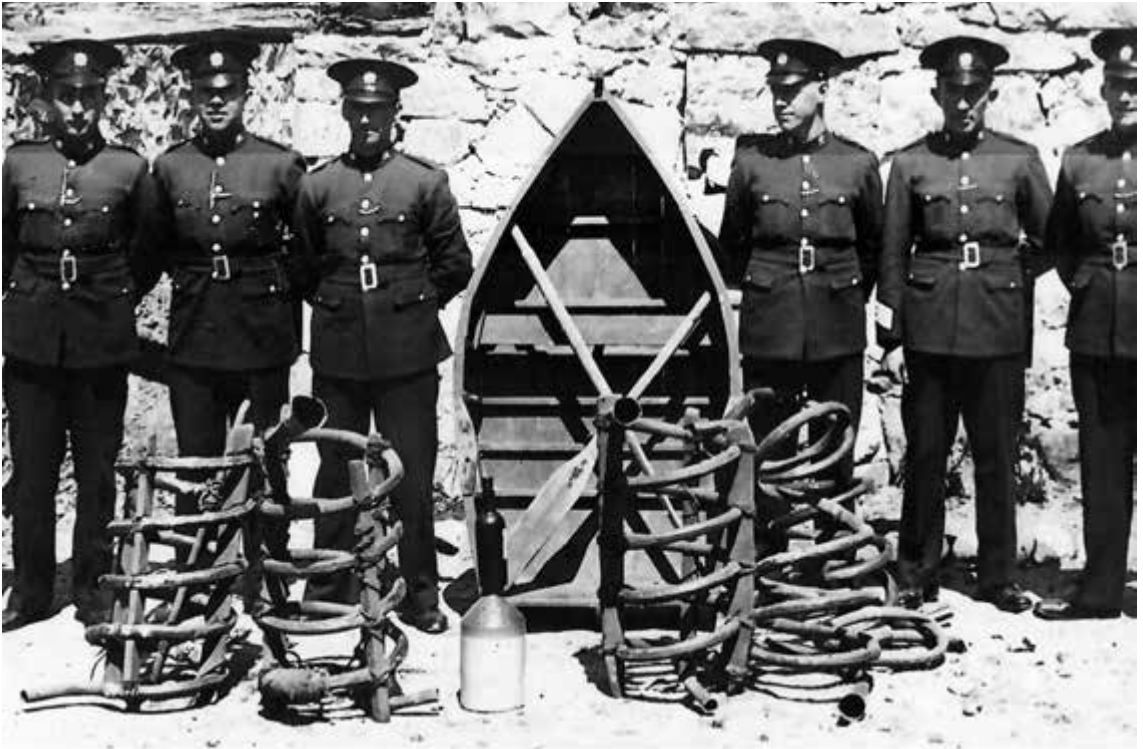

# An Garda Síochána

Copy of Inspection minute of Deputy Commissioner E. Coogan at Corofin Garda Station on 11th May, 1923.

Visited Station in conjunction with Divisional tour. Sergeant M. Lennon, 201, and station party present. When I arrived at the station the Sergeant sat glowering at me and refused to call the party to attention.

I called the party to attention myself, and Garda O'Neill tried to rise but fell into the fireplace. I asked the Sergeant to account for the state of affairs existing at the station and he replied in such a manner as would do more justice to the worst corner-boy in the slums of London.

I searched the Barracks and found that a seizure of poteen (3 gallons) made on the previous day had now been almost consumed by the station party. The Barrack Servant sat with a baton in her hand, protecting the remainder of it, and refused to move. She also had possession of the Station Books and records and she refused to allow me to examine them. In my examination of the Barracks I found that the W.C. was filled with Station Records, apparently used by the Station Party on their visits there.

I heard noise coming from the cell and when I went to investigate, I found three young ladies there, from whom I took statements. They complained that when passing the Barracks they were forcibly taken in by Sergeant Lennon and Gardai Bourke and O'Toole for a purpose better imagined than described.

In the Station kitchen I found Garda Bourke, he caught me by the uniform and would not let go of me until I promised to refund him a fine of £5 imposed on him recently and have record of same erased. When I returned to the front of the Barracks I found the Sergeant urinating from the front door on to the Street and he started to argue with me on the footpath with his person exposed.

On leaving the Station I was approached by a local trader who demanded that I made the Station Party pay some of their mess debts for the preceding 12 months, now amounting to some £70.

~~The whole situation at this station is disgraceful.~~  
I hereby suspend all members of the Station Party.  
Further instructions will issue to-day from the District Office when I return there.

I hope that the Divisional Officer will ensure that these men discharge their local debts before they themselves are discharged from the Force.

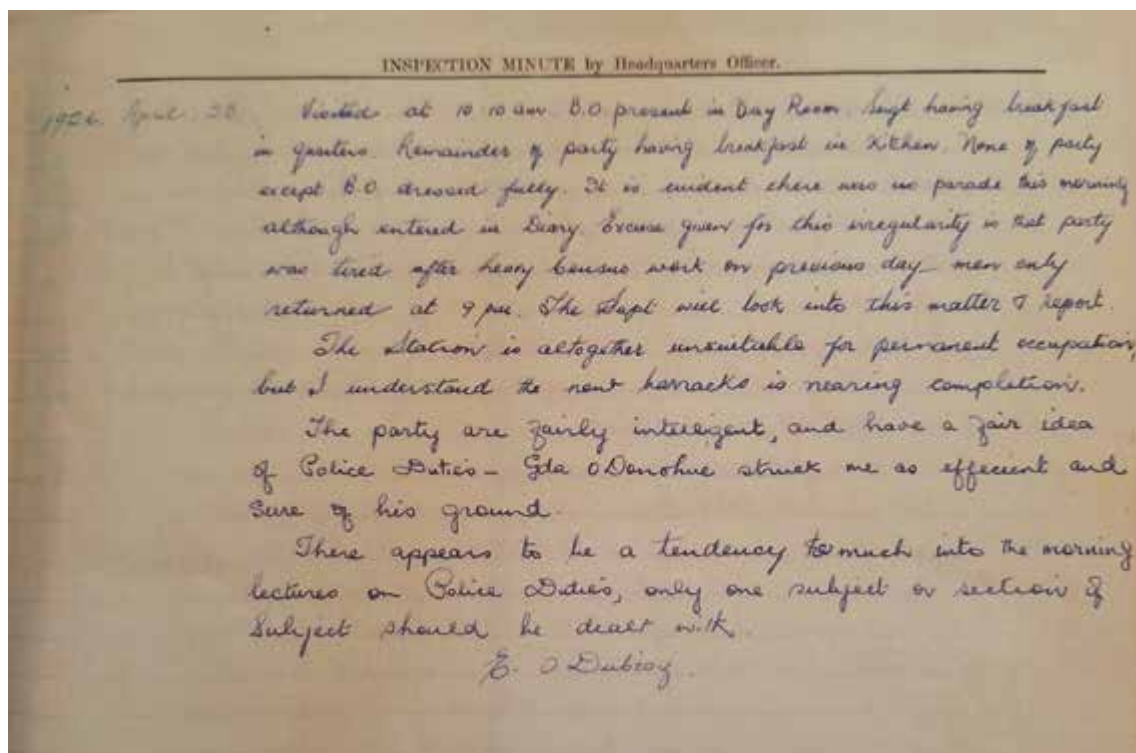

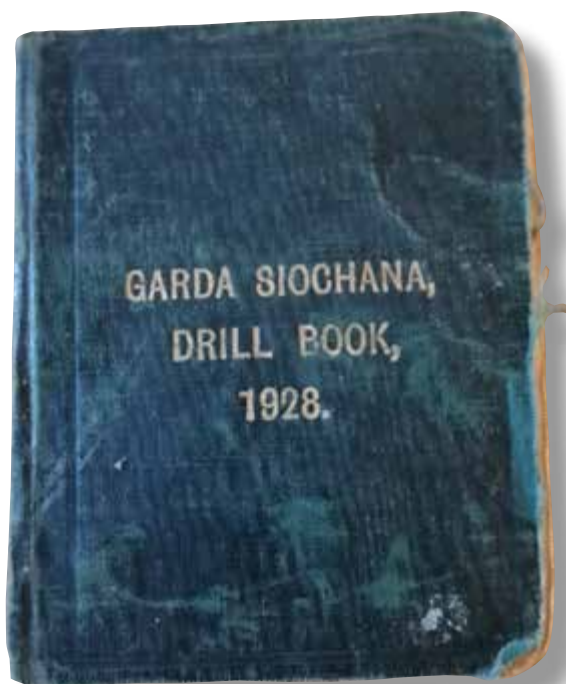

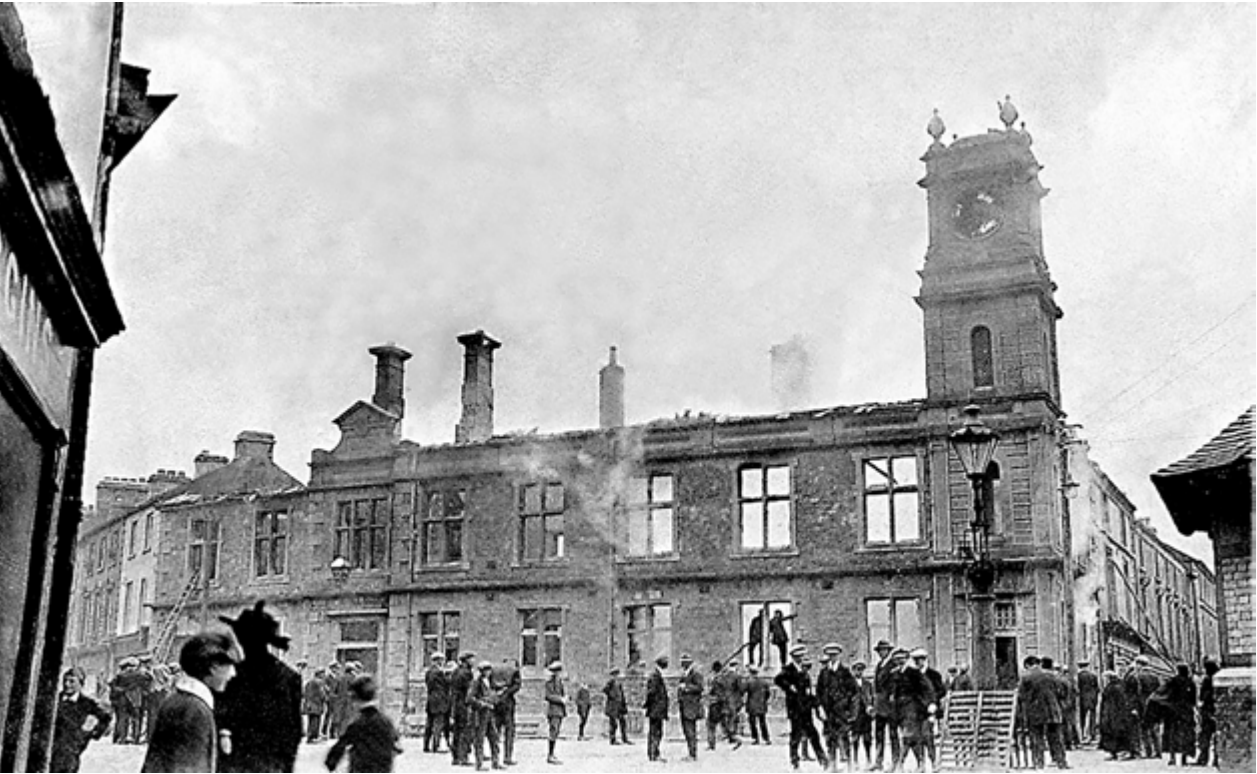

## 6. Tuam Civic Guards

The first contingent of Civic Guards arrived in Tuam on 27 October 1922, with their beds and belongings on the back of John Hession's lorry. Rail service had just resumed following months of disruption on the line due to the mining of bridges by anti-Treaty forces who were active in the north-Galway area. The train could travel no further than Athenry due to a deliberate derailment of an engine at Ballyglunin station

between Athenry and Tuam. Their arrival in the town was welcomed as a sign of a return to law and order. In charge was Sergeant Hugh Ruddy, a man who had previously served in the town as an RIC constable but who had resigned from the force immediately after the 'Sack of Tuam' in July 1920.

Tuam had been left isolated due to the blocking of main roads with felled trees and the destruction of every bridge leading into the town. Warnings were issued to local people not to assist in any repair work. The closure of the railway line between Athenry and Sligo resulted in three hundred men being laid off with severe disruption to business and farming. No sooner was a bridge repaired by the council, than it was mined again. A lull of a few weeks had convinced people attacks might cease, but a week after the arrival of the Civic Guards, recently repaired bridges were destroyed. Railway service was again halted between Tuam and Athenry in November when the metal bridge at Ballinderry was blown up.

During September, anti-Treaty Irregulars had arrived into the town on lightening raids, pedestrians were stopped and searched on the street while shops were raided for cash and goods. During these incursions, gunbattles broke out on Dublin Road at the Workhouse where the national troops were based. The Archbishop of Tuam, Dr Gilmartin, appealed to the Irregulars at a Confirmation service in the parish of Islandeady to desist from armed opposition. He went on to say that the Government had received a clear mandate from the people to function within the terms of the Treaty and it was the duty of the Government to protect life and property and maintain order and it was the duty of the people to support the Government.

The newly arrived and unarmed Civic Guards were directed not to confront the Irregulars. Their first duty was to make the old police barracks in Vicar Street habitable. Every window had been broken and most of the fittings had either been

Bhí Tuaim fágtha gan cheangal le háiteanna eile mar gheall ar bhóithre móra a bhlocáil le crainn agus gach droichead isteach chuig an mbaile mór a scrios. Bhí rudaí ciúin ar feadh roinnt seachtainí agus misneach ag daoine go bhféadfadh deireadh leis an ionsaí, ach seachtain tar éis don Gharda Sibhialta a theacht, scriosadh na droichid a raibh caoi curtha orthu le tamall anuas. Cuireadh stop leis an tseirbhís traenach idir Tuaim agus Baile Átha an Rí arís i mí na Samhna nuair a séideadh an droichead miotail i mBaile an Doire in aer. I rith mhí Meán Fómhair, tháinig dreamanna de na fórsaí Sealadacha isteach ar an mbaile mór ag déanamh ruathair, ag stopadh coisithe ar na sráideanna agus á gcuardach, agus ag tabhairt ruathair faoi shiopaí gur thóg airgead agus earraí. Le linn ionsaithe den chineál sin, thosaigh troid le gunnaí ar Bhóthar Bhaile Átha Cliath ag Teach na mBocht, mar a raibh na Trúpaí Náisiúnta lonnaithe. D'impigh an Dr. Mac Giolla Máirtín, Ardeaspag Thuama, ar na fórsaí Sealadacha ag searmanas Dul faoi Láimh Easpag i bparóiste Oileán Éadaí éirí as an trodaíocht faoi airm. Dúirt sé gurbh léir go raibh údarás ag an Rialtas ó mhuintir na hÉireann feidhmiú

destroyed or burnt as firewood. Dr Gilmartin had persuaded the anti-Treaty IRA not to blow up the building before they evacuated it a few months earlier.

Tuam was not the worst town in Ireland as regards lawlessness according to a report in *The Tuam Herald*, but the writer claimed there were certain elements in the town who would benefit from the restraining influence of the policeman.

The Guards in Tuam barracks did not suffer the same level of aggression that was meted out in other areas of the county. Ahascragh Guards had a narrow escape when the barracks was petrol bombed and burned in January 1923. The Sergeant in Killimor Barracks, east Galway, was injured when over two hundred shots were fired at the building in November that year. A second attack in February 1924 saw it burned to the ground. In Claregalway, three Guards and the Sergeant were stripped and had their uniforms burned.

## Sergeant Ruddy

Sergeant Ruddy's presence in Tuam may have been a factor why Tuam was not targeted. Hugh Ruddy was born in the small townland of Askilaun outside Foxford, Co. Mayo; he had joined the RIC in 1910, aged twenty-one and served as a Constable in Kildysart, Newcastlewest and Ennis before arriving in Tuam in November 1918, accompanied by his wife Jane and their eleven-month-old daughter. The Ruddy family settled into their home on Bishop Street and Constable Ruddy continued with his duties until the evening of 19 July 1920, when RIC Constables

James Burke and Patrick Carey were killed in an ambush on the Tuam to Dunmore Road. That night, Tuam was terrorised as armed policemen embarked on a fearsome rampage in reprisal, shooting indiscriminately on the street, dragging young men from their beds and threatening to shoot them. The Town Hall was set on fire and local businesses smashed up and looted. Alarmed and shocked by this behaviour, Constable Ruddy declined to be a party to the wrecking of the town. He left the barracks, cycling home a circuitous route to avoid the violence and resigned immediately from the force.

On 7 September 1920, Chairman of Tuam Town Commissioners, Michael Maguire said he had

pleasure in proposing Mr Ruddy's appointment as Collector of Tolls and Customs. He cited his courage in giving up a lucrative position and his unwillingness to participate in the wanton destruction and terror visited on the local population. Two weeks later, Hugh Ruddy was taken at midnight from his home by a group of five armed men in trench coats and peaked caps; his frightened wife followed them onto the street, pleading with the men not to kill her husband, but she was ordered back into the house. Hugh Ruddy and another man, Tommy Owens, head porter at the railway station, suffered a terrible beating in a sandpit on the Athenry Road and were then told to make their own way back to town. Ruddy was told to re-join the RIC but, because he did not comply, he was visited a second time by Auxiliaries and warned to leave town as he was an insult to the police force and was in receipt of Sinn Féin money from the Town Council which was described as a Sinn Féin body.

The Ruddy home on Bishop Street was burnt down and the Archbishop of Tuam gave the family shelter. Fearful for his family's safety, the Ruddys returned to Foxford and, in January 1921, emigrated to Pittsburgh where other Mayo relatives lived. Although Hugh was happy in Pittsburgh and had applied for his citizenship, his wife Jane never fully settled; she wanted her third child to be born in Ireland so the family returned home and with the help of the Revd Con Cunningham, Tuam, Hugh joined the recently formed Civic Guards in May 1922.

He was promoted to Sergeant in October, shortly before arriving in Tuam and spent eleven years in the town where he was held in high regard and well liked. One notable incident in his career was when he rescued a swimmer in difficulty at Salthill in August 1931; he was alerted by his daughter Mabel to the cries for help. Seeing that the swimmer (later identified as a Miss Finn from Dublin), was being carried out to sea, he dived in fully clothed and brought her safely ashore.

Tháinig siad ar ais dá bhrí sin agus, le cúnadh ón Athair Con Ó Cuinneagáin i dTuaim, chuaigh Aodh isteach sna Gardaí Sibhialta i mí Bealtaine 1922.

Fuair sé ardú céime ionas go ndearnadh Sáirsint de gairid sular tháinig go Tuaim agus chaith sé aon bhliain déag ina dhiaidh sin ar an mbaile mar a raibh meas agus dea-chlú air. Eachtra shuntasach amháin a tharla i rith an ama sin an lá ar thug sé bean a bhí i mbaol a báite slán as an bhfarraige i mBóthar na Trá i mí Lúnasa 1931. At a farewell presentation in Tuam prior to his transfer to Howth Station in July 1933, he was commended for discharging his duties in a very tactful manner, especially towards those whose circumstances were disadvantaged.

Sergeant Ruddy's final posting was in Athy Station from where he retired on February 28th, 1945. He lived the remainder of his life in Clontarf and died in March 1971, followed a few months later by his beloved wife Jane.

## 7. Garda Frank O'Rourke Reg. No: 1756

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October 1922 was a significant in the history of Tuam – the arrival of the first detachment of the Civic Guard to occupy the police station in the town. This was just seven months after the RIC had handed over their policing duties to the authorities of the new Irish state.

Frank O'Rourke was an early member of the Civic Guard who had joined the ranks on 22 August 1922. The late Michael Shannon, Tuam, also joined on that day. Frank remembered clearly: "His registration number was 1753, three Guards senior to me", Frank's registration number being 1756.

Born in Ballinaboy, County Leitrim, on 2 December 1899, Frank lived his first four weeks in the 19<sup>th</sup> century. After training in Dublin Castle,

his first posting was to the old police barracks in Vicar Street, Tuam, with nine Guards and two Sergeants.

We did not know where we were going and we had no place to stay. The building had only outer doors. All the inner doors had been used for firewood by the IRA who were preparing to blow up the place. Lofts and joists on each floor of the three-storey building had been pulled down to make the explosion more effective when the Archbishop of Tuam, Dr Gilmartin, intervened and persuaded them not to do it.

*Each man carried his own bed and box of private belongings and we came by train to Athenry. There we were then, standing in the rain at the railway station, waiting for a way to get out. The military were across the road in the Railway Hotel, commandeering stuff. But with us, in charge, was a senior Sergeant, Hugh Ruddy, an ex-member of the RIC who had been stationed in Tuam and had recently returned from America to join the Civic Guard. Transport for us and our belongings was found because of him.*

On the way, two train engines had been deliberately derailed by the IRA at Ballyglunin Station. There were no lights in the town when we pulled up at the barracks.

The barracks in Tuam was covered in layers of mortar and rubble where the joists had been knocked down. We had no place and did not know at first where we were going to sleep, but eventually we took our beds again and slept in the courthouse. One man even put his bed in the witness box.

This continued for about a week. During the day we worked at clearing up the mess in the barracks and then moved our beds back in. We lived there for three years. It was repaired some three years later in 1925 by Jim Stockwell, building contractor.

In the meantime, on 8 August 1923, the Civic Guard had been renamed An Garda Síochána na hÉireann (Guardians of the Peace of Ireland).

*Bhí ábhar leapa agus bosca dá chuid giúirléidí príobháideacha ar iompar ag gach fear ag teacht ar an traein as Baile Átha an Rí. B'iúd ansin muid, seasta sa bháisteach ag stáisiún na traenach, ag fanacht go mbeadh bealach amach againn. Bhí an t-arm trasna an bhóthair in óstán an Railway Hotel, i mbun forghabhála. Ach bhí Sáirsint sinsearach i gceannas orainne, Aodh Ó Rodaigh, a bhíodh san RIC i dTuaim agus a bhí tar éis filleadh as Meiriceá le dul sa Gharda Sibhialta. Mar gheall airsean a fuarthas deis iompair dúinne agus dá raibh linn againn.*

Frank spent five years in Tuam and he used to do the 'nine Fridays'. He was...

*Coming back from confession one Thursday when the whole place was held up by strange men wearing white bands. The IRA were attacking the Free State Army who were holed up in the workhouse. I continued along though there was danger of crossfire. They questioned me but let me go.*

Frank was transferred to Kilconly where he spent the next four years and then to Corrandulla.

According to Frank, illegal fishing in the Clare River and poteen making were commonplace.

*Corrandulla and indeed all that Corrib country was swimming in poteen then. We once found five gallons of it in Headford.*

His next position was in Oranmore and while stationed there, he returned to Tuam to find his bride. He married Annie Fahy of High Street (daughter of Simon Fahy) at Tuam Cathedral.

Athenry was his last posting; he arrived in February 1935 and spent the next 27 years working there. He retired on his birthday, on 2 December 1962, having spent a total of 40 years and four months in the force.

Frank said that the Civic Guard and An Garda Síochána gave him a good life and still did. Frank was a talented violinist, used to play at feiseanna and dances in Tuam's Town Hall.

*I remember my first holiday. It was April 8th 1923. It was only an odd Guard then who would go home on holiday. Because they might be beaten up by the IRA, you see, but I did. I cycled from Tuam to Ballinaboy in Leitrim. Cycling was easy enough if the wind was not against you. But if it was, so it was tough. Coming back some days later there wasn't a breeze but it rained all the way. I was so wet I could hardly get off the bike in case I tore my clothes. There*

Aistríodh Frank go Cill Chonla, áit ar chaith sé ceithre bliana, agus ansin arís go Cor an Dola.

De réir thuairisc Frank, bhíodh iascach mídhleathach ar Abhainn an Chláir coitianta ag an am, mar a bhíodh déanamh an phoitín.

*Bhí Cor an Dola, agus go deimhin ceantar Loch Coirib uilig báite le poitín an t-am sin. Bhí uair amháin ar gabhadh cúig ghalún poitín in Áth Cinn.*

Frank was one of the last surviving members of the Civic Guard.

## 8. Garda Reserve

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### Galway Division

The Garda Reserve rank became part of An Garda Síochána in 2006. This rank consists of part-time members of the force who work on certain restricted patrol duties in support of the regular members of An Garda Síochána.

Contrary to popular belief, the Garda Reserve was not the first instance of part-time/temporary members of An Garda Síochána being utilised. After the start of World War II in 1939, the Irish Government recruited 300 men to a temporary police force called ‘Taca’, the Irish word for prop or support. Although these members were paid, service was on a temporary basis and was non-pensionable. Initially, 233 members were

attested to the Taca Síochána in 1939 and trained at the Garda Depot in the Phoenix Park. The usual entry requirements in relation to height, marital status and age were rigorously applied. A large proportion of the Taca recruits came from the western side of the country and there was a greater variety as regards former employment. These men were mainly in their early 20s and, on the whole, better educated than their predecessors in the force. After training, all were sent in uniform to Stations in Dublin. While they were considered to be a temporary force, they performed the same duties as the permanent members but with less favourable conditions of service. In 1942, the Taca Síochána members who remained were fully absorbed into the Garda Síochána proper on a pensionable basis.

On 30 September 2006, 40 members of the Garda Reserve commenced training. They were later assigned to pilot areas in the country and were on probation for five years. Most of their training was to be delivered on the job.

At present (in 2026), members of the Garda Reserve will serve a two-year probationary period and will be assessed annually. They are required to work a minimum of 208 hours per annum and possess limited Garda powers under the Public Order and Road Traffic Acts. They are utilised in support of full-time members across a range of duties, events and emergencies. They do not patrol on their own and must be accompanied by a full-time member of the force. They cannot drive Garda vehicles, operate in plain clothes or carry firearms but are subject to the same standards of discipline and procedures as those that apply to the full-time members.

Garda Reserves are currently attached to all the District Headquarters in the Galway Division.

Cé gur breathnaíodh orthu mar fhórsa sealadach, chomhlíon siad na dualgais chéanna agus a chomhlíon na comhaltaí buana seachas nach raibh na coinníollacha seirbhíse chomh maith céanna. Sa bhliain 1942, tógadh isteach ina n-iomláine na comhaltaí den Taca Síochána a bhí fanta sa nGarda Síochána ceart ar bhonn inphinsin.

Ar an 30 Meán Fómhair, 2006, chuir 40 comhalta de Chúltaca an Gharda Síochána tús lena gcuid oiliúna. Cuireadh chuig ceantair phiolótacha timpeall na tíre iad ina dhiaidh sin agus bhí siad ar promhadh feadh 5 bliana. Oiliúint agus iad i mbun a gcuid oibre a bheadh i gceist le formhór na foghlama.

Faoi láthair, sa bhliain 2022, fónfaidh comhaltaí de Chúltaca an Gharda Síochána tréimhse phromhaidh dhá bhliain agus déanfar iad a mheas gach bliain. Éilítear orthu 208 uair an chloig sa bhliain a oibriú ar a laghad agus tá cumhachtaí teoranta Gardaí acu faoi na hAchtanna Oird Phoiblí agus na hAchtanna um Thrácht ar Bhóithre. Téitear i muinín comhaltaí Chúltaca an Gharda Síochána chun tacú le comhaltaí lánaimseartha maidir le réimse dualgas, ócáidí agus cásanna éigeandála. Ní théann siad amach ar patról leo féin agus ní mór comhalta lánaimseartha den fhórsa a bheith in éineacht leo. ## 9. Women in An Garda Síochána, Galway

Internationally, the New York Police Department (NYPD) utilised females within its organisation since the 1890s. Irish records show that in 1917, the Dublin Metropolitan Police (DMP) employed four women to patrol the streets between 7 pm and midnight. Each morning, they had to report on the “moral state of the streets” but, despite their duties, they were not members of the DMP. Following the establishment of the Irish Free State in 1922, these four female Police Assistants remained in place. However, they were not replaced on retirement and, by 1955, only one female Police Assistant (Elizabeth Watters, 73 years of age) remained in Dublin, although in the following year a further four female Police Assistants were appointed.

# An Garda Síochána

Since 1923, women had been recruited to the Police forces in the UK and they had full powers. In Ireland, however, this did not happen until February 1958, when Commissioner Daniel Costigan approved the appointment of 12 women to join An Garda Síochána; they became the first female members of AGS in 1959.

Extensive lobbying by various organisations had taken place from the 1930s, including campaigns of the Joint Committee of Women's Societies and Social Workers, for women to be accepted into An Garda Síochána. This committee lobbied the Garda Commissioner, the Minister for Justice and the Taoiseach for a number of years without success.

In 1948, Senior Management in An Garda Síochána recognised that female members were needed and the Deputy Commissioner at that time sought the appointment of five women to the force. By 1952, there having been no advance in the matter, the Minister for Justice was asked by an Assistant Commissioner to urgently appoint six female members to Dublin City.

In the early 1950s, a Committee of Inquiry was set up to examine and improve the workings of the Garda organisation and it was at this time that the issue of female members being accepted into the organisation was given proper consideration.

The issue was debated in the Dáil at the time and certain TDs made some unusual comments such as “the commanding personalities of the women of the west and north-west should form the nucleus of this force.” Another TD suggested that “female Gardaí should not be too good looking, that they should be plain women and not targets for marriage.” Naive comments of this nature could, to some extent, be attributed to the Civil Service Marriage Bar still being in force until 1973.

Finally, in 1958, the Department of Justice authorised Commissioner Costigan to initiate the recruitment of 400 Gardaí for the following year (1959), 12 of whom were to be female.

This resulted in 178 female applicants, 41 of them being interviewed and, in 1959, the first 12 female members (Ban Gardai) of An Garda Síochána, among an intake of 400 that year, beginning training. Female applicants had to be 20 years of age when applying despite the fact that their male counterparts only had to be 18. The process to recruit female members into the force had taken over 20 years from the inception of the initiative and 37 years from the foundation of the force itself.

Following Commissioner Costigan's consultation with the UK Home Office, Sergeant Doreen Prissick of the Liverpool City Police Force was the female instructor specifically seconded to Garda Headquarters for four months to train the newly recruited female members.

# An Garda Síochána

As with all women working in the Public Service, the new female members received less pay than their male counterparts and their role was initially seen as dealing with children and young girls who came to the attention of the force. They could not work after 1 am, were not issued with batons and had to retire after 25 years of service. Unfortunately, the careers of many of these first female members of An Garda Síochána were ended by the infamous Civil Service Marriage Bar of the time.

Of the first twelve Ban Gardaí, Margaret (Peig) Tierney was a native of Bridge Street, Oughterard, Co. Galway. The *Connacht Tribune* of 18 July 1959 recorded her appointment under the heading “Among First Lady Gardaí”, mentioning that a presentation was made to her by the Oughterard Pioneer Council. On appointment, she was given the Registered Number 9W; she later recalled that they had been known affectionately as the “12 Apostles” and that they had been provided with boiler-suits at the beginning of their training as their uniforms had not yet been available.

Following training at the Phoenix Park Depot, Peig’s First Station was Pearse Street, Dublin, where she served from 1960 to 1962. At Pearse Street, she was one of the first Ban Gardaí to be promoted to the rank of Sergeant. She was subsequently transferred to Edward Street, Limerick, becoming one of the first Ban Gardaí to work outside Dublin. While stationed in Limerick, Peig met her future husband, Sergeant Michael Brown and, due to the ‘marriage ban’, a very promising career was cut short (as was the case for all female members who were forced to choose between marriage and a career in An Garda Síochána). Having chosen marriage, Peig had to retire on 31 August 1965 and married Michael the next day. Sergeant Margaret ‘Peig’ Browne (nee Tierney), Registered Number 9W, died in November 2016.

Of the first 12 Ban Gardaí, six were, on completion of their training, sent to Store Street Garda Station and six to Pearse Street Garda Station. They were not allowed to reside in the Stations, unlike their male counterparts at the time.

After the first intake of females in 1959, subsequent appointments in the following years were relatively small. The marriage bar was lifted in 1973 and in 1975, a further 10 female members were appointed.

Nationally, female members were first appointed to the ranks of Sergeant in 1960, Inspector in 1981, Superintendent in 1989, Chief Superintendent in 1999, Assistant Commissioner in 2003 and Deputy Commissioner in 2011. In 2014, Noreen O'Sullivan was appointed as the twelfth Commissioner of An Garda Síochána and the first woman to lead the organisation.

The first female members of the force to arrive in Galway were Imelda O'Flynn (nee Daly) and Maureen Ryan (nee Igoe) who both arrived in the Eglinton Street Station in 1976. In April 1976, the *Irish Independent* recorded the announcement of the first Ban Gardaí in Waterford and Galway ("Ban Gardaí for two more towns", 27.04.1976). The news stated that "Maureen Igoe, Store St. and Imelda Daly, Edward St., Limerick, are going to Galway." The upcoming arrival of the new female Gardaí was also noted in the *Western People* under a story headline representative of its times – "Two 'Little' Girls in Blue" (13.03.1976). The report noted:

*The introduction of the Ban Gardaí will be welcomed in the city, especially by law-and-order officials, as there has been some difficulty in the past over the searching of female suspects and same was being held up until the arrival of a Ban Garda from Limerick.*

The term Ban Garda was officially dropped in 1991 and in 1992 female Gardaí were permitted to wear trousers on duty.

Imelda O'Flynn, who had arrived in Galway in 1976, was the first Galway-based female promoted to the rank of Sergeant in 1998. Marie Skehill, a native of Loughrea, was the first Galway-based female to be promoted to the rank of Inspector in 2003 and, in 2008, she was the first Galway-based female to be promoted to the rank of Superintendent.

Noreen O'Sullivan served as Assistant Commissioner for the Western Region while attached to Galway Garda Station before ultimately becoming the first female Commissioner of An Garda Síochána.

On 11 February 2023, Clíona Richardson, a native of Dublin, was appointed to the rank of

As head of An Garda Síochána's Major Emergency Management Unit, Assistant Commissioner Richardson had responsibility for the running of the COVID-19 Co-ordination Unit when it was established in 2020 to manage An Garda Síochána's strategic response in a co-ordinated manner as the pandemic evolved.

In her current role she has responsibility for the Cross Border Joint Agency Task Force (JATF) and is co-chair of the JATF Operations Co-ordination Group which is charged with reviewing and developing the Cross Border Strategy 2025-2027.

Assistant Commissioner Richardson holds a Degree from UCD/Smurfit Business School in Police Leadership and Governance and also completed the An Garda Síochána's Policing and Human Rights Law in Ireland certificate programme in conjunction with the University of Limerick. She is a graduate of the FBI National Academy and a member of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP).

## *DUTY: Aspects of the History of An Garda Síochána in Galway*

For An Garda Síochána, enhancing gender diversity has been a key part of its cultural change and ongoing organisational transformation. This is evident from the fact that women are deliberately attached to all operational and specialised sections within the organisation. Women now make up over 30% of all serving members, placing An Garda Síochána above the European average in terms of female representation. Women also make up over 70% of all Garda Staff and, at this time (2026), more than half of the Senior Leadership Team.

An Garda Síochána has in recent years established a Women's Network to provide opportunities for training, mentoring, collaboration and networking among female colleagues.

The commitment and dedication of women in An Garda Síochána today is a fitting tribute to the sacrifices made by the original 12 trail blazers who paved the way in 1959.

## 10. The First Garda Flag

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The Garda Aonach in 1926 was the brainchild of Commissioner O'Duffy as part of his plan to immerse his force in all things Irish. It was also notable for the ceremonial unfurling of the new Garda flag. The flag was designed and embroidered by the Dun Emer Guild, Churchtown, Dublin, which had been founded in 1902 by Evelyn Gleeson, along with Susan (Lily) and Elizabeth (Lolly) Yeats, the artistic sisters of the poet W.B. Yeats and the painter Jack B. Yeats. The flag was royal blue in colour and made of Irish poplin, fringed in gold. It was double sided. The old spelling of Síotcána is used and the crests of Leinster, Munster and Ulster are included. The Connaught crest however is not part of the flag and it is thought that this was possibly because the Connaught crest was considered too war-like for the times in question. The Galway City crest appears to have been used in its stead.

On the reverse of the flag embroidered in gold was the sunburst formerly believed to have been the ancient symbol of the Fianna and representing the dawn of freedom. This was also representative of the old IRA/IRB. This sunburst is to be seen on the Scott Medals awarded to Gardaí for deeds of exceptional bravery and on the badge of the Irish Armed Forces.

The Garda flag was later approved for issue in January 1927 and differs greatly from the current flag. It was produced by Messrs Clery & Co., O'Connell Street, Dublin. It was not centrally issued to Stations but rather Commissioner O'Duffy expected that it be purchased by the men at each Station at their own expense. The large flag, suitable for Divisional Headquarters, cost 55 shillings and the smaller flag 27 shillings and six pence.

In the 1930 Garda pilgrimage to Lourdes this Garda flag was carried along with the Tricolour. The original flag (large) which would have

## 11. An Garda Síochána 1930: Places and Stations

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The following list of Garda Stations, Divisions, Districts and Sub-Districts, are from the full list of the East Riding followed by the full list of the West Riding. The Sub-Districts (places with a Station) are in alphabetical order under each District Headquarter). The notes are in the present tense but refer to the situation that existed in 1930; they are taken verbatim from the *Garda Síochána Establishment Scheme*, published in that year.

### **GALWAY EAST RIDING**

**BALLINASLOE** (Joint Station) [Divisional and District Headquarters] – Population 6,637; 997 families.

## 11. An Garda Síochána 1930: Áiteanna agus Beairicí

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There are 77 townlands, 45 licensed premises and 6 schools, with an attendance of 954 children. In 1914, there were 2 Barracks in this area with a strength of 1 Head Constable, 7 Sergeants and 25 Constables. [Down to 1 Inspector, 2 Sergeants and 10 Guards in 1930.] The Dublin-Galway and Roscommon-Castlereagh and Tuam main roads pass through the Sub-District and there are two sawmills, a gas works, a corn mill, 2 fairs monthly and a weekly market. Fishery duties on the Suck and Bunowen require a good deal of attention.

**AHASCRAUGH** – Population 2,873; 611 families. The Ballinasloe-Tuam main road passes through the Sub-District and there are 5 schools, with an attendance of 447. There are 94 townlands attached to this Station, 6 licensed premises, 6 fairs are held annually. The rivers Suck and Bunowen flow through the area and a good deal of fishery duty is necessary.

