1. Message from the Commissioner

January started the year 2026 with successful policing operations and service delivery right across the country. As Commissioner, I held engagements with international policing partners and other members of our Senior Leadership Team also had significant stakeholder engagements. I was proud to see the publication of our Strategic Plan 2026-2028 and our Annual Service Plan 2026.

On 26 January 2026, I visited INTERPOL Headquarters in Lyon, France upon the invitation of its Secretary General Valdecy Urquiza. This allowed the opportunity to discuss key issues, including organised crime, strategic priorities and recent developments across Interpol. I also met our members from An Garda Síochána seconded to Interpol. This is an important relationship, and valuable contribution to international policing and cooperation. There was also high level meetings between An Garda Síochána and Coimisiún na Meán to discuss challenges surrounding AI and its use as a tool for the creation of intimate images.

Meetings were also held with representatives from the Irish Human Rights and Equality Commission; the CEO of Ruhama, Ms. Barbara Condon, the leader of Sinn Féin Mary Lou McDonald and chair of the Oireachtas Committee on Justice Deputy Matt Carthy; and with internal Garda Representative Associations. I was also delighted to welcome Irish Life Dublin Marathon 2025 Race Director Jim Aughney to Garda Headquarters as preparations get underway for the 2026 event.

We addressed over 800 business owners at the Centra Conference 2026 this month, reaffirming An Garda Síochána commitment to tackling retail crime and addressing the abuse and assaults faced by retail workers every day.

Further engagements this month included meeting with representatives of the Independent Commission for Reconciliation and Information Recovery, which follows the establishment of a new Troubles Legacy Liaison Unit. The newly established unit places new resourcing demands on An Garda Síochána, which competes with our ongoing priority of increasing visibility in our urban areas. The allocation of resources will continue to be carefully managed through 2026, as we also prepare for the demands of providing a policing and security service for the EU Presidency, and other significant policing events and demands.

Visibility will continue to be a priority, as we listen to the public who have told us through our Public Attitude Survey of the perception of crime and its impact on how safe they feel. We also continue to monitor our crime trends and statistics, to ensure deployment in each of our Regions and Divisions addresses where there are new challenges emerging.

Right across Ireland our divisional teams respond to all policing demands, delivering exceptional detections. This consistent policing keeps our communities safe and delivers convictions before the courts. To support their work, we delivered upgraded public order body armour nationwide to frontline members of the Garda National Public Order Unit, with enhanced fire safety material and body-worn camera integration.

An Garda Síochána continue to address the challenges in communities across Ireland with the dangers of motorcycles, mopeds, scooters and e-bikes. These can, and have, resulted in death and serious injury of users and pedestrians. We continue to utilise our engagement with youth and youth workers to increase awareness of the risks to prevent the behaviour. I am also working with my Senior Leadership Team to consider new policing opportunities to increase detection opportunities. Collaborative working with partners in this area will maximise every opportunity in this area to improve safety for all road and public space users. One successful operation in the Dublin Metropolitan Region resulted in the seizure of 18 e-scooters and a number of scramblers, motorised bicycles, drugs and cash, as part of an ongoing investigation targeting on-street drug dealing in Dublin's North Inner City.

In support of our road safety efforts, two road safety briefings were conducted this month in respect of the Christmas Road Safety campaign and the St. Brigid's Day Bank Holiday campaign. As part of these campaigns, media briefings were held and public messaging issued. This complemented our visibility and enforcement on our road networks.

Sadly, a further 13 people lost their lives on our roads this month, and the very real pain and sufferin

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endured by all those affected by such fatalities remains to the fore of all that we do. An Garda Síochána remains steadfast in our commitment to road safety, and we are always mindful of the very real and devastating consequences that each and every fatality and serious injury has on individuals, families and communities. I also want to recognise the work of our Gardaí and other first responders, who carry out this work with professionalism and compassion in very difficult circumstances.

During the month of January 2026, approximately 11 people were arrested on average per day for driving under the influence of drugs, while approximately 13 people on average per day were arrested for driving under the influence of alcohol. We continue to appeal to the public never to drive while under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

Our specialised national and regional teams continue to impact those involved in serious and organised crime, this unrelenting and essential work will continue into 2026.

The men and women of An Garda Síochána have commenced policing for 2026 with professionalism and a deep commitment. Already we have seen an increase in proactive detections of public order, drug offences and driving while intoxicated. We will continue to work with our many partners into 2026 to deliver on our commitment to keep people safe.

