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
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# REFERENCE



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#### The Minister for Justice

Sir,

It gives me pleasure to present this my first annual report on Crime and information generally on Garda activity in respect of the year 1990.

Throughout the year under review the Garda Siochana coped manfully with increasing operational demands of crime, drug abuse and traffic.

The welcome reduction in the amount of recorded crime in 1989 has been slightly reversed, though, thankfully, not by much (1%). The biggest increase (2%) was in Group 3 - Offences Against Property without violence (larceny, fraud, forgery, etc.). The detection rate was down slightly from 33.2% to 33.1%.

The value of property stolen was £36,376,810, compared with £33,023,563 in 1989. Property to the value of £3,012,883 (8.3%) was recovered. The percentage figure for 1989 was 7.8%.

The overall level of crime remains unacceptable. I intend to closely monitor the crime situation and take whatever measures may be appropriate to deal with the situation.

Recorded crime in the Dublin Metropolitan Area showed a decrease of 2.9% from the 1989 figure. This accounted for 56.6% of the overall figures for the year under review.

It will be noted that the figures for murders (17 committed and 15 detected) were the same as for 1989.

An ongoing problem in recent years has been the incidence of armed crime. It is pleasing to note that armed crime, at 459, decreased by 12.4%. This followed a substantial decrease of 22.2% in 1989 compared with 1988. It is apparent that the measures taken to counteract this terrifying and cowardly form of crime are proving effective.

The total number of persons convicted for crime recorded in 1990, or dealt with by way of caution under the Juvenile Liaison Scheme, was 13,654. Of this number 5,190 (38.0%) were under 17 years of age. The corresponding figure for 1989 was 4,894 (35.7%). It is hoped that a number of initiatives recently taken in relation to the Juvenile Liaison Scheme - including the establishment of a National Juvenile Liaison Bureau - will further enhance the Scheme.

The misuse of drugs continues to be a problem. Throughout the year there was no respite in the attention focused on those who engage in this activity. It is disturbing to find that the number of persons charged with drug offences was 2,071, an increase of 54.1%, and the number of drug seizures was 2,316, an increase of 48.3%. The increases in the number of persons charged and the seizures relate, in the main, to small amounts of cannabis and cannabis resin. Our policy in this matter is to maintain vigilance and foster a greater public awareness of the problem in the community. Arrangements are being made to have members undergo refresher training courses in the prevention and detection of drug abuse.

There were 432 fatal road traffic accidents during the year resulting in 478 deaths, an increase of 2 and 18 respectively. A number of initiatives are being taken in this area, including an increase in the strength of Traffic Corps personnel and a greater emphasis on the enforcement of drink driving and speeding legislation.

Proceedings were taken in respect of 462,088 summary offences during the year. This represents a decrease of 112,644 (or 19.6%) on the 1989 figure. The decrease was in line with a policy decision to prosecute for the more serious offences in appropriate instances. The figures, however, in respect of persons prosecuted were generally in line with those for previous years.

Community based schemes - Neighbourhood Watch and Community Alert - continue to expand. At the end of 1990 there were 995 Neighbourhood Watch Schemes, involving 199,701 households, and 221 Community Alert Schemes.

Neighbourhood Policing also extended and at the end of 1990 there were 8 Sergeants and 120 Gardai engaged on this work in the Dublin area and 6 Gardai in Cork City.

I would like to record my appreciation for the support and encouragement given throughout the year by the public, particularly community groups, the customs service and the media.

I would also like to thank your Department for the assistance and support received, and Dr. James Donovan and his Staff in the Forensic Science Laboratory for the efficient manner in which they carry out their work.

I am grateful too for the support received from the Staff Associations and I look forward to enjoying an open and beneficial relationship with them.

In conclusion, I wish to thank all members of the Force and civilian staff for their loyality and dedication during the year under review, and for their willingness to adapt and respond to the challenges we face.

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

#### INDICTABLE OFFENCES

Indictable offences which came to the notice of the Garda Síochána during the year ended 31st December, 1990 numbered 87,658 as compared with 86,792 in the year ended 31st December, 1989, an increase of 1.0%.