**AUGHRIM** – Population 1,612; 336 families. There are 5 public houses and 4 schools, with 408 attending. The main Ballinasloe-Loughrea road runs through the Sub-District and 2 small fishery rivers – the Meelehan and the Tristane – call for attention from the Guards. Station necessary.

**BALLYGAR** – Population 3,671; 742 families. Seven schools have an attendance of 865 and there are 18 licensed premises. The main Tuam-Mountbellew and Ballinasloe-Castlereagh roads pass through the Sub-District, in which there are 76 townlands and there are 20 fairs per annum and a weekly market. In 1914, there were two stations – Ballygar and Ballinamore – in this area with a strength of 2 Sergeants and 11 Constables. [Down to 1 and 4 respectively in 1930.]

**CREGGS** – Population 1,816; 391 families. There are 5 schools having an average [attendance] of 395 and 7 licensed premises and the main Ballinasloe-Castlereagh and Roscommon road passes through the area. Seven fairs are held annually at Creggs and there are weekly markets. There are 56 townlands attached to the Station.

**BÉAL ÁTHA NA SLUAIGHE** (Comhstáisiún) [Ceancheathrú Rannáin agus Ceancheathrú Ceantair] – Daonra 6,637; 997 líon tí.

77 baile fearainn, 45 áitreabh ceadúnaithe agus 6 scoil ar a bhfreastalaíonn 954 dalta. Bíonn aonach ar siúl faoi dhó sa mhí agus margadh uair sa tseachtain. Éilítear cuid mhaith aire a thabhairt maidir le dualgas iascaigh ar an tSuca agus Abhainn Bhun Abhann.

**ÁTH EASCRAIGH** – Daonra 2,873; 611 líon tí. Ritheann an príomhbhóthar idir Béal Átha na Sluaighe agus Tuaim tríd an bhFochéantar. 5 scoil ar a bhfreastalaíonn 447 dalta. Tá 94 baile fearainn ceangailte leis an Stáisiún seo; 6 áitreabh ceadúnaithe; bíonn 6 aonach ar siúl i rith na bliana. Ritheann an tSuca agus Abhainn Bhun Abhann tríd an limistéar agus bíonn gá le dualgas iascaigh a dhéanamh cuid mhór den am.

**EACHROIM** – Daonra 1,612; 336 líon tí. 5 theach ósta agus 4 scoil ar a bhfreastalaíonn 408 dalta. Ritheann an príomhbhóthar idir Béal Átha na Sluaighe agus Baile Locha Riach tríd an bhFochéantar, agus dhá abhainn bheaga a ndéantar iascach orthu – an Mhaolachán agus Abhainn Throstáin – agus ar gá aire na nGardaí ina leith. Tá gá le Stáisiún.

**BÉAL ÁTHA GHÁRTHA** – Daonra 3,671; 742 líon tí. Seacht scoil ar a bhfreastalaíonn 865 dalta, agus 18 n-áitreabh ceadúnaithe. Ritheann an príomhbhóthar idir Tuaim-an Creagán agus an príomhbhóthar idir Béal Átha na Sluaighe-an Caisleán Riabhach tríd an bhFochéantar, ina bhfuil 76 baile fearainn. Bíonn

**EYRECOURT** – Population 1,756; 400 families. The main Ballinasloe-Birr-Portumna roads pass through the Sub-District. There are important salmon fisheries on the River Shannon; portion of Shannon Scheme Works situated in Sub-District and there are 6 schools, with an attendance of 300 and 7 licensed premises. The Sub-District extends to 96 townlands.

**KILCONNELL** – Population 1,893; 416 families. The Dublin-Galway trunk road passes through the village and there is heavy traffic during the summer months. There are 13 fairs held annually and there are 5 schools, with an average attendance of 338 and 7 licensed premises. There are 72 townlands attached to the Station. In 1914, there were two Barracks in this area – Kilconnell and Woodlawn – with a strength of 2 Sergeants and 8 Constables. [Down to 1 and 3 respectively in 1930.]

**LAURENCETOWN** – Population 937; 210 families. Main roads, Ballinasloe-Banagher and Loughrea-Birr, pass through the Sub-District. One school has an average attendance of 75 and there are 3 licensed premises. There are 40 townlands attached to the Station. A Station is considered necessary at this centre.

**MOUNTBELLEW** – Population approximately 3,000. There are from 6 to 8 schools, with an attendance of about 500, and there are about 22 licensed premises. The main Ballinasloe-Tuam and Castlereagh-Roscommon roads pass through the Sub-District, which comprises 51 townlands. There are 2 villages – Caltra and Castleblakney [sic] – in which 5 and 6 fairs respectively are held each year and there is a monthly fair at Mountbellew. This Station has recently been opened to replace the Station which was at Castleblakney [sic].

**LOUGHREA** – This is District Headquarters Station. Population 5,941; 1,024 families. There are 45 public houses in the area; 8 schools have an attendance of 1,281 and the Sub-District,

During the months of December and January each Guard at Loughrea performs 40 hours' duty per month between 12 midnight and 8 am. In 1914, there were 2 Barracks in this area – one at Loughrea and one at Kilrickle – with a strength of 1 Head Constable, 5 Sergeants and 26 Constables. [Down to 2 Sergeants and 7 Constables in 1930.]

**KILLIMOR** – Population 2,070; 396 families. One school has an attendance of 200 and in addition to his duties in connection with this school, the School Attendance Officer has to attend to 6 schools outside the Sub-District, at which children from his area attend. The main Ballinasloe-Portumna and Loughrea road, on which, owing to the absence of railway facilities, there is considerable traffic, passes through the Sub-District. There are two rivers which provide salmon-fishing attractions and a good deal of attention must be devoted to fishery duty. There are 75 townlands attached to the Station, which has 10 licensed premises to supervise.

**KILTORMER** – Population 2,468; 518 families. This is a large Sub-District containing 124 townlands and considerable time has to be devoted to the collection of agricultural statistics each year. The absence of railway facilities appreciably increases road traffic and in recent years this problem demands increasing attention. There are 5 schools, with an attendance of 473 and there are 4 licensed premises. In 1914, there were two Barracks in this area, one at Kiltormer and one at Gurty Madden, with a strength of 2 Sergeants and 11 Constables. [Down to Kiltormer Station only with 1 Sergeant and 4 Constables in 1930.]

**KILRICKLE** – This Station has not yet been established and at present [1930] the Sub-District is temporarily attached to Loughrea.

The main Galway-Tipperary and Offaly roads pass through the town. There is no rail service and road traffic in the area is considerable. A considerable amount of fishery duty is necessary on the Shannon and there are 1,400 acres preserved for game. Lord Lascelles's estate is situated in the area, which, in 1914, had 3 Barracks – one at Portumna, one at Ballyshrulie and one at Gurtumna, with a strength of 1 Head Constable, 5 Sergeants and 22 Constables. [Down to one Station only with 1 Sergeant and 5 Constables in 1930.]

**TYNAGH** – Population 3,005; 603 families. There are 130 townlands; 3 villages – Tynagh, Dunery and Abbey. A river frequented by salmon runs through the Sub-District and considerable fishery duty is necessary. There is a monthly fair and

A considerable portion of the Sub-District is wild and mountainous. The Sub-District extends to 95 townlands and in 1914, there were 4 Barracks in the area – one at Woodford, one at Looscaun, one at Rossmore and one at Clonmoylan, with a strength of 1 Head Constable, 5 Sergeants and 21 Constables. [Down to 1 Sergeant and 4 Constables in 1930.]

**ATHENRY** [Sub-District Station only] – Population 2,930; 556 families. There are 95 townlands in the Sub-District. It is an important railway junction and 4 main roads run through the area. There is a bi-monthly District Court and a weekly market and there are 14 cattle fairs, 14 pig fairs, 3 special sheep fairs and 4 horse fairs each year. 5 schools have an attendance of 518 and in addition to his duties in connection with these, the School Attendance Officer has to deal with 4 schools outside the Sub-District, at which children from his area attend. [Down to 1 and 3 respectively in 1930.] Though the population is small the Station is considered necessary.

**GURTEEN** – Population 1,098; 209 families.

There is a monthly District Court; there are 4 schools, with an attendance of 228; there are large game preserves and the railway junction for Loughrea is in the Sub-District. There are 2 public houses. There are 38 townlands and 1914 there was a Barrack at Gurteen and an outpost at Colmanstown, with a total strength of 2 Sergeants and 10 Constables. [Down to 1 and 3 respectively in 1930.] Station necessary.

**MENLOUGH** – Population 1,720; 370 families.

There are 53 townlands; 6 schools, with an average attendance of 533 and its 5 public houses are scattered through the Sub-District.

**MONIVEA** – Population 1,410; 263 families.

The main Athenry-Tuam road runs through the Sub-District. There are 4 licensed premises in the area; 4 schools have an attendance of 363 and there are occasional fairs at this centre. There are 47 townlands, a considerable portion of which is preserved for game.

**GORT** [Sub-District Station only] – Population 3,403; 654 families. The Sub-District, which extends to 60 townlands with an area of 31,679 acres. The main Galway-Ennis-Limerick road runs through the area and there are quarterly cattle fairs; monthly pig fairs and weekly markets. 6 schools have an attendance of 606 and there are 34 public houses. In 1914, there were 2 Stations – Gort and Derrybrien – and 2 outposts in this area with a total strength of 1 Head Constable, 7 Sergeants and 24 Constables. [Down to Gort only, 1 Sergeant and 6 Constables in 1930.]

**ARDRAHAN** – Population 1,822; 342 families. There are 3 schools, with an attendance of 192; 3 public houses. The Galway-Ennis-Limerick main road passes through the Sub-District. There are 100 townlands attached to the Station.

The Galway-Lisdoonvarna-Lahinch road, which is extremely busy during the summer months, runs through the area; the village of Kinvara is fairly important as a fishing centre and is a seaport. The Sub-District has a long coastline which requires constant supervision to prevent traffic in illicit spirits. There are weekly markets and occasional cattle and sheep fairs. 6 schools have an attendance of 441 and there are 15 public houses. In 1914, the strength of Kinvara was 1 Sergeant and 7 Constables. [1 and 4 respectively in 1930.]

**PETERSWELL** – Population 1,319; 263 families. Poaching for game and fish is prevalent; and considerable time must be devoted to this problem by the Gardaí. The main Loughrea-Gort road runs through the area and there are 4 schools, with an attendance of 356 and 4 public houses. The Sub-District extends to 99 townlands, 22,887 acres and in 1914, there were 2 Barracks - Peterswell and Kilchreest – and 1 outpost in the area, with a total strength of 1 Head Constable, 3 Sergeants and 17 Constables. [Down to 1 Station with 1 Sergeant and 4 Constables in 1930.]

**SHANAGLISH** – Population 1,998; 407 families. The main Galway-Ennis-Limerick road passes through the Sub-District. 4 schools have an attendance of 268 and there are 2 public houses. The Sub-District extends to 60 townlands, with an area of 20,913 acres. In 1914, the strength was 1 Sergeant and 7 Constables. [1 and 4 respectively in 1930.]

## GALWAY WEST RIDING

**GALWAY** [Sub-District Station only with 1 Inspector, 3 Sergeants and 23 Guards] – Population 13,286; 2,689 families. There are 2 factories, 4 mills, fisheries, seaside resort and tourist centre for Connemara. Galway is an important market town, with fairs and markets held in the streets, which are in most cases narrow and call for an exceptional amount of point and beat duty. During the past few years traffic has increased by at least 300%. The five main roads are important bus routes. In town there are 6 dangerous street crossings needing constant supervision. There are 17 schools and 2 colleges. The public houses, of which there are 123, require more than ordinary supervision. Of late the arrival and departure of Trans-Atlantic liners has added to the duty to be performed.

**CURRANDULLA** [sic] – Population 3,116; 618 families. There are 71 townlands, 6 schools and 6 public houses. Main road Galway to Castlebar and Ballina and a bus route pass through this Sub-District.

**HEADFORD** – Population 2,972; 711 families. There are 107 townlands, 5 schools and 21 public houses. Cattle fair held once per month; weekly market every Tuesday and pig market in Caherlistrane every Thursday. This is a busy tourist resort in summer, large numbers of anglers coming for the fishing in Kilbeg, Clydagh, Annakeen and Greenfield Bays. Poteen traffic on the islands in Lough Corrib calls for much attention by the party.

The distance by sea between nearest points is 1¼ miles from the first to second and 1½ miles from second to third. There is one school and one public house on each of the two smaller islands. Is a seaside resort frequented by large numbers of tourists in summer. [Surprisingly, this is where Kilronan appears on the list in the 1930 document.]

**LOUGHGEORGE** – Population 2,290; 395 families. There are 3 schools and 5 public houses. A good deal of time is occupied in enforcing traffic regulations. In 1929, there were 196 offences recorded in this Sub-District and of these, 2/3rds were in respect of breaches of the Motor Car Acts and Summary Jurisdiction Act. Fishery duty.

**ORANMORE** – Population 2,431; 469 families. There are 7 schools and 9 public houses. This is a busy area in regard to traffic, as the main Galway-Dublin and Galway-Limerick roads pass through it. These are important bus routes. There is one very dangerous junction in the village requiring a Guard for point duty. Clarenbridge, in the Sub-District, has 5 public houses five miles away which must be visited each night by two Guards.

**SALTHILL** – Population 2,553; 501 families. There are 53 townlands of a rural area added, 11 public houses and 5 schools. Duty comprises ordinary beat and patrol work and in summer traffic and point duty. Is a very busy seaside resort, having a large influx of visitors in Summer. Established strength of party requires to be increased by 2 Guards from May to October inclusive. Is terminus of Galway bus service, which runs every ¼ hour in summer and every half-hour during winter. Fishery duty.

**TUAM** [Sub-District Station only] – Population 6,416; 1,039 families. There are 131 townlands, 50 public houses and 11 schools. This is an important business town. 1 Garda is employed

**DUNMORE** – Population 3,851; 857 families. There are 77 townlands, 22 public houses and 5 schools. Good business town. One bus route passes through area. Weekly markets and monthly fairs are held. A dangerous street crossing requires a man for point duty.

**GLENAMADDY** – Population 3,888; 825 families. There are 70 townlands, 14 public houses and 10 schools. Good business centre. There are 2 Banks in village. One Garda is whole-time School Attendance Officer.

**KILCONLY** – Population 2,987; 623 families. There are 46 townlands, 3 public houses and 11 schools. One Garda is whole-time School Attendance Officer.

**MILLTOWN** – Population 3,661; 765 families. There are 78 townlands, 10 public houses and 10 schools. 3 of the public houses are at a distance of 7 miles from the Station. One Garda is whole-time School Attendance Officer.

There are 3 seaside resorts and locality is much frequented by tourists. Average outdoor daily duty – 8 day patrols of 4 hours each and 5 night patrols of 3 hours each. 3 rising patrols performed per week. Fishery duty.

**CARNA** – Population 2,777; 595 families. There are 51 townlands, 7 public houses and 11 schools. Average outdoor daily duty – 4 day patrols and 2 night patrols; 2 rising patrols per week. Tourist resort.

**LEENANE** – Population 1,070; 207 families. 6 public houses and 3 schools. Daily duty outdoor averages 3 day patrols and 2 night patrols; 2 rising patrols are performed each week. Tourist resort.

**LETTERFRACK** – Population 2,902; 599 families. There are 69 townlands, 10 public houses and 9 schools. Average daily duty – 4 day patrols and 3 night patrols; 2 rising patrols are performed each week. This Sub-district includes the Island of Inishbofin, 9 miles from mainland and duty thereon is now performed by this party since the abolition of Cleggan. Great numbers of tourists frequent and pass through the area in summer. Distance to furthest point of Sub-District is 18 miles.

**RECESS** – Population 1,292; 258 families. There are 58 townlands, 4 public houses and 4 schools. The daily average duty comprises 4 day patrols and 2 night patrols; 2 rising patrols are performed each week. There is a seaside resort (Cashel).

**OUGHTERARD** [Sub-District Station only] – Population 3,168; 707 families. There are 125 townlands, 14 public houses and 5 schools. 54 patrols were performed by the party in week ended 31/3/30. 50 Revenue patrols were performed in 1929. There are 10 Islands in Lough Corrib on which illicit distillation is carried on; these are at a distance of from 7 to 10 miles from Station. During December 1929, 149 day and 123 night patrols were performed. The main road Galway-Clifden passes through the area and is an important bus route. This is also an important tourist resort.

**CARRAROE** – Population 2,248; 435 families. There are 2 public houses and 5 schools. The party at this Station perform an average 50 hours per week outdoor duty per man. This is a poteen-making area and the principal work is in connection therewith. There were 915 Revenue patrols performed during 1929. Fishery duty.

**INVERAN** – Population 2,534; 479 families. There are 5 public houses and 8 schools. Length of Sub-District by road is 15 miles. There is a considerable amount of bus and motor traffic through the area. Illicit distillation.

**LETTERMORE** – Population 3,175; 592 families. There are 2 public houses and 10 schools. There is an average of 8 hours out-door duty per man per day done at this Station. 209 Revenue patrols were performed in 1929. Illicit distillation is carried on in 11 islands off coast, some of which are at a distance of 8 or 9 miles from this Station. A boat is an essential requirement here.

**MAAM** – Population 1,874; 400 families. There are 5 public houses and 8 schools.

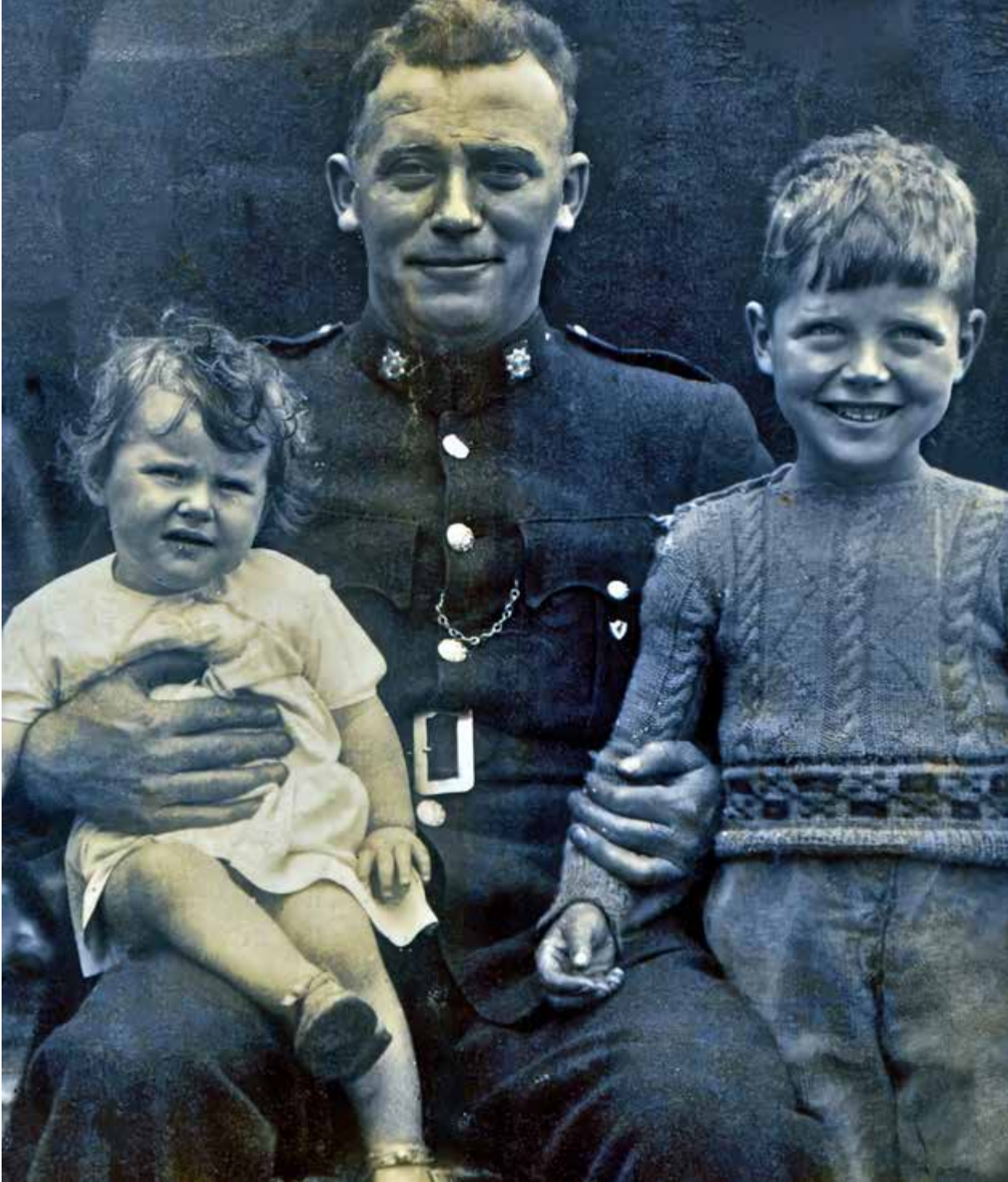

Area considerably increased since the abolition of Clonbur Station. Average of 8 hours out-door duty daily per man is done. Road, Galway-Clifden, passes through area and is a bus route. Tourist resort.

**MOYCULLEN** – Population 1,903; 832 families. There are 57 townlands, 4 public houses and 4 schools. There is a considerable amount of Revenue work to be done in this Sub-District. 13 seizures were made in year 1929, practically all on commonages and no prosecutions resulted.

**ROSMUCK** – Population 2,055; 420 families. There are 5 schools and 1 public house. The daily average duty is 4 day patrols and 2 night patrols; 2 rising patrols are performed each week. This is a poteen making area, particularly on the islands off the coast. Boats are necessary for the effective suppression of this traffic.

**SPIDDAL** – Population 2,349; 445 families. There are 35 townlands, 5 public houses and 5 schools. An average of 8 hours duty per man per day is performed here. Each man performs 4 rising patrols each month. During the summer months there are 2 Irish Colleges at which approximately 600 students attend. 300 Revenue patrols were performed during 1929. During the summer large numbers of visitors come from Galway, etc., by motor and bus and the road which passes through the Sub-District is a direct route to the tourist resorts of Connemara. There are 2 islands off the coast on which the manufacture of illicit spirits is carried on.

was deemed not appropriately located, so a site was obtained in Barnaderg village. According to Garda Matt Marley, the new Station was built by Paddy Duffy, Lavally, in 1929. Sergeant Travers and later Sergeant Forde were some of the sergeants in charge of the new Station after Sergeant McNulty.

Records show that among the members who served in Barnaderg in those years were Gardaí Bolan, Conlon, Halpin, Keohane, Lohan, O'Donnell and Seavers.

The outbreak of World War II in September 1939 caused many changes in the country and

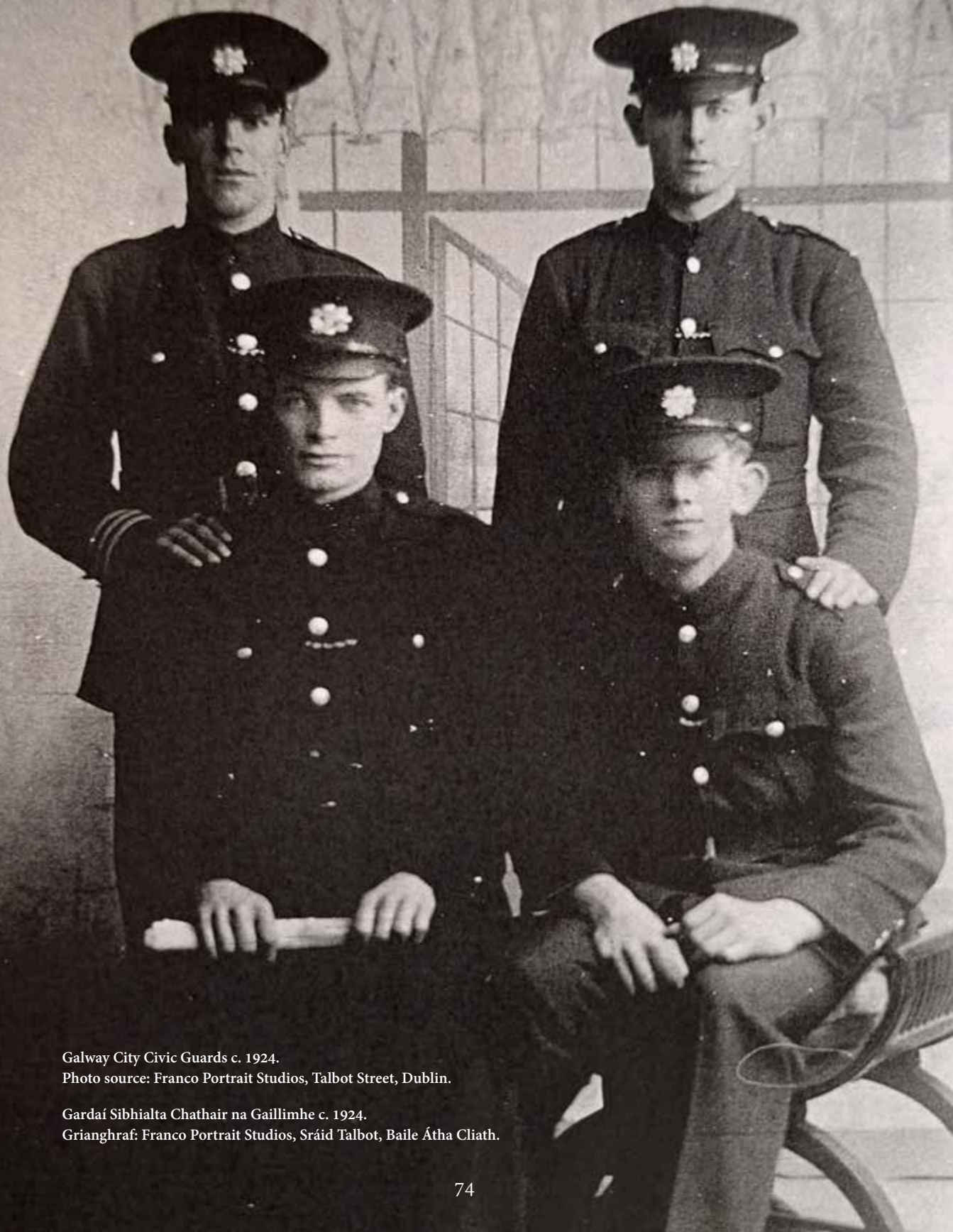
Many men who served in the LDF during what became known as ‘the Emergency’ spent days and nights on patrol work, protection duties, etc. They were dangerous and difficult times but a fine spirit existed between the public and the Gardaí who worked in close harmony through this eventful period. One of the major events of those war time days was the crash of a big Canadian bomber plane in the Lavally area, with the loss of the entire crew.

The war years passed and the personnel of Barnaderg Station inevitably changed. Sergeant James Hawkshaw was in charge of the station. He was a native of Westport and his son M.J. was a member of the Galway Senior football team playing in Croke Park in 1957. Other members of the force at that time were Garda Tom Cosgrove, Martin Gill, John T. Finlay and the late Pat Hegarty. Sergeant Hugh Ruane and Sergeant William Harhen came after Sergeant Hawkshaw. Sergeant Harhen’s brother, Michael Harhen, also served as a Garda in Barnaderg in the 1950s. Another native of the West Cork area, Sergeant Pat Bevan, served for over seven years in Barnaderg. The list of men who served in Barnaderg is a long one from the first day in Clogherboy to the diamond anniversary of the foundation of the force when the station was manned by Sergeant Michael Waters and Gardaí Martin Lyster and Richard Horan.

## 13. Garda Síochána in Oughterard

Oughterard has been policed from many buildings, firstly from the Army Barracks at Ordnance Ground, on the Glann Road, about 4km north of the village, then from the house next to McGeough's butchers on Camp Street, from Main Street when, on 27 of October 1922, the Civic Guard moved into what is now called 'the Old Barracks' across from the Courthouse and from 1980 to the present from their location on Main Street.

Sergeant Gregory Allen, formerly of the Garda Museum writes: "This is a group of the Oughterard District Force, circa 1924." Based on the identification of the Officer in Charge,

who is believed to be Superintendent Edmond O’Riordan, a native of Charleville, Co. Cork, who joined as cadet in 1923 and was a veteran of the War of Independence. Superintendent O’Riordan assumed command of the Oughterard District on 6 February, 1924. He retired from An Garda Síochána in 1940 and died in 1970.

In 1926, Sergeant Leo Maher (702) was posted to Oughterard as Sergeant in Charge. He later served as Superintendent in Rathfarnham and as Chief Superintendent in Mayo and Dublin.

### **Early Years**

Single Gardaí slept in the Barracks and got their meals locally. Mrs Geoghegan and Miss Walsh, Bridge Street, cooked meals for the Gardaí.

By the late 1970s, the condition of the Barracks had deteriorated so much over the years, with the ingress of water and unhygienic conditions, that it caused a walkout of the serving Gardaí to the old rectory adjacent to the Church of Ireland where now the local Garda Station is.

record the move, it got a very prompt reaction. Suddenly everybody became interested in carrying out renovations to the newly acquired premises. The Office of Public Works were there like a flash, because it would not have been possible to carry out the renovations while the building was occupied, a third premises was secured in a matter of hours to accommodate the members temporarily while the more permanent premises was being prepared.

We now hope that the action by the Gardaí at Oughterard will help to concentrate the minds of officialdom on a few other appalling old buildings which pass for Garda Stations and which are in urgent need of attention or replacement.

## **Pioneering Gardaí from the Oughterard/Killannin Area**

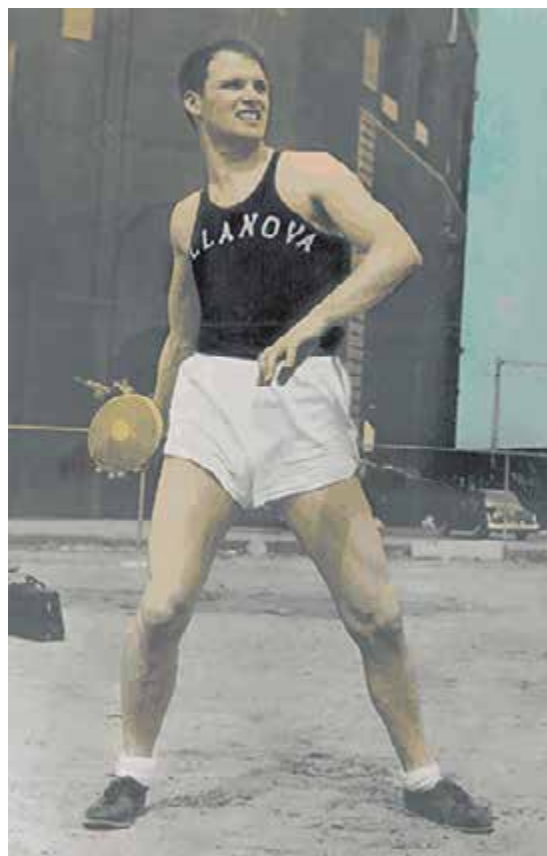
Fate has a way of bringing people together. Tipperary-born Sergeant Edmund 'Ned' Tobin was stationed in Oughterard and, while there, he got to meet Cummin Clancy. When Ned was subsequently posted to Dublin, he then met Rosscahill-born Peter Walsh.

### **Cummin Clancy (1922-2013)**

Cummin was born on 9 November 1922 and educated at Glann National School; he subsequently trained to become a Garda.

Garda Ned Tobin, based in Oughterard, Co. Galway, noticed Cummin's ability as an athlete when he competed in local sports meetings in the 1940s. Ned was impressed at his sheer strength, skill and natural ability as a discus thrower.

Inspired by Ned Tobin's previous achievements (see below), Cummin, while stationed in Dublin, joined Donore Harriers athletic club and began to blaze his own trail and became the Irish champion, registering a Personal Best and breaking the Irish record in 1948, a record that stood for 19 years. Also in 1948, just a fortnight

### **Cuimín Clancy (1922-2013)**

An 9 Samhain 1922 a rugadh Cuimín agus chuaigh sé ar Scoil Náisiúnta an Ghleanna.

Chuaigh sé faoi oiliúint ina Gharda ina dhiaidh sin. Thug an Garda Ned Tobin, a bhí i Stáisiún Uachtar Ard, faoi deara chomh hábailta agus a bhí Cuimín i mbun lúthchleasaíochta ag imeachtaí áitiúla spóirt i rith na 1940idí. Chuaigh an neart a bhí ann i gcion ar Ned, chomh maith leis an gcumas agus an scil nádúrtha a bhí ann ag caitheamh teisce.

Bhí eolas ar a raibh bainte amach roimhe sin ag Ned Tobin (féach thíos) ina spreagadh ag Cuimín



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before the Olympic Games, he won the English Amateur Athletic Association Championship.

Cummin was 26 years of age when he was chosen to be one of 73 Olympians (68 men and 5 women) to represent Ireland in London. While at the Olympics, Cummin met the American athletes' coach, Jumbo Elliot, who would change the course of his life. Jumbo invited Cummin to Villanova University; while there, he met his future wife Maureen and subsequently started work in the insurance business in Garden City, New York, in 1956. Cummin passed away in 2013 at the age of 90.

## **Sergeant Peter Walsh (1934-2009), born in Rosscahill, Co. Galway**

Peter commenced his service in An Garda Síochána in the former Dublin Metropolitan Area in 1954, his First Station being Kevin Street. He later transferred to the Mayo Division where he served in Murrisk and Achill Island. In 1960, he was transferred to the division of Galway West, serving in Letterfrack and Gort before retiring in September 1984.

Peter was a well-known and highly respected member of An Garda Síochána. Outside his commitments to his family and career, his love of sport came next. While serving in Gort, Peter was involved in setting up the South Galway Athletic Club and he was chairman of the Galway County Board of the BLE, while in Letterfrack.

In 1954, Peter moved to Dublin where he joined the Civil Service Athletic Club and trained each week in Kilmainham, practising the shot, hammer and discus – without doubt the 56lb was his favourite discipline. When Peter competed in several All-Ireland Championships in these events, he had many great contests with Michael Hehir (Moycullen) and Garda Ned Tobin (Tipperary). He also won several Connacht Senior Championship titles.

agus, nuair a bhí sé ar lonnú i mBaile Átha Cliath, cheangail sé le Cumann Lúthchleasaíochta Donore Harriers agus thosaigh ar a shlí féin a dhéanamh go raibh ina churadh uile-Éireann. Chaith sé a sháriarracht phearsanta féin sa bhliain 1948 nuair a sháraigh sé curiarracht na hÉireann, iarracht nach sárófaí arís go ceann 19 mbliana. An bhliain chéanna sin, 1948, coicís ghairid roimh na Cluichí Oilimpeacha, bhuaigh sé an English Amateur Athletic Association Championship.

26 bliana d'aois a bhí Cuimín nuair a roghnaíodh i measc 73 (68 fear agus 5 ban) ar fhoireann na hÉireann é do na Cluichí Oilimpeacha i Londain. Ag na cluichí sin a casadh Jumbo Elliot, cóitseálaí lúthchleasaíochta na Meiriceánach, ar Chuimín, fear a chuirfeadh cor mór ina chinniúint. Thug

Peter's involvement in athletics over many years helped him greatly in his professional work because it enabled him to get to know young people in a very positive way. In 1982, at the age of forty-seven, Peter competed successfully in the 56lb for the last time at Garda Sports in Salthill. Two years later, he retired from the force and from athletics.

### **Sergeant Edmund 'Ned' Tobin (1911-1987)**

Edmund 'Ned' Tobin was born on 23 November 1911 at Rehill, Ballylooby, Co. Tipperary. He joined An Garda Síochána in 1933, embarking on a career path ideally suited for his talents and serving for a period of time in Oughterard.

### **An Sáirsint Peter Walsh (1934- 2009) a rugadh i Ros Cathail, Co. na Gaillimhe**

Thosaigh Peter i mbun seirbhíse leis an nGarda Síochána i gCeantar Cathrach Bhaile Átha Cliath sa bhliain 1954. Sa bheairic ar Shráid Caoimhín a bhí sé ar dtús. Aistríodh ina dhiaidh sin é go Rannán Mhaigh Eo, mar a ndearna sé fónamh i Muraisc agus in Acaill. D'aistrigh sé go Rannán Iarthar na Gaillimhe sa bhliain 1960 agus rinne sé fónamh i Leitir Fraic agus ar an nGort sula ndeachaigh sé amach ar pinsean i mí Meán Fómhair 1984.

Bhí aithne go forleathan air agus ardmheas air ina Gharda. Taobh amuigh dá dhúthracht don teaghlach agus a dhíograis i mbun oibre, bhí cúrsaí spóirt ar an gcéad réimse eile den saol inar mhó spéis ag Peter. Le linn dó a bheith ar an nGort, bhí baint ag Peter le Cumann Lúthchleasaíochta Dheisceart na Gaillimhe a chur ar bun agus bhí sé ina chathaoirleach ar Bhord Contae na Gaillimhe de BLÉ nuair a bhí sé i Leitir Fraic.

D'athraigh Peter go Baile Átha Cliath ina chónaí sa bhliain 1954 agus cheangail sé ansin le Cumann Lúthchleasaíochta na Státseirbhíse. Bhíodh sé ag traenáil i gCill Mhaighneann gach seachtain, ag caitheamh meáchain, ag caitheamh an oird agus ag caitheamh na teisce. Is cinnte gurb é caitheamh an mheáchain 56lb ab ansa leis. Bhí Peter san iomaíocht do Chraobh na hÉireann agus ba mhinic Michael Hehir (Maigh Cuilinn) agus an Garda Ned Tobin (Tiobraid Árann) ina choinne. Thug sé Craobh Sinsir Chonnacht leis níos mó ná uair amháin.

Tuairisc nuachtáin faoin nGarda Ned Tobin nuair a sháraigh sé Curiarracht an Domhain arís.

Standing at six feet five inches, he won thirty-seven national athletics titles, including two all-round titles won in Killarney in 1936 and Carrick-on-Suir in 1937. He won his first titles on 1 July 1934 at the championships held in Fermoy when he won the discus, 56lb weight for distance and 56lb weight over the bar events. Amazingly, he equalled this feat at the Irish Athletics Championships held in Thurles in the following year. His discus throw of 152 ft 6½ in. (46.49 m) in Thurles was an Irish record until beaten by Oughterard native Cummin Clancy in August 1949. Ned Tobin held the World record for the 56lb weight discipline in 1943.

Ned was promoted to Sergeant in May 1950. He died on 16 February 1987 in Dublin.

