#### **Foreword**

It is my pleasure to introduce An Garda Síochána's Policing Plan for the Donegal Division for the year 2011. This plan outlines our strategic goals for the second year of the Strategy Statement 2010 – 2012 and includes the priorities determined for An Garda Síochána by the Minister for Justice and Law Reform under Section 20 of the Garda Síochána Act 2005.

The Strategy Statement 2010 – 2012 is based upon four core values, namely:

- **Honesty** Being honest and ethical and adhering to the principles of fairness and justice;
- Accountability Accepting individual responsibility and ensuring public accountability;
- **Respect** Having respect for people, their Human Rights and their needs;
- **Professionalism** Providing a professional policing service to all communities.

The Plan concentrates on delivering six main policing areas;

- Ensuring our Nation's Security
- Confronting Crime
- Effective Roads Policing
- Ensuring a Peaceful Community
- Working with Communities
- An Excellent Organisation

The Minister has determined the following matters as priorities for the Garda Siochana for 2011, in accordance with Section 20 of the Garda Siochana Act 2005.

#### **Security**

To protect the State and the people against terrorism in all its forms.

#### Crime

To combat serious crime, in particular organised crime.

## **Policing Communities**

To achieve the maximum levels of safety for local communities and to provide a community policing service which meets the demands of the public.

### **Roads Policing**

To police the roads, in particular to reduce the number of deaths and serious injuries arising from collisions.

## **Efficient use of resources**

To promote efficiencies in resource allocation and deployment so as to enhance the policing service to the public.

### **Victims of Crime**

To support and protect all victims of crime and treat them with dignity. To keep all victims of crime informed about the progress of their cases and bring offenders to justice promptly.

## **Human Trafficking**

To prevent and detect human trafficking

### FOREWORD FROM THE DONEGAL DIVISIONAL OFFICER.

In preparing this policing plan, I have sought submissions from our stakeholders, including public representatives, Donegal County Council, HSE and local community groups throughout Donegal. I received a number of excellent submissions and many aspects of those submissions have been incorporated into the Plan.

There continues to be a significant threat from dissident republicans within the Donegal division. In 2010, there were a number of dissident related incidents with an increase of cross border criminal activity. An Garda Siochana as an organisation are committed to protecting our citizens from organised criminal gangs. To minimise the threat of Tiger Kidnappings I have allocated a Detective Sergeant to Ballybofey during 2010 to Co-ordinate and improve border operations to counter this threat. A Detective Sergeant was also appointed with responsibility for the Ballyshannon and Glenties Districts in 2010. In addition to this, a Regional Support Unit has been established this year at Ballyshannon.

There will be an increased emphasis on targeting property crime in 2011. There will be intelligence lead operations against specific individuals and gangs involved in persistent property crime. Drugs enforcement will be continued through targeted operations and by maintaining the strength of Divisional Drugs Units. This strategy proved hugely effective in 2010 with significant successes against cannabis cultivation operations.

An Garda Síochána, along with its partners in the Donegal Road Safety Working Group, will continue our efforts throughout 2011 with a view to further improving road safety in Donegal following the multiple fatalities again in Inishowen. The establishment of a Divisional Traffic Unit in Bunbeg has been introduced to improve road safety in the west of the County. A number of vehicles with ANPR (Automated Number Plate Recognition) are now in operation in the Division and these will be used in targeting prolific Road Traffic offenders, Criminals, and Stolen vehicles. The National roll out of Mobile Safety Speed Detection Camera in the Division will increase public awareness and deter speeding on the County's roads.

Joint Policing Committees have been established in Letterkenny, Buncrana, and Ballyshannon. We recognise communities concerns and we will endeavour to assess their needs. Our National Community Policing Strategy was rolled out in 2009 and in this context, I intend to increase the number of Gardaí attached to Community Policing units throughout the Division to ensure that An Garda Síochána is more visible and accessible to the community in general. This is part of our commitment to the National Model of Community Policing.

An Garda Síochána's National Youth Strategy will receive priority in the Division in 2011 and continued emphasis will be placed on developing and enhancing the services we provide to young people throughout the Division this year. In this regard, an additional position was created for a Juvenile Liaison Officer at Letterkenny. Further to this, a pilot project of the Garda Síochána's Case Management System for prolific young offenders was run throughout the Donegal Division in 2011 in collaboration with other interested State Agencies.

With respect to accommodation, the custody suite in Letterkenny is fully operational. The new station in Buncrana was officially opened in 2010. Creeslough and Ramelton Garda Stations will be refurbished in 2011. Sourcing Garda accommodation on Arranmore Island will continue as well as the acquisition of suitable accommodation at Carndonagh. A

Divisional Property and Exhibits Store has been completed at Letterkenny station and will be operational in the first quarter of 2011.

The realignment of the Carrick and Glencolmcille Garda Districts from the Glenties District to the Ballyshannon District is currently under review. This is projected to be completed by the third quarter.

All Garda operations throughout 2011 will be conducted in the context of the current budgetary constraints. My management team and I will endeavour to maximise operations in an efficient and effective manner within budget to deliver the best possible policing service to the people of Donegal Division.