In the Dublin Metropolitan Area (D.M.A.) 49,652 indictable offences were recorded, a decrease of 2.9% on the figure for 1989. Of the total crimes recorded in the State 56.6% occurred in the D.M.A. The D.M.A. has an estimated population of 1,043,787 based on the 1986 census of population, or 29.5% of the total population of the State.

#### CRIME RATE

Based on the 1986 Census of Population, the crime rate per 1,000 of the population was 24.8 with a rate of 47.6 in the D.M.A. and a rate of 15.2 outside the D.M.A. The following table shows the rate for each Division and the Dublin Metropolitan Area which is composed of 5 Divisions.



#### DETECTION OF CRIME

The overall detection rate in 1990 was 33.1% (33.2% in 1989). The detection rate varies from 96.3% in respect of Other Indictable Offences to 30.3% in Offences Against Property with Violence.

The total number of indictable offences detected was 28,985. Proceedings were taken in 25,133 cases, and the remaining 3,852 cases (col. 17 of Indictable Offences table) include cases dealt with under the Juvenile Liaison Scheme.

#### OFFENCES AGAINST THE PERSON (GROUP 1)

Murder, Manslaughter, Dangerous Driving causing Death, Traffic Fatalities. Possession of Firearms with intent to Endanger Life, Assault and related offences comprisé this Group.

In 1990 a total of 1,631 offences were recorded in this Group, a decrease of 2.2% on 1989. The detection rate was 82.6% (79.1% in 1989).

The overall figure of 1,631 Offences Against the Person includes 627 (38.4%) committed in the D.M.A. where the detection rate was 72.4% (69.6%) in 1989).

#### MURDER

There were 17 murders in 1990, two (2) of which remain unsolved. There were 2 cases of attempted murder.

#### MANSLAUGHTER

There were 15 cases of manslaughter in 1990, five (5) of which arose out of traffic accidents.

#### TRAFFIC FATALITIES

There were 478 deaths arising from 432 fatal traffic accidents, an increase of 18 deaths on the 1989 figure of 460. Eight persons (4 in 1989) were charged with dangerous driving causing death and three persons (1 in 1989) were charged with dangerous driving causing serious bodily injury.

#### OFFENCES AGAINST PROPERTY WITH VIOLENCE (GROUP II)

Offences of burglary, aggravated burglary, robbery, arson and serious malicious damage to property are included in this group. A total of 35,453 offences were recorded in 1990, an increase of 0.2% on 1989 and the detection rate was 30.3% (31.6% in 1989).

Of the total number of offences in this Group 17,718 (50.0%) were committed in the D.M.A. where the detection rate was 28.2% (29.6% in 1989).

#### ROBBERY AND AGGRAVATED BURGLARY

There were 1,646 robberies in 1990, an increase of 283 on the previous year. Aggravated burglaries at 1,014 decreased by 7 from 1,021 in 1989. Firearms were used in 56 cases of robbery and 403 cases of aggravated burglary, a decrease of 23 and 42, respectively, on the figures for 1989. These figures show an overall decrease of 65 armed crimes compared to the previous year.

#### ARSON AND MALICIOUS DAMAGE

There were 4,382 cases of malicious damage of which 244 cases were arson; 2,222 (50.7%) were detected. In 1989 the total figure for arson was 218, showing an increase for 1990 of 11.9%.

#### BURGLARY

Offences of burglary numbered 28,073 of which 7,545 (26.9%) were detected. In 1989, a total of 28,841 offences of this nature were recorded showing a decrease of 2.7% for 1990.



#### LARCENIES ETC (GROUP III)

Larcenies, Forgéries and Frauds of various kinds comprise this Group. In 1990, 50,222 such offences were recorded and this shows an increase of 999 (2.0%) on the figure for 1989. A total of 16,552 (33.0%) of these offences were detected. In 1989 detections amounted to 32.1%.

The overall figure of 50,222 offences recorded in this Group, includes 31,118 (62.0%) committed in the D.M.A. where detections totalled 8,480 (27.3%). In 1989 detections in the D.M.A. totalled 8,630 (27.3%). The number of larcenies from unattended vehicles at 17,780 shows a decrease of 619 (3.4%) on the figure for the previous year.

#### OTHER INDICTABLE OFFENCES (GROUP IV)

This is a miscellaneous crime group in which 352 offences were recorded. A total of 339 (96.3%) of these offences were detected.