Chuidigh an bhaint a bhí ag Peter le cúrsaí lúthchleasaíochta ar feadh na mblianta fada leis ina shaol oibre ó chuir sin ar a chumas aithne a chur ar dhaoine óga ar bhealach a bhí antairbheach. Sa bhliain 1982, agus é seacht mbliana is dhá fhichead, chaith Peter an meáchan 56lb den uair dheireanach ag Spóirt an Gharda i mBóthar na Trá. Dhá bhliain dár gcionn, chuaigh sé ar pinsean as na Gardaí agus déirigh sé as an lúthchleasaíocht.

## An Sáirsint Edmund ‘Ned’ Tobin (1911-1987)

Rugadh Edmund ‘Ned’ Tobin ar an 23 Samhain 1911 sa Réchoill i mBaile Átha Lúbaigh, Co. Thiobraid Árann. Chuaigh sé isteach sa Gharda Síochána sa bhliain 1933, slí bheatha a bhí an-oiriúnach dá chuid cumais agus inniúlachta. Rinne sé fónamh ar feadh tamaill in Uachtar Ard.

Bhí sé troithe agus cúig orlaigh airde ann agus thug sé seacht gcraobh náisiúnta déag agus fiche leis sa lúthchleasaíocht, dhá chraobh náisiúnta ilbheartaíochta ina measc, i gCill Airne sa bhliain 1936 agus i gCarraig na Siúire sa bhliain 1937. Ag craobhchomórtas i Mainistir Fhear Maí ar an 1 Iúil 1934 a bhuaigh sé den chéad uair, rug sé an chraobh leis an lá sin ag caitheamh na teisce, ag caitheamh meáchain (56lb) chun faid agus ag caitheamh meáchain (56lb) chun airde. Rinne sé an ghasce chéanna ag Craobh Lúthchleasaíochta na hÉireann i nDurlas Éile an bhliain dár gcionn. Chaith sé an teasc 152 tr. 6½ or. (46.49 m) i nDurlas, curiarracht na hÉireann gur sháraigh Cuimín Clancy, as Uachtar Ard ó dhúchas, é i mí Lúnasa 1949. Ba le Ned Tobin curiarracht an domhain maidir leis an meáchan 56lb sa bhliain 1943.

Fuair Ned ardú céime go grád an tSáirsint i mí Bealtaine 1950. Fuair sé bás an 16 Feabhra 1987 i mBaile Átha Cliath.

## **Cuimhní Cinn ar an saol in Uachtar Ard - An Sáirsint Pat Lehane**

Tháinig mise i méarcach go hUachtar Ard an 12 Meán Fómhair 1964. Is iad a bhí sa stáisiún ag an am an Ceannfort Padraig S. Ó Gallchohair, Dún na nGall; an Sáirsint Jim Feely (9092), as Sligeach ó dhúchas; an Garda Tadhg Ó Gaoithín (8681), as Dún Chaoin; Micheál Ó Dubhda (9826), as Daingean Uí Chúis; Donncha Ó Mainnín (6745), Baile an Fheirtéirigh (Cléireach Ceantair); Gabriel Ó Collaráin (13373), Áth Cinn (Tiománaí Oifigiúil); Con Ó Gallachóir, Dún na nGall; Pat Gillispie, Dún na nGall; Mick Ward, Dún na nGall – go ndéana an Tiarna trócaire orthu uilig. Sula raibh an mhí caite, bhí Séamus Ó Beoláin (15707), Ciarraíoch eile, tagtha ón gcoláiste oiliúna.

Ford Consul 375 an carr patróil a bhíodh againn.

Bhí an áit thar a bheith simplí, na hoifigí in íochtar agus áit codlata thuas staighre. Dhá thine móna a bhíodh ann mar chóras teasa, agus geimhreadh i ndiaidh geimhridh, bhíodh ainmhithe ceithre cos ag teannadh isteach i bhfad róchóngarach dúinn.

Bhí cúl an fhoirgnimh le hAbhainn Ruibhe agus i rith shéasúr an sceite, ba mhinic a thagann an torann a dhéanadh an breac agus an bradán ag tochailt i ngrinneall na habhann idir muid agus codladh na hoíche.

Níl aon chosúlacht ag an bpóilíneacht a bhíodh orainn an uair sin lena mbíonn ar siúl sa lá atá inniu ann. Ní raibh aon chóras raidió ann, ná ríomhairí; ní raibh aonaid speisialta againn ná póilíneacht bóithre le déanamh; aon charr amháin patróil a bhíodh i ngach ceantar. Bhíodh na Gardaí ina n-áiritheoirí ag tiomsú ábhar staidrimh gach bliain faoi chúrsaí talmhaíochta agus iad i mbun an daonáirimh freisin gach cúigiú bliain. Dheintí clár na dtoghthóirí a leasú uair sa bhliain. Bhí tábhacht leis an dlí maidir le Fiaile Dhíobhálach.

## **Memories of my time in Oughterard - Sergeant Pat Lehane**

I arrived as a recruit to Oughterard on 12 September 1964. The Station Party consisted of An Cheannfort Padraig S. O'Gallchohair, Donegal; Sergeant Jim Feely (9092), native of Sligo; Garda Tadhg Guiheen (8681), native of Dunquin; Mick Dowd (9826), Dingle; Denis Manning (6745), Ballyferriter (District Clerk); Gabriel Colleran (13373), Headford (official driver); Con Gallagher, Donegal; Pat Gillispie, Donegal; Mick Ward, Donegal - Lord be good to them all. Later that month, Jim Boland (15707), Kerry, arrived from training.

The patrol car was a Ford Consul 375. The accommodation was very basic, with offices on the ground floor and sleeping quarters upstairs. The heating system was two turf fires. During the winter, some uninvited 'furry friends' squatted too close for comfort.



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The Owenriff River was at the rear of the building. During the spawning season, our sleep was very often interrupted by the very loud noise made by both salmon and trout burrowing in the gravel on the riverbed.

Back in those days, policing bears no resemblance to that of today. There was no radio system, no IT, no specialised units, no road policing, with transport consisting of one patrol car per district. Members acted as enumerators in compiling agricultural statistics on an annual basis, while also doing the census every five years. Registers of electors were revised annually. The laws in relation to noxious weeds had their priority.

In Oughterard and throughout Connemara, the laws relating to poteen brewing were rigorously enforced. To this end, a patrol car and a boat were in constant use. The late Garda M. Dowd was both an expert and genius in this field.

Another duty undertaken was the certification that bull calves that failed the Department inspection, were properly castrated. The performance of these duties generated excellent local knowledge.

Going through life, you will encounter people who will have a positive effect on you. One such person was the late Mrs Mary Geoghegan, Claremount, also known as the ‘merry widow’. Her great, loud, hearty laugh could be heard for some distance. She always had a positive attitude.

Another was Pat Gibbons; no matter what his hurry, he would always come off his bicycle and talk to me, especially about Cork hurling. If he had something important to say, he would preface with “well help me Jaysus, Paddy Lehane.”

John O’Toole from Learn (known as John Ann) was another such person, who always spoke in Irish. After having a drink, he would preface or conclude a sentence with “fair play to John Ann.”

In Uachtar Ard agus ar fud Chonamara, bhíodh an dlí maidir le stílíreacht á chur i bhfeidhm go dian. Bhíodh carr patróil agus bád in úsáid go seasta síoraí i mbun na hoibre sin. Bhí éirim iontach sa nGarda M. Dowd, nach maireann, i mbun an chúraim sin agus saineolas aige ar na cúrsaí a bhain leis.

Dualgas eile a bhíodh le déanamh, deimhniú a thabhairt go ndearnadh gach gamhain tairbh nár shásaigh cigireacht na Roinne a choilleadh mar ba chóir. Bhíodh eolas maith ar an gceantar ag Gardaí tar éis dualgais de na cineálacha sin a dhéanamh.

Bíonn daoine i rith an tsoil arb é do leas i gcónaí castáil leo. Duine den chineál sin arb ea Mary Geoghegan in Ard an Chláir, an bhaintreach mheidhreach mar a bhíodh aithne freisin uirthi. Chluintí an gháire chroíúil aisti fada go maith ó bhaile. Bhí meon fabhrach i gcónaí ag Mary.

Duine eile den chineál céanna a bhí i Pat Gibbons; ba chuma cá mbíodh a dheifir, thagadh sé i gcónaí anuas den rothar go labhraíodh liom, go mór mór má bhí iománaithe Chorcaí le plé. Nuair a bhíodh ábhar tábhachtach le tarraingt anuas aige, bhíodh an réamhrá seo i gcónaí roimh a chuid cainte aige: “well help me Jaysus, Paddy Lehane.”

Duine de Thuathail ansin as an Léim, John Ann a bhíodh air agus Gaeilge a labhraíodh sé riamh, bhí an mianach céanna ansiúd. Dá mbeadh braon ar bith ólta aige, bhíodh réamhrá nó curfá le gach abairt aige: “fair play to John Ann.”

Bhíodh John Finnerty as Sráid an Champa isteach is amach ag an mbeairic go rialta, ‘John Bone’ a thugtaí airsean. Lá amháin ar tháinig sé isteach, tháinig an garda a bhí ar dualgas roimhe sa chaint: “Chuala mé a John go bhfuil tú ag dul ag pósadh.” D’iompaigh John ar a sháil agus amach leis an doras ach bhí sé ar ais cúig nóiméad dár gcionn ag fiafraí: “níor chuala tú a dhuine chóir, nó ar chuala, cé hí féin?”

A regular caller to the Garda Station was John Finnerty, Camp Street, aka 'John Bone'. On one such visit, the member on duty spoke first, saying: "John, I heard you are getting married." John bolted out the door but, on returning five minutes later asked: "did you hear to whom, Sir?"

Another visitor to Oughterard was one Francis Kendall-Husband, a native of Somerset, England, styling himself as the last of 'wandering bards'. He travelled throughout Ireland and slept in the cells of Garda Stations. On his arrival in Oughterard, he would book his B&B at the Station. That night, he would take stage in Mike Power's bar. He composed and recited poetry for the clientele. He always departed early in the morning. He was an

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encyclopaedia of knowledge on the Gardaí, he was aware of promotions, transfers, retirements and he also knew some members' wives by their names.

One of the events I enjoyed, when the opportunity presented itself, was the game of cards in the late Mattie Healy's shop on Sunday nights. A great group would gather, Tom Healy (the Yank), Jackie Murray, John Austin Molloy, amongst others. The most versatile character of the lot was Mark Geoghegan, an elderly man who spoke both in Irish and English, with an equally good turn of phrase in both.

The following are the names of other members of the force who served in Oughterard: Liam Roche (10708), Charles Friel (14465) RIP, Tom Duffy (16666), Jim Healy, James Cuddy, Brian Mongan, Michael Flaherty, Pat Ferriter RIP. Others also served. Seamus Kenny RIP, a native of Newcastle West, was stationed at Lettermore.

Before I conclude, I will have to refer to very enjoyable days out in Glann, woodcock shooting in the company of Paddy Clancy. The fantastic scenery more than made up for all the misses. God be good to you, Paddy.

Just to let you know, I came to Oughterard in 1964. Except for a year in Rosmuc, I stayed until 1971, when I was transferred to Carrickmacross on promotion. Afterwards, I served in Sneem and Dingle before finally settling in Killarney. My registration number is 15626d.

## Joe Boyce, Retired Garda Sergeant, 16573E

Retired Sergeant Boyce wrote about his Garda career as follows:

*I was born in Carrigart, Co. Donegal. After leaving school, I worked on the family farm. In the summer of 1965, I saw an advert for the entrance exam to join An Garda Síochána. I sat the written exam in Letterkenny and was successful. I completed the medical exam in*

## Joe Boyce, iar-Sháirsint sa Gharda, 16573E

Mar seo a leanas an cuntas a thug an Sáirsint Boyce ar a shaol sna Gardaí:

*Garda Headquarters, Phoenix Park, on the 8th of March 1966 – the day Nelson’s Pillar was blown up. I reported to the Garda College, Templemore, in May 1966.*

*It was a long way from Carrigart to Templemore (340 kms) – I recall, having been home one weekend, ‘thumbing’ lifts back down to the Garda College; I eventually got there on the Sunday night after getting 18 ‘lifts’.*

*After completing my initial period of training, I was allocated to Oughterard in September 1966. At that time, it was a District Headquarters with a Superintendent and a 24-hour service. The station was located across the street from the Corrib Hotel on Main Street.*

*In June 1967, I was transferred to Leitir Mór Garda Station and, given that it was a Gaeltacht area, all correspondence, giving evidence in Court, etc. were done through the medium of Irish. During this time, I was sent on temporary transfer to Clones, Co. Monaghan,*

*Rinne mé an scrúdú scríofa i Leitir Ceanainn agus d’éirigh liom. Cuireadh scrúdú dochtúra orm i gCeannáras an Gharda i bPáirc an Fhionnuisce ar an 8 Márta 1966 – an lá céanna ar séideadh Nelson’s Pillar in aer. Tháinig mé i láthair i gColáiste an Gharda ar an Teampall Mór i mí Bealtaine 1966.*

*Tá an Teampall Mór i bhfad (340 km) as Carraig Airt – is cuimhín liom deireadh seachtaine amháin ar thug mé cuairt chun an bhaile agus bhí mé i muinín “chóras iompair na hordóige” ag fillleadh ar Choláiste an Gharda; shroich mé ceann scríbe sa deireadh oíche Dé Domhnaigh tar éis 18 ‘síob’.*

*Tar éis an tréimhse bunoiúna a chur isteach, aistríodh go hUachtar Ard mé i mí Meán Fómhair 1966. Ceanncheathrú Ceantair a bhí ann an tráth sin le Ceannfort i gceannas agus seirbhís 24 uair a chloig. Trasna na sráide ó óstán an Corrib Hotel ar an bPríomhshráid a bhíodh an bheairic.*

*I mí Meitheamh 1967, aistríodh go Beairic Leitir Móir mé agus ó tharla gur i gceantar Gaeltachta atá sin, is i nGaeilge a bhíodh an comhfhreagras uilig, an fhianaise uilig os comhair Cúirte, agus mar sin de. Lena linn sin, aistríodh go sealadach mé go Cluain Eois i gContae Mhuineacháin, ar dualgas teorann nuair a tharla ráig den ghalar Crúb is Béil. Chaith mé dhá mhí freisin ar dualgas sealadach i bPaiteagó, Co. Dhún na nGall, ‘i rith na dtrioblóidí’.*

*I mí Iúil 1970, aistríodh don Chlochán mé agus i mí Lúnasa 1971, go dtí Beairic na nGardaí ar an mBun Beag i gCo. Dhún na nGall (ceantar eile Gaeltachta). D’athraigh mé féin agus mo bhean, agus an iníon nuabheirthe a bhí againn, inár gcónaí ansin agus is ann a mhaireamar go ceann ocht mbliana agus is ann a rugadh triúr den chlann.*

*Fuair mé ardú céime go grád an tSáirsint i mí Dheireadh Fómhair 1978 agus aistríodh go*

*on border duties during the outbreak of 'Foot and Mouth Disease'. I also spent two months on temporary duties in Pettigo, Co. Donegal, during 'the troubles'.*

*In July 1970, I was transferred to Clifden Garda Station and in August 1971, I was transferred to Bunbeg Garda Station, Co. Donegal (another Gaeltacht area) and moved up there with my wife and newborn daughter. I spent eight years there where three of our children were born.*

*In October 1978, I was promoted to the rank of Sergeant and transferred to Burnfoot Garda Station, also in Co. Donegal, on border duty.*

*In February 1979, I was transferred to Rosmuc Garda Station in the Connemara Gaeltacht where we lived for five years and our two youngest children were born.*

*In September 1983, I transferred back to Oughterard – where my service had begun and was to finish. Oughterard was still a District Headquarters at this time, with a Superintendent, two Sergeants, approximately seventeen Gardaí and one civilian Garda staff.*

*In the early '90s, Salthill became the new District Headquarters with Oughterard Station partly being reduced to one Sergeant and five Gardaí.*

*I retired in June 2002 after 36 years' service, having thoroughly enjoyed working in An Garda Síochána. I met some wonderful people, both in An Garda Síochána and in the communities I worked in. I would do it all over again if that were possible.*

*Two of my sons and two daughters followed my footsteps by joining 'the force' as we referred to it and I also have two sons-in-law and a daughter-in-law who serve in An Garda Síochána.*

*Stáisiún na nGardaí i mBun na hAbhann, Co. Dhún na nGall mé ar dualgas teorann.*

*I mí Feabhra 1979, aistríodh go Beairic Ros Muc i nGaeltacht Chonamara mé agus chaitheamar cúig bhliana ag maireachtáil ansin agus lena linn sin a rugadh an bheirt is óige den chlann.*

*I mí Meán Fómhair 1983, aistríodh ar ais go hUachtar Ard mé – san áit amháin a tháinig tús agus deireadh le mo chuid seirbhíse. Bhí Ceanncheathrú Ceantair in Uachtar Ard i gcónaí an tráth sin le Ceannfort, beirt Sáirsintí agus isteach le seacht nduine dhéag de Ghardaí chomh maith le sibhialtach amháin ar an bhfoireann.*

*Go luath sna 1990, idí a rinneadh Ceanncheathrú an Cheantair de Bheairic Bhóthar na Trá agus íslíodh an líon foirne in Uachtar Ard go dtí Sáirsint amháin agus cúigear Gardaí.*

*Chuaigh mise ar pinsean i mí Meithimh 2002 tar éis 36 bliana seirbhíse. Bhain mé an-taitneamh as an saol oibre i mo Gharda. Casadh daoine iontacha orm, sa Gharda Síochána féin agus sna háiteanna a raibh mé ag obair iontu. Ba bhreá liom a bheith ag tabhairt faoi in athuair, dá bhféadfaí sin.*

*Tá beirt mhac liom agus beirt iníon a chuaigh isteach, mar a deirimid féin, 'san fhórsa' agus tá fir chéile beirt iníon liom agus bean chéile mic liom ina nGardaí freisin.*

## **An Ceannfort Pat Tierney a chuaigh ar scor as an gClochán**

I bPort an Chairrín in Uachtar Ard a rugadh an Ceannfort Pat Tierney sa bhliain 1936. Chuaigh sé sa Gharda Síochána an 12 Meitheamh 1957 agus 13225L an uimhir chláráithe a bhí aige. Go Droichead Átha a cuireadh ar dualgas ar dtús é, áit a raibh sé go ceann 9 mbliana. Cuireadh go dtí an tSnaidhm i gCo. Chiarraí, go Baile an Locha i gCo. Ros Comáin agus go dtí an Caisleán Riabhach ina dhiaidh sin é. Nuair a fuair sé ardú céime ina Chigire, aistríodh chuig an Rannóg Iompair é i gCeannáras na nGardaí sular aistríodh ansin go Port Láirge é. Ar ardú céime a fháil dó arís go grád an Cheannfoirt, bogadh go Dún Dealgan é sular thug sé a aghaidh siar arís go Mainistir na Búille agus ar deireadh go dtí an Clochán áit a ndeachaigh sé ar scor in 1996. Bhásaigh an Ceannfort Pat Tierney an 25 Eanáir 2017.

## **Superintendent Pat Tierney's last posting was in Clifden**

Superintendent Pat Tierney was born at Portacarron, Oughterard, in 1936. He joined An Garda Síochána on 12 June 1957 and was assigned the registered number of 13225L. His first posting was to Drogheda where he spent 9 years, followed by transfers to Sneem, Co. Kerry, Ballinlough, Co. Roscommon and then to Castlerea. Promotion to Inspector led to a transfer to the Transport Section of Garda HQ before a further re-assignment to Waterford. Further promotion to Superintendent led to a move to Dundalk before returning west to Boyle and finally to Clifden from where he retired in 1996. Superintendent Pat Tierney passed away on 25 January 2017.

## 14. Garda Síochána in Moycullen

Prior to the commencement of An Garda Síochána, there were, over the years, at least 44 RIC men stationed in Moycullen, with several marrying women in the area and making Moycullen their home (Table 1). In 1922, the RIC barracks was burned and the occupants were relocated to other nearby stations.

As the Civil War progressed, the National Army undertook local policing in accordance with national policy. The placement of the Civic Guard in the rural areas of the county did take time, so the army remained at their posts until replaced.

Sular cuireadh an Garda Síochána ar bun, bhí ar a laghad 44 duine de Chonstáblacht Ríoga na hÉireann a cuireadh ar lonnú i Maigh Cuillin agus bhí roinnt acu a phós bean as an áit agus a chuir fúthu i Maigh Cuillin (Tábla 1). Sa bhliain 1922, dódh beairic an RIC agus d'athraigh na constáblaí go dtí beairicí eile in aice láimhe.

De réir mar a bhí Cogadh na gCarad ag leanúint ar aghaidh, thug an tArm Náisiúnta faoin bpóilíneacht áitiúil de réir an pholasáí náisiúnta. Bhí roinnt mhaith ama gur cuireadh na Gardaí Sibhialta ar lonnú taobh amuigh de na bailte móra agus d'fhan an t-arm i mbun an chúraim go dtí gur tharla sin.

On 4 October 1923, the first members of the Civic Guard arrived in Moycullen.

One garda sergeant and three gardaí took over the policing of the area from the previous law enforcers, the RIC and the National Army. However, their arrival was not the most auspicious. There was much consternation and a lot of discussion around the problem of where to accommodate them, with correspondence back and forth between the various bodies: the Civic Guard Superintendent, the Board of Works, the Ministry of Home Affairs and An Garda Síochána. The issue of a permanent barracks was to go on for many years before the current barracks was finally built. It was not until September 1927 that the new Garda Barracks in Moycullen was ready for occupation. The Garda Barracks is still a fine building in the centre of the village today and continues to serve the community.

A number of Moycullen families have given service to An Garda Síochána over the years. Mark Lydon, who came from Dromabheag, Moycullen, joined An Taca Síochána in 1939

Níor socraíodh an cheist maidir le beairic bhuan go ceann na mblianta sular tógadh an bheiric atá ann anois faoi dheireadh. Níor tharla beairic nua na nGardaí réidh le húsáid i Maigh Cuilinn go dtí mí Meán Fómhair 1927. Áras breá beairic na nGardaí i lár an bhaile go fóill agus leas ag an bpobal as i gcónaí sa lá atá inniu ann.

Bhí roinnt teaghlaigh i Maigh Cuilinn a raibh dlúthbhaint acu leis na Gardaí le blianta anuas. Cheangail Mark Lydon, as Droma Bheag i Maigh Cuilinn, leis an Taca Síochána sa bhliain 1939

and later became a member of An Garda Síochána. He eventually retired as sergeant from Carrickmacross Garda Station, County Monaghan, in 1969. After his retirement, Mark returned to live in Dromabheag. Mark Lydon's sister, Julia, married Peter O'Halloran. Four of their children joined the force. Martin O'Halloran joined in 1954 and retired as a Superintendent in Naas, County Kildare, in 1988. Andrew O'Halloran joined in 1965 and died as a serving member at Tullyvin Garda Station, County Cavan, in 1996. John O'Halloran joined in 1958 and retired as a Superintendent in Sligo and Christy O'Halloran, who also joined in 1958, retired as a Sergeant from Monasterevin Garda Station, County Kildare, in 1989.

In 1972, Séamus Lydon, nephew of Mark Lydon, joined An Garda Síochána. Séamus completed his training in Templemore, County Tipperary and was stationed in Kiltimagh, County Mayo, carrying out routine Garda duties. Like many Gardaí who were seconded on temporary transfer to other places when the need arose, whether it be to help out at the Galway Races, An Fleadh

agus chuaigh sé isteach sa Gharda Síochána ina dhiaidh sin. Ina sháirsint a bhí sé i mbeairic Charraig Mhachaire Rois, Contae Mhuineacháin, nuair a chuaigh sé ar pinsean sa bhliain 1969. Tháinig Mark ar ais go Droma Bheag ina chónaí i ndiaidh dul ar pinsean. Phós Julia, deirfiúr le Mark Lydon, Peter O'Halloran. Chuaigh ceathrar dá gclann sna Gardaí. Sa bhliain 1954 a chuaigh Martin O'Halloran isteach agus bhí sé ina Cheannfort i Nás na Rí, Contae Chill Dara agus é ag dul ar pinsean sa bhliain 1988. Chuaigh Andrew sna Gardaí sa bhliain 1965 agus bhí sé ag fónamh i mbeairic na nGardaí i dTulaigh Bhinn, Contae an Chabháin nuair a fuair sé bás sa bhliain 1996. Chuaigh John leis na Gardaí sa bhliain in 1958 agus i Sligeach a bhí seisean ina Cheannfort nuair a chuaigh sé amach ar pinsean, an bhliain chéanna a chuaigh Christy sna Gardaí. Ina Sháirsint i mbeairic Mhainistir Eimhín, Contae Chill Dara, a bhí seisean ag dul ar pinsean dó sa bhliain 1989.

Sa bhliain 1972, chuaigh Séamus Lydon, mac dearthára le Mark Lydon isteach sa Gharda Síochána. Ar an Teampall Mór i gContae Thiobraid Árann a rinne Séamus a chuid traenála agus i gCoillte Mach, Contae Mhaigh Eo a thosaigh sé i mbun ghnáthdualgas an Gharda. Mar a chéile le Gardaí eile a bheadh ar iasacht le haistriú sealadach in áiteanna eile de réir mar a theastaíodh, más ag Rásaí na Gaillimhe, ag an bhFleadh Cheoil nó ar an teorainn, rinne Séamus fónamh freisin i mbun dualgas teorainn, obair a bhí níos gnóthaí agus níos casta go minic. Bhí Séamus ar lonnú i nDún Dealgan i gContae Lú agus i nDromad i gContae Liatroma i rith na tréimhse sin. Bhain a chuid dualgais lena linn sin "le cuidiú an dlí agus ord eagair a choinneáil i réim i ndlínse na tíre seo." I mí Meán Fómhair 1973, tháinig Séamus ar ais go Coillte Mach i gContae Mhaigh Eo ar ais i mbun a chuid dualgais ansin sula ndearna sé dualgas teorann an dá bhliain ina dhiaidh sin i Leifear i gContae Dhún na nGall. Tar éis na tréimhse sin, chuaigh Séamus i mbun na ngnáthdualgas

Ceol or border duties, Séamus found himself on border duty dealing with much busier and volatile situations. Séamus was stationed at Dundalk, County Louth, Dromad, County Leitrim, during this time. His duties at the time, he said, were to help “maintain law and order in our jurisdiction.” In September 1973, Séamus returned to Kiltimagh, County Mayo, before the following two years saw him on border duty at Lifford, County Donegal. After this, life settled down to normal duties and over the years he served in several stations, namely Kilkelly, County Mayo, An Daingean, County Offaly, until he returned to the county of his birth, Galway, where he was stationed first at Menlough, then Galway City (Eglinton Street) and finally at Oughterard from where he retired in 2011. Séamus said he had many happy memories of being a member of An Garda Síochána, “made wonderful friendships and served with great colleagues, some of whom I will never forget” and equally important was “being part of the community” he served.

Le himeacht na mblianta, rinne sé fónamh i mbeairicí éagsúla, i gCill Cheallaigh, Contae Mhaigh Eo agus sa Daingean i gContae Uíbh Fhailí sular tháinig sé ar ais go dtína chontae dúchais, Gaillimh, go Mionlach i dtosach agus go cathair na Gaillimhe ansin (Sráid Eglinton) sular athraigh sé go hUachtar Ard, an bheairic ina raibh sé ag dul amach ar pinsean dó sa bhliain 2011. Deir Séamus gur breá na cuimhní cinn atá aige ar a shaol sna Gardaí, cairdeas dlúth le daoine agus comhghleacaithe iontacha ag an obair, roinnt acu nach ligfidh sé i ndearmad go brách, agus, chomh tábhachtach céanna, an ceangal leis an bpobal a raibh sé ag freastal orthu.

Fear eile as Maigh Cuilinn a raibh dlúthbhaint aige leis an bhfórsa ab ea James Clancy, as Droma Bheag, a chuaigh isteach sa Gharda Síochána sa bhliain 1935. Sa gcoláiste i bPáirc an Fhionnuisce a rinne sé a chuid traenála agus cuireadh ar lonnú sa Choireán i gContae Chiarraí é agus i mBaile Locha Riach i gContae na Gaillimhe. Ansin a bhí sé ag dul amach ar pinsean dó tar éis fónamh ar feadh 31 bhliain. I rith na 1960idí agus tús na 1970idí, bhí beirt nianna le James Clancy, Séamus agus Tomás Clancy, a chuaigh isteach sna Gardaí. Faoin am sin, bhí an coláiste traenála ar an Teampall Mór i gContae Thiobraid Árann. I Sráid an Phiarsaigh i mBaile Átha Cliath a thosaigh gach aon duine den bheirt sular aistríodh Thomas Clancy go Cill Ríicill, Contae na Gaillimhe go dtí go ndeachaigh sé amach ar pinsean tar éis 31 bhliain seirbhíse sa bhliain 1997. Rinne Séamus fónamh i mbeairic Chill Rónáin in Árainn ach ba scéal trua a bhás i mí Aibreán 1976, gan é ach 27 mbliana d’aois.

Iníon le Maitiú Ó Súilleabháin, Martina Oates, a chuir an tuairisc staire seo ar fáil:

*I gCarraig Thiar, Corr na Móna, gar don teorainn idir Gaillimh agus Maigh Eo, a rugadh Mattie Ó Súilleabháin ar an 17 Eanáir 1926. Ba é an tríú duine clainne é sa teaghlach ina raibh cúigear buachaillí agus beirt chailíní. Chuaigh sé ar an scoil náisiúnta ina cheantar féin agus*

Another Moycullen name with deep connections to the force was that of James Clancy, from Dromabheag, who joined An Garda Síochána in 1935. He trained at Phoenix Park, before being posted to Waterville, County Kerry, and later to Loughrea, County Galway, where he eventually retired, having served in the force for 31 years. Later, in the 1960s and early 1970s, James Clancy's nephews, Séamus and Tomás Clancy, joined the force. By then the training college was based in Templemore, County Tipperary. Both young Gardaí served initially at Pearse Street, Dublin, before Thomas Clancy was transferred to Kilrickle, County Galway, until his retirement in 1997 after 31 years' service. Séamus Clancy was stationed at Kilronan Garda Station on the Aran Islands, but he sadly passed away in April 1976 at the young age of 27 years.

The following has kindly been provided by Mattie O'Sullivan's daughter, Martina Oates:

*Mattie O'Sullivan was born in Carraig Thiar, Corr na Móna on the Galway–Mayo border on 17 January 1926, the third eldest in a family of five boys and two girls. He was educated in the local primary school and went on to study for a further five years at the Christian Brothers in Ballinrobe, County Mayo. During his leaving certificate year, he did the entrance exam for An Garda Síochána and was successful in securing a place in the Phoenix Park, Dublin, in 1945 at the age of nineteen. The Phoenix Park was then the headquarters and training centre for all new recruits. Like many young men of his day, Mattie followed in the footsteps of his uncle, John Lowry (his mother's brother), who had been stationed in the Eglinton Street Barracks, Galway. Mattie often spoke of the tough training they received in Dublin and the strict discipline that was involved, but also spoke highly of all the wonderful colleagues that he met and would remain friends with him for seventy years. On leaving the depot, he was First Stationed in Rathangan, County Kildare, and would stay there for five years before*

*heading to Caherdaniel, Waterville in South Kerry for another three and a half years. It was the custom in those days that a Garda couldn't be stationed within 28 miles of his home place. The grá to return home to his home county of Galway came to fruition and he was stationed in Leitir Mór for over two and a half years. Everywhere he went he managed to make time to play Gaelic football. It was a great means of getting to know the locals and, very important for a Garda in those days, in helping with local knowledge. Mattie was very proud of his sporting achievements but most especially of the County Junior medal that he won with Micheál Breathnach's, Galway, in 1957.*

In the late 1950s, Mattie moved to Craughwell, County Galway, where he remained for six years. It was there he met his future wife, Kathleen. In 1961, Mattie moved again, this time to Moycullen. He would spend almost thirty years working here and reporting to Oughterard which was the Garda headquarters for the west of the county at that time. Mattie had a great love for Moycullen and this remained with him during his lifetime. When he came to Moycullen in 1961,

Athraíodh Mattie arís sa bhliain 1961, go Maigh Cuilinn an uair seo. Bhí i ndán dó beagnach deich mbliana fichead a chaitheamh ag obair ansin, ag tabhairt tuairiscí do bheairic Uachtar Ard, ceannáras na nGardaí in iarthar an chontae ag an am. Bhí an-luí ag Mattie le Maigh Cuilinn agus níor fhuaireadh sin ar feadh a shaoil. Nuair a tháinig sé go Maigh Cuilinn sa bhliain 1961, bhí an Sáirsint John Crofton i gceannas agus triúr Gardaí eile san áit, Liam Hoare, Con Gallagher agus Barney Sweeney. Ní raibh dhá bhliain caite sula bhfuair Liam Hoare ardú céime a thug go Baile Átha an Rí é i gContae na Gaillimhe agus sula ndeachaigh Barney Sweeney i mbun oibre ar an gCeathrú Rua i gContae na Gaillimhe. D'athraigh Con Gallagher go Bóthar na Trá agus bhí John Crofton imithe amach ar pinsean. Bheadh Mattie ar an aon Gharda amháin i mbeairic Mhaigh Cuilinn go ceann seacht mbliana is fiche. Bhí Maigh Cuilinn suaimhneach go maith agus is beag coir a tharla ann. Ba dheas an rud cónaí ar bhruach Loch Coirib agus d'fhéad sé iascaireacht a dhéanamh – an caitheamh aimsire ab fhearr uilig leis. I nGaeilge a bhíodh an obair uilig á déanamh agus na nótaí uilig á scríobh i mbeairic na nGardaí i Maigh Cuilinn agus bhí labhairt na Gaeilge ar a thoil ag Mattie.

Sergeant John Crofton was in charge along with three other Gardaí, Liam Hoare, Con Gallagher and Barney Sweeney. Within two years, Liam Hoare was promoted to Sergeant and moved to Athenry, County Galway, while Barney Sweeney took up a new position in An Ceathrú Rua, County Galway. Con Gallagher moved to Salthill and John Crofton had now retired. Mattie would remain as the only Garda in the barracks for the next 27 years. Moycullen was a relatively quiet place with little crime. Living on the shores of Lough Corrib was idyllic; he enjoyed fishing – his greatest pastime. In Moycullen Garda Station, all of the work and records was trí Ghaeilge and Mattie was very fortunate to have excellent spoken Irish. He always conversed trí Ghaeilge with the residents of the Moycullen townlands of Sliabh an Aonaigh, Pilagh, Thullnаноone and na Tamhnacha Beaga.

His handwriting was very distinctive and complimented by many, but particularly by his superiors over the years in service. Mattie managed to police the area as best he could and felt that a few words in the ear, or the verbal warnings, worked much better than summons and prosecutions. Most definitely, he was known as a very fair man in the locality and within the width and breath of Connemara. Mattie had 44 years of service in An Garda Síochána. He retired in 1989 and went on to have many more enjoyable years after his retirement. His legacy outlived him as there are many people who still speak highly of him to this day. His son, Senan O'Sullivan, would follow in his footsteps and joined the Garda force in 1983, later serving as a Detective in Limerick for 30 years. Mattie was a proud Galway man with a great love of his people, his job, his area and his family. He passed away peacefully on 17 June 2012.

Some of our local gardaí have distinguished themselves in many different ways.

Moycullen Garda Ray Lyons served with the United Nations in Sarajevo in 1995.

Gardaí Peter Folan, Kevin McDonagh and Martin Costello also served in Moycullen in recent years with Garda Eoghan Ó Cadhain the current member.

Tá mac leis, Senan O'Sullivan, sna Gardaí ón mbliain 1983. Bhí seisean 30 bliain i Luimneach, ina Gharda i dtosach agus ina bhleachtaire ina dhiaidh sin. Gaillimheach go smior a bhí i Mattie Ó Súilleabháin a raibh an-ghean aige ar a dhream, ar a chuid oibre, ar an gceantar agus ar a theaghlach. Cailleadh ar a shuaimhneas é an 17 Meitheamh 2012.

## 15. An Garda Síochána Gort

The following is a brief overview of the policing history of Gort as compiled on the occasion of the refurbishment of Gort Garda Station in 1997.

A Chief Constabulary Police Station, along with a detachment of Revenue Police, had been in existence in Gort since the early 1800s and there had been a Bridewell in the town since 1814, while the Courthouse was erected in the Square in 1815. The Constabulary were first situated at Barrack Street and later at Georges Street. In 1867, having been reorganised as the Royal Irish Constabulary (RIC), they were installed in the old

infirmery, which had been custom-built for the soldiers in the Barracks.

Immediately prior to the arrival of the first Gardaí in Gort, law and order had been maintained by Captain Hession of the National Army.

The newly-formed Civic Guard arrived in Gort on 27 October 1922 and the first Sergeant was William Hogan. The *Connaught Tribune* reported on 5 November 1922:

*nine members of the Civic Guard arrived at the Courthouse at Gort and took up residence there. The old Barracks at Georges Street, vacated by the RIC several years ago, has been inspected with a view to occupation by the Guards.*

The *Connaught Tribune* later reported on 12 December 1924:

*Superintendent English with a Sergeant and six Guards have been added to the complement at Gort; the extra forces arrived on Monday.*

The *Connaught Tribune* on 26 December 1925 further reported:

*Assistant Commissioner Coogan visited Gort Barracks, inspected and examined Gardaí mobilised from within the area. He complimented the Officers and the men on their appearance and in their answering and informed them he was particularly pleased with the Gort Unit. He noted two of the town quota for their efficient answering.*

Garda Tommy McGovern, a native of Drumshanbo, County Leitrim, joined An Garda Síochána in August 1924 and arrived at Gort Garda Station in April 1929. When interviewed in 1997 by Garda Christy Moran and Garda Mick Harte of Gort Garda Station, he gave a fond account of his time in Gort. He described the Sergeant of the time as an authoritarian type, stating that everybody did as they were told. He clearly remembered the morning

inspection when, at 09:00, all members lined up for examination by the Sergeant on legal matters. He explained how one member had to work a 24-hour tour as Barrack Orderly, sleeping in the Day Room to ensure the phone, should it ring, would be answered and how Gardaí at that time were given two days leave per month, usually at the bequest of the Sergeant. Duties at the time involved Wandering Animals, School Attendance and Dog Licences.

