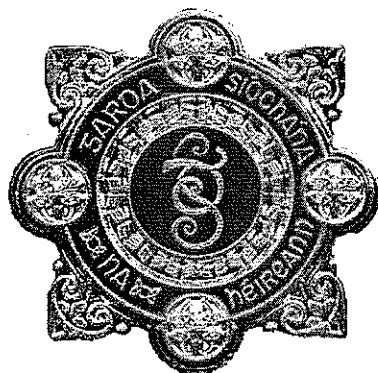

### Foreword of Chief Superintendent J.G. Kelly, Divisional Officer, Limerick.