When compared with 1989, the overall figure shows a decrease of 155 (30.6%). Of the total number of offences recorded 189 (53.7%) were committed in the D.M.A. and 185 (97.9%) of these were detected.

#### SCENES OF CRIME EXAMINATION

During the year Scenes of Crime Examiners attached to the Fingerprint Section of the Technical Bureau attended the scenes of 670 crimes. The total number of fingerprint identifications was 1,630. Members attached to Ballistics Section visited 424 scenes of crime.

#### FORENSIC SCIENCE

In 1990 the Forensic Science Laboratory dealt with a total of 4,428 cases. Of these 2,316 involved drugs and the remaining 2,112 involved murder, rape, hit-and-run accidents, fires, armed robberies, etc.

There were approximately 28,500 separate exhibits brought to the Laboratory for testing.

186 cases involving the suspected use of firearms were referred to the Laboratory and these cases involved 2,742 separate exhibits.

There were 42 cases involving the suspected use of explosives which had a total of 132 exhibits.

#### MISSING PERSONS


During the year 1,359 persons were reported missing. At the end of the year 29 persons were still not traced. One unidentified body was found during the year.

#### GARDA DOG UNIT

The present strength of the Garda Dog Unit is 2 Sergeants and 12 Gardai within the Dublin Metropolitan Area and 1 Garda at Cork City.

During the year trained dogs were used by Garda Handlers in searches for both drugs and explosives. They were also used in tracking operations in major crimes and general patrolling. 460 searches were undertaken. 100 arrests were made by Garda Dog Handlers and other incidents led to the issue of 125 summonses. The unit assisted in the investigation of 200 other cases.

#### JUVENILE LIAISON OFFICER SCHEME

The Garda Juvenile Liaison Officer Scheme, which was introduced in 1963, is now in operation in every Garda Division. The Scheme provides for the cautioning of juvenile offenders, as an alternative to Court Proceedings, subject to certain conditions.

Juveniles dealt with in this way are placed under supervision of a Garda Juvenile Liaison Officer who is specially appointed and has relevant training in dealing with young people. It is the function of the Juvenile Liaison Officer to assist in the rehabilitation of the juvenile with a view to the avoidance of further criminal activity.

In addition, he is involved in supervising and guiding potential deliquents and all aspects of youth work through contact with young people in youth clubs, attending meetings and seminars, and visits to schools. This involvement is aimed towards a greater appreciation of the Garda role in Society and the importance of law observance.

The Minister for Justice has announced the establishment of a Garda Juvenile Bureau, forming part of the Community Relations Section. The Juvenile Bureau will deal with all matters involving juveniles and young persons on a National basis. It will also have responsibility for the introduction and operation of a GARDA SCHOOLS PROGRAMME.

Primarily the Juvenile Bureau will be responsible for the monitoring and speedy disposal of all cases where juvenile offenders are involved and ensure that appropriate levels of supervision of Juvenile offenders takes place. In addition, the Juvenile Bureau will concern itself with all matters relating to and affecting young people, i.e.:

- formulating and operating a Schools Programme,
- formulating Crime Prevention Programmes aimed at juveniles at risk,
- liaising with Statutory and Voluntary Agencies concerned with the welfare of young people,
- research and develop Diversion Programmes,
- record and examine cases involving juveniles missing from home and identify patterns in this area,
- implement and develop further an Outreach Programme designed to establish Garda contact and monitor the activities of 'detached' young people, particularly in the areas of drug and alcohol abuse,
- establish a liaison with School Attendance Officers and develop this area of contact,
- involve itself in the area of Child Sexual Abuse.

The Juvenile Bureau will be under the command of a Director (Superintendent) and will be operational during the coming year.

#### GARDA COMMUNITY RELATIONS

The Garda Community Relations Section which is under the control of a Chief Superintendent has responsibility for the operation of the Juvenile Liaison Officer Scheme, the Garda Crime Prevention Unit, Garda Patrol, Neighbourhood Policing and the community based crime prevention programmes of Neighbourhood Watch, Community Alert and Pharmacy Watch. The Section continues to investigate various anti-crime measures that will involve further citizen participation in crime prevention.