During a Licencing matter on 29 September 1928, Sergeant Breen informed the Court that there was a population of 1,216 people in the town of Gort. There were also 34 Public Houses in the town, which amounted to one public house for every 36 persons.

At Gort District Court on 12 September 1931, John Hennelly was summoned by Sergeant Gallagher for Careless Driving of a motorcycle. The Sergeant informed the Court that the Defendant had driven along the street with both

hands off the handlebars while adjusting his goggles. The Defendant deposed that there was nobody on the street and that he was going slowly. He further stated that he took his hands off the handlebars to adjust his goggles and that his machine was only capable of doing 20 miles per hour. The Justice, cautioning the Defendant, told him to try this stunt riding somewhere else than on the streets of Gort.

The retirement of Garda Thomas Burke, Gort, after twenty-five years of service, was recorded in the *Connacht Tribune* of 12 November 1949, with the article outlining his “adventurous career”

under the heading “Old-I.R.A. Man Retires from The Gardaí.” Burke had joined the IRA in 1917, taking part in ambushes with the Mid-Tipperary Flying Column, for which he served some time in Limerick Jail. While later breaking the terms of his probation, he was captured by a group of British soldiers who took him to a wood to beat him, dress him in a British uniform and tie him to a tree. After robbing Burke, the soldiers “loosed a volley at him, wounding him in two places.” Burke recovered and later served with the Treaty forces and joined the Corps of Military Police in March 1922. Burke’s activities did not end there: “On 11th September 1923, he jumped a moving train at the Broadstone and, unarmed, captured an armed robber.” He joined An Garda Síochána in March 1924 and served most of his twenty-five years in stations in East Galway (Ahascragh, Mountbellew, Loughrea, Craughwell and Gort).

Sergeant Gerry Sheehan joined An Garda Síochána in 1965, his first posting being Gort Garda Station. At that time, younger members still lived in the Barracks. He recalled that Police Duties were lectured every Tuesday and Thursday morning by the Sergeant in Charge. The 24-hour Station Orderly tour was still in existence, town patrol was a regular duty and motor vehicles were rare which, due to the state of the roads at the time, was just as well. Leave was still limited to two days a month and again at the discretion of the Sergeant. Sergeant Sheehan served under a number of Superintendents during his service in Gort. His last Superintendent was Paul Mockler, a Roscommon man who himself had also started his career in An Garda Síochána as a young Garda in Gort.

In 1997, the Station at Barrack Street was refurbished, accommodating at that time a Superintendent, two Sergeants, 18 Gardaí and one Civilian Clerk. There were also a further two Sergeants and six Gardaí attached to the other stations in the Gort District, namely Shanaglish, Kilchreest, Craughwell, Kilcolgan, Ardahan and

The refurbished Gort Garda Station reopened on the 4 April 1997 and was officially opened by the Minister for Justice Nora Owen (“Minister opens €300,000 Gort Garda Station”, *Connacht Tribune*, 04.04.1997). ## 16. Bookeen Garda Barracks

The Garda Station at Bookeen was a renovated RIC Station that had been destroyed by fire during the War of Independence. It was first occupied by An Garda Síochána on 15 October 1924.

(Many of these first Gardaí, when deployed to their Barracks across the country, encountered this same issue in finding their Barracks having been burned down during the previous months of the

War of Independence. The irony in some cases was that some of these new Gardaí were previously actively involved in the War of Independence and responsible for the burning of these Barracks they were now expected to occupy).

The owner of the property, Major Denis Bowes Daley of Dunsandle, Athenry, leased it to the State for an annual rent of £30, which was reduced to £25 in 1929, possibly due to the Station Party's constant complaining about the condition of the building.

The building had six rooms, a kitchen, dayroom, Sergeant's Office, two bedrooms and a cell.

Outside was a fuel store, cycle shed, lavatory, back yard and garden at the front. The Barracks was in constant need of repair.

The population of the sub-District at the time was 1,394, all residing within an area of 17,003 acres.

Sergeant Joseph Quinn from County Leitrim, an Irish speaker, was the first member in charge to arrive in 1924 along with a Garda Francis McCloskey, a native of County Down. In 1925, Garda John Enright, from Limerick, Garda Pat Byrne from Roscommon and Garda Richard Drew from Cork arrived. Sergeant Quinn was succeeded by Sergeant John Nolan from Cork in 1926 and Sergeant Francis McGloin from Sligo then took over in 1927, when Garda Martin Lanigan from Tipperary also arrived. The Station Party would never have been greater than 1 Sergeant and four Gardaí throughout, with some of these members replacing others.

On 8 March 1926, the Sergeant reported having difficulty in keeping a cook for the Station Party owing to the state of the kitchen. These Barrack Servants were usually women of mature years with their pay and the cost of the food being paid directly by the men themselves.

During those early years An Garda Síochána had very strict regulations governing marriage. All Guards had to get permission to marry. No Guard could marry a woman if there was any doubt as to her ‘moral’ character. The Sergeant had to send a confidential report to the Commissioner concerning her suitability and the member in question had to prove that he had at least £60 at his disposal. This was a considerable amount considering that the Garda rate of pay was £3-10-0 (£3.50) per week, rising to £4-15-0 after 22 years. This regulation remained in place until 1950.

In 1937, Mr Daly, the landlord, stated that he wished to sell the Barracks to the State but the State rejected his offer due to the condition of the building and the question of closing down the Barracks again arose. In support of keeping the Barracks open, the agrarian trouble in the Athenry District during the previous years was highlighted.

On 26 July 1939, an application was made for the provision of an ablution room for use by the Station Party which at that time consisted of 1 Sergeant and 3 Gardaí (all single men), as the only facility available for washing and shaving was in the kitchen.

On 1 October 1940, the Barracks received its first telephone. The local exchange was ‘Loughrea 16’ and there was direct contact with the District Headquarters at Athenry after hours.

The duties of the Gardaí at Bookeen fell in to two categories, police and non-police. The former involved the prevention and detection of crime, as with any Police force, and the latter involved local Gardaí carrying out a plethora of local administrative duties on behalf of the State such as agricultural statistics. Agrarian issues, illicit distillation, licensing laws and crimes against persons and property were the main areas of duty for the Gardaí.

The daily patrol was an integral part of the Guard's life, the countryside being patrolled by bicycle, with most patrols involving distances of 12 to 18 miles per day. These cycle patrols invariably involved visits of a social or professional nature to houses along the route. In those years, the country roads frequently took their toll on the Garda's bicycle and many ended up walking miles back to their Barracks. On their return, graphic accounts of their patrol and the duties performed were entered in the patrol book. In some cases, the accounts were subject to the 'imagination' of the Garda involved.

There were 4 crimes committed in the Bookeen Sub-District between 1948 and 1953, while there was no crime at all in the Athenry Sub-District.

Most of the Guards were big stocky men, usually friendly and well respected locally. People would say at that time that the Guards had a great life with not much to do considering most of the country people were harmless. An odd stroll or cycle through the District or a knock on a pub door now and again was all that was needed to keep them in tow. The people always maintained that it was an up and coming job with a free uniform and good pension at the end of your days. They possessed enormous powers to stop people, ask questions, take names and addresses and bring people to Court. If a person was caught without a light on his bike, he would be the talk of the parish. Being pulled in and having one's name written down in the big book in the Barracks carried almost the same stigma as having it read from the altar.

The Bookeen Sub-District increased in size in 1955, when the Barracks at Gurteen closed on 25 November. This resulted in an extra 357 citizens, 67 farms, 4,312 acres of land, 2 schools and 1 pub being added to the area to be patrolled.

Bookeen Garda Barracks was finally closed in the late 1970s with the Sub-District divided between the neighbouring Loughrea, Athenry and Kiltulla Garda Stations.

Sa chás go mbeirfí ar dhuine gan solas ar a rothar, bhíodh a ainm i mbéal an phobail. Bhí sé chomh tromchúiseach céanna, beagnach, a bheith stoptha ag an nGarda agus d'ainm a bheith scríofa sa leabhar mór sa mBeairic is a bheadh sé d'ainm a léamh amach ón altóir.

## 17. Historical Aspects (Galway Gardaí)

The Civic Guard was formed following a meeting in the Gresham Hotel in Dublin on 9 February 1922. General Richard Mulcahy chaired the meeting and among those present was Michael Collins. By March 1922, there were requests from local authorities across the country for Guards to be posted in the various towns. While uniformed Guards appeared at the funerals of Arthur Griffith and Michael Collins in 1922, this was an exception as the general issue of uniforms did not occur until the end of that year.

On 21 February 1922, Patrick Joseph Kerrigan arrived at the Royal Dublin Society Showgrounds and became the first Civic Guard to be enlisted in the new force. Kerrigan was born on 12 September 1892 in Westport, County Mayo.

The first Commissioner of The Civic Guard was Michael Staines (1885-1955), being appointed on 10 March 1922. Subsequently, he became the first Commissioner of An Garda Síochána na hÉireann. Staines was born in Newport, County Mayo. He was a former member of the Irish Republican Brotherhood, served as Quartermaster General in the GPO during the 1916 Easter Rebellion and was interned in Frongoch Internment Camp along with his fellow insurgents. In his statement at the inception of the force, Staines stated: "The Garda Síochána will succeed, not by force of arms or numbers, but by their moral authority as servants of the people." Staines only served for a short period and was replaced by Eoin O'Duffy in September 1922.

The Civic Guard arrived in Galway on 25 September 1922, when a party of twenty-five Guards arrived in the city to take up duty. They were first stationed in the Galway County Club, Eyre Square, as repair work was being carried out on the old Constabulary Barracks at Eglinton Street. It had been burnt down by Irregulars in July of that year at the outbreak of the Civil War. The Guards remained in the County Club for almost a year until the station in Eglinton Street had been restored.

The Guards were a welcome sight for most citizens as, apart from the threat from Civil War factions, there were also some cases of disorder associated with drink in the city prior to the Guards' arrival. In some cases, unscrupulous people had been walking into shops and openly stealing as there was no law enforcement present around the city.

The National Army were in the city, stationed in the Railway Hotel, Eyre Square, but they were sometimes reluctant to take on policing duties.

Ba é Michael Staines (1885-1955) an chéad Choimisinéir a bhí ar na Gardaí Sibhialta, agus ceapadh é an 10 Márta 1922. Ina dhiaidh sin, bhí sé mar an Chéad Choimisinéir ar Ghardaí Síochána na hÉireann. Rugadh Staines i gCathair na Mart, Contae Mhaigh Eo. B'iarchomhalta é de Bhráithreachas Phoblacht na hÉireann, bhí sé i mbun seirbhíse mar Mháistir Ceathrún Ginearálta in Ard-Oifig an Phoist le linn Éirí Amach na Cásca 1916 agus rinneadh é a imtheorannú i gCampa Géibhinn Frongoch in éineacht lena chomhghleacaithe a bhí páirteach san Éirí Amach. 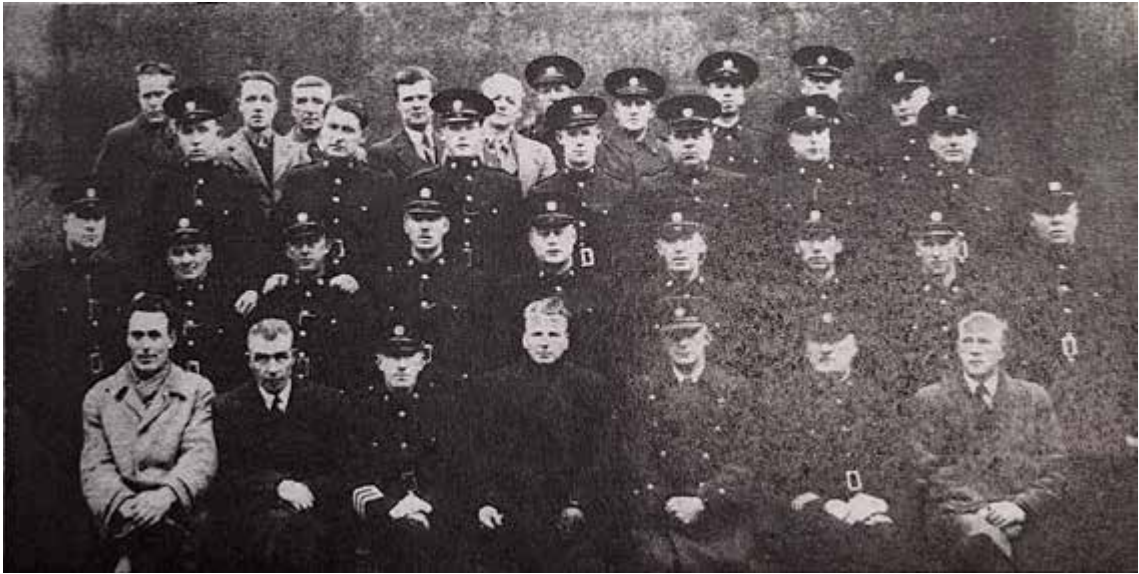

The new police force immediately set about enforcing the licensing laws and maintaining public order and decorum in the city. Another duty taken on by the Civic Guard at that early stage was dealing with poitín distillers and combatting the sale of this illicit spirit.

At the Galway Races the Civic Guard was also on duty, involved in ‘traffic control’, even in those early years and, of course, chasing down the ‘three-card-trick-men’ who were ready to relieve unwary punters of their few pounds.

An early County Report in May 1923 mentions that one of the best achievements of the fledging Irish Government was the formation of the Civic Guard. While there were problems in some areas, it stated that the force was welcomed in places such as Athenry, Craughwell, Moylough, Tuam and many other towns across the county. The force introduced day and night cycle patrols and this gave some degree of security to people living in these areas. The results were obvious in what was described as the now “peaceful and well-

ordered” countryside. The laws were enforced fairly, including by those governing alcohol, to such an extent that most publicans demonstrated a complete readiness to comply. Courts began functioning regularly in areas controlled by the Civic Guard. It was said that the Guards themselves, through their tact and courtesy, gained the respect of many people across the city and county.

On 8 August 1923, the Civic Guard was renamed An Garda Síochána na hÉireann (Guardians of the Peace of Ireland). An Garda Síochána is Ireland’s national police force ever since.

Although the Civil War officially ended in May 1923, some places experienced continued trouble.

Chuir an fórsa póilíneachta nua tús leis na dlíthe ceadúnúcháin a fhorfheidhmiú láithreach agus thug faoin ord poiblí agus dea-iompar a choinneáil sa gcathair. Ar dhualgas eile ar thug na Gardaí Sibhialta faoi ag na luathchéimeanna sin bhí déileáil le lucht déanta poitín agus dul i ngleic le díol an phoitín.

Bhí na Gardaí Sibhialta ar dualgas ag Rásaí na Gaillimhe freisin, bhí siad páirteach i ‘smachtú tráchta’, fiú sna luathbhlianta sin, agus, ar ndóigh bhí siad ag dul sa tóir ar na daoine siúd a bhí “i mbun na cleasaíochta” agus a bhí réidh i gcónaí le gealltóirí neamhairdeallacha a robáil.



# An Garda Síochána

In October 1923, a number of robberies and raids took place, which were even condemned by the Republican Party as it had ordered its men to cease all armed activities. Nevertheless, some ‘diehards’ continued and at times placed the Gardaí in great danger.

In the local newspapers, reports emphasised the courage of unarmed Gardaí going about their duty, protecting life and property on a daily basis. One such report praised the performance of the “unarmed” Gardaí facing difficult circumstances. The concept of unarmed Gardaí was highlighted as an “attempt – a courageous attempt and one we believe will ultimately justify itself to appeal to the finer instincts of the Irish people.”

By 1926, there were 63 Garda Stations throughout Galway City and county and it seems they were already building up “splendid traditions and solid relationships.”

## Tragedy at Steamer’s Quay

One of the saddest episodes for the Gardaí in Galway must be the drowning tragedy that occurred on Thursday, 18 January 1934. This was when a car in which two members of the force, along with two civilians, were travelling, skidded into the water at Steamer’s Quay, Galway. Their ill-fated journey began earlier that day at Maam and the tragedy occurred on the return trip. They were travelling in a 1929 green Ford Fordor car.

One of the Gardaí concerned was Sergeant Patrick Forde (5802), aged 28 of Maam Garda Station. He was married and had two children. He was born on 19 January 1904 at Nutgrove, Tynagh, Loughrea, County Galway. He previously worked in farming and he joined An Garda Síochána on 27 June 1924. He had also served in the Irish Volunteers (1919-1921). He had nine years’ service at the time of the accident, having been promoted to Sergeant on 1 March 1927. He had also served at Ballymote, Mohill, Fivemilebourne and Barnaderg.

Forfheidhmíodh na dlíthe go cothrom, lena n-áirítear na dlíthe siúd a bhí ag rialú alcóil, chomh maith leis sin léirigh formhór na dtábhairneoirí ullmhacht iomlán ó thaobh na ndlíthe a chomhlíonadh. Thosaigh na cúirteanna ag feidhmiú ar bhonn rialta i gceantair a bhí faoi stiúir na nGardaí Sibhialta. Dúradh gur bhain na Gardaí Sibhialta iad féin, trí stuaim agus cúirtéis a léiriú, meas na ndaoine amach ar fud na cathrach agus an chontae.

An 8 Lúnasa 1923, athraíodh ainm an Gharda Sibhialta go Garda Síochána na hÉireann (Caomhnóirí na Síochána in Éirinn). Is é an Garda Síochána fórsa náisiúnta póilíneachta na hÉireann riamh ó shin.

Cé gur tháinig an Cogadh Cathartha chun críche go hoifigiúil i mí na Bealtaine 1923, lean an trioblóid ar aghaidh i roinnt áiteanna. I mí Dheireadh Fómhair 1923, tharla roinnt robálacha agus ruathar, a ndearna an Páirtí Poblachtach féin cáineadh orthu, mar go raibh ordú tugtha acu dá gcuid fear deireadh a chur leis na gníomhaíochtaí armtha go léir. Mar sin féin, lean roinnt daoine ‘diongbháilte’ ar aghaidh agus chuir na Gardaí i gcontúirt mhór uaireanta.

Cuireadh béim i nuachtáin áitiúla ar chrógacht na nGardaí nach raibh aon airm á n-iompar acu agus iad i mbun a gcuid dualgas, ag cosaint beatha agus maoine ar bhonn laethúil. Tugadh moladh i dtuairisc amháin den chineál sin ar fheidhmiú Gardaí “gan arm” a raibh cúinsí thar

Another victim was Garda Michael Joseph Kennelly (1408), aged 38, also stationed at Maam. He was one of the founding members of the force and had the distinction of being among the first members of the force to arrive in Galway on 25 September 1922. He was born on 26 January 1896 at Ahalahana, Newtownsandes, County Kerry. A farmer, he had served from 1916-1922 in the 8th Battalion, Kerry No. 1 Brigade and joined An Garda Síochána on 30 May 1922. Garda Kennelly also served as a Garda in Galway, Monivea, Derrybrien, Letterfrack, Leenane, Clifden and Killimor. He had 11 years' service at the time of his death. Garda Kennelly was married with one son at the time of his death, with his second son born posthumously.

The four travellers arrived in Galway City at about 8 pm and the car and its occupants were seen on the Salmon Weir Bridge. It seems that the occupants may have decided to travel back to Maam via Headford. The Gardaí could then travel onto Maam, but this was only a theory that some people suggested at the time.

The car travelled towards Woodquay and turned left at the small park leading to the

Tharla an tragóid nuair a sciorr an carr ina raibh beirt chomhaltaí den fhórsa chomh maith le beirt shibhialtach ag taisteal, isteach san uisce ag Cé na nGaltán, Gaillimh. Chuir siad tús lena dturas míchinniúnach níos túsce an lá sin sa Teach Dóite agus tharla an tragóid ar an mbealach ar ais. Bhí siad ag taisteal i Ford Fordor uaine 1929.

Is iad na Gardaí a bhí i gceist, an Sáirsint Patrick Forde (5802), 28 mbliana d'aois ó Stáisiún Gardaí an Tí Dhóite. Bhí sé pósta le beirt leanaí. Rugadh Patrick an 19 Eanáir 1904 i gCeathrú an Notaigh, Tíne, Baile Locha Riach, Contae na Gaillimhe. Bhí Patrick i mbun na feirmeoireachta roimhe sin agus chuaigh sé isteach sa Gharda Síochána an 27 Meitheamh 1924. Bhí sé in Óglaigh na hÉireann freisin (1919-1921). Bhí naoi mbliana seirbhíse curtha isteach aige nuair a tharla an timpiste, agus ardú céime faighte aige go grád an tSáirsint an 1 Márta 1927. Bhíodh sé ar dualgas freisin i mBaile an Mhóta, Abhainn an Chartúin agus i mBerna Dhearg.

Bhí an Garda Michael Joseph Kennelly (1408), 38 mbliana d'aois, i stáisiún an Tí Dhóite freisin. Bhí sé ar dhuine de bhunaitheoirí an fhórsa agus bhí sé i measc na gcéad chomhaltaí den fhórsa a tháinig go Gaillimh an 25 Meán Fómhair 1922. Rugadh é an 26 Eanáir 1896 in Átha Leathana, Maigh Mheáin, Contae Chiarraí. Feirmeoir ab

Waterside and Steamer's Quay. They had possibly momentarily lost their sense of location and direction as they travelled, unknowingly, towards Steamer's Quay. One must remember that these people were unfamiliar with the area. They may have mistakenly thought that the Galway Clifden Railway Bridge over the River Corrib near Steamer's Quay was the one spanning the Headford Road. There was a lack of street lighting and the area was an open quay with no barriers. The night was dark with a south-westerly wind, occasional showers and little fog except in marshy areas of the river. They may well have mistaken the sheen of the water for the road ahead.

It appears that the vehicle plunged into the water at the end of the pier. Sadly, all four occupants were drowned in this terrible accident. The tragedy occurred within ear-shot of a dance that was being held in the nearby Commercial Boat Club.

In view of the long journey, the Gardaí were not expected in Maam until very late. However, when they didn't arrive home the following morning, relatives, friends and colleagues at Maam Station became alarmed. A search for the car began on Friday morning and included areas around Lough Corrib. The search continued and Gardaí from Eglinton Street Barracks searched the Waterside area on Saturday morning. At Steamer's Quay, they noticed marks going towards the end of the pier. The car was then found lying on its side in about seven feet of water with the unfortunate occupants still inside the vehicle.

As news of the tragedy spread, hundreds of people gathered at the scene. At the inquest that followed, the jury returned a verdict of accidental death by drowning. The entire city and county were shocked and votes of sympathy poured into Eglinton and Maam Garda Stations and the homes of the bereaved families.

D'fhéadfadh sé nach raibh a fhios acu cá raibh siad agus gur chaill ciall don treo ar feadh nóiméid agus iad ag taisteal, i ngan fhios dóibh féin is dócha, i dtreo Ché na nGaltán. Ní mór a thabhairt ar aird nach raibh aon eolas ag na fir seo ar an gceantar. D'fhéadfadh sé gur cheap siad, trí dhearmad, gurbh é Droichead Iarnróid na Gaillimhe an Chlocháin thar Abhainn na Gaillimhe in aice le Cé na nGaltán an droichead thar Bhóthar Áth Cinn. Bhí easpa soilse sráide ann agus ba ché oscailte gan bhacainní a bhí sa gceantar. ## Mill Street Garda Station

By the 1970s, the old barracks in Eglinton Street, which served the force for many years, had become antiquated and unsuitable as a modern Garda Station. Even renovations would not solve the problems as the station was very old and from another era of law enforcement. A new building was required and so it was decided to build a new station at Mill Street. In February 1986, An Garda Síochána finally closed the doors at Eglinton Street and moved their headquarters to the present location at Mill Street.

## Stáisiún Gardaí Shráid an Mhuilinn

Faoi dheireadh na 1970í, bhí an tseanbheairic ar Shráid Eglinton, ina raibh an fórsa le roinnt mhaith blianta, seanfhaiseanta agus ní raibh sé oiriúnach níos mó mar Stáisiún Gardaí nua-aimseartha. I mí Feabhra 1986, dhún na Gardaí doirse stáisiún Shráid Eglinton den uair dheiridh agus d'aistrigh siad go dtí an cheanncheathrú nua sa suíomh reatha ar Shráid an Mhuilinn.



# An Garda Síochána

When the remains of the victims were released for burial, there were emotional scenes. The coffins of both Gardaí were covered with the Tricolour and Garda flags. High ranking Garda officers were present along with the members of Galway Urban Council and many other organisations.

Many years have rolled by since the dreadful accident and the tragedy was almost forgotten, but on 25 September 2022, as part of the Galway Divisional Garda Síochána Centenary Celebrations, a plaque was erected at the Commercial Clubhouse at Steamer's Quay by Gardaí from the Galway Division and the Garda Síochána Retired Members Association; relatives of those who lost their lives on the fateful date were also present at the unveiling.

## The Murder of Jerome O'Connor

On Thursday, 15 August 1974, Jerome O'Connor was shot dead during a botched robbery outside the Allied Irish Bank in Lynch's Castle. It was a death that shook the people of Galway to the very core – the murder of this wonderful man going about his business in the heart of the city.

Jerome was a married man, fifty-two years of age, who worked for Sisk Building Contractors. That morning, he went to the bank to collect the weekly wages for the employees. The driver parked outside the bank and Jerome went into the bank to collect the money.

As he emerged, carrying €1,557 in cash, he was confronted by two armed young men, one of them carrying a sawn-off shotgun. One of them tried to pull the bag from him, but Jerome resisted and the gun was discharged during the struggle. The result was fatal for Jerome, who died on the scene, and the attackers made off with the money.

The investigation into this crime was the most intensive Garda operation ever mounted in the Galway area. It came to a climax that weekend with the detention of ten people and the capture of arms caches in a number of city houses during the course of the three-day search.

Thug siad marcanna faoi deara ag Cé na nGaltán agus bhí na marcanna seo ag dul i dtreo dheireadh na cé. Fuarthas an carr ansin a bhí ar a taobh in thart ar sheacht dtroighe uisce agus bhí na fir fós istigh san fheithicil.

Dé réir mar scaip scéal na tragóide, bhailigh na céadta ar an láthair. Ag an gcoiste cróinéara ina dhiaidh sin, thug an giúiré an bhreith gur bás tionóisceach trí bhá a bhí i gceist. Bhí an chathair agus an contae ina n-iomláine faoi scamall an bhróin agus daoine ag cur a gcomhbhrón in iúl do na Gardaí i Stáisiún Shráid Eglinton agus an Tí Dhóite agus ag tithe na dteaghlach a bhfuair a ndaoine muinteartha bás.

Nuair a tugadh na coirp ar ais do na daoine muinteartha lena gcur, ba thruabhéalach an radharc a bhí ann. Bhí Bratach na hÉireann agus Bratach an Gharda Síochána ar chónraí na nGardaí. Bhí Oifigigh Ardchéimíúla an Gharda Síochána i láthair mar aon le comhaltaí de Chomhairle Uirbeach na Gaillimhe agus go leor eagraíochtaí eile.

Tá go leor blianta caite ó tharla an timpiste uafásach sin agus is beag nach raibh an tragóid ligthe i ndearmad, ach ar an 25 Meán Fómhair 2022, mar chuid de Cheiliúradh Céad Bliain Rannán Gharda Síochána na Gaillimhe, chuir na Gardaí Síochána ó Rannán na Gaillimhe agus Cumann an Gharda Síochána do Chomhaltaí ar Scor plaic suas ag an gClubtheach Tráchtála ag Cé na nGaltán; bhí daoine muinteartha na ndaoine siúd a bhásaigh an lá cinniúnach sin i láthair freisin nuair a nochtadh an phlaic.

The following Tuesday, “an unprecedented security screen” surrounded Galway Courthouse for the appearance of six men and one woman, charged in connection with the payroll robbery and killing of Jerome O'Connor.

On the second day of the trial, two of the defendants pleaded guilty to manslaughter and were each sentenced to 10 years penal servitude. The others received various sentences for their parts in the robbery that had been carried out by a gang with alleged links to the IRA.

## Dúnmharú agus lámhach

### Jerome O'Connor

An Déardaoin, 15 Lúnasa 1974, scaoileadh marbh Jerome O'Connor le linn robáil ar theip uirthi lasmuigh de Bhanc-Aontas Éireann i gCaisleán an Línsigh. Is bás a bhí ann a chuaigh i gcion go smior ar phobal na Gaillimhe – dúnmharú fir iontaigh a bhí i mbun a ghnó i gcroílár na cathrach.

Fear pósta ab ea Jerome, caoga a dó bliain d'aois a d'oisigh le Conraitheoirí Tógála Sisk. An mhaidin sin, chuaigh sé chuig an mbanc chun tuarastal seachtainiúil na n-oibrithe a bhailiú. Pháirceáil an tiománaí an carr taobh amuigh den bhanc agus chuaigh Jerome isteach sa mbanc chun an t-airgead a bhailiú.

Agus é ag teacht amach, agus £1,557 in airgead tirim á iompar aige, thug beirt fhear óga armtha aghaidh air agus bhí gránghunna teasctha ar iompar ag duine acu. D'fhéach duine de na fir leis an mála a bhaint de Jerome ach chuir Jerome ina choinne agus scaoileadh urchar le linn na streachailte. Bhí bás Jerome mar thoradh ar an ionsaí agus bhásaigh sé ar an láthair, agus thug na hionsaitheoirí na cosa leo leis an airgead.

Bhí imscrúdú na coire seo ar an imscrúdú ba mhó a rinne Gardaí na Gaillimhe riamh. Tháinig cúrsaí chun críche an deireadh seachtaine sin nuair a gabhadh deichniúr agus nuair a fuarthas taisec arm i roinnt tithe sa gcathair le linn an chuardaigh a mhair trí lá.

Bhí “slándáil nach bhfacthas a leithéid riamh cheana” thart timpeall ar Theach na Cúirte i nGaillimh an Mháirt dár gcionn nuair a tugadh seisear fear agus aon bhean amháin os comhair na cúirte agus nuair a cúisíodh iad i robáil an phárolla agus i ndúnmharú Jerome O'Connor.

Phléadail beirt de na cosantóirí ciontach i ndúnorgain an dara lá den triail agus gearradh 10 mbliana pianseirbhíse an duine orthu. ## 18. Policing in relation to the Gaeltacht and the Irish language

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When An Garda Síochána were first formed in 1922, approximately 10% of the population spoke Irish as their everyday language, mostly in regions on or near the western seaboard. Since this time, concerted efforts were made by subsequent Governments to revive the language. Various Garda Commissioners over the years were also to the forefront in this regard.

## 18. Póilíneacht maidir le lucht na Gaeltachta agus na Gaeilge

In 1923, 500 places were reserved for Irish speaking recruits to the force. Extensive recruiting campaigns in Gaeltacht areas met with little success for various reasons. From the late 1920s to the mid-30s, preferential treatment was given to Irish speaking recruits. Basic instruction in conversational Irish was also provided to all recruits in training to improve the situation.

In 1924, a number of anonymous public contributions emerged in some of the national newspapers which criticised the Gardaí and their lack of use of the Irish language, particularly in Gaeltacht regions. Such public discussion prompted a written reply to the issue by the then Commissioner, Eoin Ó Dubhthaigh, whose rebuttal was reprinted in the newspapers. The Commissioner outlined the levels of fluency in the current force and of the ongoing training and encouragement in the organisation to improve the level of Irish speaking (*Garda Síochána and Irish*, 12.12.1924).

He specifically responded to an anonymous critic (who went under the pen name of Taistealaidhe) who had negatively assessed the situation with Irish fluency in Galway county, saying:

*To date we occupy 62 stations in Co. Galway and, on looking over the personnel, I find that we have Irish speakers in Galway City (3 Sergeants and 2 Gardaí); Kilronan (1 Sergeant and 4 Gardaí); Spiddal (1 Sergeant and 3 Gardaí); Rosmuc (1 Sergeant and 3 Gardaí); Carraroe (1 Sergeant and 3 Gardaí); Lettermore (1 Sergeant and 3 Gardaí); Roundstone (1 Sergeant and 2 Gardaí); Kilconly and Menlough (1 Sergeant each); Corofin (3 Gardaí); Corrandulla and Cashel (2 Gardaí each); Ballinasloe, Claregalway, Ballymoe, Gort, Gorteen, Inveran, Bookeen, Dunmore, Clarinbridge and Barnaderg (1 Garda each); and yesterday, 6 Gardaí, who recently secured the Fáinne, were sent to Galway. In addition to above there are 50 men in the county, between Sergeants and Gardaí who, while not fluent*

‘Taistealaidhe’ responded to the rebuttal in the *Irish Independent* (To the Editor *Irish Independent*, 19.12.1924), stating:

*I do not doubt the Commissioner’s bona fides; I can only say that many of his Irish-speaking Gardaí have been very successful in concealing their knowledge of Irish from the inhabitants of the districts in which they are stationed. Given his background Commissioner O’Duffy was adamant that the newly formed force should be in the vanguard as regards the revival of the Irish language and was instrumental in setting up Conradh Gaelach an Gharda, a society to promote both the Irish language and culture as a whole in

the force. Garda periodicals *Iris an Gharda* and later *Guth an Gharda* regularly carried articles in the Irish language, actively encouraging the men to study the language.

Even in stations where the members were capable of conversing in Irish, official correspondence continued to be carried out in English. The lack of amenities and remoteness of many of the Gaeltacht Stations was an obstacle to both the policing of these areas and the promotion of the language. A Government Commission in as early as 1926 recommended that members who could carry out their duties in Irish should receive extra pay. The Government disagreed.

Gardaí in some stations continued to make their own arrangements to improve in the language. In certain Stations the Sergeant provided lessons, others employed teachers whom they paid for themselves. Some studied on their own or joined the local Gaelic Leagues. Competency in Irish later became a prerequisite for promotion.

Despite the efforts involved, progress was slow for a number of reasons. One being the fear of being posted to remote Gaeltacht stations. One member writing to the *Garda Review* at the time described his station as follows:

*The áras (station) is 4 miles from the nearest church, 8 miles from the nearest railway station, 20 miles from the nearest Doctor, 19 miles from the nearest District Court, 33 miles from the nearest District HQ and 36 miles from the nearest Divisional HQ. 99% of the people speak no English at all and there is no field for hurling or football.*

Other initiatives in the early years to improve the situation included a Linguaphone, with Irish records, being provided. Sadly, further efforts to officially promote the language involved a degree of compulsion from the authorities, leading to resentment on behalf of the members who had their duties to attend to.

In 1933, the *Irish Press* recorded the visit of a group of Gardaí from the Dublin branch of the Gaelic League to the Aran Islands (Visit to Aran, 05.06.1933). The group, consisting of two Inspectors, two Superintendents and fourteen Gardaí, travelled to the Islands for two weeks to acquire a “blas of the Irish Language.” The travelling party were met on their arrival in Galway by three Garda representatives, Superintendent Macken, Inspector Gaffney and Sergeant Morrisroe. The group visited Spiddal and Annaghdown before they departed to the Aran Islands.

In 1934, the Galway West Division was designated an all-Irish Division, with only men capable in the language stationed there. This reluctance in regard to the language persisted in the force and also in 1934, then Commissioner Eamon Broy persuaded the Government to pay an additional 7.5% to members based in Gaeltacht areas.

In December 1935, Commissioner Broy ordered members in all Irish speaking Districts to provide their evidence exclusively in Irish to the Courts. This led to controversy among certain members of the Judiciary and had to be relaxed later. In 1937, Irish was made compulsory for entry to An Garda Síochána.

Overall, the efforts to promote the language in the early years failed, with a Government Minister at the time stating that:

*there was no sense in making the Force bilingual when the rest of the country was not.*

Since the foundation of the force, Gardaí have been assigned to the following Gaeltacht Stations in the Galway West (Galway) Division: Úarán Mór, Leacht Seirse, An Ceathrú Rua, Cill Ronáin, Indreabhán, Maigh Cuilinn, Leitir Mór, Ros Muc, An Spidéal, Carna, An Mám and Sraith Salach.

The first Gardaí posted to An Ceathrú Rua in 1923 were as follows:

In September 1957, the *Connacht Tribune* reported on the preparations being made for the introduction of the “first one-man station” in Connemara, following the reduction of Leenane Garda Barracks to one Garda (Making Way For The First One-Man Garda Station, 07.09.1957). The article outlines that: “The Garda selected will be married and will reside in the barracks and will have the status of village constable.”

Fifty-one years later, an article in the *Connacht Tribune* noted the commencement of a “one-man protest” against the condition of his working conditions at the Lettermore Station (Garda’s protest over station in a wooden hut, 03.10.2008). Garda Seán Ó Curráin took the stand to object to the prefabricated building – described by Ó Curráin as “a wooden hut” - serving as the station

and refused to continue to work from there. The decision was taken to allow the Garda to work out of Rosmuc Station until alternative arrangements could be considered.

In 2021, in line with the Official Languages Acts, An Garda Síochána commissioned a special Fáinne Gaeilge (gold, silver and cupla focal), developed by Conradh na Gaeilge to further the efforts to increase the use of the Irish language. The goal of the initiative being to encourage all personnel to use whatever Irish they have and to provide an effective way for members of the public to identify Irish speaking personnel.

*Our focus is on strengthening our Irish language services through recruitment, training and promotion of the language in order to provide a policing service that supports communities and staff who wish to engage through the medium of Irish.*

## 19. Connemara Insights

A significant policing change that occurred in 2021, was that a full service in the Irish language was now available to the people of the Gaeltacht, although the Gardaí and the people often did not understand each other very well. Garda Headquarters decided to recruit staff from the various Gaeltachts of the country to serve the Irish speakers, but these Gardaí were not allowed to work in their home areas. This left many Gardaí with different dialects scattered across the west coast of the country.

In Carraroe there were the likes of Tim Malone from Ceann Trá, Co. Kerry, in Rosmuc, Charlie Friel from Donegal and Kerryman Pat Ferriter. In Lettermore there was a man from Chúil Aodha, Co. Cork, Seán Ó Cellaigh, or Sergeant Kelly as he was better known. Sergeant Kelly was very interested in the history of the Gardaí and he gathered a lot of information and lore while he served in the Ceantair na nOílean, Carna and later in the town of Clifden.

Sergeant Kelly had a good knowledge of the 'poitín industry' in the islands as he came from Derryancollin, in Cul Aodha, Cork, an area with a tradition of poitín-making.

