Foreword:

It is my pleasure to introduce the Limerick Garda Division Annual Policing Plan for 2013. The Divisional Plan has its origins in the published goals of An Garda Síochána for 2013 and reflects the first stage of An Garda Síochána's Strategy for the coming three years.



As with all public service bodies in the State, An Garda Síochána feels the impact of the external environment; the organisation must address that impact and make the changes that allows policing service to be maintained in all communities. In 2012, the Division saw the closure of two Garda Stations: This year a total of six further Garda Stations will close and Askeaton Garda District will merge with Newcastle West Garda District. I and my Management Team provided a commitment that the policing service would be maintained in the areas affected by Station Closures in 2012 and that same strong commitment extends to those areas affected by closures in 2013.

Collectively, An Garda Síochána's published Goals for 2013 reflect our commitment to the community we serve. That commitment to community permeates through planned actions in the Limerick Divisional Policing Plan for 2013. Each Goal and its associated actions and expected outcomes have the overarching aim of protecting the community, not just through formal policing operations but also through our proud ethos of working not just *for* communities but *with* communities. Further, An Garda Síochána must look at *how* we police and identify and make the changes necessary to ensure we continue to develop, both in professional practice and effective management of resources.

Policing in Limerick Garda Division will undoubtedly face challenges in 2013. Through professional and dedicated policing and with the support of the communities we serve, I have no doubt that these challenges will be overcome.