The work performed by the Section represents the conscientious effort of many individuals both public and Gardai including the Committee Members of the Dublin Region Neighbourhood Watch Representative Committee. It must also be acknowledged the valuable support that was provided by the various statutory and voluntary agencies that the Section liaised with during the year in the development and management of various projects.

#### CRIME PREVENTION UNIT

The Garda Crime Prevention Unit is centrally situated at the Metropolitan Area Headquarters in Harcourt Square, Dublin 2. One of this Unit's many undertakings is to lecture interested groups on personal security. Their experienced officers also provide useful advice on the security of dwelling houses and these officers are available in each division nationwide. Members of the public can by prior arrangement, visit a specially equipped exhibition room where they will be introduced to various security devices aimed at improving personal and home security. Commercial interests are also catered for.

Response to the Garda Patrol television programme was very satisfactory. A total of 51 programmes was transmitted during the year, which included 57 special Crime Prevention Items. The National Newspapers and various Magazines also carried infoirmation on crime prevention measures. Pamphlets on "Cash Custody" and "Vehicle Security" were printed and distributed.

A total of 5,904 Security Surveys were completed and 1,123 lectures provided.

#### NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

An increase of 14% in the numbers of Neighbourhood Watch Schemes in 1990 brought the total number of Schemes established at the end of the year to 995. In all, 199,701 households were incorporated in the Neighbourhood Watch movement throughout the State.

Neighbourhood Watch is now firmly recognised by householders as a normal constituent of community life. In many of the newer housing estates, one of the first steps taken by homeowners is to establish a local Scheme.

The benefits of a Scheme to the local community will largely depend on the effort and commitment of local activists. A survey carried out in July, 1990, by a Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator of the Schemes in the Bray area of Co. Wicklow provided valuable evidence of the need for close co-operation between the Scheme Co-ordinator and the Liaison Garda.

The Dublin Neighbourhood Watch Representative Committee is now in its third year of operation. This committee consists of one Area Coordinator from each of the Garda Districts in the Dublin area. The committee's first A.G.M. was held on 31st March 1990, at D.M.A. Garda Headquarters, Harcourt Square. At the meeting, the Commissioner presented Certificates of Appreciation to members of the outgoing Committee for their commitment throughout the year.

The pivitol role of community involvement in controlling crime and vandalism through their local Neighbourhood Watch and/or Community Alert scheme is becoming more widely appreciated. We look forward to a strengthening of the structure of these community based programmes in the year ahead.

#### COMMUNITY ALERT

The interest in this rural based crime prevention programme has continued to grow. Originally launched in 1985 through the caring offices of Muinter na Tire, the numbers of individual schemes recorded in 1990 increased from 185 to 221. Towards the end of the year there was a marked increase in interest which should reflect itself in further considerable growth during 1991.

The need for a structure which would provide a centralised focus for Community Alert Schemes continues to be felt. Regional structures based on Garda Divisional boundaries would provide a measure of co-ordination and direction to the movement which would benefit its growth and development.

Recent increases in crime in some Divisions outside of Dublin emphasises the need for effective community-based crime prevention programmes. Community Alert has already proved that it can be an invaluable aid to combatting crime and we look forward to its continued expansion.

#### NEIGHBOURHOOD POLICING

The function of the Neighbourhood Garda is to provide a policing service to the people who reside within a defined area and to work with local residents and associations to curb crime and vandalism within that area.

The success of the Neighbourhood Policing programme over the past number of years is reflected in the growth in members now being deployed on these duties. At the end of the year, 8 Sergeants and 120 Gardai had been appointed in the D.M.A, and 6 Gardai in Cork City.

A successful seminar for the above members was held at Garda Headquarters, Phoenix Park in July. Included on the programme were a number of speakers who had special knowledge of such diverse topics as Infant Sudden Death, the Aids Resource Centre and the developments currently taking place in the Probation and Welfare Service.

The expansion of the Neighbourhood Policing programme to urban centres outside Dublin got underway in December with the formal appointment of six members in Cork City. At that stage, plans were well advanced to extend the programme to the cities of Limerick and Galway.

Further expansion can be anticipated in 1991.

#### SUB AQUA UNIT

The Garda Sub Aqua Unit was established in 1966 to carry out searches for:

- (a) Bodies of victims of crime or drowning accidents,
- (b) Weapons used in the commission of crime or other evidence of crime deposited in water.