An Garda Síochána also promoted the public consultation process on a new Code of Practice for Publ

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Closed Circuit Television (CCTV). This system is widely used across Ireland and has proven effective in addressing community harm issues such as public order offences, drug-related crime, and property a

An Garda Síochána has a gross expenditure budget of €2.74b for 2026 and net allocation of €2.41b. At the end of January 2026, the total gross expenditure is €244.64m (8% of allocation) and receipts are €12.40m (10% of allocation). An additional €17.31m is available by way of capital carryover giving an adjusted gross allocation of €2.758b.

The budget profile for January 2026 is the same as the actual expenditure for January 2026 and thus there are no variances. The profiles for the remainder of the year will be reflected in the February 2026 accounts.

Current expenditure is €206.72m, which represents 8% of the budget allocation of €2.57b.

- Pay (including €17.18m overtime and 10% refund) is €189.02m. Please note 2025 although 5-week spend, at 9% of the budget for 2026 January 2026 of 5-week include
- Non-pay is €17.70m, driven by ICT and Communications. EU Presidency expenditure in January 2026 is €157,821.

Capital expenditure of €14.50m was driven by ICT.

Appropriations in Aid is €12.40m. This is largely driven by superannuation receipts of €8.74m.

Estate Management

Works continue at Bailieborough, Portlaoise and Newcastle West Garda Stations, and are the subject of active engagement between the OPW and An Garda Síochána.

3. People and Development

The Strength of Garda Personnel

As we continue to deliver effective recruitment of Student Gardaí, in line with the Programme of Government, we will continue to review our allocation and development of Probationer Gardaí as they commence their careers in An Garda Síochána. The allocation of resources to specialised policing areas will be carefully managed with consideration of all our policing demands.

As at 31 January 2026, the Garda member strength stood at 14,397 and the Garda Staff strength stood at 3,692. A full breakdown by rank, grade and gender is outlined below.

4. Corporate Communications

Throughout the month of January 2026, the Office of Corporate Communications continued to communicate internally and externally on a broad range of policing activities undertaken by An Garda Síochána.

Our external engagement is important as it provides reassurance and accurate information to the public, often after serious and concerning incidents. During January 2026, on behalf of An Garda Síochána, the Garda Press Office issued 159 press releases, including 57 missing person appeals in respect of 30 individuals; 21 witness appeals; together with those related to operational activities and operations undertaken by the organisation during the month of January 2026.

This month we delivered nine issues of Newsbeat which shared important information to our Gardaí and Garda Staff, including our Strategic Plan and Annual Service Plan, guides on cryptocurrency fraud investigation, drug-related intimidation, enhanced public order equipment and the establishment of the Troubles Legacy Liaison Unit.

A Garda social media awareness and education campaign was launched on 12 January 2026 focused on individuals who use cocaine highlighting the impact of buying illegal drugs and how it funds criminals who commit various crimes such as intimidation, human trafficking, violence and environmental destruction.

On The Beat aired on 5 January 2026 for a new series






'On The Beat', a four-part ride-along docuseries which was filmed in Waterford, Limerick and Monaghan, explores the daily work of Gardaí and the communities we serve. With exclusive access, the series shows the real challenges, real teamwork and real moments that shape policing across Ireland. The first three episodes, which aired in January 2026, saw an average of 422,000 viewers tune in. Audience feedback was generally positive, with viewers responding well to the realism and seeing the Gardaí in action.

5. Crime Trends


Crime Trends

These are carried in the CSO's quarterly publications of crime trends and in their annual reports.

● Reported Incidents ● 12m Avg





6. Demonstrations and Events

Demonstrations

While there has been a significant reduction in the volume of demonstrations compared to January 2025, An Garda Síochána provided a policing response, including traffic management at protests/demonstrations, which continued to focus on themes including anti-immigration, associated accommodation and international conflict.

7. Roads Policing

An Garda Síochána continues to respond to road safety challenges. In January 2026, 13 people died in fatal collisions. There were 98 serious injury collisions reported in January 2026. An Garda Síochána continues to implement the 30-minute roads policing initiative which was introduced in April 2024 to increase visibility on our roads. In January 2026, there were 3,884 MIT checkpoints conducted. There was an average of approximately 11 arrests per day nationally for driving under the influence of drugs, 13 per day for driving under the influence of alcohol and there were more than 2,900 vehicles seized under the provisions of Section 41 of the Road Traffic Act in January 2026.

A media briefing on road safety enforcement, with a particular focus on the introduction of red light camera technology in support of Iarnród Éireann, took place on 28 January 2026. The purpose of the briefing was to provide public information on the introduction of a red light camera and the reinforcement of key road safety messaging, and outline its role in improving compliance and reducing serious road traffic collisions.