Sergeant Kelly once relayed me stories of searches that he was involved in:

*A new boat was assigned to the Garda Station in Oughterard for poitín duties. It was late one particular afternoon when we visited an offshore island and arrived at a certain house.*

*I spotted the keg in the middle of the floor through the window. Among those present was an old woman and she sat on the bed covering the keg with her dress. She refused to get up and said we were not allowed to search her without a female Garda. Due to the tide and light conditions, we had to leave empty handed.*

*On a later occasion we made another 'raid' in the same area but as soon as we put to sea the bell in the church in Leitir Meallain rang to*

Bhí spéis thar na bearta ag an Sáirsint Kelly i stair na nGardaí agus bhailigh sé go leor eolais agus seanchais nuair a bhí sé ag obair i gCeantar na nOileán, i gCarna agus i mbaile an Chlocháin níos deireanaí.

Bhí cur amach maith ag an Sáirsint Kelly ar 'thionscal an phoitín' sna hoileáin mar gurbh as Derryancollin, i gCúil Aodha, Corcaigh é, ceantar lenar bhain traidisiún déanta poitín.

Rinne an Sáirsint Kelly cur síos uair amháin dom ar scéalta a bhain le cuardaigh ina mbíodh sé páirteach:

*Cuireadh bád nua do chúrsaí poitín ar fáil do Stáisiún na nGardaí in Uachtar Ard. Bhí sé deireanach go maith tráthnóna amháin nuair a thugamar cuairt ar oileán amach ón gcósta agus chuamar chomh fada le teach áirithe. Tríd an bhfuinneog chonaic mé an ceaig a bhí i lár an urláir. Bhí seanbhean ina measc siúd a bhí sa teach agus í suite ar an leaba agus an ceaig á chlúdach aici lena gúna. Dhiúltaigh sí teacht amach as an leaba agus ní raibh cead againn í*

*warn the islanders that we were on our way. This search was also unsuccessful and as a result of this, the Archbishop of Tuam ordered the church to be rededicated. Needless to say, it was difficult to catch the poitín makers in the act!*

In 1924, a Carraroe man paid dearly for his journey east when he was arrested by the Gardaí. This is how the *Irish Times* described the incident:

*Although in those early years the Gardaí had some trouble enforcing the law of the land they succeeded in doing this for the most part. The Garda Síochána barracks at Gortmore, Rosmuc was burned down at least four times in those early years; however, it has stood the test of time and it still standing.*

An Garda Síochána is held in high esteem by the Irish public and has gained a reputation around the globe as an independent, fair organisation that has stood by its core principles since its inception. I hope they will be showered with the same praise in the years to come.

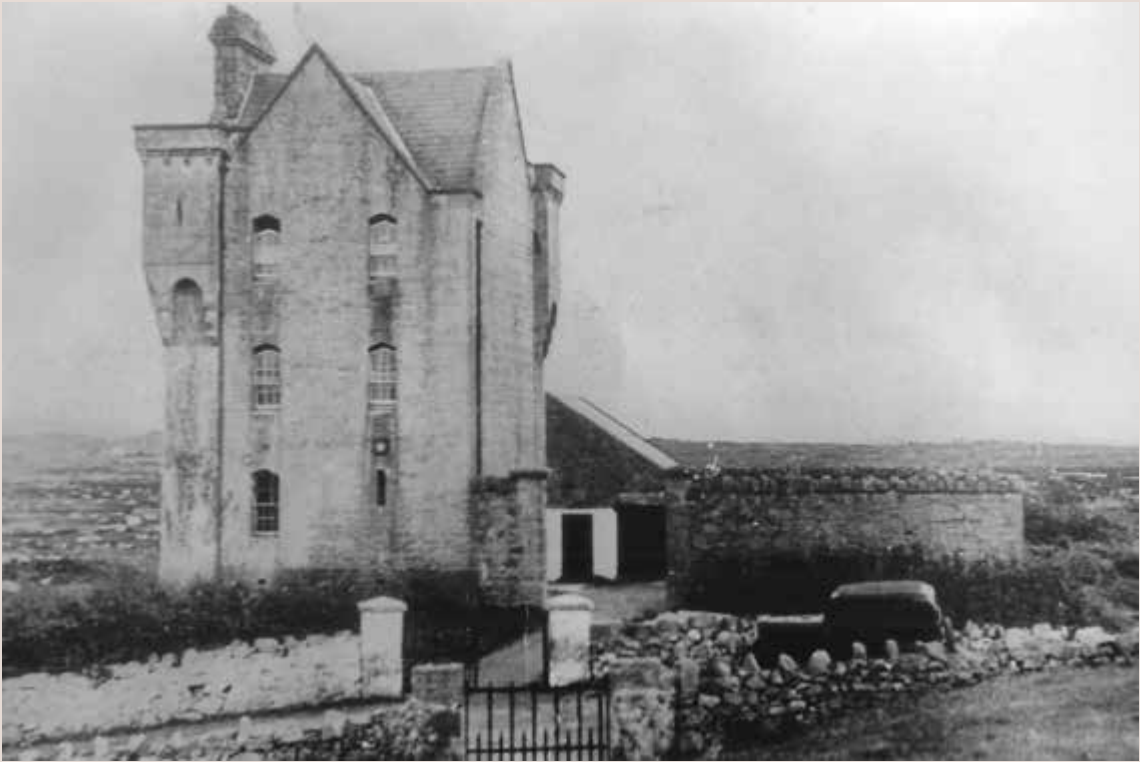

## 20. Garda Uniform

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The Garda uniform has recently undergone a change in style driven by necessity as regards operational practicality. The formal shirt and tie will be replaced by a more practical liveried polo-shirt and the trousers will be replaced by navy combats with extra pockets for day-to-day use. This will be the 5th change to the Garda uniform since the inception of the force.

## 20. Éide an Gharda

The original uniform of 1922, when eventually issued, consisted of a formal, high-collared tunic and shirts with detachable collars. Up to the issue of this uniform in sufficient numbers, the original members of the force were distinguishable only by their Garda caps.

It was not until 1952 that the first major change took place with the issue of an open-neck tunic with the Garda crests on the lapels, a style which remains with the force to this day for formal occasions. The old police helmet, up to that time

worn in Dublin and Cork, was withdrawn. This second issue of the uniform became known as the 'bulls-wool' as the material was stiff and notoriously hard to keep clean. The buttons were silver in colour and required regular polishing.

This 'bulls-wool' uniform was worn until 1987, when the material was changed to a lighter shade of blue with anodised gold buttons and insignia; the cap with the plastic peak was consigned to history. While impressive to look at, this uniform was still more appropriate for ceremonial duties on the parade ground rather than the realities of modern police work.

In 1991, the formal tunic was replaced for outdoor duty with a more functional patrol jacket in an attempt to provide both comfort and practicality for varying weather conditions. A NATO sweater was also introduced for the first time.

In 2005, the uniform was again updated, with the patrol jacket being changed to a shorter blouse style. Protective boots were also issued at this time. The fit of the patrol jacket was changed once more some years later and this is the uniform in use today. Stab vests were issued in 2007 to all members of the force.

Despite the changes to the uniform over the years, the Garda cap remained largely consistent in design, with only the material of the peak having been changed in 1987. In 2020, regulations were amended to allow certain members of the force to wear particular headgear associated with their religious and cultural beliefs. In 2025 base ball caps were issued for official use. Specialist Units such as Armed Support, Scenes of Crime, Mountain Bike, Motor-Cyclists and Public Order Units are issued with uniforms and equipment suited to their operational needs.

The first Garda Síochána Code in 1928 directed that “members on duty are to be clean and regular in their person, clothing and equipment. They are to be properly shaved with hair properly cut and dressed. Their buttons, handcuffs, truncheon and truncheon case are to be clean and polished.” Eventually, in 2021, Gardaí were permitted to wear beards.

## 21. Equipment

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Traditionally, four items of equipment are required for policing. Gardaí require something to see and be seen at night, a means of raising alarm, a weapon of defence and a method of restraining a prisoner. The Gardaí of 1922 and for many years were issued with dry battery lamps, a whistle, a truncheon and a pair of cumbersome 'D' handcuffs which would not have been a personal issue.

## 21. Trealamh

The modern equivalents of this equipment are various torches, a Tetra digital radio, a 16"ASP retractable baton and ASP hinged handcuffs.

The original truncheon (baton) had been a weapon of police forces in various forms for previous decades. It is effectively a 15" piece of hardwood, the weight of which depending on the type of wood used. It was carried in a leather case which hung from a leather belt on the tunic and later was carried in a special concealed baton pocket in the trousers. After many years and various trials, the baton was replaced by the ASP retractable baton in 2007, a telescopic baton carried overtly on the utility belt. In 2009, Gardaí were also issued with a canister of 'Oleoresin Capsicum' (O.C.) spray for personal protection. This piece of equipment is also carried on the utility belt.

The whistle has now been consigned to ceremonial use only but its original purpose was to assist the Garda raise the alarm and seek assistance when required. While this may have been of some use in the bigger cities, it is unlikely to have been of much assistance to members patrolling the rural country roads and lanes throughout the country. The advent of the Garda Radio system in 1941, over the years gradually improved communications for the force with initially bulky dry battery radio transmitters being trialled. By 1947, radios were fitted to just nine cars with a further six cars fitted with one way (receiving only) set-ups. Radios were only suitable for vehicles, which were in short supply in the early decades of the organisation. Since the '70s, Personal Radios revolutionised the communication system and today the current Tetra Digital personal radio issued in 2009, coupled with Computer Aided Dispatch control rooms, ensure that all parts of the country are now reachable. In addition to the enhanced technology and performance, these systems ensure an enhanced encrypted system within the organisation and a compatibility to link with other agencies if and when the need arises.

Cé gur mór an chúnamh a bhí san fheadóg sna cathracha níos mó ní móide gur chuidigh sé mórán le comhaltaí a bhí ar patról ar bhóithre agus ar róidíní na gceantar tuaithe ar fud na tíre. Le teacht chóras Raidió an Gharda Síochána sa bhliain 1941 tháinig feabhas ar chúrsaí cumarsáide de réir a chéile don fhórsa agus triail á baint as tarchuradóirí raidió téagartha ar chumhacht cadhnra tirim ar dtús. Faoin mbliain 1947 ní raibh ach naoi gcarr feistithe le raidió agus bhí cumraíocht aontreo (glacadh amháin) feistithe i sé charr eile. The original Civic Guard were initially to be armed with a Webley revolver firearm for personal protection. Following the Kildare mutiny it was decided, considering the still fluid political situation in the country, that arming a large body of men may not be the wisest of decisions. The decision was then made that the force would remain predominantly unarmed.

While Detectives were routinely armed across the years, policy has shifted towards specialised firearm units, trained and equipped to deal with critical firearm incidents. The Emergency Response Unit (ERU) has been in existence in this regard since 1977. While Dublin based, they are the primary national unit when dealing with critical firearm incidents. Regional Support Units (RSUs), now Armed Support Units (ASUs), came into existence across the country from 2008 and are also trained and equipped to address critical incidents. The advent of the RSU in 2008 was the first time in the history of the State that the public would have seen armed uniformed Gardaí in their cities, towns and villages. These units are equipped and trained

in the use of both firearms and a range of less lethal options. They are also trained in Critical Incident Response, Tactical Deployment, Conflict Resolution and Negotiation, Entry Methods, Tactical Driving and First Aid.

Separately, the Garda Public Order Unit is a unit of specially trained members of An Garda Síochána who deal with incidents of major public order, including protests and riots. A Divisional Public Order Unit is made up of 21 members under the control of an Inspector. Gardaí assigned to Public Order Units are uniformed members who are normally attached full time to normal policing duties.

These Gardaí are based in all Garda Divisions and are trained in peaceful crowd management and public order tactics. When assigned to Public Order Unit duty, they wear flame-retardant overalls along with other protective equipment such as helmets, gloves and body armour, depending on the level disorder present and making them clearly identifiable. When on duty they will also carry shields.

## 22. Transport

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In December 1922, Commissioner O’Duffy, being questioned by the Department of Home Affairs in regard to the appointment of a former member of the Royal Irish Constabulary as an advisor to the new force, returned fire in his usual curt manner. In his reply, among the issues raised, he pointed to the fact that the only means of transport available to the fledgling force at that time were a few “broken down lorries, abandoned by the Army and subsequently towed to the Garda Depot.” He also stated that the force had no decent cars and that he himself had to borrow a car from the Army to conduct his duties and inspections around the country.

## 22. Iompar

In the 1950s, every member of the force outside the Dublin Metropolitan Area (DMA) was obliged to have a bicycle and this was the only means of transport in the Sub-Districts. A single patrol car was attached to the District Headquarters in the larger towns. Motor-cycles with sidecars were only allocated to some stations in the DMA.

The Garda Driving School was established in 1954 at the Garda Headquarters at the Phoenix Park Depot in Dublin and later moved to the Garda Training Centre, now the Garda College, at Templemore, County Tipperary.

In the 1980s, following an upsurge in serious crime, task forces were created and issued with bigger, high-powered vehicles. Divisional

Specialised Traffic Units followed, along with improved vehicles.

Many different makes, models and colours of cars have been used as patrol vehicles over the years and the livery and security features have changed with the times to enhance safety for all members of the force and other road users. The Garda fleet of today (2026) consists of approximately 2,800 vehicles and includes cars, vans, 4x4s, trucks and motor-cycles.

The Garda Water Unit uses inshore ribs and boats and the Garda Air Support Unit operates a fixed-wing plane and helicopter facility.

Horses and, especially, bicycles were historically the main means of transport of early police. With the advance of modern society, these disappeared from policing. Interestingly, in recent years both have made a comeback to Irish policing to great effect. The Garda Mounted Unit was created in May 1998 and its horses are stabled at Áras an Úachtaráin, Phoenix Park, by kind invitation of the President of Ireland. The unit was initially made up of 1 Sergeant and 7 Gardaí with 6 horses. The unit operates around the clock and is deployed for Crime Prevention Patrols, Community Engagement Events, Missing Person Searches, Major Policing Events, Public Order Control and Ceremonial Duties. There are currently 12 horses in the Mounted Unit.

A fleet of mountain bikes became an important part of Garda equipment in 2004, initially in Dublin. Gardaí on such bicycles are now a common sight in many cities, towns and villages across the country. They have proven to be a very popular means of policing, both with members of An Garda Síochána and the public and are seen as a very effective method of patrolling – with the added value of increasing and enhancing opportunities to communicate with the public.

You spend 18 weeks at the modern Garda Training Centre in Templemore. The rest of your training is "on the job" under the care of experienced men, followed by a refresher course at Templemore. On appointment and during your period of training, you are paid £972 per annum.

You could be trained in first aid, motor and sub-motor work, driving, traffic control, dog handling — above all, the Garda teaches you to act in emergency. There is training in fingerprinting, scientific photography and other branches of detective work, training for special duties such as management and public relations — and, of course, for promotion!

There are at present 6,329 men in the Force. This includes 1,316 Sergeants, 103 Inspectors, 124 Superintendents, 29 Chief Superintendents, one Assistant Commissioner, two Deputy Commissioners and the Commissioner. Everyone starts level with the same chance to go ahead.

## 24. Ailt sna Nuachtáin

Sa bhliain 1930, rinneadh taifeadadh sa *Connacht Sentinel* ar mhórshiúl Eocairisteach bliantúil deoise i nGaillimh (Act of Homage na Gaillimhe, 27.05.1930) le lucht féachana de dheich míle duine. I measc na n-alt ina ndearnadh cur síos ar rannpháirtithe an mhórshiúil agus ar na maisiúcháin feadh an bhealaigh i ndathanna an Phápa, tugadh ar aird go raibh “focal buíochais tuillte ag an nGarda Síochána mar gheall ar an mbealach éifeachtach a rialaigh siad an trácht.”

## 24. Newspaper Articles

The following is a sample of local newspaper articles concerning various Garda issues that appeared in the local press across the years.

### Traffic

In 1930, the *Connacht Sentinel* recorded the annual diocesan Eucharistic procession in Galway (Galway's Act of Homage, 27.05.1930) and its audience of ten thousand attendees. Amongst the article's descriptions of the procession participants and the route's decorations in the Papal colours, a comment notes “A word of praise is due to the efficient manner in which the Garda Síochána regulated the traffic.”

From 1930, a notice in the *Connacht Sentinel* shows that very little changes through time and that a number of Galway's issues remain the same today. The notice highlights an upcoming lecture by the Deputy Commissioner W.R.E. Murphy of the Civic Guards in the Galway Chamber of Commerce, focusing on "the traffic problem" (Traffic Problem in Galway, 06.05.1930). It notes that "On market days the old and the new methods of locomotion are sometimes in dangerous proximity but the tact of the Gardaí and the goodwill and good humour of most drivers – of motor cars and horse carts – combine to smooth difficulties and disentangle traffic intricacies."

In 2020, Tuam Traffic Corps marked twenty years of service, beginning in 2000 with a Sergeant and four Gardaí and growing in size to a unit of a Sergeant and ten Gardaí. Sergeant in Charge Ray Moore praised the unit, commenting that "They are a dedicated and hugely important part of An Garda Síochána and provide a service that benefits the whole community. They are there to make our roads a better place for motorists and I believe that they have achieved this very effectively" (Gardaí geared for success!, *Connacht Tribune*, 18.12.20).

## Recruitment

In August 1960, a special correspondent for the *Connacht Sentinel* discussed the ongoing recruitment drive by An Garda Síochána (The Passing of the Big Policeman, 09.08.1960). The writer lamented their assumed changes between the new recruits and those of the past:

*Roughly six hundred new Guards are to be recruited in the next few years, but where, might one ask, are the strapping young fellows we saw in uniform in the past? There was a time, not so long ago, when no man not considered 'first-class recruit', as the phrase went, would be accepted in the Metropolitan Division. First-class meant six feet. Guards now appearing on*

Tá siad ansin lenár gcuid bóithre a dhéanamh níos sábháilte do thiománaithe agus creidim go bhfuil an méid sin bainte amach go héifeachtach acu" (Gardaí ullmhaithe don rathúlacht!, *An Curadh Connachtach*, 18.12.20).

## Poitín

Sa bhliain 1935, tuairiscíodh gníomh rathúil de chuid an Gharda Síochána sa Churadh Connachtach tráth ar thug na Gardaí faoi stiléireacht aindleathach:

*Tá buille tubaisteach faighte ag lucht déanta an phoitín in Iarthar na hÉireann. Ar feadh an lae Dé hAoine thug fórsa de bhreis is caoga comhalta den Gharda Síochána, faoi stiúir an Cheannfóirt, Sean Murphy, Gaillimh, faoi thóraíocht ar oileáin Loch Coirib, le hachar de bhreis is tríocha a cúig míle cearnach, agus iad sa tóir ar stiléirí aindleathacha. Ba é an cuardach seo an cuardach ba mhó riamh ag fórsaí an Stáit, agus b'fhiú an tairbhe an trioblóid. Thug na Gardaí an ruathar ar luas*

*the Dublin streets are like mere boys compared with the material we had been used to. They are all small, tidy and dapper. When one of the old brigade turns out with a member of the new brigade, it looks like a father taking along a promising son who will one day grow up.*

## Poitín

In 1935, the *Connacht Tribune* reported on a recent successful operation by Galway Gardaí to uncover illicit distilling, stating:

*The death knell of poteen makers in the West of Ireland has been sounded. All day on Friday a force of over fifty members of the Garda Síochána, under the direction of Supt. Sean Murphy, of Galway, combed the islands of Lough Corrib, an area of over thirty-five square miles, in an intensive search for the illicit distillers. The search was the biggest ever organised by the State forces and results certainly justified the trouble taken. The swoop of the Gardaí was a lightning one and came as a total surprise to the illicit distillers who inhabit the islands of the Corrib. The biggest quantity of poteen ever taken in the history of poteen, over five hundred gallons, worth over £1,000 was captured and representing weeks of hard work by the illicit distillers; the whole lot was sent rocketing skywards in sheets of flame. (The Poteen War, 21.12.1935).*

The Gardaí team included an accompanying reporter from the *Connacht Tribune*, who praised them on their efficiency and results of the major operation, quoting one Garda who stated in response that “It is all in a day’s work.”

## Community Policing

In 1935, the Gardaí played a role in the organisation and management of the provision of an Irish-speaking holiday in the Galway Gaeltacht for two hundred and thirty children from Dublin (To the Gaeltacht: Dublin Children’s Holiday, *Connacht Sentinel*, 23.07.1935). The large group of children

Thaistil an grúpa mór leanáí ar thraein chomh fada leis an gCnoc, áit a raibh “cúig cinn de bhusanna agus an tOllamh Ó Buachalla, Coláiste na hOllscoile Gaillimh, an tArd-Cheannfort Macken, Gaillimh, ag fanacht leo agus bhí comhaltaí den Gharda Síochána ag an stáisiún freisin a threoraigh na leanáí isteach ar na busanna.”

I mí na Bealtaine 2013, tuairiscíodh sa *City Tribune* na himeachtaí poiblí a bhí á reáchtáil ag an nGarda Síochána i nGaillimh, bhí sé seo ar siúl mar chuid d’Fheachtas ag Tacú le Pobail Níos Sábháilte (imeachtaí an Gharda Síochána maidir le cosc ar an gcoireacht, 24.05. 2013). Bhí na gníomhaíochtaí seo dírithe ar dheis a thabhairt do mhuintir an phobail casadh leis na Gardaí Pobail Áitiúla agus leis an Oifigeach Coiscthe Coireachta ar bhonn neamhfhoirmiúil ar mhaithe le heolas agus comhairle a chur ar fáil maidir le sábháilteacht phearsanta agus le sábháilteacht ar bhóithre.

In May 2013, the *City Tribune* reported on the public events held by Galway City Gardaí as part of the Supporting Safer Communities Campaign (Garda events to advise on crime prevention, 24.05. 2013). These activities aimed to give members of the public the chance to meet the Local Community Gardaí and Crime Prevention Officer informally in order to provide information and advice on personal and road safety.

## **Tributes**

Comments by a speaker in the Seanad with relation to Galway Gardaí were recorded by the *Connacht Sentinel* in 1941 (Senator's Tribute to Galway Gardaí, 24.06.1941). Senator Helena Concannon discussed the incoming changes which would enable the government to discharge members of An Garda Síochána whose services were no longer required. When outlining the need for discipline in the force, the Senator stated: "We had for many years in Galway, under a particularly efficient Garda officer, an example of how they may become a part of the people and particularly the part they played in the Gaelicisation of the people was wonderful."

## **Good Detection**

Galway City Gardaí were praised in the *Connacht Tribune* in February 1942: "Smart work by Galway Gardaí led to the discovery, in the local market on Saturday morning, of a quantity of fowl which had been reported at Eglinton Street Barracks to have been stolen the previous night." (Stolen Fowl Discovered in Galway Market, 07.02.1942). The discovery of the stolen fowl resulted in the arrests and

## Funeral of Founding Member

The death of Sergeant Patrick Allen, one of the first members to be enrolled in An Garda Síochána upon its foundation, was recorded in the *Connacht Sentinel* in June 1949 (Sergt. Patrick Allen, G.S. Pallaskenry, County Limerick, 14.06.1949). Sergeant Allen had originally come from Woodquay and had been stationed in Pallaskenry, Co. Limerick. His funeral involved large-scale demonstrations of honour by Gardaí from both Limerick and Galway – “A guard of honour of Limerick Gardaí escorted the remains to the outskirts of Limerick and the cortege was met by a guard of honour of Galway Gardaí under Sergeant M.

## Garda Dance

In December 1955, the *Connacht Tribune* reported on the success of the annual Garda Céilí and Dance in aid of the Garda Benevolent Fund, held in the Seapoint Ballroom (Galway Garda Dance, 31.12.1955). The dance “lived up to its reputation as one of the most enjoyable functions of the year in Galway. Spot prizes and seasonal decorations added to the gaiety of the scene. An interesting feature was the display of Irish dancing by Rita White and Mary O’Riordan. The arrangements for the dance, which was attended by parties from all over the province, were excellent. They included a bar and running buffet in the restaurant. It was a tribute to Garda James Kilroy and his hard-working committee that everything went off without a hitch.”

# An Garda Síochána

## Commissioners Visit

The Garda Commissioner Daniel Costigan visited Galway in 1959 to hold conferences with the Officers and Sergeants of the West Galway Division. The visit formed part of a wider tour undertaken by the Commissioner to various divisions of the force, to discuss policies and learn about “the difficulties encountered by the field police.” The *Connacht Tribune* noted that “A statement issued by the Gardaí after the conference said the Commissioner was very glad to learn of the comparative absence of crime in Co. Galway and of the high percentage (85%) of detection achieved. He was especially glad to learn of the good relations between the people of Galway and the police and the high measure of co-operation extended by the people and the local authorities.” (Garda Conference in Galway, *Connacht Tribune*, 06.06.1959)

## Gardening Skills

In November 1967, the *Connacht Tribune* reported on a further accolade for Dunmore Garda Station: “For the fourth year in succession Sergeant John Byrne of the Dunmore Garda Station, Co. Galway, has won the Roscommon East Galway Garda Division gardens competition sponsored by Bord Fáilte and was placed joint fifth with Skerries in the All-Ireland placings. The garden, which is a blaze of colour during the summer months, has been the subject of much admiration down the years and the successes gained to date reflect the highest credit on Sergeant Byrne and his staff at Dunmore.” (*Prize Garden*, 10.11.1967).

## Papal Visit

The papal visit to Galway in 1979 provided one of the largest crowds for a public event in the county, with more than a quarter of a million people travelling to Ballybrit Racecourse to see Pope John Paul II. An enormous security operation coordinating with the Church authorities, the Gardaí and the Army, was meticulously planned

Bhí aiféala ar an scríbhneoir maidir leis na hathruithe measta idir na earcaithe nua agus na Gardaí a bhí ann roimhe seo – “Tá suas agus anuas le sé chéad Garda nua le hearcú sna blianta atá romhainn, ach cá bhfuil, mura miste leat mé a fhiafraí, na fir óga bhreátha a bhí le feiceáil san am atá caite? Bhí am ann, agus níl sé i bhfad ó shin, nach nglacfaí fear ar bith nach measfaí é a bheith ina “earcach den chéad scoth”, mar a chuaigh an ráiteas, isteach sa Gharda Síochána. Chiallaigh den chéad scoth sé troithe ar airde. Is mó cosúlachta atá ag na Gardaí atá le feiceáil ar shráideanna Bhaile Átha Cliath anois le buachaillí óga i gcomparáid leis na fir bhreátha a bhíodh le feiceáil tráth. Tá siad beag, néata agus pointeáilte...Nuair a bhíonn duine den tseanfhoireann in éineacht le duine ón bhfoireann nua, is cosúil le hathair a bhíonn ann lena mhac a bhfuil cuma na maitheasa air agus a bheidh fásta suas lá éigin.”

## Scileanna Garraíodóireachta

Tuairiscíodh sa *Churadh Connachtach* i mí na Samhna 1967, go raibh gradam eile bainte amach ag Stáisiún Gardaí Dhún Mór: “Den ceathrú bliain as a chéile tá comórtas garraíodóireachta buaite ag an Sáirsint John Byrne, Stáisiún Gardaí Dhún Mór, do Rannán Gardaí Ros Comáin Oirthear na Gaillimhe, tá Bord Fáilte i mbun

in advance for the visit and it was: expected that almost every Garda in the West of Ireland will be involved in the special security arrangements for the visits to Galway and Knock and that Gardaí will be asked to do special stints of duty in a massive operation (Big Security Operation For The Pontiff, *Connacht Tribune*, 31.08.1979).

The Irish Press reported that motorists in the Tuam area had been advised that “if, on the day of the Knock and Galway ceremonies, they have a minor crash, the Gardaí should not be called” (Traffic alert while Pope is in West, *Irish Press*, 14.09.1979).

The visit “demanded the services of a force of more than 1,000 Gardaí, drawn from divisions in the west and south. The Gardaí, who were assigned to crowd and traffic control as well as other routine duties, worked extremely long hours to help the massive influx and departure of people go as smoothly as possible” (Man breaches security to talk to Pope, *Irish Press*, 01.10.1979).

In the days following the event, Galway Gardaí were involved in the immediate task of tracing a large number of people reported missing following the Papal Youth Mass at Ballybrit. A Garda spokesman said that they were “getting an average of four phone calls every three minutes from relatives of people who are missing. Many of the missing people followed the Pope Mobile around the course and afterwards they were unable to find their corrals and were unable to find their friends. Some of those missing lost the location of their buses while others were unable to get back to where their cars were parked when they got out of Ballybrit.” By the morning of Tuesday, 2nd October (less than two days after the event), a Garda spokesman told the *Sentinel* that “everybody who had been reported missing was now accounted for” (400 Missing In The Wake Of Ballybrit, *Connacht Sentinel*, 02.10.1969).

### **Tug-o-War Challenge**

The Gardaí in Clifden faced a challenge from the

Tuairiscíodh san *Irish Press* gur tugadh comhairle do thiománaithe i gceantar Thuama “sa chás, go mbeadh miontimpiste acu ar lá na searmanas i gCnoc Mhuire agus i nGaillimh, nár chóir glaoch a chur ar na Gardaí” (Traffic alert while Pope is in West, *Irish Press*, 14.09.1979).

Irish Ladies' tug-o-war team in 1989 (Cleggan ladies are set "to pull" Gardaí, *Connacht Tribune*, 29.09.1989). The team challenged Clifden Gardaí to a "Cops versus the Cailins" contest in Letterfrack to "prove a point against their local guards." Team member Patricia Keane told the *Tribune* "We won't be looking for any concessions against the Gardaí – it will be the same number each side." A Garda spokesman stated that "they wouldn't be averse to pulling the ladies anytime subject to manpower being available. I'm not saying though that we will be gentlemanly enough to let them win."

## Talent Competition

The regional final of the Golden Arrow Garda Variety Talent Contest took place in the Great Southern Hotel in Galway in March 1981 (Gardaí Show Off Their Talents! *Connacht Tribune*, 13.03.1981). The contest was a national

Bhí dúshlán i ndán do Ghardaí an Chlocháin ó fhoireann Ban na hÉireann sa tarraingt téide sa bhliain 1989 (Cleggan ladies are set "to pull" Gardaí, *Connacht Tribune*, 29.09.1989). Thug an fhoireann dúshlán Ghardaí an Chlocháin i gcomórtas "Na Gardaí in aghaidh na gCailíní" i Leitir Fraic "chun pointe a chruthú in aghaidh na ngardaí áitiúla." Dúirt duine den fhoireann, Patricia Keane leis an *Tribune* "Ní bheidh aon ní á ghéilleadh againn in aghaidh na nGardaí – beidh an líon céanna foirne ag an dá thaobh." Dúirt urlabhraí ó na Gardaí "nach mbeadh aon rud i gcoinne acu féin ó thaobh na mná a tharraingt uair ar bith faoi réir ag foireann a bheith ar fáil. Mar sin féin, níl mé á rá go mbeimis sách béasach le cead a thabhairt dóibh an lámh in uachtar a fháil orainn ach oiread."

## Comórtas Tallainne

Bhí an babhta deiridh réigiúnach de Chomórtas Tallainne an Golden Arrow Garda Variety ar

competition, held over six months and confined to Gardaí. The six acts in the Western final included musicians, singers and a seanchaí. The winner was Stephen Folan: “an accordion player stationed at Inverin Garda Station. His act included jigs, reels and a hornpipe.”

## Presidential Visit

In June 1984, Galway City had its second Presidential visit with the arrival of Ronald Reagan. The city put into place “long weeks of arduous planning and enormous security measures” to ensure the visit went to plan. An extra 1,700 Gardaí were temporarily drafted to Galway from all over the country and were distributed across the city. The *Connacht Tribune* praised the Gardaí’s procedures and recorded that “A chain of Gardaí within arm’s reach of each other was formed from the Sportsground through the city centre to UCG” (Planning Pays As Visit Runs Like Clockwork, *Connacht Tribune*, 08.06.1984). An excited crowd and the presence of a large contingent of anti-Reagan protesters, caused issues for the Gardaí. The *Tribune* noted that “Many of the onlookers, who had travelled from many counties, were positioned on the far side of Eyre Square and did not even get a glimpse of the President. Others who were situated near the Great Southern Hotel presumed that the President had stopped at the other end and they immediately rushed up through the Square, causing a temporary panic among the Gardaí. One anti-Reagan campaigner threw two eggs at the passing cavalcade. However, although both missed their proposed target, a Garda was not quite so lucky and his already soaked uniform from the earlier downpour was duly decorated with egg yolk.” Gardaí who continued on to Ashford Castle in Mayo for the next stage of the presidential event also encountered a further challenge: “The Gardaí and the army were not the only ones out in their thousands at Ashford Castle for the arrival of the President. The lush, humid grounds of Ashford played host to hundreds of

Imlonnaíodh 1,700 Garda breise chuig cathair na Gaillimhe ó gach áit ar fud na tíre. Moladh sa *Tribune* nósanna imeachta an Gharda Síochána agus tuairiscíodh go raibh “Gardaí ina seasamh go dlúth le chéile i líne ón bhfaiche spóirt go lár na cathrach go UCG” (Planning Pays As Visit Runs Like Clockwork, *Connacht Tribune*, 08.06.1984). Chruthaigh slua a bhí ar bís, agus láithreach scata mór lucht agóide i gcoinne Reagan fadhbanna do na Gardaí. Tugadh ar aird sa *Tribune* go raibh “go leor de na daoine a bhí ag féachaint ar na himeachtaí agus a thaistil ó go leor tíortha eile, ar an taobh thall den Fhaiche Mhór agus nár éirigh leo sracfhéachaint féin a fháil ar an Uachtarán. Bhí daoine eile a bhí in aice le hÓstán an Great Southern den tuairim gur stop an tUachtarán ar an taobh eile agus bhrostaigh siad suas tríd an bhFaiche Mhór láithreach bonn, agus chruthaigh scaoll ar bhonn sealadach i measc na nGardaí. thousands of midges which had all the Gardaí, army, press and even the SS men plagued. The Gardaí tried to keep them off by waving tree branches and hankies and newspapers. However they tried in vain!"

## Bravery Awards

In 1996, the *Connacht Tribune* told the story of Garda Denis Madden, who had risked his life to save the life of a man who had fallen into the canal in Galway City. Garda Madden was awarded with the Scott Medal for Bravery at Templemore, with the Commissioner Patrick Culligan making the presentation for "exceptional courage and heroism involving risk to life in the execution of duty." The ceremony also included the

## Bravery medal for Garda hero who saved man from drowning in canal

—by Declan Tierney—

A Garda who risked his own life to save a man who had fallen into the canal in Galway city was awarded the Scott Medal for bravery at Templemore.

Garda Denis Madden, originally from Woodlawn near Ballinsloe, was presented with the medal following his prompt actions to save a man from drowning in freezing waters.

The incident happened when a man fell into the canal on December 21, 1994 and was making no attempt to save himself despite a buoy being thrown at him.

Garda Madden, attached to Mill Street Garda Station removed his jacket and shoes and jumped into the canal to save the man, who resisted the Garda's effort.

The Garda eventually managed to get the man to the wall of the canal where he secured him with a rope thrown by his colleagues. The rope became entangled and

presentation of a further Scott Bravery Medal to Garda Tom Flaherty, who had rescued a woman from the same city canal just two weeks later than the first incident (Bravery medal for Garda hero who saved man from drowning in canal, *Connacht Tribune*, 01.03.1996).

In 2018, the *Connacht Tribune* recorded the presentation of bravery awards to two city-based Gardaí – Garda Maria Freeley and Reserve Garda Alan Burke (My Hero! 26.10.2018). Both Gardaí worked together to successfully rescue a man who had fallen into the water at Spanish Arch. Gardaí Chief Superintendent Tom Curley commended the two members of the force, saying: “It reflects well on them and indeed on all members of the Gardaí who are prepared to take risks to keep people safe.”

### Galway Races

In July 1998, the *Evening Echo* discussed the first appearance of the Garda Mounted Police horses outside of Dublin to help with the Galway Races traffic and to keep order in the city centre (Mounted gardaí help to ease the traffic jams at Galway Races, 30.07.1998). The unit, led by Garda Roisin O’Dea of Oughterard, had been drafted in to help with the traffic situation following the failure of a new traffic light system on the main route to the racecourse.

Gardaí recorded their satisfaction with the 1998 Race Week in the *City Tribune*, “with very little trouble to report on” (Gardaí happy with trouble-free Races, 31.07.1998). A Garda spokesman commented: “The festival has gone off like a breeze so far and we would put it down to more visible and more active policing, plus better control of the traffic. There were a lot of lost children on the course, but I would put it down more to a case of lost parents having a bet!”

In July 2010, Gardaí announced a new colour-coded route and entrance system to improve the traffic to and from Galway Racecourse for Race Week (Gardaí unveil plan to avert Race Week traffic jams, *Connacht Tribune*, 16.07.2010). The blue, red and green coded routes were “designed to prevent any cross-flow of traffic making its way to and from Ballybrit Racecourse, while also leaving the roads open for non-race traffic” and a Garda spokesperson advised motorists to plan their routes in advance.

I mí Iúil 2010, d’fhógair na Gardaí bealach dathchódaithe agus córas isteach nua chun trácht isteach agus amach as Ráschúrsa na Gaillimhe do Sheachtain na Rásaí a fheabhsú. (Gardaí unveil plan to avert Race Week traffic jams, *Connacht Tribune*, 16.07.2010). Rinneadh na bealaí a bhí códaithe, gorm, dearg agus uaine “a dhearadh chun cosc a chur le tras-sreabhadh trácht ag déanamh an bhealaigh ó Ráschúrsa Bhaile an Bhriotaigh, agus leis na bóithre a fhágáil oscailte do thrácht nach mbaineann leis na rásaí ag an am céanna”, agus chomhairligh urlabhraí an Garda Síochána do thiománaithe an bealach a bheith pleanáilte acu roimh ré.

## Accomodation

In July 2009, the *Connacht Tribune* reported on a major campaign, mounted by the Kilrickle community, to reverse the decision to close their local Garda Station and patrol the area through mobile units from Loughrea (Residents vow to reverse decision to remove permanent Garda presence, 17.07.2009). Galway East TD Paul Connaughton supported the local campaign, stating that “The role of a Community Garda living in the midst of a community like Kilrickle bestows many advantages to almost everybody.”

The new Oranmore Garda Station opened in May 2007, the €4.2 million structure containing interrogation rooms, cells, a compound and juvenile detention rooms, as well as providing accommodation to the Garda Traffic Corps. Galway West Dail Deputy Noel Grealish commented that “the new Inspector-led station would be a major benefit to the rapidly expanding area of Oranmore – now officially the fastest expanding area in the country with a 107 per cent population increase pinpointed in the latest census” (Oranmore new Garda Station opens next week, *Connacht Tribune*, 11.05.2007).