The Unit carried out 12 search operations during the year in connection with the investigation of crime. Resulting from 24 underwater search operations 7 bodies were recovered.

#### THE EMERGENCY 999 SERVICE

During the year 196,624 emergency 999 calls were received by the Garda. 159,612 calls at the Communications Centre, Dublin Metropolitan Area; 24,136 at the Communications Room, Union Quay, Cork City; 4,471 at Communications Room, Dundalk; 3,505 at Communications Room, Henry Street, Limerick; 2,191 at Communications Room, Galway; 1,438 at Communications Room, Waterford; 837 at Communications Room, Letterkenny and 434 calls at the Communications Room, Portlaoise.

#### STOLEN MOTOR VEHICLE INVESTIGATION UNIT

The Unit which operates for the whole country is based in Dublin. Close liaison is maintained with similar Units in other countries and this co-operation has led to the recovery of many stolen vehicles. 117 vehicles all of which bore false plates, were identified by the Investigation Unit as stolen. 80 vehicles stolen within the State were located here. 28 vehicles - 20 stolen in Great Britain and 8 in Northern Ireland were recovered here. 9 vehicles stolen within the State were located in Northern Ireland. For the year 1990 there were 1,661 vehicles recorded as stolen. 1120 of the vehicles stolen were motor cars while the remaining 541 vehicles included motor cycles, lorries, vans etc.

#### SPECIAL TRAFFIC CORPS

A Special Traffic Corps has operated in each Garda Division since 1973. While its primary responsibility is the prevention and detection of road traffic related offences, it is, nevertheless, expected to be involved in all aspects of law enforcement.

The principal aims are to reduce the rate of traffic fatalities and injuries on the roads by accident prevention generally and to create a greater public awareness and appreciation of traffic legislation and road safety measures.

The Traffic Corps was to the forefront in the successful Road Safety Campaign conducted prior to and over the Christmas period. 17,245 checkpoints were set up. 4645 persons were breath tested and there were 981 detections under the drunk driving legislation during the course of the Campaign.

# PRESS AND PUBLIC RELATIONS

The Garda Press /Public Relations Office continues to service the media on all relevant newsworthy material as well as assisting journalists, students, researchers and career guidance counsellors seeking information on the Force or requesting material for projects.

The advent of local radio and the increased frequency of news broadcasts made greater demands on the office, but extra staff was allocated to cope with this increased workload. The training of Gardai in the provinces to cope with local radio was a significant development undertaken by the Press Office.

Demands for career talks on the Garda Siochana and for participation in career guidance exhibitions are ever increasing and tremendous interest is shown by students throughout the State in the Garda Siochana as a career.

The Garda Band gave numerous recitals in aid of charity and otherwise, and thereby continued to play an important role in fostering good relations with the public, community groups and school children.

# MISUSE OF DRUGS

In 1990 the number of persons charged with the offences under the Misuse of Drugs Acts 1977-1984 was 2,071. This compares with 1,344 persons charged in 1989 and shows an increase of 54.1%.

The number of drug seizures increased by 48.3% from 1562 to 2316 in 1990.

The increase in the figures relate mainly to small amounts of Cannabis and Cannabis Resin for personal use and do not indicate any great increase in trafficking over recent years.

Approximately 73% of persons charged in 1990 were prosecuted for offences related to Cannabis and Cannabis Resin while less than 4% were charged for Heroin possession.

The amount and type of drugs seized varies from year to year and in 1990 three major seizures of Cannabis Resin alone amounted to 100Kg approx. As in 1989 two further seizures of Cocaine amounting to 1Kg were washed up on the West Coast of Ireland and believed to have come from a cargo ship lost at sea. To date there have been no seizures of 'Crack' Cocaine.

The Customs Service were responsible for a number of significant drug seizures during the year and in co-operation with the Gardai are responsible for some notable detections.

During the year talks and lectures on drug abuse were requested by various interested groups and such talks were given on 357 occasions.

All Garda training and promotion courses include lectures on drug law enforcement to enable members to deal with all aspects of this problem.

Arrangements are being made to provide members with an up-dated refresher training course in the prevention and detction of drug abuse.
