- We will develop and extend our support Hospital Watch at Cork University Hospital (CUH) during 2005. Easter 2006 will see the opening of the new Maternity Section. 200 additional patient places will be created at this location with the relocation of services from St Finbarr's and Erinville Hospitals.
- In all missing person reports we will appoint a Garda Liaison Officer to maintain direct contact with families.
- Upgraded immigration facilities at Cork Airport will become available 2005 allowing us provide increased quality of service at this location
- Community Policing will continue to be fostered, developed and resourced so that our core policing service delivery is uniquely Irish and uniquely closer to the people we serve. Community commitment is a two way process. We depend on our communities to help us to help you.
- Divisional Officer will continue to develop awareness and training in relation to the Cork Joint Major Emergency Plan. 2004 saw the successful completion of an inter agency desktop exercise with a pharmaceutical company in the Cork Harbour Area. In 2005 we anticipate partaking in a live inter agency exercise at Cork Airport to test our readiness to respond to an emergency at that location.

All Immigration Officers dealing with non-nationals will treat them in a fair and humane manner and will be mindful of their human rights. Immigration Officers will liaise with the Community Garda appointed to deal with ethnic and minority groups. Members from the Immigration Unit will endeavour to prevent racially motivated attacks and monitor any such incidents by the use of the PULSE system. Every effort will be made to combat illegal immigration by enforcing Immigration Law at Cork Airport and the Ferry Port at Ringaskiddy. The Immigration Unit will liaise with Crime, Drug and Fraud Units in an effort to combat criminal activity by non-nationals and target groups suspected of crime and drug related activity. Immigration Unit will share with all sections intelligence in relation to illegal activity by non-nationals. Members from the Immigration Unit will visit business premises owned or run by non-nationals in an effort to build up a good relationship with them and to gain an insight into their ethnic and multicultural communities. Ensuring that divisional staff are fully aware of the difficulties encountered by members of ethnic/religious minority groups as indicated by a recent Public Attitude Survey and that Gardaí be sympathetic when dealing with all members of ethnic minorities. 	
	 Gardaí to ensure that any incident which appears to be racially motivated is immediately thoroughly investigated and brought to the notice of his/her supervisor. 	

- Ethnic liaison Garda and community Gardaí are to continue to encourage close liaison with transition centres and build up a rapport of trust with administrators and occupants of these centres.