## Covid

In early 2021, Galway’s most senior Garda, Chief Superintendent Tom Curley, reflected on the challenges faced by the Gardaí during the height of the Covid pandemic in an interview with the *Connacht Tribune*. Chief Supt. Curley said that, from the start of the Covid emergency, the Gardaí had experienced an extremely positive sense of community engagement and “had gone with ‘the 4 Es policy’ – to engage, explain, encourage and enforce. He praised the “huge level of co-operation” from the public and the “huge effort” put in by his own staff in An Garda Síochána since the onset of Covid in March 2020 (Community Triumphs Over Covid, *Connacht Tribune*, 01.01.2021).

## Cóiríocht

Osclaíodh an Stáisiún Gardaí nua in Órán Mór i mí na Bealtaine 2007, stáisiún ina bhfuil struchtúr a chosain €4.2 milliún, le seomraí ceistiúcháin, cillíní, seomraí coinneála do chiontóirí óga, chomh maith le cóiríocht a chur ar fáil do Chór Tráchtá an Gharda Síochána. Dúirt Teachta Dála Ghaillimh Thiar Noel Grealish “go rachadh stáisiún faoi stiúir Cigire go mór chun leasa do cheantar Órán Mór atá ag leathnú go tapa – atá anois, go hoifigiúil, ar an gceantar is mó sa tír atá ag leathnú le hardú daonra de 107 faoin gcéad léirithe sa daonáireamh deiridh” (Oranmore new Garda Station opens next week, *Connacht Tribune*, 11.05.2007).

## Covid

I dtús na bliana 2021, rinne an Garda is sinsearaí i nGaillimh, an tArd-Cheannfort Tom Curley, machnamh ar na dúshláin a bhí i ndán don Gharda Síochána agus paidéim Covid i mbarr a réime in agallamh leis an gCuradh Connachtach. Dúirt an tArd-Cheannfort Curley go raibh braistint phobail thar a bheith dearfach á bhrath ag na Gardaí ó thosaigh éigeandáil Covid, agus “coinníodh ‘le polasaí na 4 Es’ – teagmháil a dhéanamh, míniú a thabhairt, spreagadh a thabhairt agus forfheidhmiú a dhéanamh (to engage, explain, encourage and enforce). Mhol sé “an leibhéal ard comhoibríthe” ón bpobal, agus an “iarracht mhór” a rinne a fhoireann féin sa Gharda Síochána ó thús Covid i Márta 2020 (Community Triumphs Over Covid, *Connacht Tribune*, 01.01.2021).

## 25. John Fitzgerald Kennedy in Galway

“The three happiest days I’ve ever spent in my life”, was how President John Fitzgerald Kennedy described his visit to Ireland in June 1963. For the visit, all Garda leave was cancelled, with members directed to get their hair cut and to wear their best uniform. They were to look first class and display efficiency, smartness and courtesy. Members unfortunate not to have received the current issue of uniform would find themselves on duty at places away from the Presidential route. The Garda Commissioner stressed that the eyes of the world would be on Ireland.

## 25. John Fitzgerald Kennedy i nGaillimh

“The three happiest days I’ve ever spent in my life” an tuairisc a thug an tUachtarán John Fitzgerald Kennedy ar a chuairt go hÉirinn i mí Meithimh 1963. ## *DUTY: Aspects of the History of An Garda Síochána in Galway*

### *DUALGAS: Gnéithe de Stair an Gharda Síochána i nGaillimh*

On each of the three days, an average of almost 3,000 Gardaí was deployed at the various locations. The Gardaí had been directed to keep their backs to the motorcade while surveying the crowd, but occasionally the crowd surged forward, led by the Gardaí, looking for an autograph.

The *Irish Times* of 27 June quoted an unidentified Garda as saying he “wouldn’t be sorry when the President’s visit was over.”

The President’s schedule included visits and engagements at Dublin on his arrival on 27 June, followed by visits to Wexford and then back to Dublin where, at a reception in Áras an Uachtaráin, the great and good of Irish society appear to have embarrassed themselves in their efforts to meet the President. On day two of the visit, the President went to Cork before again returning to Dublin for his address to the Dáil and the Seanad.

On his final day, 29 June, he visited Galway where 600 Gardaí performed duty in the city. Gardaí had been drafted in from around the country for the visit and were accommodated at Renmore Army Barracks and at St Mary’s College in the city.

After receiving the freedom of Galway City, President Kennedy made a speech from Eyre Square before, to the utter dismay of his Secret Service detail, he again mingled with the crowd. The exuberance of the crowd led one local Sergeant on duty to send a message over the radio for backup quick or “they’ll be wanting to shoulder him into town.”

The visit of the American President John F. Kennedy to Galway in 1963, as part of his Irish tour, was one of the city’s most prolific international events and required a huge level of organisation on the part of the Gardaí. A large section of the city was pedestrianised and closed to regular traffic on the day with the expectation that the city’s population would double in size for

An lá deireanach den chuairt, an 29 Meitheamh, tháinig sé go Gaillimh. Bhí 600 Garda ar dualgas ar an mbaile mór. Bhí Gardaí tagtha as gach ceard den tír le haghaidh na cuairte agus lóistín acu i mBeairic an Airm ar an Rinn Mhóir agus i gColáiste Mhuire ar an mbaile mór.

Bronnadh saoirse chathair na Gaillimhe ar an Uachtarán Kennedy agus tar éis dó aitheasc a thabhairt uaidh ar an bhFaiche Mhór, nach ndeachaigh sé, rud a chuir díomá mór ar lucht an Secret Service, i measc na ndaoine arís. Bhí an slua chomh tógtha leis gur fhógair Sáirsint amháin de chuid na Gaillimhe féin ar a raidió gurbh fhearr dream cúltaca a chur isteach go beo nó go mbeidís “wanting to shoulder him into town.”

The Garda resources required to staff such a large event were drawn from across the country. A notice in the *Donegal Democrat* in July commented:

On his way to the plane at Shannon Airport, the President commented to Assistant Commissioner Michael Wymes: "the police did a mighty fine job, thanks very much, I would like you to thank them all for me."

Following his visit, President Kennedy personally wrote to Garda Commissioner Daniel Costigan, thanking An Garda Síochána for their handling of his visit. This letter, however, did not come into the public domain as Commissioner Costigan was prohibited from circulating it by a senior official in the Department of Justice, which meant that the thousands of Gardaí involved in the security for the Presidents' visit, were never informed of his personal appreciation in regard to their efforts. The letter was eventually released with State papers in December 2006.

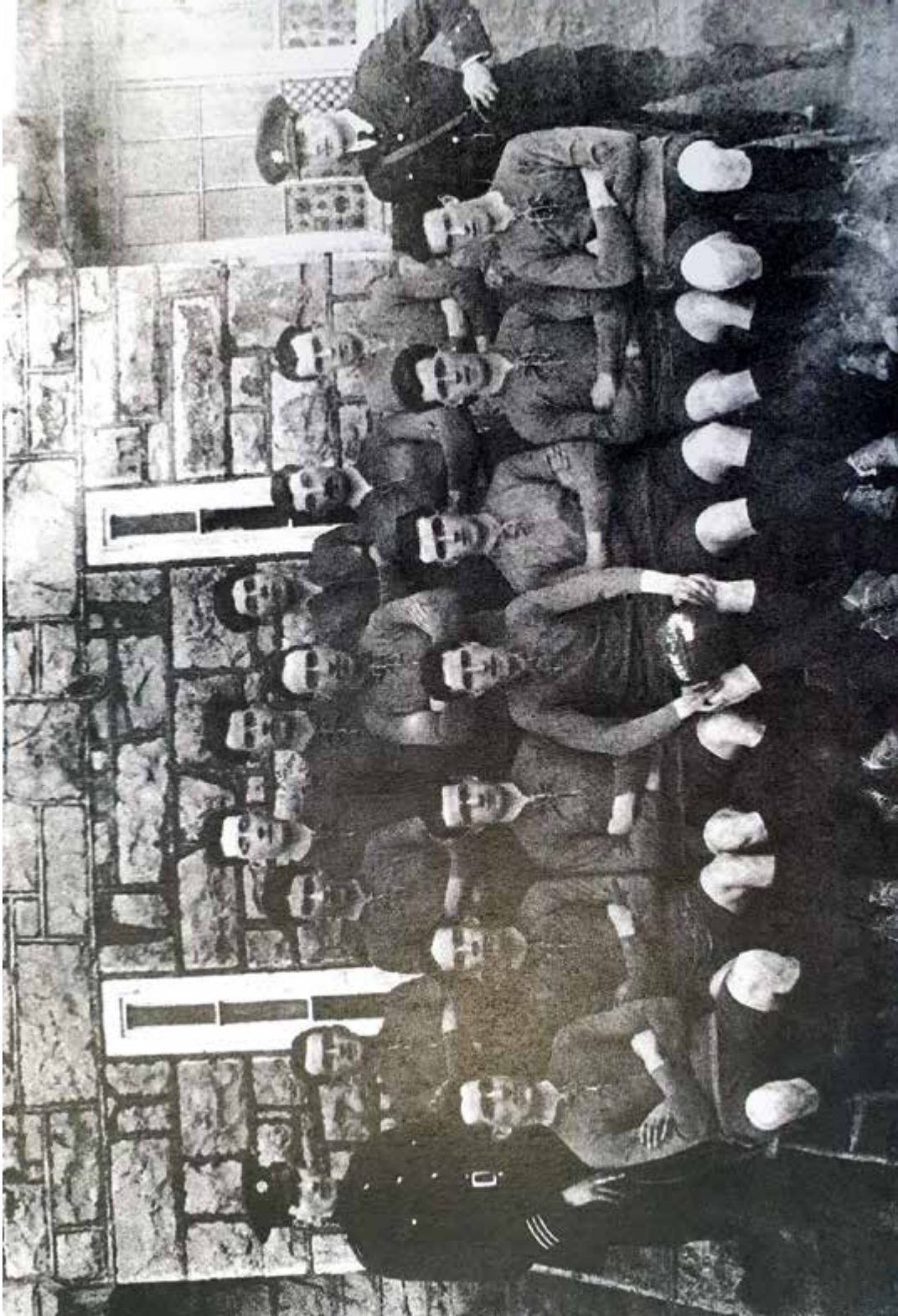
President Kennedy's promise to return to Ireland, sadly, never came to pass as he was assassinated less than five months later in the USA in Dallas, Texas.

## 26. Sport

General Eoin O'Duffy became the second Commissioner of An Garda Síochána on 18 September 1922. A former Chief of Staff of the IRA, O'Duffy had, before the outbreak of hostilities during 1916-1922, been very active in the Monaghan and Ulster Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA) at an administrative level. O'Duffy recognised the benefits of sport to the lives of the young Gardaí whom he now led. He also saw sport, especially the GAA, as a means for members of the new force to bring themselves into favourable contact with communities which were still wary following the years of animosity.

Young Gardaí throughout the country immersed themselves in local GAA teams and affairs, a tradition that continues to this day. From the early days, members of An Garda Síochána reached as GAA players the highest of levels in both hurling and football. Many also were actively involved at local, county and provincial level as coaches, referees and administrators.

The sporting body within An Garda Síochána is known as the 'Coiste Siamsa'; its goal is to foster all sports within the organisation. The Chief Superintendent in each Division assumes chairmanship of its local board. A photograph of a Galway Garda football team from 1923 still exists.

In the Galway Garda Division, many members featured prominently both at club and county level in the GAA over the years. In more recent times, Galway Gardaí have also become involved in sports other than in the GAA such as soccer, rugby, golf and basketball.

In 1925, the first of many future Garda Sports Days took place at South Park in Galway City, with the *Connacht Tribune* noting that the event unfortunately fell victim to extremely inclement weather (Garda Sports, 01.08.1925):

*The rain and wind increased so greatly during the afternoon that, after a tardy start had been*

*made at 2.30pm, an hour and a half after the scheduled time, it was decided, at 5.30pm, to postpone the events to a future date. A large number of enthusiasts who had travelled from Dublin and all over the country were keenly disappointed.*

Events in running, cycling, shot putting and slinging took place on the rainy day, but others in hurdles, high and long jump, tug-of-war and relay, obstacle and veteran races, took place at the rescheduled Sports Day the following month.

Chief Superintendent John Mitchell was the Divisional Officer in the Galway West Division from 1985 to 1993. In 1960, he was a member of the Wexford Senior Hurling team which won the All-Ireland Championship. This was the team of the famed Rackard brothers. John Mitchell's early Garda career was spent in Kerry but he transferred his hurling allegiance to Galway. This may have cost both him and Wexford further All-Irelands but it was always his view that Gardaí should play for the local clubs where they were stationed.

Galway Gardaí were the winners of the County Inter-firm Football League in 1969, winning with a score of 3-7 to 2-3 against the Tuam Sugar Factory (County Inter-Firm League Won Deservedly by Gardaí, *Connacht Tribune*, 01.08.1969). The *Tribune* noted: "The five-hundred odd spectators were treated to a fine game which would have done credit to two top-class club teams and the Gardaí who were fitter and shrewder won deservedly."

In 1989, two Galway Gardaí played an important role in the success of the Garda tug-o-war team at the World Police & Fire Games in Vancouver, Canada (Gold medals for Gardaí, *Connacht Tribune*, 15.08.1989). The team was managed by Sergeant Michael Concannon from Dunmore and Tom Flaherty from Inverin was a member of the successful team.

Garda James Kavanagh represented Ireland in the Compromise Rules Series against Australia in 2010 and Colm Boyle was involved in 2013 and 2014.

## Inter-firm Competitions

Throughout the 1970s, '80s and '90s, Galway Garda teams were involved in hurling and football Inter-firm competitions, achieving a high degree of success. During this period, the Galway Senior Inter-County Football team had a number of Garda players, including Sean Glynn, Mattie Coleman, Frank Broderick, Seamas Burke and Gerry Burke. In 2010, '11 and '12, the Galway Garda Divisional Football team won the All-Ireland Inter-firm Championship.

In 1984, the Galway Gardaí made history when they won both the All-Ireland Inter-Firm Junior Football Final as well as “the first All-Ireland in this the centenary year of the GAA at Limerick Gaelic Grounds” (Galway Gardaí capture the first All-Ireland of centenary year, *Connacht Sentinel*, 10.01.1984).

Many Gardaí across the Division of Galway continue involvement in various GAA clubs and sporting organisations, ensuring community engagement and maintaining the proud traditions put in place by Commissioner O'Duffy more than a hundred years ago.

Mother hung up our small stockings with big safety pins on a clothes line that hung over the fireplace.*

*Christmas morning we were all up bright and early. We tip-toed down the stairs and crept along the hallway so as not to awaken Mother. We took down our sock and in it was a pair of knitted socks, a few sweets and a pencil. Not one toy for any of us, not even for the baby. After dinner, we went to the church with the smaller children sitting up in the big pram. We looked into the manger crib. After all our praying, Baby Jesus sent us nothing so we decided to hide Him under the straw. We climbed into the crib, pulled the straw up and hid the Baby Jesus under the straw as far down as we could. We then went home satisfied that Baby Jesus was hidden away. We told Bab Flood what we had done and she just smiled. She felt sorry for us and gave us some apples and oranges. The next day we went to the church only to see Baby Jesus back in his crib again. This time we buried the Baby Jesus again, but this time we used our shoe laces and tied him to the straw so that he couldn't get out. Mother was very cross and wanted to know what happened to our laces but we never told her.*

*The Garda Superintendent heard about our dilemma and a few days later a phone call came to the barrack to say Santa hadn't forgotten us and a large parcel was on its way from the Guards in the Depot Training Centre in Dublin. The parcel contained a beautiful doll, with a china face, drums, bugles, games of all kinds, a big fruit cake and socks for all of us. We were overjoyed. Baby Jesus had loved us after all, even though he was a little late. We paraded up and*

## 28. A Family's Service

*by Chief Superintendent John Kelly (Retired)*

Where does one start to document the cumulative service of over 350 years? Each family member made their individual decision, at different times, while growing up in a rural town. To my family, the Gardaí were an integral part of the local community when growing up in Tuam in the 1950s and 1960s. Everybody knew their names and the Gardaí knew practically everybody in the town, where they were a daily presence; many Gardaí were included in various organisations and community groups. They were highly respected and had a big influence on us in making a decision to join An Garda Síochána.

Looking back in time on the extended family, the first reference to policing in our family was to our great-grandfather Patrick Cahill. Born in 1859, he joined the Royal Irish Constabulary (RIC) in 1877. A native of Kilkee, County Clare, he served in Queen's County and Counties Mayo, Roscommon, Waterford and Galway. He was promoted to the rank of Sergeant on 1 March 1892. Married to Mary, they had four children. The eldest daughter, Sarah, married John T. McElroy, our grandfather.

John T. McElroy was born in 1886 in Roscommon and joined the RIC in 1904. He left the RIC, joined the 3rd Irish Guards of the British Army on 24 January 1915 and fought in World War I. At Chalk Pit Wood, at the battle of Ypres in Belgium, he was awarded the military medal for bravery in 1916. Wounded in April 1916, he was discharged from the 3rd Irish Guards on the 23 January 1918 and re-joined the RIC. John T. McElroy married Sarah Cahill and they had two sons and three daughters - one of them, Mary, who married Peter Kelly in 1946, was to be my mother. John T. McElroy died in 1958 and was buried in Tuam.

## 28. Seirbhís Teaghlaigh

*An tArd-Cheannfort John Kelly (ar scor)*

Bhíodh ardmheas orthu agus tionchar mór acu orainne maidir le socrú dul isteach sa Gharda Síochána.

Nuair a scrúdaím stair na muintire, is maidir le mo shin-seanathair a fheicim an tagairt is luaithe den phóilíneacht. Sa bhliain 1859 a rugadh Patrick Cahill agus chuaigh sé isteach i gConstáblacht Ríoga na hÉireann (an RIC) sa bhliain 1877. Ba as Cill Chaoi i gContae an Chláir ó dhúchas é agus rinne sé fónamh i gContae na Ríona, i Maigh Eo, i Ros Comáin, i bPort Láirge agus i nGaillimh. Fuair sé ardú céime go grád an tSáirsint ar an 1 Márta 1892. Bhí sé pósta le Mary agus ceathrar clainne orthu. Phós Sarah, an iníon ba shine, John T. McElroy, mo sheanathair.

Rugadh John T. McElroy i Ros Comáin sa bhliain 1886 agus chuaigh sé isteach san RIC sa bhliain 1904. D'fhág sé an RIC agus chuaigh isteach in Arm na Breataine, sa 3ú Reisimint de Ghardaí na hÉireann, ar an 24 Eanáir 1915. Throid sé sa chéad Chogadh Mór. Bronnadh bonn míleata as crógacht air sa bhliain 1916 mar gheall ar choimhlint Chalk Pit Wood, i rith chath Ypres na Beilge. # An Garda Síochána

Peter Kelly, my late father, worked as an auctioneer and law clerk for a firm of solicitors in Tuam until his untimely death in 1973. My mother was a nurse who had trained in England and retired from the Bons Secours Hospital in Tuam. She died in April 2018.

As an organisation, An Garda Síochána sets the tone of one's career by assignment of the First Station. Thereafter, through self-motivation, career advancement, experiences gained along the way and taking internal promotion exams, one develops a career within the service. Career paths are always different – by postings, events, encounters, actions taken, people and events interacted with, one's career development is coupled with motivation, loyalty, commitment and vocation to serve.

The first of my brothers to join An Garda Síochána was Gerry – he joined in 1966. He is probably unique in policing history in that he served in all four provinces. His career in An Garda Síochána started in a small station in Labasheeda, County Clare and he then was moved to William's St, Limerick. He was promoted to Sergeant to Clontibret, County Monaghan, he then transferred to the Garda College in Templemore, County Tipperary, and later returning to Ennistymon and Ennis. On promotion to the rank of Inspector, he was transferred to Roscommon town and later returned to Ennis. On promotion to the rank of Superintendent, he was assigned to Tullamore town and later returning to Ennis again. Promotion to the rank of Chief-Superintendent followed – he started in Dun Laoghaire, County Dublin, followed by the traffic division in Dublin Castle, Portlaoise, Ennis and finally Limerick City where he led the Garda service at a time of violent crime. At the latter end of his career, he was promoted to the rank of Assistant Commissioner with responsibility for the Western Region of the country; he retired in 2007, having completed 41 years of service.

The next to enter the service was John, who joined in 1970, starting at Harcourt Terrace in Dublin. He later moved to Kevin Street and then Pearse Street. On promotion to the rank of Sergeant, he was posted to Stepside, County Dublin. Returning to Kilmainham and Kevin Street, he was promoted to the rank of Inspector and assigned to Ballyfermot, Dublin. After five years there, he was promoted and assigned to Ballyconnell, County Cavan. On his return to Dublin, he was assigned to the Crime Branch at Garda Headquarters. After a period, he was assigned to Blackrock and then Dun Laoghaire. In 2001, he was promoted to the rank of Chief Superintendent and assigned to Internal Affairs at Garda Headquarters and completed his 39-and-a-half years of service at the Garda Technical Bureau in 2009.

Ba é Noel, nach maireann, an deartháir deireanach a chuaigh isteach sna Gardaí.

The third brother to join the service, Peter, joined in 1979 and started his career in Store Street. Having moved to Mayo later, he served at Belmullet, Lahardaun and then Ballina, where he completed 30 years of service, attached to An Garda Síochána's Divisional Traffic Corps. He retired 2009.

The last brother to join was Noel (RIP), who joined in 1984 and whose First Station was Store Street. On promotion to the rank of Sergeant, he was assigned to the Garda College. He subsequently served in Clifden, Gort and Mill Street, Galway. He was later promoted to Inspector returning to the Garda College and then to Salthill. On promotion to the rank of Superintendent, he was assigned to the Clifden District and later to the Salthill District, completing his 37 years of service as Regional Traffic Superintendent for the Western region. He retired on 1 April 2021; sadly, he died unexpectedly on the 9th of June 2021.

To add to the family members who served in An Garda Síochána, four first cousins joined the service between 1980 and 1995. Jimmy McElroy retired in 2009 after 29 years of service. John McElroy retired in 2022, as a Detective Sergeant after 36 years of service. Mary McElroy joined in 1995 and is still serving in the Ballinasloe district. Josephine McElroy joined in 1995 and is still serving as Sergeant at Athenry Station.

Furthermore, the late Noel's wife, Fiona White Kelly, joined An Garda Síochána in 1997 and is still serving in Galway City. Mark Kelly, son of Gerry Kelly, joined in 2004 and is still serving in Galway. Mark's wife Orla Flatley is also serving member in Galway. Yvonne Kelly, Gerry's daughter is married to serving member Brian Colbert. John McElroy's sons, Ian and Jack are following in the family footsteps.

To complete the family and extended family history of service, Lousie O'Sullivan, niece of John Kelly's wife Maureen, joined the service in 2010 and is serving in Finglas.

My husband, Michael O'Reilly of Cromane Lower, Killorglin, County Kerry, joined An Garda Síochána in May 1955. His First Station was in Swinford, County Mayo and in December 1956 he was transferred to Kinlough, County

Leitrim, during the first Border Campaign. In those days, the Gardaí acted as school attendance officers. I was a young primary teacher, straight out of college, teaching in a one-teacher school, Drummans N.S. in Largydonnell, County Sligo and Michael used to call to the school to check on the attendance. In 1959, he asked me to a Garda Dance in the Rainbow Ballroom, Glenfarne, County Leitrim, now a museum, open to the public as the 'Ballroom of Romance'. During the dance, a custom hut was blown up and all the young Gardaí were called away. I often wonder what they could have done as they were all dressed up for the dance, not a uniform in sight. John McGivern, the owner of the ballroom got up on stage and kept the dance going. Anyway, we had all come in hired cars with other young couples, as very few owned cars then and we knew we would get home safely. I can't remember if the Gardaí got back before the dance ended.

We were married in St Aiden's Church, Kinlough, on 16 August 1961 by Fr Des Flynn, a newly ordained priest who left the priesthood shortly afterwards and who kept in contact with us until his death. We were the first couple he married; God rest his gentle soul.

Because I was a native of Kinlough, where Michael was stationed, we were, according to Garda rules then, transferred to Kilbeggan, County Westmeath, in July 1962, a few days after our first baby, Maria, was born. We lived in Ballinagore, County Westmeath, a few miles from Kilbeggan, until 6 December 1965 when we moved to Athlone. Our second baby, Cepta, was born six days later, on 12 December 1965. Michelle was also born in Athlone, on 26 May 1965 and we moved to Recess, Connemara, County Galway, on 10 December 1965 when Michael was promoted to Sergeant. We lived in the Garda Station, which was in very bad repair: no running water, no bathroom, no toilet in the house. We had an external toilet out the back and a tank of water when it rained. The spring water

Ní cuimhin liom an raibh na Gardaí ar ais sula raibh an damhsa thart nó nach raibh.

Phós an tAthair Des Flynn muid i Séipéal Aodháin, Cionn Locha, ar an 16 Lúnasa 1961. Sagart nua-oirnithe a bhí ann agus d'fhág sé na sagairt gairid ina dhiaidh sin. Choinnigh sé caidreamh linn go dtí tráth a bháis. Ba muid an chéad lánúin a phós sé riamh. Go dtuga Dia suaimhneas dá anam uasal.

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for tea and for washing vegetables etc. had to be carried from a pump at the Post Office, ¼ of a mile away. It was a complete shock for us coming from Athlone, but we got used to it and Micheál, our first son, was born there on 23 April 1967.

We made many friends in Recess with whom we are still in contact. In May 1968, we came to Moylough Garda Station to a big house with running water, bathroom, toilet etc. It was great for us all and reduced my workload especially. Our children Róisín and Padraic were born in Moylough and we lived there until Michael's retirement in 1994.

From 1970 on, he was sent on temporary transfer to Petigo, Letterkenny, Burnfoot, Moville and Bridge End in County Donegal, to Monaghan and to Ballyconnell, County Cavan. That was a time of car bombs, incendiary devices left in briefcases, suitcases etc. I stayed in Moylough with the children. The Garda Station was situated on the side of the street and we had a common entrance to the Garda Office and to our living quarters. One evening, while Michael was stationed at the border, a gentleman, dressed all in black with a black briefcase, walked into the kitchen. He said he was in the Garda Depot with Michael and a great friend of his. I immediately picked up on this, as he was about 5 foot 5 inches and the Garda recruits then had to be much taller than that. Anyway, I offered him a cup of tea as we were in the middle of dinner and it was getting dark and I was hoping he would leave soon. After an hour or so, he left and I turned around with a sigh of relief, when I noticed the briefcase on the floor near the fridge. I froze and I didn't know where to turn when he reappeared. He had forgotten it. When I told Michael the story, he knew the visitor well. He was a 'knight of the road', always dressed well, stayed in hotels overnight and left without paying, until he was caught and started all over again when he was released from jail. He was harmless and called at Garda Stations all over Ireland for a few pounds.

On another occasion, Michael was on duty in Ballina. Michael left Moylough at 6 am. Myself and the children went to 11 am Mass and shortly after our return I noticed a big black car parked outside the window. Sitting in it were four men. I started to prepare dinner for the children and when I looked again, the car was there and the men had vanished. I was petrified as I was sure it was a car bomb. I tried to phone the Gardaí in Tuam, but Michael had forgotten to put the phone through to the house. I spent the day out the back, hoping we would be safe if the car exploded. The car was still there when we went to bed and during my sleepless night I got up and looked and the car was still there. Around 5 am I got up again and the car was gone. On Michael's return, I told

Thosaigh mé ag réiteach an dinnéir do na gasúir agus nuair a bhreathnaigh mé arís, bhí an carr ann ach é folamh, na fir imithe. Bhí mé scanraithe, cinnte gur buama a bhí ann. Thriail mé glaoch ar na Gardaí i dTuaim, ach bhí dearmad déanta ag Michael an fón a cheangal leis an teach. Chaith mé an lá amuigh ar chúil an tí, ag súil go dtiocfadh muid slán dá bpléascfadh an carr. Bhí an carr i gcónaí ann agus muid ag dul a chodladh. B'aimhréidh mar oíche chodlata í, d'éirínn go mbreathnaínn agus bhí an carr ann i gcónaí. Thart ar a cúig ar maidin, d'éirigh mé agus bhí an carr imithe. Nuair a tháinig Michael ar ais, d'inis mé an scéal



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him the story and he said that he knew the men well. They were members of a show band, waiting to be picked up in Moylough by the van they travelled in together. They always parked outside the Garda Station as they knew it was safe there, until they were dropped back after the dance.

We spent 27 years in the Garda Station in Moylough until we built a house in Chapel Road, where we still live. The children were very happy there and when the six of them meet, they reminisce about their childhood there and all the different characters who called at the door and all the children who came to play in the back yard. Moylough was full of children then.

Michael is 91 years old and, sadly, he got Parkinson's disease and all that it entails, so he is unable to write an account of his life. He was very happy in the Garda Síochána and made wonderful friends everywhere he went and many of his Garda colleagues are still in contact with us. Living in Garda Stations for thirty years was a life less ordinary.

## 31. An Garda Síochána – Garda Staff

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From the beginning of An Garda Síochána, the need for civilian personnel to provide expertise was recognised. In 1923, among the senior management team at Garda HQ was C. Monks, who was in charge of Finance. There were also a Chief Surgeon and an Assistant Surgeon assigned to Garda Headquarters along with a Secretary to the Commissioner.

Locally, administrative/clerical work in An Garda Síochána has always been essential for the operation of the organisation. Again, in the formative years of the force, certain Gardaí were selected for clerical duties in Divisional and District Offices, with the foremost qualification for selection being the standard of their handwriting.

## 31. An Garda Síochána – Foireann an Gharda

# An Garda Síochána

Two former Garda Commissioners, Michael Kinnane (1938 to 1951) and Daniel Costigan (1952 to 1965), did not come to the position through the ranks but rather were appointed to the role from their former positions as senior civil servants.

Despite numerous reports through the 1960s and into the 70s, progress in regard to civilianisation in An Garda Síochána was quite slow. By 1970, close to 25 male Gardaí operated as designated clerks, working from 9 am to 5 pm on a Monday to Friday basis. Other Gardaí may have also been assigned to certain important offices on a non-designated basis.

Between 1970 and 1998, 15 separate reports into different areas of Garda activity and reform recommended additional civilianisation and after the Conroy Commission in 1970, female civil servants were gradually allocated to Garda Stations. During the following years, the number of civil servants in the organisation increased into the 300s, to the 400s in the 1980s and to over 700 in the 1990s.

It should be noted, however, that not all civilian employees in An Garda Síochána were civil servants and the numbers included other roles such as tradesmen, gardeners, storemen and cleaners etc.

The turn of the century saw further progress, with the responsibility for all civilian staff being transferred to the Commissioner in 2005. By 2006, there were 1,281 civilian staff. A Garda Inspectorate and Advisory Group report to the Commissioner that year recommended a new role of Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) at Deputy Commissioner level to oversee Administration and Resource Management. The first CAO was then appointed in 2007.

Also in 2007, a Government decision provided for the appointment of a further 300 clerical officers for areas outside Dublin, recommending the employment of specialist civilian employees

De réir a chéile, tháinig ardú go dtí 300 agus os a chionn ar líon na státseirbhíseach san eagraíocht, os cionn 400 sna 1980idí agus os cionn 700 sna 1990idí.

in other areas such as Analysis, Scenes of Crime, Finance, Human Resources, ICT and Forensics, which would in turn release Gardaí employed in these posts to frontline duties.

Clerical and administrative support were significantly enhanced in those years in order to further the official policy of releasing desk-bound Gardaí to operational duties and bring the organisation into line with international norms; by 2008, the number stood at 2,053.

Middle and senior non-sworn management staff were also introduced across a range of administrative, technical/professional and industrial support areas.

From 2018, all non-sworn members of the organisation became known as Garda Staff. In 2022, there were 3,389 Garda Staff across all fields, which rose to 3,678 by the end of 2024.

An Garda Síochána has moved from a time when civilian staff were almost exclusively confined to clerical support in stations to a point where non-sworn members are now appointed to an ever-wider range of specialist and managerial functions, including membership of the Senior Leadership Team (SLT).

Valuable support is being provided to An Garda Síochána by Garda Staff in these areas and the success of flagship initiatives such as the Garda Information Services Centre (GISC), Garda Central Vetting Unit (GCVU) and Fixed Charge Penalty Office (FCPO), among others, in this regard is increasingly apparent.

A recent development regarding non-sworn members is the vital position of Control Room Operator, which is the first point of contact for members of the public seeking emergency Garda intervention. There are now four Regional Control Rooms across the country where the call-takers are all members of Garda Staff. The Regional Control Room for the North Western Region is based at Murrough, Galway.

Commissioner O'Duffy (second Commissioner of An Garda Síochána) later saw sport as a method of integration of the new force into the communities in which they were to serve. He also emphasised the use of flexibility and discretion in their duties without recourse to prosecution for every trivial offence. This pragmatism, along with the fact that the Gardaí lived among their communities, differed from the methods of their predecessors, the RIC and helped Gardaí to win

public acceptance. The relationship that then developed between the communities and the Gardaí, which is the envy of many other police forces, could be seen as the basis of the formal Community Policing models that followed.

While it could be argued that all Gardaí in past times were Community Policemen, in order to meet the needs of the 21<sup>st</sup> century community, An Garda Síochána had to change as an organisation. Traditional policing responses are under continuous pressure from 21<sup>st</sup> century challenges and our service delivery must change accordingly.

A one-size-fits-all approach is no longer acceptable. A community/customer policing approach, adopting modern processes and procedures to manage relationships with communities and individuals and to better understand their needs, is now part of the work and values of all members.

There are currently 2 Sergeants and 22 Gardaí employed on full-time Community Policing throughout Galway City and County.

He joined An Garda Síochána on 27 June 1925 and was promoted to rank of Sergeant on 1 March 1927. He served in Ballymote, Mohill, Fivemilebourne and Barnaderg. He was married with two children.

He was married with two children.

On 18 January 1934, Garda Kennelly was on duty with Sergeant Patrick Forde. They were returning to their Station at Maam, having escorted a female patient to Ballinasloe Mental Hospital. On driving through Galway City, the hackney car in which they were travelling left the roadway and entered the River Corrib at Steamers Quay, Woodquay. On Friday, 28 October 1988, while undergoing an official motor-cycle training course, Garda Conroy was involved in a road traffic collision at Glenmony, Birr, Co. Offaly and fatally injured.

### **Garda Paul Colleran, Registered No 26973E, Loughrea Garda Station.**

Garda Colleran had 5 years service in An Garda Síochána when he lost his life. He was born on the 25 April 1975 and was a native of Quarry Park, Moylough, Ballinasloe, Co. Galway. He held a Diploma in Construction Studies, a Certificate in Civil Engineering and worked as a Site Technician prior to joining An Garda Síochána on 29 October 1996. He also served in Fitzgibbon Street and Navan.

On Wednesday, 5 March 2003, while returning from the District Court at Navan, Garda Colleran was involved in a road traffic collision at Rattin, Kinnegad, Co. Westmeath. He passed away from his injuries on 7 March 2003.



## 34. Scott Medals

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In 1923, General Eoin O’Duffy, Commissioner of An Garda Síochána, travelled to the International Police Conference in New York. There he met with Colonel Walter Scott, an honorary Commissioner of the New York City Police. Scott, a wealthy philanthropist, was very impressed with the newly formed Irish police force and presented O’Duffy with a 1,000-dollar gold bond; the interest on this was to finance an annual gold medal for members of An Garda Síochána. O’Duffy decided that the medal would be for outstanding valour.

The only condition attached to the award of the Scott Medal was that:

*no action, however heroic, will merit the award of the Scott Medal, unless it takes the shape of an act of personal bravery, performed intelligently in the execution of duty at imminent risk to the life of the doer and armed with full previous knowledge of the risk involved.*

The medal takes the form of a Celtic Cross with five panels depicting the words “The Scott Medal”, “For Valour”, the Eagle and the Shield of the USA, the Harp and Sunburst and the Garda Crest.

Scott Medals are presented by the Minister for Justice, Equality and Law Reform at the Annual Scott Medal Ceremony.

### **Garda Daniel Manley, Registered No 7628, Milltown Garda Station.**

Scott Medal Bronze.

On 27 August 1938 at 1 am, while on patrol at Tuam, Co. Galway, along with Garda Curran, Garda Manley disarmed a man holding a single barrel shotgun. It was unknown at the time if the weapon was loaded. The male in question was subsequently arrested and sentenced to a period of imprisonment.

## 34. Boinn Scott

### **Garda Michael McGann, Registered No 16395, Gort Garda Station.**

Scott Bronze Medal.

On 4 December 1970, Garda McGann rushed to the scene of a fire at a Licenced Premises at Church St, Gort. On arrival he was informed that a 2-year-old boy was still inside the building. He entered through the hallway and despite the fact that the ceiling was in flames and the house full of thick black smoke, he crawled across the floor and located the child, effecting a rescue.

### **Garda Geoffrey Power, Registered No 16755L, Galway Garda Station.**

Scott Silver Medal.

At 3.20 am on 10 April 1991, Garda Power was informed that a male had fallen into the River Corrib. The river was in flood at the time and Garda Power, on seeing the male pinned against a stanchion, dropped 10 feet [3 meters] into the water and made his way to the youth. He also had to make his way over an 8-foot gate layered with barbed wire. On reaching the exhausted youth he

## **Garda Thomas J Flaherty, Registered No 22405G, Galway Garda Station.**

Scott Bronze Medal.

On 31 March 1994, Garda Flaherty rescued a female who had fallen in to the City Docks. Having dived 15 feet [4.5 meters] into the water, he located the female and keeping her head above the water swam 60 feet [over 18 meters] to the dock wall where they were eventually taken from the water by colleagues. The female made a full recovery.

## **Garda Denis Madden, Registered No 17523D, Galway Garda Station.**

Scott Bronze Medal.

On 21 December 1994, Garda Madden came to the rescue of a male in the canal at Lower Dominick Street, Galway. Garda Madden jumped 20 feet [6 meters] into the water and was initially dragged underwater by the male. He eventually dragged the male to the canal wall despite his resistance and was eventually assisted from the canal by colleagues. Garda Madden was for a period in great danger of being swept away. The male in question made a full recovery.

## **D/Garda Kieran McNamara, Registered No 19562F, Loughrea Garda Station.**

Scott Bronze Medal.

On 1 March 2002, while on foot patrol, D/Garda McNamara noticed suspicious activity at the Irish Permanent Building Society at Main Street, Loughrea. He then intercepted two males, wearing balaclavas and armed with a knife and a hammer, fleeing the building. After a struggle, D/Garda McNamara managed to arrest the male

Both were subsequently convicted in regard to the incident.