8. Prevention and Disruption of Crime

Garda National Immigration Bureau Charter Operation

On 25 January 2026, the Garda National Immigration Bureau successfully undertook a charter operation and removed 33 persons to both Poland and Lithuania. All 33 persons (17 Polish nationals and 16 Lithuanian nationals) were subject of EU removal orders. The 33 individuals amassed a total of 1,043 criminal convictions while in the State for serious offences, including domestic violence, drugs, sexual offences, theft, fraud, money laundering, criminal damage, public order, road traffic and non-fatal offences.

Search operation in the DMR to combat drug-related intimidation and organised crime activity

On 27 January 2026, Gardaí conducted search operations at 21 locations as part of ongoing investigations targeting on-street drug dealing in Dublin's North Inner City. Gardaí seized a number of vehicles suspected of being used to facilitate on-street drug dealing, specifically e-scooters, e-bikes and scrambler motor bikes. Alongside efforts to disrupt and dismantle drug distribution networks, the operation was aimed at combatting drug-related intimidation and organised crime activity associated with these networks. The searches resulted in the seizure of the following items; 18 electric scooters, a motorbike, five mini scramblers, five motorised bicycles, various controlled suspected drugs (approximately €55,000 worth and subject to analysis) and €10,740 cash.

Garda National Youth Diversion Bureau attend an online guidance lab on Diversion Pathways

The Garda National Youth Diversion Bureau attended an online guidance lab on diversion pathways, organised by the European Union Crime Prevention Network (EUCPN). The Network aims to connect the local, national and European level, and promote crime prevention knowledge and practices among the EU Member States. The EUCPN Secretariat currently holds weekly guidance labs which aims to bring together practitioners with practical experience, to discuss topics and challenges in the field of youth recruitment, with a focus on a specific topic, for example, youth diversion, focused deterrence or online prevention techniques. At these meetings, practitioners can provide feedback and exchange experiences, which will be used by the Secretariat to develop a toolkit on youth recruitment into organised crime.

An Garda Síochána Road Safety Campaign for St Brigid's Bank Holiday Weekend

On 29 January 2026, An Garda Síochána Road Safety Campaign for St. Brigid's Bank Holiday weekend was launched by Assistant Commissioner, Catharina Gunne, Roads Policing and Community Engagement. Minister of State, Seán Canney and CEO of the Road Safety Authority, Mr. Sam Waide, were also in attendance at the launch. The importance of driving without distractions was highlighted at the launch. Assistant Commissioner Catharina Gunne, Roads Policing and Community Engagement said:

"Driving requires your full attention. When you pick up a mobile phone, read a message, or interact with any device behind the wheel, you are placing yourself, your passengers, and every other road user at risk. No call, message or notification is worth a life. Put the phone away, remove distractions, and stay focused on the road. We are asking everyone to play their part. A safe journey is the responsibility of every driver. By eliminating distractions and making safe decisions, you can help ensure that all road users arrive home safely."

The Road Safety Campaign ran from 7am Thursday, 29 January 2026 until 7am on Tuesday, 3 February 2026.

9. Community Engagement

The STRIPE Young Scientist and Technological Exhibition

Between 7 and 10 January 2026, the Garda National Community Policing Unit (GNCPU) provided a stand at the STRIPE Young Scientist and Technological Exhibition. This provided opportunity to engage with young people at primary and secondary schools level.

An Garda Síochána was able to showcase developments with regard to Garda equipment and technology, including the new Garda Community Policing mobile van. The van is designed to drive to and immediately establish a mobile office at community policing events, exhibitions and festivals. It provides An Garda Síochána with a platform to engage positively with young people by offering relevant crime prevention and road safety advice while highlighting the range of Garda work and career opportunities. The Garda National Diversity Unit (GNDU) were also in attendance to promote the work of An Garda Síochána and of GNDU.

Just One Life – Young Driver Awareness Programme

On 22 January 2026, Gardaí in the Eastern Region held the Just One Life – Young Driver Awareness Programme in the National Opera House, Wexford Town. This event was aimed at educating young people on road safety and the real-life consequences of dangerous driving. Garda representatives spoke directly to students about collisions, driver error, and the lifelong impact incidents can have on families and communities.

AXA Roadsafe Roadshow in the Southern Region

On 22 January 2026, the AXA Roadsafe Roadshow took place in the Southern Region. This Road Safety initiative is run by AXA Insurance in Ireland in partnership with An Garda Síochána, emergency services and local partners. It is designed to educate young people, especially Transition Year students, about the real dangers of road traffic collisions and encourage safer driving behaviour. There were 1,800 Transition Year students in attendance from schools in the Southern Region.

This was an exceptional event where students heard from Gardaí, Paramedics, Surgeons, Fire Service personnel, a father whose daughter died in a road traffic collision and a young man who suffered serious injuries having been involved in a collision. There was also a re-enactment of a traffic collision where students got to witness the aftermath of a collision and the impact and effects that it can have.