### **An Garda Denis Madden, Uimhir Chláraithe 17523D, Stáisiún Gardaí na Gaillimhe.**

Both members then gave chase to the males who were subsequently arrested and convicted.

**D/Garda James Connolly, Registered No 17790C, Galway Garda Station.**

Scott Silver Medal.

On 16 December 1983, D/Garda Connolly was part of a search operation for kidnapped businessman, Don Tidey. At Drumcroman Wood, Ballinamore, Co. Leitrim, he came under intense automatic gunfire from the suspects and

## 37. First Galway Man to Lead the Gardaí

### Dónall Ó Cualáin | Career History

Dónall Ó Cualáin was appointed Acting Garda Commissioner in September 2017 and served in that role until his retirement in September 2018. He was the first Galway man to hold the highest rank in An Garda Síochána.

He was born in Leitirmóir in 1959 but grew up and went to school in Carna. His father was a National School Teacher in the area and his mother, originally from Kilrickle, Co. Galway, was the District Nurse in Leitirmóir.

Prior to joining An Garda Síochána, Dónall Ó Cualáin worked with Beirtreach Teo. and Taighde Mara while completing a Certificate in Aquaculture in the Galway Regional Technical College, as the present Atlantic Technological University (ATU) was then called. He worked in fish farming in both Connemara and Oranmore until 1983, when he joined An Garda Síochána.

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the force maintained with the community. This relationship, he feels, was and is the ‘family silver’ when it came to policing in Ireland in that Gardaí were both of the community and with the community. This unique tie, while becoming strained in recent times, has never been broken.

As the most enjoyable part of his career, he cites the variety of roles involved and he feels that he was allowed to have five or six separate careers in one, across the operational, tactical and strategical spectrum of An Garda Síochána.

When I was twelve years old, I read a report in the *Irish Independent* newspaper that stated that over the next ten years there would be a need to recruit ten thousand new members of An Garda S och na as the first generation of Garda i would be coming to the end of their service. I made up my mind there and then that I wanted to become a member of An Garda S och na.

I finished school at fifteen years of age, did odd jobs for a few years and then got a steady job in construction, but I knew that I wanted to join the Garda i so I 'kept in touch with the books' as I knew that I would have an entrance exam to do.

In the Spring of 1960, I applied to join; I did the entrance exam in May 1960, got the results in October 1960 and, in June 1961, I was called for an interview and a medical assessment.

# An Garda Síochána

On 3 October 1961 at 10am, I presented myself at the Garda Depot in the Phoenix Park, Dublin, to join An Garda Síochána – with my suitcase which, as directed, contained two pairs of pajamas, black shoes with toe caps, shaving kit, black polish and brushes, one clothes brush and a packet of blue socks.

We were taken to the recreation hall where we were given our registered numbers, mine was 14891. (Years later, my registered number changed to 14891(A) when computers came into use in An Garda Síochána.)

By 12 noon we were sworn in as members of An Garda Síochána. We were shown around the depot, which included the mess hall, canteen and other facilities. A drill sergeant then showed us how to make our beds; first he told us that there were four ways to make a bed, the right way, the wrong way, our way and his way; and then he told us we would be doing it his way.

About twenty-five of us were then taken to Park Gate Hall (it is still there today, across from the new Courts of Justice building but it is no longer used by the Gardaí). This meant that we had to walk to and from the depot, which took us about fifteen minutes. Six of us were allocated to one room; there were three alcoves in each room, with two beds in each alcove, which was not bad. We had a big open press to hang our clothes. Five of us stayed chatting in our room but the sixth man just left his bags on the bed and went out the door. We never saw him again. A few days later, someone collected his bags. His most have been one of the shortest services in An Garda Síochána.

Our training consisted of learning law, police powers, foot drill, physical training and first aid. On our first Saturday at the depot, we should have been allowed out at 1pm but we were instructed to stay in the depot until 5pm. The reason was that a large number of Gardaí from all over Ireland were attending a protest meeting in the Macushla ballroom, in relation to pay and conditions. This

Faoin 12 meán lae, bhí muid curtha faoi mhionn an Gharda Síochána. Taispeánadh an t-áras dúinn, proinnteach, ceaintín agus eile. Bhí sáirsint druileála ansin a thaispeáin dúinn leis an leaba a chóiriú; de réir an leagan amach a bhí aigesean ar chúrsaí, bhí ceithre bhealach ann leis an leaba a chóiriú, an bealach ceart, an bealach contráilte, an bealach a bhí againne agus an bealach a bhí aigesean; agus is é an bealach a bhí aigesean a bheadh againn uilig as sin amach.

Tuairim is cúig dhuine fichead againn ansin a tugadh go dtí Halla Pháirc an Gheata (tá sé i gcónaí inniu ann, trasna ó áras nua na gCúirteanna Breithiúnais, ach ní ag na Gardaí atá úsáid as níos mó). Chiallaigh sin go mbeadh siúlóid anonn is anall chuig an gceannáras orainn, timpeall is ceathrú uaire. Seisear againn a cuireadh i ngach ceann de na seomraí. Cailleach shúgáin dhá leaba a mbíodh muid ina gcodladh ann, trí cinn mar sin sa seomra, ní raibh sin andona. Bhí cófra mór againn lenár gcuid éadaigh a chrochadh ann. D'fhan cúigear againn ag caint

was the first-ever protest meeting of Gardaí. A number of high-ranking officers were sent to the vicinity of the Macushla ballroom to take the names of members attending and addressing the meeting. It resulted in eleven members being dismissed. Jack Marrinan (RIP) was one of the eleven. That was our first week in the depot.

We had our famous Drill Sergeant as our Drill Instructor who had some choice comments to insult the class, such as “you should have turned left at the depot gates”, which meant we should have gone to Dublin Zoo. Another of his comments was: “it took at least two TDs and a parish priest to get you in here, but one stroke of my pen will get you out.” As it turned out, our Drill Sergeant was transferred to another part of the country within three months.

The canteen opened in Park Gate Hall at 8.30pm, when a pint of milk and a rock bun was my order of the night. It was the same I ordered at 11am each morning in the canteen at the Depot. We had dinner at 1pm which was varied and good, as was the tea at 5pm, so we had no complaints. The Mess Sergeant threw half-pounds of butter at the lads when they came in the door, which was his way of distributing the butter. Not every half-pound of butter reached its intended target.

On 1 December, we were sent into Dublin City for traffic duty during the Christmas rush. We went down in a lorry every morning at 10am. I was attached to College Street (now Pearse Street). My street for patrolling was Westland Row. The only problem that I encountered was on 8 December when a milkman went into mass and left his horse and dray unattended. The horse moved along as it was trained to do and caused a bit of an obstruction until I came along and took him under control – problem solved. I had plenty of experience with horses, as I came from a farm in Newtown, Abbeyknockmoy.

At that time, all the ‘boat trains’ from Dun Laoghaire came into Westland Row Railway

Seoladh roinnt de na hoifigigh shinsearacha cóngar don Macushla Ballroom go mbreacfaidís síos ainmneacha na nGardaí a bhí i láthair agus iad siúd a labhair os comhair an chruinnithe. Tugadh bóthar d’aon duine dhéag mar gheall air sin. Bhí Jack Marrinan (nach maireann) ar dhuine acu sin. B’shin í an chéad seachtain againne sa cheannáras.

Sáirsint Druileála iomráiteach a bhí ina Theagascóir Druileála againn. Lean cuimhne ar chuid de na leathfhocail a bhíodh uaidh, mar shampla “ba cheart duit casadh ar chlé ag geata na háite seo”, rud a thabharfadh chuig Zú Bhaile Átha Cliath thú. Caint eile a rinne sé ná: “beirt Theachtaí Dála ar a laghad agus sagart paróiste a theastaigh le go mbeifeása anseo os mo chomhair; chuirfeadh aon scríob amháin de mo pheannsa amach thú.” Mar a tharla, aistríodh an Sáirsint Druileála go dtí cuid eile den tír uilig sula raibh trí mhí caite againn leis.

D’osclaíodh an ceaintín i Halla Pháirc an Gheata ag 8.30 i.n.; pionta bainne agus bunóg rísíní a d’ordáinnse oíche i ndiaidh oíche ann. Mar a chéile a bhíodh agam ag a 11 ar maidin i gceaintín an cheannárais. Bhíodh dinnéar againn ag a 1 i.n., béile maith agus athrú ó lá



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Station and all the trains for the west left from Westland Row too. Just across the street from the railway station was a small shop that only sold religious goods, like the Mission Stalls of old. It was funny to see all the young people who got off the 'boat trains' rushing to the shop to buy rosary beads, prayer books etc. for going back home to show their mothers.

On Christmas Eve 1961, I got to go home for two days but had to be back at the Garda Depot at 11pm on St Stephen's night – not much of a break. On 24 January 1962, I celebrated my 21<sup>st</sup> birthday in Parkgate Hall with a rock bun and a pint of milk. On 3 March that year, we had our passing-out parade and two nights off but we had to be back by 11pm on the Sunday night. I was allocated to Rathfarnham Garda Station as my First Station.

I and my belongings were taken in a Garda van from the Depot to Rathfarnham. On arrival, I introduced myself to the Sergeant. As a single man I was required to live in the Station accommodation. My accommodation was a bedroom which was occupied by four more members. We each had an iron bed, hard mattress, grey 'bulls' wool' blankets with a stripe, white sheets and a metal wardrobe. There were mess facilities where you got your own breakfast and tea and a cook came in and made the dinner in the middle of the day. We had to pay the mess bill on the first day of the month when we were paid.

Rathfarnham was deemed to be a country station with country working conditions. It was District Headquarters for Dundrum, Tallaght, Coolock, Clondalkin and Stepaside. All those stations, except Dundrum, closed at 5pm and the Rathfarnham patrol car had to cover all that area. Only the more senior members got to perform duty in the patrol car. My role was Station Orderly, which was a 24-hour shift and the protection post at the home of Taoiseach Seán Lemass. The protection post was in three-hour shifts, but the night shift was six hours and you

Choinnigh an capall ag corraí leis, mar a chleacht sé agus a bhí múinte dó. Bhí sé ag teacht roimh fheithiclí eile go dtáinig mise an bealach agus gur smachtaigh mé é. Bhí cleachtadh mhaith agamsa ar chapail, mac feirmeora as an mBaile Nua, Mainistir Chnoc Muaidhe.

Na laethanta sin, is isteach ag Stáisiún Rae an Iarthair a thagadh na traenacha uilig ó na báid i nDún Laoghaire. Isteach an stáisiún céanna a thagadh na traenacha uilig as iarthar na tíre. Bhí siopa beag trasna na sráide ó stáisiún na traenach nach mbíodh ar díol ann ach earraí eaglasta, mar a bheadh cábán ar an Misean fadó. B'ábhar mór gáire na daoine óga seo uilig a fheiceáil ag teacht den traen ón mbád agus iad ag deifriú anonn chuig an siopa go gceannaídís páidriní, leabhra paidreacha, agus mar sin de, go mbeidís le feiceáil acu ag a gcuid máithreacha ag dul isteach abhaile dóibh.

D'éirigh liom, Oíche Nollag 1961, go raibh cead abhaile go ceann dhá lá agam. Bheadh orm a bheith ar ais i gceannáras an Gharda faoin 11 i.n. Lá Fhéile Stiofáin – ní mórán de bhriseadh a bheadh ann. An 24 Eanáir 1962, rinne mé ceiliúradh ar chothrom aon bhliain is fiche mo lá breithe i Halla Pháirc an Gheata. Sea go

were allowed half an hour to get there and half an hour to get back. There was no proper shelter, no toilet, no... anything.

My first tour of duty at the protection post was 10pm to 1am. It was snowing very heavily that night, with only a bush for shelter. I will always remember saying to myself: "if this is the Garda Síochána work, it will not be long for me", but I lasted thirty-seven years and four months as a member of An Garda Síochána.

Jack Marrinan (RIP) was also stationed in Rathfarnham and we became good pals. He told me about being dismissed after the Macushla ballroom meeting and how they were called up to Garda Headquarters on the instructions of Dr McQuaid, Archbishop of Dublin. Archbishop McQuaid instructed the then Minister for Justice to reinstate those who were dismissed following the Macushla ballroom meeting. Jack refused to go to the Depot on three occasions, so they had to get in a Peace Commissioner to Rathfarnham Garda Station to have him sworn into the force again and be reinstated. During my stay in Rathfarnham, he became General Secretary of a representative body for Guards, now called the Garda Representative Association (GRA).

We got two days off every month, which meant three nights off to go home. There was no leave on weekends, so if I wanted to go home on a Sunday to play a hurling match, I worked plain clothes on a Saturday night from 10pm to 6am, got to 5am mass in the city, having hired a self-drive car and I left for home at 6am. I got home to Newtown at 9am when the family were going out to 9am mass; I slept a few hours, played the hurling match and was back for 10pm work on Sunday night. This I did most weekends for fifteen months but, thanks to the GAA, I got a transfer to Kiltimagh, County Mayo, in May 1963.

I spent seven years in Kiltimagh and, during that time, I married Della, we had four children and I got promoted to Sergeant. I really enjoyed my

Is ann a bhí Ceanncheathrú Ceantair a dtáinig Dún Droma, Tamhlacht, an Chúlóg, Cluain Dolcáin agus an Chéim faoina scáth. ## Mayo Gardaí drafted into Galway City

In June 1963, I and a busload of other Mayo Gardaí were sent to Galway for the visit of President John Fitzgerald Kennedy. We were put up in St Mary's College, Galway; there were small beds but we managed. I was allocated to Shop Street on the day. There was no problem with the visit; it was short and sweet.

I was drafted into Galway on a number of occasions for the Galway Races to work night duty. The races were a three-day event at that time. I enjoyed that duty and never had any problem and met lots of interesting people.

Galway Cathedral was officially opened on 15 August 1965 and a bus full of Mayo Gardaí, including me, was drafted in to perform duties for that occasion. We left Mayo at 6am; when we arrived in Galway, we were given a cup of tea and a sandwich and sent to our posts at 9am. My post was the Crescent junction (Sea Road) and my instructions were not to let any traffic down by the junction except for the clergy, which was pretty hard as locals and press etc. wanted to go down as well. I was stuck at that point until after 5pm, without a bit, bite or sup. When we came back to Eglinton Garda Station, we were told that there was mass across from the station in the Abbey Church and there was still no mention of food. At that point I had enough of clergy for one day, but I did go to mass.

After mass we went for something to eat. We got on the bus at about 10pm and headed for Mayo. We had gone about ten miles when the bus pulled into Lydon's of Knockdoe; this was at about 10.30pm. Closing time for the pubs at that time was 10pm on Sundays so, as we went into the pub, the locals ran out the back door and the more we called them back, the faster they ran! They were sure we were inspecting the pub but it was just the

Guards looking for a few drinks before we hit the long road to Mayo. Bit by bit the locals came back in and finished their drinks and had a few more. I would say, we left the pub sometime between 11.30pm and 12 midnight. I later learned that the locals had a great story to tell their friends and neighbours the next day, how they were drinking with a busload of Gardaí all night. I think they lived on that story for a week or more.

I was promoted to Sergeant and sent to Burnfoot in Donegal. I spent eighteen months there and the troubles in Northern Ireland kept us on high alert.

I then transferred to Kilmaine, County Mayo, in August 1972 and my wife, our four children and I lived in the Garda Station in Kilmaine. A few months later we were joined by another addition to the family.

Tarraingíodh isteach go Gaillimh mé uaireanta éagsúla aimsir na Rásaí go ndéanfainn dualgas oíche. Trí lá a leanadh na rásaí an t-am sin. Thaitníodh sin liom, ní raibh aon trioblóid riamh agam agus chastaí go leor daoine spéisiúla orm.

# An Garda Síochána

While stationed in Kilmaine, my area covered Ballinrobe, Kilmaine, Cong and Shrule and I had the opportunity to work in all those areas. I was Sergeant in Charge of the Ballinrobe Area for a number of years. I was very involved in the local community in Kilmaine, in particular with the GAA and I was involved in setting up a Foróige club. I was also very involved with hurling in Mayo, both as a player and in management. I played hurling with Ballinrobe hurling club and was Chairman of Mayo Hurling Board for a time. I also played with the Galway Garda Divisional Hurling team.

While serving in Kilmaine I was involved in the Association of Garda Sergeants and Inspectors (AGSI) and served as Vice President of the organisation for a number of years.

In 1993, I was transferred to An Cheathrú Rua, West Galway. I was made very welcome by the Gardaí in the An Cheathrú Rua, Leitir Móir and Rosmuc Sub Districts; they included Gardaí Folan, Keane, Burke, Heanue, McDonagh, Kinneavy, Mitchell (RIP), O'Connor and Lynch. Garda Brendan Kinneavy often put me up and looked after me in the Garda house in Rosmuc when I was working late.

On my first Saturday night, I didn't know if I was on O'Connell Street in Dublin or in An Cheathrú Rua with all the buses bringing patrons to the local disco. The discos took place every Saturday night; they were well run and I never encountered too much trouble.

During my time in the area, we set up a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme (Scéim Phobal ar Aire ar an gCeathrú Rua). We had a few poitín raids and solved a number of crimes.

In July 1994, I was a front-seat passenger in a patrol car when we were involved in a road traffic collision. As a result of the accident, I was off sick for ten to twelve weeks. When I returned to work, I found out that I was being transferred and I was

not happy about this. A few months later, I was happy to be posted to Maam in the Clifden District and I remained there until I retired in 1998.

### **Maam Area**

I had responsibility for Maam, Leenane and Letterfrack. These were very well-run stations ever before I went there and the area was crime free. Garda Terry Keenan was heavily involved in every facet of the community, including getting a community centre built and setting up community organisations; he was and still is highly respected by the local community. All his great work led him to winning a Garda Divisional Merit award for his service to the community. I had a great rapport with Terry, even before I went to Maam, as we travelled together to Dublin to Garda Association meetings.

When I went to Maam, a Garda van was allocated to the area for the first time.

There were discos in Maam Cross every weekend; people came from far, near and wide and we had very little trouble.

Peacockes Hotel in Maam Cross was a favourite stop for tourist buses and we often got asked for Garda memorabilia, especially by retired police personnel from America. In addition to this, we were regularly asked by tourists about *The Field* and *The Quiet Man* film locations.

The annual Maam Cross Fair was and still is, a big occasion on the Tuesday following the Bank Holiday on the last Monday of October and extra Garda personnel was drafted to assist with animal control.

My time in the Maam area was most enjoyable as the people were extremely law abiding, courteous and respectful.

The highlights of my career were job satisfaction, keeping the areas that I served in free from crime as much as I could and helping those who required the services of An Garda Síochána.

I thoroughly enjoyed my time working with the Association of Garda Sergeants and Inspectors as well. It afforded me the opportunity to try to improve the pay and working conditions of the members. I also met members of police forces from other countries during this time and this broadened my horizons and knowledge.

I made lifelong friends within An Garda Síochána and am delighted that three of my children, Alberta, Paul and Adrian decided to follow in my footsteps and became members of An Garda Síochána. They did this without any persuasion from me. I retired on 23 January 1998 as the compulsory retirement age at that time was fifty-seven. I was given a great 'sendoff' at a function in Peacockes at Maam Cross from the people of the various areas that I served in, as well as members from the National Executive and members of An Garda Síochána in Galway and Mayo.

I would have stayed on for another few years if that had been possible.

Cuireadh cóisir iontach ar siúl dom tigh Peacocke ar an Teach Dóite, le daoine i láthair ó na ceantair uilig ina ndearna mé fónamh i mo Gharda, chomh maith le daoine den Ardchoiste Náisiúnta agus Gardaí as Gaillimh agus Maigh Eo.

He saw many changes in the force during his years in the Gardaí from the time he left his native Waterford, including a stint as a motorcycle Garda, before moving up through the ranks to eventually become a Chief Superintendent.

Bill Fennell spent two terms in the Tuam and Roscommon-Galway East Divisions during the latter years of his career. Prior to his final return to the West, he also spent a short time in Thurles from February 1999 until April that year.

Going to Thurles was a move almost halfway back towards his Waterford home! His wife Hillary is from the Thurles area, a place called Littleton. But his time there in charge was short as he came back to Roscommon-Galway East which covered Tuam. He retired on 5 September 2005 but his links with Tuam still remain strong.

*I knew a little bit about Tuam before being appointed Superintendent there as I was an Inspector in Galway in the 1980s. Also, before I left Galway to go to Navan in 1991, I had some dealings with Tuam as it was the court area for the town.*

*I was delighted when I was appointed to Tuam as it was just down the road from Galway where I lived and I was at home every evening.*

*When stationed in Tuam, the Gardaí that I got advice from included the late Garda Dick Williams who was of monumental assistance to me as well as being such a well-respected figure in Tuam. He said to me: "whatever you do, be straight with the people of Tuam and they will be straight with you" which was great advice.* said the retired Garda Chief.

Like any Garda recruit coming out from Templemore, he said to me that he "went wherever he was sent" and his First Station was Nenagh for a stint on the beat there.

Ba bheag nár filleadh ar a dhúchas a bhí san athrú go Durlas Éile, leath bealaigh ar ais go Port Láirge, agus ba filleadh ar a dúchas dáiríre a bhí ann dá bhean, Hillary, as áit cóngarach don bhaile sin ar a dtugtar an Baile Beag. Ach ní fada a chaith sé i gceannas ansin gur tháinig sé ar ais go Ros Comáin-Oirthear na Gaillimhe, an rannán a dtagann Tuaim faoina scáth. Chuaigh sé ar scor an 5 Meán Fómhair 2005 ach tá ceangal dlúth i gcónaí aige le Tuaim.

*Bhí roinnt eolais agam ar Thuaim sular ceapadh i mo Cheannfort ann mé mar gheall ar an tréimhse a bhí caite agam i mo Chigire i nGaillimh i rith na 1980idí. Sular fhág mé Gaillimh ag dul don Uaimh sa bhliain 1991, bhí roinnt plé agam le Tuaim mar gurbh é ceantar cúirte an bhaile é.*

*Bhí ríméad orm nuair a ceapadh i dTuaim mé ó tharla nach bealach fada bóthair a bhí ann as Gaillimh, mar a raibh cónaí orm, agus bhínn in ann a bheith ar ais abhaile gach tráthnóna.*

*Nuair a bhí mise ar lonnú i dTuaim, bhí an Garda Dick Williams, nach maireann, ar dhuine acu siúd a chuireadh comhairle orm. Ba mhór an cúnamh eisean agus bhí an-mheas air ag muintir Thuama. Deir sé liom, pé ar bith céard a dhéanfainn, a bheith macánta ionraic le muintir Thuama agus go mbeidísean amhlaidh liom; agus b'iontach an chomhairle í sin,"* arsa an t-iar-Ard-Cheannfort.

After that he did various driving courses and became an official motor-cyclist Garda and went from that to become a District Clerk in Nenagh, which was a stepping stone to becoming a Sergeant. Then, in September 1977, there was a major recruitment drive in the Gardaí and he was sent back to Templemore as an instructor for police duties, the driving school and for motor-cyclist Gardaí.

Bill says that coming to the Tuam area after that and getting to know the Gardaí there was a seamless enough transition when he was appointed Superintendent.

*In any station that you would go to at that time the vast majority of Gardaí in the area lived in the area, which is not the case now. They were all a great help to me from the very start.*

He got involved in activities in the community in the Tuam area, including setting up the primary schools' quiz. That helped show the people another side of the Gardaí, especially among young people and parents.

*I got a lot of help from others, including Garda Oliver King who was in Mountbellew then. It was just to get the Gardaí involved with the school-going children and to let them see that we weren't the ogres that some might make us out to be, laughed Bill.*

*I enjoyed that and we had some good craic with the children and we were amazed at how interested they were in everything. It was nice to see that some of them who took part in those school quizzes joined the force later on, he added.*

Tuam was a sprawling area to cover for the Gardaí back then and it has got even bigger since as it now stretches from beyond Headford to Ballymoe, which used to be in the Roscommon area.

But Bill recalls that it was always a manageable area and the public was great to deal with.

Deir Bill nárbh athrú rómhór a bhí san aistriú go ceantar Thuama dó ina dhiaidh sin nuair a ceapadh ina Cheannfort é ná in aithne a chur ar na Gardaí san áit.

*Stáisiún ar bith a dtiocfá ann na laethanta sin, bheadh formhór mór na nGardaí ina gcónaí sa cheantar, rud nach fíor sa lá atá inniu ann. Ba mhór an chabhair dom iad uilig ón gcéad lá.*

Ghlac sé páirt in imeachtaí pobail i gceantar Thuama agus ba é a chuir Tráth na gCeist ar bun do na bunscoileanna. Chuidigh sin le gné eile de na Gardaí a léiriú do na daoine, go háirithe do dhaoine óga agus dá gcuid tuismitheoirí.

*Bhí cúnamh go leor agam ó dhaoine eile, ina measc an Garda Oliver King a bhí ar an gCreagán an t-am sin. Ní raibh i gceist ach caidreamh a bheith idir na Gardaí agus na leanaí a bhí in aois scoile ionas go bhfeicfidís nach amhais a bhí ionainn mar a bheadh daoine áirithe a dhéanamh amach," a deir Bill agus é ag gáire.*

*Bhí sin taitneamhach, bhí craic mhaith againn leis na leanaí agus b'iontach linn an tsuim a bhí acu i ngach uile shórt. Ba dheas an rud a thabhairt faoi deara, tráth ab fhaide anall, go ndeachaigh roinnt díobh sin a bhí páirteach*

*Some years ago, it became apparent in the Church of Ireland that the number of priests had dwindled. There was a need for more help for the conducting of services. So, I was persuaded by the then Archdeacon of the Diocese, Gary Hastings, to become a reader.*

*Ansin, tuairim is trí bliana ó shin, ceapadh ar iasacht mé i gceantar Thuama agus Chonga maidir le seirbhísí. Mí-ásach go leor, bhí Déan Thuama, Alistair Grimason, san ospidéal ar feadh tréimhse fada agus, faraor, fuair sé bás ar an 22 Samhain 2022 agus ba mhínic mise asam féin i mbun na seirbhísí i dTuaim, a deir a t-iar-Ard-Cheannfort.*

Bíonn air "daoine oirnithe" a fháil do sheirbhísí Comaoineach nuair a bhíonn sé i bhfeighil na heaglaise ach, nuair a deirtear leis gur dócha gurbh fhurasta dó a bheith ina Dhéagánach dá rachadh sé ar ais i mbun staidéir tamall, ligeann Bill an gháire mheidhreach sin as a d'aithneodh cuid mhaith agus abraíonn "ar ndóigh, san aois a bhfuil mise inti, seans gur fada caite an t-am lena aghaidh sin" agus sin deireadh leis mar ábhar cainte.

*Then, about three years ago, I was seconded to the Tuam-Cong area for services. Unfortunately, the late Dean Alistair Grimason of Tuam was hospitalised for a long period of time and sadly, passed away on 29 November 2022 so I was often on my own conducting services in Tuam, said the retired Garda Chief.*

Bill Fennell has to get ‘ordained people’ for Communion services during the times that he is in charge at the Church. However, when it is put to him that, if he went back to study, he probably could easily become a Deacon, Bill emits one of his hallmark jovial laughs and he concludes by saying: “sure, at my age, it is probably far too late for that.”

Again, Bill’s voluntary Church work is just another example of the many different facets of community activities that members of An Garda Síochána quietly take part in, often in their spare time, while off duty or in retirement too, like Tuam’s peace-keeping retired Chief Superintendent.

## 40. Garda Con Mulvey, Retired

I was born in Knocklong, County Limerick, the son of a blacksmith; with my mother, father and older brother, I moved to Glengarriff, County Cork, when I was about three years old.

After I finished school, I got work in a German textile factory in Castletownbere and I got the opportunity to travel to Oberursel (Taunus) in Germany for further training. On my way, I arrived in Frankfurt on the day J.F. Kennedy, then President of the USA, was shot dead in 1963.

Having been in Germany for a period, I received a letter from my mother saying: “The local Sergeant was telling your Dad that the Garda exam is coming up and he also said: ‘it would suit your

lad.” Pensionable, secure, good pay, etc. etc. After a few more letters and receiving the application form in the post, I reluctantly decided to go home.

I sat the Garda exam with a friend from Glengarriff. We were placed 99<sup>th</sup> and 100<sup>th</sup> on the list of applicants. In the Depot I was allocated the number 16118 and his was 16119; furthermore, we had the same birthday: 25/6/1945! I liked the training and made some great friends.

A few memories from my time in the Depot include the following: Our Police Duties Instructor required us to recite all definitions by heart. Failing to do so correctly incurred the penalty of writing the ‘damn thing’ ten times. I will never forget the words of the caution.

Having bacon and cabbage one day, I found a snail in my cabbage; I picked it up with a spoon and went to the member of staff who was supervising. I said: “look, Sir, what I found in my cabbage”; he looked down and back to me and said: “what do you want me to do about it?”! On my way back to my table, the snail made its escape.

One night, I was awakened by a loud shout and, looking up, I saw our Gym Instructor looking down at me, saying: “what are you doing down there?” “Sleeping, Sir”, I said. I was lying on my mattress on the floor. “Who did this to you?” he asked. “I don’t know, Sir, because I was asleep.” The culprit owned up straight away. He got a good lecturing from the instructor and was asked whether he had any relation in the Gardaí. He said he had a brother in Pearse Street Garda Station. With that he was let off the hook.

When the allocation to stations were made, my friend was allocated to Cork City. I was very pleased for him but when I heard that Garda Mulvey was to go to Athenry, I was in a state of shock and disappointment. I had never heard of the place and thought: “get me a map please.”

Jab inphinsin, slán, pá maith, srl. srl. Rinne mé an cinneadh, go drogallach, tar éis cúpla litir eile agus foirm iarratais a fháil ar an bpost, filleadh abhaile.

Thug mé faoi scrúdú an Gharda Síochána in éineacht le cara liom as an nGleann Garbh. Uimhir 99 agus uimhir 100 a bhí againn ar liosta na n-iarratasóirí. Tugadh uimhreacha 16118 agus 16119 dúinn san Áras; agus, anuas air sin, ba é an lá breithe céanna a bhí againn: 25/6/1945! Thaitin an oiliúint liom agus rinne mé roinnt cairde maithe.

Áirítear ar roinnt de na cuimhní atá agam ó mo chuid laethanta san Áras: Chuir Teagascóir na nDualgas Póilíneachta faoi deara dúinn na sainmhínithe go léir a fhoghlaim de ghanmheabhair. Chiallaigh a mhalairt a dhéanamh go mbeadh sé mar phionós ort an ‘diabhal de rud’ a scríobh amach deich n-uaire. Ní dhéanfaidh mé dearmad go deo ar fhocail an rabhaidh.

Lá amháin agus mé ag ithe bagún agus cabáiste, fuair mé seilide sa gcabáiste; phioc mé suas leis an spúnóg é agus rinne mé mo bhealach chuig an gcomhalta foirne a bhí i mbun maoirseachta. Dúirt mé: “Féach, a dhuine uasail, ar an rud a fuarthas sa gcabáiste; d’fhéach sé síos agus d’fhéach sé ormsa ansin agus dúirt: “céard atá tú ag iarraidh ormsa a dhéanamh faoi?”! D’éalaigh an seilide agus mé ar mo bhealach ar ais go dtí an bord.

Dhúisigh béic ard mé aon oíche amháin agus nuair a bhreathnaigh mé suas, chonaic mé an Teagascóir Aclaíochta ag féachaint anuas orm: “Céard atá tú a dhéanamh thíos ansin?, a dúirt sé liom.” Dúirt mé: “Tá mé i mo Chodladh a Dhuine Uasail.” Bhí mé i mo lú ar mo thocht ar an urlár. “Cé a rinne é seo ort?” a d’fhiafraigh

I was welcomed to Athenry Station by Sergeant Garvin. When I asked about duty times, he said: “9 am in the station and finish at 9 am the following morning”, i.e. 24 hours. I said to myself: “To hell with this; I am going back to Germany.” Instead, I had now become an official ‘Mammy’s Garda’.

I had accommodation with Kathleen Curley in Athenry town, a very kind lady and a mother to us all. She was a dab hand at poker; she could stay playing all night.

I remember one morning, when we travelled to 6am mass in Loughrea. It was my first town duty and I was standing at the front door with my HDip. in Policing and a few lectures in my back pocket plus a good crease in my pants and my shoes shining. After 18 weeks of high-pressure training, what was I supposed to do then? I need not have worried. I had joined a family – a family of Gardaí. With senior men like Mick Geary, Pat Melia, John McNulty and others, my real training and education began. Those men were great teachers, advisors and friends.

Fuair sé íde béil ón teagascóir agus fiafraíodh de an raibh duine a bhain dó sna Gardaí. Dúirt sé go raibh deartháir leis i Stáisiún Gardaí Shráid an Phiarsaigh. Scaoileadh leis nuair a d’inis sé an méid sin.

Nuair a tosaíodh á gcur amach chuig na stáisiúin, is go cathair Chorcaí a cuireadh mo chara. Bhí mé thar a bheith lúcháireach do mo chara ach scéal eile ar fad a bhí i gceist nuair a chuala mé go raibh an Garda Mulvey le cur go Baile Átha an Rí, cúis mhór díomá a bhí ann. Níor chuala mé trácht ar an áit riamh cheana agus smaoinigh mé: “faigh mapa dom, le do thoil.”

Chuir an Sáirsint Garvin fáilte romham go Stáisiún Gardaí Bhaile Átha an Rí. Nuair a chuir mé ceist faoi uaireanta dualgais, dúirt sé: “9am sa stáisiún agus ag críochnú ag 9am an mhaidin dár gcionn”, m.sh. 24 uaire a chloig. Dúirt mé liom féin: “Bíodh an diabhal aige seo; tá mé ag dul ar ais go dtí an Ghearmáin.” Ina áit sin, bhí mé i mo ‘Gharda Mhamaí’ go hoifigiúil.

Bhí mé ag fanacht in éineacht le Kathleen Curley i mbaile Bhaile Átha an Rí, bean an-chineálta a bhí inti agus bhí sí ar nós máthair againn go léir. Bhí máistreacht aici ar an bpócar; d’fhéadfadh sí fanacht ag imirt cártaí ar feadh na hoíche.

Is cuimhin liom maidin amháin, nuair a chuamar chomh fada le Baile Locha Riach d’Aifreann 6am. Bhí mé ar dualgas i mbaile mór den chéad uair agus mé ag seasamh ag doras na sráide le mo le HDip. sa Phóilínacht agus cúpla léacht i mó phóca tóna, filltín breá i mo threabhsar agus snas i mo chuid bróg. Tar éis 18 seachtaine faoi oiliúint ardbhrú, céard a bhí mé in ainm is a dhéanamh anois? Ní raibh aon údar inní agam. Bhí mé anois i mo bhall de theaghlach, – teaghlach an Gharda Síochána. Le fir níos sinsearaí ar nós Mick Geary, Pat Melia, John McNulty agus daoine eile i mo thimpeall, is ina dteannta sin i ndáiríre ar cuireadh tús leis an oiliúint agus leis an oideachas.

On one occasion, a Sunday night, Mick Geary found me watching tv in the house and asked me: “why are you not going dancing, what are you doing here?” I said I had no money. He said: “you have no money? Here’s a fiver and get the hell out of here.” On the once-monthly pay day, in cash, I cleared the black book: “Mick, here is your money and thanks very much.” The ‘black book’ was commonly used by a lot of Gardaí.

Some mornings, while being on duty as Barracks Orderly, the Superintendent’s Clerk, Pat Melia, asked whom I had relieved and told me to get him. When he arrived and went to the Super’s Office, I would, after a few minutes, get a signal to leave the station. I travelled to the local Golf Club where I would meet Superintendent Tom Broderick and Pat Melia to play a leisurely 9 or 18 holes of golf. I preferred the 18 as it kept me out of the barracks longer.

I was once involved in the discovery of a local brewery (making Poitín). We brought that particular little operation to an end, destroying the illegal liquor and equipment .

While in Athenry, I gave talks to children on the subject of road safety and I continued to do so during my subsequent time in Kiltullagh. I was then transferred to Monivea Station. We did the tillage book and visited all the farmers in the area. We knew ‘the man to go to’ to get all the information in one go but if that didn’t work, we were usually given two to three weeks to gather the information ourselves. Another job we got to do was to distribute and collect the national census forms.

After a short time in Monivea, I was detailed to attend at the driving school in Templemore. This was a great course and we had some exciting times, as you can imagine. We drove on instruction, you had no mind, it was the physical working of the car – if you were told to do 80 miles an hour around a bend that is what you did without thinking. I, as a student in the back

Nuair a bhíodh seisean imithe isteach in Oifig an Cheannfoirt, d’fhaighinn, tar éis cúpla nóiméad, cead an stáisiún a fhágáil. Thaistealaínn chomh fada leis an gClub Gailf áitiúil, áit a gcasfaínn leis an gCeannfort Tom Broderick agus le Pat Melia le 9 nó 18 poll gailf a imirt ar mo sháimhín só. Thaitin 18 poll gailf níos fearr liom mar gur chiallaigh sé níos mó ama imithe as an mbeairic.

Bhí baint agam uair amháin le teacht ar ghrúdlann áitiúil (ina rabhtas ag déanamh poitín). Chuireamar deireadh leis an bhfiontar sin agus scríosamar an poitín agus an trealamh neamhdhleathach.

Le linn dom a bheith i mBaile Átha an Rí, labhraínn le leanaí maidir le sábháilteacht ar bhóithre agus lean mé leis sin le linn mo chuid ama i gCill Tulach ina dhiaidh sin. Aistríodh ansin mé chuig Stáisiún Gardaí Mhuine Mheá. Choinníomar leabhar curaíochta agus thugamar cuairt ar na feirmeoirí go léir sa cheantar. Bhí eolas againn ‘ar an bhfear le dul chomh fada leis’ ar mhaithe leis an eolas a fháil d’aon iarraidh amháin, ach murar oibrigh an méid sin, de ghnáth tugadh coicís go trí seachtaine dúinn

of the car, was scared to bits. On completion of the course, I returned to Athenry with my qualification to drive the official patrol car.

Athenry District was being reduced in size so those of us who were surplus to requirement were again transferred and I was sent to Clifden. It was a very quiet town. There was a 24-hour protection post at Ballyconneely as the British Navy was doing a survey of the sea. We had a caravan to use during the course of this duty. We were also given all-weather clothing which I believe came from the British Navy!

There was a popular poker school in the station and this helped to pass the time and also to top up the money. Occasionally, Peter O'Toole (the famous actor) would sit in, but he was careful

with his chips. The only problem I had in Clifden was the spoken Connemara Irish compared to the Munster dialect; in conversation with some locals, a Connemara/Munster Dictionary would have been useful.

While on Temporary Transfer to Dundalk during the 'Irish Cement Strike' in nearby Drogheda in May 1970, I met the woman of my dreams. Maureen and I were married 13 months later.

I returned to Clifden with my new bride and was only there for two and a half weeks when I got a permanent transfer to Bookeen Station, which was now in Loughrea Garda District, whereas it had still been in the former Athenry District when I went to Clifden.

When I got to Bookeen Station, I applied for a typewriter. The Superintendent's Office required to know the number of words, per day, per week etc. that I would be typing. As I had only arrived in the station, it was not possible to give an answer to that question, so it was back to the ink bottle and parker pen for me. The file met a 'firey' end. There was a very small fire place in the public office but in my first attempt at heating the place, I filled the station with smoke and, as you might guess, we discovered squatters in the chimney.

The strength of the station in Bookeen previously had been 1 Sergeant and 2 Gardaí. It was now one Garda: Con! I was the member in charge as this station was still a full Sub District. My first impression was of a press standing at an angle, leaning into a hole in the floor caused by rotten floor boards, so the station was in need of a few visits from the Office of Public Works. I had great support from the Gardaí in Loughrea – they used to say: "we are only a phone call away."

While in Bookeen, I had a few calls from John Huston, the famous film director who had become an Irish citizen in 1964 and who, at that time, lived with his family in St Cleran's, Craughwell.

Bhí laghdú á dhéanamh ar Cheantar Bhaile Átha an Rí agus aistríodh arís an líon sin againn a bhí mar bharráíocht ar riachtanais agus cuireadh mise chun an Chlocháin. Baile thar a bheith ciúin a bhí sa gClochán. Bhí post cosanta 24 uaire an chloig i mBaile Conaola mar go raibh Cabhlach na Breataine i mbun suirbhé ar an bhfarraige. Bhí carbhán againn le linn dúinn a bheith ar an dualgas seo. Tugadh éadaí uile-aimsire dúinn agus creidim gur ó Chabhach na Breataine a tháinig an t-éadach!

Bhí scoil phócair sa stáisiún agus chuidigh sé sin go mór leis an am a chaitheamh agus chuidigh sé le hairgead a chur inár bpócaí freisin. Uaireanta, thagadh Peter O'Toole (an t-aisteoir cáiliúil) isteach, ach bhí sé an-chúramach go deo lena chuid cártaí. Gaeilge labhartha Chonamara an fhadhb ba mhó a bhí agam sa gClochán i gcomparáid le canúint Chúige Mumhan; bheadh foclóir Chonamara/na Mumhan thar a bheith úsáideach chun comhrá a choinneáil le roinnt de mhuintir na háite.

Le linn dom a bheith ar Aistriú Sealadach go Dún Dealgan le linn 'Stailc Irish Cement' chas mé le grá geal mo chroí i mí na Bealtaine 1970 i nDroichead Átha. Phós mé féin agus Maureen 13 mhí ina dhiaidh sin.

D'fhill mé ar an gClochán le mo bhrídeog agus ní rabhamar ansin ach beagán os cionn coicíse nuair a fuarthas aistriú buan go Stáisiún Gardaí an Bhuaicín, a bhí i gCeantar Gardaí Bhaile Locha Riach anois, cé gur i gCeantar Bhaile Átha an Rí a bhí sé nuair a chuaigh mise go dtí an Clochán.

Rinne mé iarratas ar chlóschríobhán nuair a chuaigh mé chuig Stáisiún Gardaí an Bhuaicín. Theastaigh ó Oifig an Cheannfoirt an líon focal a bheadh á gclóschríobh agam in aghaidh an lae, na seachtaine, srl a fháil amach. Mar gheall nach rabhthas ach tar éis glacadh le mo chuid dualgas sa stáisiún, ní rabhthas in ann an cheist sin a fhreagairt, agus mar sin ní raibh de rogha agam ach filleadh ar an mbuidéal dúigh agus ar pheann

Bookeen Station covered two Court Districts, so one had to be careful when issuing invites to meet a District Judge. At one stage, I investigated a traffic accident involving a tractor and a car. The tractor was in two halves, one on the left and one on the right-hand side of the road. The Director of Public Prosecutions had to be consulted as the middle of the road divided the Athenry and Loughrea Court Districts.

The owner of the station in Bookeen wished to repossess the station; luckily a site was available in Kiltullagh for a new station. That site had been bought years before to accommodate policing surrounding the large Bord na Mona works at Attymon Bog. Now, a new station with accommodation was built at Kiltullagh and my family and I moved in. When we left Bookeen Station, Garda Pat Melia and I decommissioned the old building by taking down the Garda crest from over the front door.

I was then in charge of the Sub District of Kiltullagh. The private residence was seen by the community as part of the Garda Station and it soon became apparent that I was on a 24-hour duty sheet. If I was not available, Maureen answered our private door and directed the caller or took a message for me. She was now a non-commissioned 'Garda', without pay. When, during this time, I also performed duty at Hackballscross on Temporary Transfer, Maureen was very busy.

I gave a hand to the Kiltullagh National School hurling team. We had some great matches and lots of fun, but no medals. With some ice cream and juice on our way home, the lack of medals was soon forgotten. I also became a leader with the local Foiróige club. We had a successful project on alcohol awareness. I felt that the young people really benefited from these events. I always maintained a great interest in the youth and trying to steer them away from alcohol.

I often gave talks in the local schools and my son, who was at the time in one of the classes, wasn't

Le linn dom a bheith lonnaithe i Stáisiún Gardaí an Bhuaicín, fuair mé cúpla glaoch gutháin ó John Huston, an stiúrthóir scannán cáiliúil a bhain saoránacht Éireann amach sa bhliain 1964 agus a bhí ina chónaí lena theaghlach, ag an am sin, in St Cleran's i gCreachmhaoil.

Bhí dhá Chúirt Dúiche á gclúdach ag Stáisiún Gardaí an Bhuaicín, mar sin ní mór duit a bheith fíor-chúramach agus cuireadh á eisiúint agat le teacht os comhair Breitheamh Cúirte Dúiche. Ag am amháin, d'fhiosraigh mé taisme tráchta ina raibh carr agus tarracóir i gceist. Bhí an tarracóir ina dhá leath, leath amháin ar an taobh deas den bhóthar agus an leath eile ar an taobh clé. Bhí gá le dul i gcomhairle leis an Stiúrthóir Ionchúiseamh Poiblí mar go raibh taobh amháin den bhóthar faoi Chúirt Dúiche Bhaile Átha an Rí agus an taobh eile faoi Chúirt Dúiche Bhaile Locha Riach.

Theastaigh ó úinéir Stáisiún Gardaí an Bhuaicín seilbh a ghlacadh ar an stáisiún arís; go hámharach bhí suíomh ar fáil do stáisiún nua i gCill Tulach. Ceannaíodh an suíomh roinnt blianta roimhe sin chun cóiríocht a chur ar fáil don phóilíneacht thart timpeall oibreacha móra Bhord na Móna ar Phortach Áth Tíomain, anois,

best pleased that his father was in the school, talking to him and his friends.

With the youth club we recorded the memorials in the graveyards and created a map and a book. We presented this to Fr McNamara, the local Parish Priest. He was very pleased and thanked the young people for their effort. This gave me a great interest in local history which remains with me to this day.

I regularly visited elderly and vulnerable people in my area – as often as possible. These visits were very much appreciated and I got great satisfaction from meeting those people.

One morning, I received a call from the Superintendent in Loughrea to inform me that I was being transferred to Galway. I made some choice comments which I will not share. He said: “hold on, Con, the station is also being transferred so neither you or the station will be moving!” I was now part of Galway District and then had to perform occasional duties in Galway City.

I also had a special duty, which I performed only once a year: Being Santa – this was the most memorable duty of all.

I was one of the Garda team that won the All-Ireland Golf Championship in 1992. Our team captain was Kevin Devally.

Performing many duties, some of which were mundane and reoccurring, I always kept in mind two words: ‘prevention’ and ‘detection’. I would mostly lean to prevention, if at all possible. To this end, I performed many short checkpoints at different locations and times in the sub district. In many cases, I used cautions and advised the driver to present later at the station with the issue remedied.

To conclude, I found that, in dealing with certain situations, I had an ally; not an official issue and never requiring special permission to use it – a smile – it always helped diffuse tensions.

Ach beagán uachtar reoite agus sú a bheith againn ar an mbealach abhaile, is gearr go mbeadh na boinn ligthe i ndearmad. Bhí mé i mo cheannaire leis an gclub áitiúil Foróige freisin. Bhí tionscadal rathúil againn maidir le feasacht ar alcól. Bhí mé den tuairim gur bhain na daoine óga tairbhe i ndáiríre as na himeachtaí seo. Lean mé leis an spéis san aos óg i gcónaí agus rinne mé iarracht iad a choinneáil ón alcól.

Is minic a labhair mé sna scoileanna áitiúla, agus ní bhíodh mo mhac, a bhí i gceann de na ranganna ag am sin, sásta a athair a fheiceáil sa scoil ag labhairt leis féin agus lena chuid cairde.

Rinneamar taifeadadh sa gclub óige áitiúil ar na leaca cuimhneacháin sna reiligí agus chruthaíomar léarscáil agus leabhar. Bhronnamar an léarscáil agus an leabhar ar an Athair McNamara, an Sagart Paróiste áitiúil. Bhí sé thar a bheith sásta agus ghlac sé buíochas leis na daoine

óga faoin iarracht a bhí déanta acu. Thug an méid sin spéis mhór sa stair áitiúil domsa agus tá an spéis sin agam go dtí an lá atá inniu ann.

Thugainn cuairt go rialta ar dhaoine aosta agus ar dhaoine goilliúnacha i mo cheantar – chomh minic agus ab fhéidir liom. Léiríodh an-mheas ar na cuairteanna seo agus bhain mise sásamh iontach as casadh leis na daoine seo.

Maidin amháin, fuair mé glaoch gutháin ón gCeannfort i mBaile Locha Riach lena chur in iúl dom go rabhthas chun mé a aistriú go Gaillimh. Bhí go leor le rá agam faoin aistriú sin ach nílim chun an méid sin a roinnt anseo. Dúirt seisean: “Foighne ort nóiméad anois, a Con, tá an stáisiún á aistriú freisin mar sin ní bheidh tú féin ná an stáisiún ag bogadh!” Bhí mé anois mar chuid de Cheantar Gardaí na Gaillimhe. Bhíodh orm a bheith ar dualgas i gCathair na Gaillimhe ansin ó am go chéile.

Bhí dualgas ar leith orm freisin, dualgas nach mbíodh le déanamh agam ach uair amháin sa mbliain: Daidí na Nollag! – ba é sin an dualgas is mó uile nach ndéanfaidh mé dearmad go deo air.

Bhí mé ar dhuine d’fhoireann an Gharda Síochána a bhuaigh Craobhchomórtas Gaill na hÉireann sa bhliain 1992. Is é Kevin Devally a bhí ina chaptaen ar an bhfoireann.

Bhínn ag tabhairt faoi go leor dualgas, bhí roinnt de na dualgais sin leadránach agus roinnt acu a tharla arís agus arís eile, ach choinnigh mé dhá fhocal ar chúl mo chinn i gcónaí: ‘cosc’ agus ‘brath’. ## 41. Garda Jim Cuddy (Retired)

I was born in Swinford, Co. Mayo and I joined An Garda Síochána on 18 September 1968 and retired on 3 January 2003. I was first assigned to Eglinton Street, Galway City, on 22 February 1969 and later transferred to Oughterard, Co. Galway, in August 1970.

While stationed in Oughterard, we had a number of poitín raids in Lettermore, Lettermullen and on the islands of Lough Corrib.

In those days, we performed what was called a '24 Station Orderly' when the Station Orderly did

a 24-hour shift and, if you were lucky, you got the following day off, called an 'Ex-BO (Barrack Orderly) day'. Gardaí at that time had just two days off a month and their annual leave.

At that time, there were no such things as computers or mobile phones. What we had was a 'crank-up phone', linked to the Post Office and a telex machine for receiving official messages which had to be copied and sent out to other stations.

In September 1973, I transferred back to Eglinton Street, when the first Divisional Garda Traffic Corps was established. The complement of the Traffic Corps was 1 Sergeant and 12 Gardaí and we operated in two large, white Vauxhall Cavaliers.

The amount of money that could be used for a prisoner's meal in those days was two shillings and six pence. On one occasion, a young Garda was Station Orderly in Eglinton Street and, when it came to lunch time, there was a person in custody in the cell, so a meal had to be procured. The Station Orderly duly went to the cell and asked the prisoner what he wanted for lunch and the man asked for steak and chips, which was ordered from a local restaurant and delivered to the station with an invoice for seven shillings and six pence. When the Clerk in the Sergeant's office returned from lunch, he was confronted with the invoice on his desk. He went to the Station Orderly and advised him that the cost of a meal for a person in custody could not exceed two shillings and six pence. The Station Orderly replied: "well, he has it ate now."

Later, in 1979, a new section was created, called the Crime Collator (to deal with criminal intelligence) and I was assigned as the first Crime Collator for the Division of Galway West. The number in the Collator's office was later increased to two with the arrival of Sean McMenamón, later replaced by Joe Carey. Both have since passed away.

Ní raibh caint ná trácht ar ríomhaire ná ar fhón póca na laethanta sin, bhíodh ort an fón a chasadh le ceangal le hOifig an Phoist. Bhí meaisín teiléacs ann a dtagadh teachtaireachtaí oifigiúla isteach air. Bhídís sin le cóipeáil ansin agus le seoladh amach chuig beairicí eile.

I mí Mheán Fómhair 1973, aistríodh ar ais go Sráid Eglinton mé nuair a cuireadh Cór Tráichta an Gharda ar bun den chéad uair. Sáirsint amháin agus dáréag Gardaí a bhí ar fhoireann an Chóir an t-am sin agus dhá charr mhóra bhána de dhéanamh Vauxhall Cavalier a bhíodh fúinn.

Dhá scilling agus sé pingine an t-airgead a bhí ceadaithe le caitheamh ar bhéile do phríosúnach an uair sin. Tharla lá go raibh dualgas an Fheighlí Bearice i Sráid Eglinton ar Gharda óg agus, nuair a tháinig am lóin, bhí duine ar a choinneáil sa chillín agus bhí gá béile a sholáthar. Chuaigh an Feighlí, mar ba chóir, chomh fada leis an gckillín agus d'fhiafraigh den phríosúnach cén lón a bhí uaidh. Stéig agus sceallóga a dúirt an fear istigh agus ordaíodh sin ó bhialann gar do láthair. Tugadh an béile isteach agus sonrasc leis ar seacht scilleacha agus sé pingine. Nuair a tháinig an Cléireach in oifig an tSáirsint ar ais óna lón féin, bhí an sonrasc seo ar an mbord roimhe. Chuaigh sé chomh fada leis an bhFeighlí Bearice agus dúirt leis nach bhféadfaí níos mó ná leathchoróin a íoc ar bhéile do dhuine a bhí ar a choinneáil. Is é an freagra a fuair sé ó fheighlí na beairice: "bhuel, tá sé ite anois aige."



# An Garda Síochána

Over the years, there were a number of events that stood out. We had visits from President Regan and Hillary Clinton from the USA and, of course, the Pope's visit in 1979. We also had a number of murders in Dominick Street and the Claddagh, which were solved. The Galway hurlers and footballers won All-Ireland Championship titles in the 1980s, 1990s and 2000s and the home comings gave a great lift to Galway City and County.

In 1986, Eglinton Street Garda Station closed and the Gardaí moved to a new station at Mill Street, which was officially opened by the then Minister for Justice, Alan Dukes.

In the past, we had a Chief Superintendent based in Galway City and we also had Superintendents in Galway, Gort, Loughrea, Oughterard and Clifden. Those were the districts that comprised the Galway West Division at the time. The towns of Ballinasloe and Tuam were part of the Roscommon, Galway East Division. The first two female recruits to come to Galway were Maureen Ryan and Imelda O'Flynn. Shop Street and Eglinton Street were two-way streets at the time with traffic such as buses, lorries, cars and the odd bicycle going in both directions.

During my service in the Gardaí in Galway, I was involved in many of the Garda-related organisations. I was a Garda Representative Association (GRA) official at District, Divisional and Central Executive Committee level for a number of years, advocating for the welfare and conditions of Garda members in the Galway Division. I was also an elected member for the Connaught Region on the Garda Medical Aid Board in Dublin and served on that board for 15 years. I served on the Divisional Welfare Committee and was a Board member of the Garda Medical Aid Society for a number of years as well.

Sa bhliain 1986, dúnadh Beairic na nGardaí ar Shráid Eglinton agus d'athraigh na Gardaí go dtí stáisiún nua ar Shráid an Mhuilinn. Alan Dukes, Aire Dlí agus Cirt na linne a rinne an oscailt oifigiúil.

San am a bhíodh, is é an chaoi a mbíodh Ard-Cheannfort i gCathair na Gaillimhe agus Ceannfort i nGaillimh, ar an nGort, i mBaile Locha Riach, in Uachtar Ard agus ar an gClochán. I retired from An Garda Síochána when I reached the retirement age of 52 in January 2003, having served 35 years. Six months later, I was co-opted onto Galway County Council and have been successful in four local elections over the years, leading to a further 20 years of public service.

I enjoyed every day in An Garda Síochána and would like to thank all those I worked with for their friendship and camaraderie.

## 42. Superintendent P.J. Colleran, 14552A (Retired)

Superintendent Patrick Joseph (P.J. / Paddy) Colleran's journey from the quiet fields of Headford, County Galway, to the upper ranks of An Garda Síochána stands as a testament to a life dedicated to public service, fairness and community spirit. Born in 1937 to William and Bridget Colleran, P.J. was one of nine children

and was raised on a small family farm. Seeking a future beyond the limitations of rural life, he joined the Gardaí in January 1961 at the age of 23, embarking on a career that would span over three decades and touch countless lives. In joining An Garda Síochána he was following in the footsteps of his older brother Gabriel Colleran who had joined a few years previous. Gabriel had served with distinction for over 22 years, mostly in the West of Ireland where he retired as a Sergeant from An Spidéal, Co. Galway, before changing career and taking up a new role as Lecturer in Law at the then Regional Technical College (RTC) in Galway. In spite of his early retirement from An Garda Síochána, Gabriel, who sadly passed away in 2015, had always spoken so highly and with pride of his time as a member of An Garda Síochána.

P.J. Colleran's Garda career began with six months of training at the Phoenix Park training centre. His first posting took him to Carrigans, Co. Donegal, for border duty, a quiet start that belied the wealth of experience to come. Throughout the 1960s, he served in various stations across Counties Mayo, Clare, Roscommon and Galway, rising to the rank of Superintendent when he was stationed in Birr, Co. Offaly, until his retirement in 1997. In 1966, he married Nuala Conlon, a school teacher, and by 1973, he had settled his family in Ballinasloe, which would remain their home base through his many transfers. P.J.'s devotion to Nuala for over forty years of marriage, was reflected in the act of his serving her breakfast in bed every single day, a simple act that spoke volumes of their enduring partnership and affection before she passed away in 2009.

His close attachment to Ballinasloe was further evidenced by the multiple roles he held in the Ballinasloe District over the years, including his time as the Sergeant-in-Charge of Ballinasloe Garda Station while he resided with his family in the official accommodation adjoining the Barracks, and his role as Inspector prior to his promotion to Superintendent.

# An Garda Síochána

P.J. Colleran's career was marked by several memorable and historic moments:

## JFK's Visit to Galway, 1963

As a young Garda, one of P.J.'s most exciting assignments was crowd management during President John F. Kennedy's historic visit to Galway on 29 June 1963. P.J. vividly recalls standing on the corner outside what was then Moons Department Store on Shop Street, as the presidential motorcade swept by. He was one of about 100 Gardaí drafted in from all over Connacht and put up in St Mary's College for several days. The anticipation and pride of that day, as the presidential fleet arrived and thousands of Galwegians lined the streets, remains etched in his memory, a moment when Galway felt at the heart of the world.

## The Arrest of John Gilligan

Another notable episode was P.J.'s role in the arrest of John Gilligan in Ballinasloe, long before Gilligan would become infamous in Irish criminal history. Acting on an alert after Gilligan was spotted in Athlone, P.J. and fellow Gardaí lay in wait at St Michael's Car Park, Ballinasloe. The arrest itself had a touch of irony, Gilligan, returning to his car with a Supermac's snack box, was caught thanks to his hunger. "If only he'd skipped the chips, he might have skipped an arrest!" P.J. would later joke. Little did anyone know then that Gilligan would later become one of the most notorious criminals in Ireland and would subsequently be convicted and receive lengthy prison sentences for various serious criminal offences.

## The Stardust Fire and Tribunal

Even in his later years, P.J. Colleran's commitment to justice and public service remained undiminished. At the age of 84, he testified at the tribunal into the Stardust fire tragedy. As a Garda Inspector with 20 years' experience at the time of the disaster, he was the senior Garda officer

on duty at the communications centre in Dublin Castle on the night of the fire on 14 February 1981. He helped coordinate the Major Accident Plan on the night, directed emergency responses and ensured that information was relayed to anxious families and the public. His testimony decades later was a reminder of the profound impact the Stardust disaster had on all those involved and of his enduring sense of duty to the families still seeking justice.

## The Ann Lovett Case

As Inspector in Granard in 1984, P.J. Colleran was at the centre of one of Ireland's most tragic and haunting cases, the death of Ann Lovett, a 15-year-old schoolgirl who died giving birth alone at a grotto. P.J. helped lead the investigation and offered support to the Lovett family at a time of immense grief and national soul-searching. At the inquest, P.J. read out a statement from Ann Lovett's mother. The sadness and tragedy of the case left a lasting effect on him, as it did on the entire country. The experience reinforced his belief in compassion and the importance of community support in the face of tragedy.

## Awarded the Centenary Medal by His Son, Chief Superintendent Seán Colleran

One of the proudest moments came in October 2022, when he was awarded the Garda Centenary Medal. What made the occasion truly special was that the medal was presented by his own son, Chief Superintendent Seán Colleran who had followed in his footsteps and was attached to the Clare Division at the time. Owing to P.J.'s service as a Sergeant in Doonbeg in 1965 (well before Seán was even born!), the centenary medal was presented to him at the centenary event in Ennis. The ceremony was a poignant symbol of family legacy and dedication to public service, celebrated by colleagues and the wider community.

Throughout his service, P.J. was known for his fairness, professionalism and deep sense of community. He believed in the value of Gardaí maintaining close contact with the public, advocating for a return to the 'beat on foot' to foster trust and approachability. His approach was always to serve rather than punish and his empathy left a lasting impression on colleagues and the communities he served.

P.J.'s career took him to every province in Ireland, culminating in his role as

Superintendent in Birr, where he was widely admired for his leadership and dedication. Upon his retirement at age 60 in 1997, tributes poured in from judges, solicitors and citizens alike, all attesting to his fairness, courtesy and commitment. Judge Jim O’Sullivan, reflecting on P.J.’s career, remarked that he was “one of the great officers who people speak highly of” and that his presence would be missed in court.

## 43. Garda Pat Gallagher (Retired)

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*by Pat Gallagher*

I was born in 1944 on the north-west coast of Donegal, into a farming and fishing family – the eldest of twelve siblings. The size of the family at that time was a common occurrence in Ireland, especially in rural areas, encouraged by both church and state. Feeding such a large family in a coastal community in the 1940s was not a big issue. What the land failed to provide, the sea provided in abundance: herring, mackerel, white fish of all descriptions, salmon and lobster. Money... there was none! Manual labour was exchanged: a day given was for a day taken.

At seventeen years of age, I was persuaded by the local sergeant of An Garda Síochána to sit the entrance exam to join the Gardaí. Within a month of sitting the exam, I was among hundreds of

men, mostly from the west of Ireland, labouring on civil engineering works in the Highlands of Scotland. One mid-afternoon in September 1964, a policeman from Fort William arrived at my place of work, asked for me by name and told me that I was to report to the Garda Depot in the Phoenix Park in Dublin for a pre-entrance medical exam on a given date. The harsh weather conditions in the mountains of Scotland, with frost, snow and ice in the teeth of winter, helped make up my mind: “Gardaí, here I come!”

Having passed the medical, I entered the training college in Templemore, County Tipperary, in November 1964, having being assigned registered number 16008C. Six months later, I was on my way to my First Station, in Loughrea, County Galway. I was met at the local railway station by Jim Clancy, a veteran of almost forty years’ experience in the force. A native of Moycullen, what Jim did not know about human habits and behaviour was not worth knowing. He brought me directly to my pre-arranged digs, a shared room above the garda station. There were four or five of us new lads bedding in the station. No shower or hot water at the time, just a washbasin between us. For a small fee, we received breakfast, lunch and dinner from the next-door neighbour (Mrs Fitzpatrick). It was fairly basic living at the time but, most important to us, it was cheap!

Some days later, Sergeant Terry Moorhouse detailed Joe McCarty, another recruit and myself to go to two townlands on the outskirts of Loughrea to check for dog licences. It was a joke; at most houses we visited, where a dog was present and where no licence could be produced, the stock excuse from the homeowners was that the dogs had strayed into their house just before we arrived. The return of detections for unlicensed dogs gathered by Joe and myself was not impressive!

The 1960s and ’70s in Ireland was a great period to be young, active and mobile. If you did not have a car, you made sure you were friendly with someone who had. The showbands were at their

Sé mhí dar gcionn, bhí mé ag déanamh mo bhealaigh don chéad bheairic agam i mBaile Locha Riach i gContae na Gaillimhe. Bhí fear romham ag an stáisiún traenach, Séamas Mac Fhlannchaidh a raibh beagnach daichead bliain caite aige sna Gardaí. Ba de bhunadh Mhaigh Cuilinn eisean agus an ní nach raibh ar eolas aigesean faoi bhéasa agus ghnás an duine, níorbh fhiú a fhios a bheith agat. Thug sé caoldíreach chuig an áit mé a raibh lóistín socraithe dom, seomra codlata os cionn bheairic na ngardaí. Bhí ceathrar nó cúigear againn ann, na gasúirí úra, a chodlaíodh sa bheairic. zenith at that time and a means of travel was a must. Every dance venue, whether dance hall or marquee was packed to the rafters. A venue being in an isolated location was no barrier to drawing the masses. We were on rotation in the station to patrol the various music venues; there were never any problems at the shows, we were just sent to show a presence, usually on the second half of our split shift.

While in Tynagh station, a regular detail was to visit the farmers whose lands were bordering the public road and to warn them to clear their land of weeds such as ragwort, dock, thistle and other unsightly wild growth. However, the greatest culprit at the time was the County Council who owned the grass verges on both sides of

Le linn a bheith i mbeairic Thíne, ba ghnáthdhualgas cuairt a thabhairt ar fheirmeoirí a raibh a gcuid talún ag síneadh leis an mbóthar poiblí agus foláireamh a thabhairt buachalán, copóg, feochadán agus fásra fiáin dá gcineál a ghlanadh. Ba leis an gComhairle Contae an réimse féaraigh le ciumhais an bhóthair féin a dtugtaí an 'long acre' i mBéarla air. B'annamh a thugtaí feirmeoir chun cúirte mar gheall ar neamhaird ar fholáireamh den sórt seo nuair a bhíodh taobh an bhealaigh mhóir chomh dona céanna nó níos measa. Ní raibh an Roinn Talmhaíochta agus an Chomhairle Contae ag teacht go maith lena chéile ag an am, agus chaitheadh na Gardáí déanamh go réidh cúramach idir an dá thaobh. Maireann cuimhne go fóill agam ar fhón den seandéanamh a oibriú, an láimh múscailte a chasadh, an giolla teileafóin do do fhreagairt, thú a cheangal leis an stáisiún a iarraidh – 'Tynagh 202'; is dócha gur athraigh an uimhir freisin leis an aimsir.

the road, known as ‘the long acre’ by locals. Failure to comply with a warning seldom led to a prosecution for local farmers, because of the condition of the adjacent ‘long acre’. At the time, the Department of Agriculture and the County Council were not in tune with each other, while the gardaí were walking the tight rope between the two. I still remember twisting the handle on the old phones, getting through to an operator and asking to be put through to the station – ‘Tynagh 202’; I am sure the number has been changed since.

Another Department of Agriculture instruction, from time to time, to the local Gardaí was to visit a local farm and ascertain that a bull on the farm had been neutered in accordance with previous instructions from that Department. The number of Gardaí willing to physically examine a bull in an open field was very low. Scott medals for bravery were awarded for less. The word of the farmer was good enough for me.

Job wise, being a member of An Garda Síochána from the 1960s to the 1990s was great because,

I dtús na 1970idí, tháinig deireadh le drochghnás na ‘sealanna scoilte’; nuair a bhíodh sin i bhfeidhm, bhíodh ar an nGarda oibriú ón 10 r.n. – 2 i.n. i dtús an lae agus ón 10 i.n. – 2r.n. san oíche le seal iomlán a chur isteach (gabhtar buíochas speisialta le Jack Marranan RIP arb é a thréandícheall agus a chumas i mbun caibidlíochta ba chúis le deireadh a chur leis na sealanna scoilte). B’fhearr na



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during that time, overtime was introduced, time-off improved immensely and annual leave entitlements were extended (following the recommendations of the 1968 Conroy Commission). In the early 1970s, the terrible practice of 'split shifts' was ended. On split shifts, Gardaí had to work from 10 am to 2 pm in the morning and from 10 pm to 2 am at night to complete one full shift. Special thanks to the efforts and negotiation skills of Jack Marrinan, RIP, for getting the split shift abandoned. Greater opportunities in various aspects of police work arose, as well as the chance to work abroad with the United Nations and Interpol for the Gardaí with initiative and promotion in mind.

In 1972, the Traffic Corps was set up in Galway, comprising one Sergeant, twelve Gardaí and two high-powered 2.5-litre traffic cars. After a brief stint in Clifden, I was one of the twelve to join the new unit. Of the original thirteen members of the unit, five are now deceased, RIP. Our remit was solely related to traffic: speeding, drunk-driving, no insurance or driver's licence, bald tyres or any other problem that would render the vehicle or the driver a danger to other road users. Within a few weeks, there was a marked improvement in safety on the roads generally. The presence of a traffic car was feared and respected and the number of serious accidents and drunk-driving dropped dramatically. A similar 'shock' initiative appears to be warranted again today.

The world is evolving at a fast pace. The young men and women in the present and future Garda force, with their higher standard of education, new ideas and new technology, will make our communities a safer place for all. We did our best in our time; if they can say the same at the end of their working career, they will have a content retirement.

Tar éis tamall gairid a chaitheamh ar an gClochán, bhí mise ar dhuine den dáréag san aonad nua. Tá cúigear den triúr Garda déag a bhí san aonad ar dtús imithe ar shlí na fírinne ó shin, go ndéana Dia trócaire orthu. Le cúrsaí tráchtá ar fad an cúram a leagadh orainne: luas, tiomáint agus ól déanta, tiomáint gan árachas nó ceadúnas tiomána, boinn a bhí róchaite nó a dhath ar bith eile a d'fhágfadh an fheithicil nó an tiománaí ina gcontúirt ag daoine eile ar an mbóthar. Taobh istigh de na seachtainí tosaigh, bhí feabhas mór ar chúrsaí sábháilteachta ar na bóithre. B'ábhar inní go mbeadh carr leis an gcór tráchtá amuigh agus tháinig ísliú tobann ar líon na dtionóiscí tromchúiseacha agus na gcásanna ina raibh daoine ag tiomáint agus iad ar meisce. De réir cosúlachta, dhéanfadh athrú 'tobann' den chineál céanna tairbhe san am i láthair.

Ní go mall a chasann rothaí móra an tsaoil. Fágfaidh fir agus mná óga an Gharda sa lá atá inniu ann agus san am atá le theacht, leis an oideachas breise atá orthu, na smaointe nua agus na deiseanna nua teicneolaíochta, comharsanachtaí na hÉireann níos sábháilte ag an bpobal iontu. Rinne muidne gach dícheall lenár linn féin; má bhíonn an ní céanna le rá acusan i ndeireadh a ré oibre, beidh siad sona sásta agus iad ar pinsean.

## Conclusion

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The history of An Garda Síochána is deeply intertwined with the story of the Irish State itself.

Our earliest records for the Galway Garda Division list the first members of the Civic Guard that arrived at Galway City on 25 September 1922. Among the first 20 men was Sergeant James C. Clarke who was a native of Co. Westmeath. Sergeant Clarke was a former member of the Royal Irish Constabulary and on joining the Civic Guard he was assigned the registered number 3. This meant that he was actually the third man to join the force in 1922. This highlights the deep historical significance of the Garda organisation in Galway and its close alignment with the broader narrative of the Irish State.

The other Sergeant who arrived in Galway on that same date was James Daley, registered number 1750. A native of Cork, his efforts in regard to his duties in those early years appear to have been well recognised.

*We wish to place on record our appreciation of the manner in which Sergeant James Daly has performed his duties since the advent of the Guards in Galway. (Resolution of the Grand Jury of County Galway, 24 June 1924).

Records also reveal that, following the departure of the Royal Irish Constabulary, Garda stations were initially established in locations such as Bookeen, Ballinahinch, Cleggan, Cill Chiaráin, Clonbur, Laurecetown, Castleblakeney, Turloughmore, Aughrim, Gurteen, Menlough, Peterswell and Kilconly. Over the years, as operational needs and practices evolved, many of these stations were closed and their personnel was redeployed.

The 'County Register of Crime' for Galway (a Register that was, due to necessity, adopted directly from the RIC) shows that in 1924 there was a total of 161 crimes reported. While modest by today's standards, the register includes serious crimes such as malicious injury to property, robbery with arms, kidnapping, intimidation, arson and assaults on Gardaí. Many of these crimes were politically motivated, reflecting the lingering unrest in the aftermath of the Civil War.

This was a time when every aspect of a Garda's life was regulated whether on or off-duty.

The Garda Síochána Laimh Leabhar Dualgas, 1923 which was the textbook of duties for the Civic Guard covered such Legislation and Barrack Regulations as –

Is léir ó na taifid freisin gur tharla, tar éis do Chonstáblacht Ríoga na hÉireann imeacht, stáisiúin Gardaí a chur ar bun i dtosach in áiteanna mar iad seo a leanas: An Buaicín, Baile na hInse, An Cloigeann, Cill Chiaráin, An Fhairche, An Baile Mór, Gallach, An Turlach Mór, Eachroim, Goirtín, Mionlach, Tobar Pheadair agus Cill Chonla. Le himeacht aimsire, de réir mar a tháinig athrú ar éileamh nó ar ghnáis oibre, tharla cuid mhór de na stáisiúin sin a dhúnadh agus na Gardaí iontu a chur ag obair i malairt stáisiúin.

De réir an 'County Register of Crime' maidir le Gaillimh (Clár de chuid an RIC ar leanadh leis de cheal ama), tuairiscíodh 161 coir sa bhliain 1924. Cé gur beag an líon sin i gcomparáid lenár linn féin, luaitear coireanna tromchúiseacha ar an gclár, mar shampla díobháil mhailíseach do mhaoín, robáil faoi arm, fuadach, imeaglú, coirloscadh agus Gardaí a ionsaí. Cúrsaí polaitíochta ba chúis le go leor coireanna den sórt sin, comhartha ar an míshuaimhneas a lean tamall tar éis Chogadh na gCarad.

- Rate of Walking – When on beat or patrol the Guard should walk at a rate of 3 miles per hour.
- Changing of bed sheets – Such change is to be made once a month on the 1st.
- Change of linen and socks – men are to change their linen and socks twice in each week and flannels once a week.
- Dressing of beds – Beds are to be dressed and properly folded by 8 am throughout the year.

Single Gardaí had to live in their stations and had to be back at their stations by 11 pm unless on night duty. They were also begrudgingly allowed only 2 days leave per month.

Today, the Galway Garda Division encompasses the entire county, but this was not always the case. Initially, there were two separate divisions: Galway West, overseen by a Chief Superintendent based at Eglinton Street in Galway City, and Galway East, managed by a Chief Superintendent at Ballinasloe, Co. Galway. While Galway West remained a stand-alone division, parts of Galway East were later incorporated into the Roscommon/Galway East Division, with its headquarters in Roscommon. In 2008, following the redrawing of divisional boundaries to align with local authority areas, the unified Galway Division was established under the leadership of a Chief Superintendent based at Mill Street, Galway City; since 2018, the Galway Division is based at the new Regional Headquarters in Murrrough, Galway City.

While the challenges facing the force today are considerable, they should not overshadow the many achievements of An Garda Síochána. As one of the Irish State's most enduring institutions, the Gardaí have played a vital role in establishing and maintaining peace and stability since

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the nation's turbulent beginnings. This was accomplished by a largely unarmed force whose members earned the trust and goodwill of the communities they served.

Today, the responsibilities of An Garda Síochána span a wide range of areas, including crime prevention, public order, state security, economic and social regulation and emergency response. In recent years, society has called for a faster pace of change in how the organisation is structured and managed, particularly in relation to resources and priorities.

Since 1989, members of An Garda Síochána, including many Galway based members, have played a prominent role in United Nations peacekeeping missions around the world, beginning with their first deployment to Namibia. Their contributions have been formally recognised and continue to reflect the organisation's commitment to international service and cooperation.

Public satisfaction with An Garda Síochána remains consistently high, with approval ratings regularly exceeding 90 per cent. This level of trust is unmatched by other police forces of similar structure and is widely regarded as a benchmark across Irish society.

Despite the complex and ever-evolving demands of modern society, the trust and goodwill between the Irish public and An Garda Síochána endures. It was first established by the founding members in 1922 and has been carefully upheld by over 41,000 Gardaí who have served since. This legacy of public service remains central to the organisation's identity and will continue to guide its mission in the years ahead.

The chapters in this publication reflect the many facets of Garda life in Galway – from the origins of the Civic Guard and the legacy of the RIC to community policing, uniforms, transport and personal stories of service. They include topics

Together, these contributions offer a rich and varied portrait of An Garda Síochána in Galway – its people, its places and its enduring commitment to public service.

If the founding members of An Garda Síochána had failed in 1922, the State would have failed. Successive generations of Gardaí have carried that same burden, ensuring the State's continued stability and development.
